# Police officer from Aston Clinton wins bravery award

Three Milton Keynes Police Officers who saved the lives of a terrified wife and her three children by detaining an extremely violent and aggressive husband have been named overall winners of the Thames Valley Police Federation Bravery Awards and will now represent TVP at the National Police Bravery Awards in London this June.

PC David Icke, who grew up in Aston Clinton, and his colleagues, PC Emily Chapman and PC Nazia Hussain, suffered severe injuries but were still able to subdue the man during the attack.

In June, 2018 the officers were called to attend reports of screaming from a property in Bletchley at around midnight. On arrival, the officers could see neighbours on the street and could hear screams coming from one of the houses.

Realising they were children's screams the officers knew they had to get into the property quickly and smashed their way into the property using a neighbour's hammer.

As they reached the landing, they could see a man punching his wife.

Seeing the officers approach him, the man turned his aggression on PC Hussain and grabbed her before punching her in the head several times. PC Chapman then discharged her Taser, but such was the man's aggressive state that it had no effect on him.

She then used her PAVA spray on the man in a bid to get him to release PC Hussain, but again the deterrent did little to stop the attack.

By now the man had grabbed PC Chapman and was forcing her over the bannister before PC Icke managed to spray more PAVA directly into the man's eyes.

However, the man carried on attacking PC Hussain until the officers managed to bundle him to the ground.

Back up arrived to help detain the man, and the officers could see the devastation his violence had caused. Three children were in the bedroom, which was covered in blood and vomit.

PC Icke broke his hand during the incident while PC Hussain suffered concussion.

The man later received a 16 year jail sentence, and it transpired that as the officers arrived he had been planning to murder his wife by drowning her in the bath.

PC Icke said; "We were fighting for our lives, and we needed to protect the people in the house because we didn't know at that point what's happened to them and the state of their health. We had to control the man anyway we could."

PC Chapman said "It really did get to the point where we would have tried anything to stop him, to protect us and the others... I was so worried about him getting back into the bedroom, to the children and wife. It is one of those cases that we all feel we saved their lives. That's our job. That's what we're here to do, and it is one job that will always stick in our minds as we did it to the best of our ability and saved them."

The officers later arranged for Christmas presents to be sent to the children.

Thames Valley Police Federation Chairman Craig O'Leary said the officers were life-savers. He added: "These officers endured what can only be descried as a horrific incident.

"Having sustained injuries themselves, they have done a phenomenal job in making sure that this offender was brought to justice. That was reflected in the sentence that he was given. The courts don't hand out 16-year sentences unless it's warranted and I think that really goes to show the severity of the job that this team faced on that day.

"Every single one of them is brave to the core, and they are a terrific example of the professionalism and the bravery that our Thames Valley Police officers show on a daily basis."

David Icke lived in Aston Clinton from 1988-2009, and attended Aston Clinton School and Tring School. He married Emily Sullivan at St Michael's Church Aston Clinton in June 2010, but sadly Emily died at the age of 25, in June 2015, of Cystic Fibrosis. David has now remarried and has son and lives near Banbury.

### NGS Open Gardens

The National Garden Scheme was started in 1927 by the Queen's Nursing Institute as a means of raising

money. Nearly 100 years later the NGS still gives access to over 3700 exceptional private gardens throughout the country and raises impressive amounts of money for nursing and health charities through admissions, teas and cake.

This year there will three gardens opening locally. On **26 April, from 2-5pm** you will be able to visit 101, Green End Street and Lantern Cottage, also in Green End Street. The combined admission for the two gardens is £4 per person. Refreshments will be available at Lantern Cottage.

They will be open again on **28 June** and the same arrangements apply. On that day another garden, at Canal Cottage, 11, Wharf Row, Buckland Road will also be open. This will be open from **12-4pm** and admission is £3 per person.

# Green Park -A short history



The sporting facility which we now know as Green Park in Stablebridge Road, has not always been the same. In fact, it has a long history dating back to the late 18th Century.

The Aston Clinton Estate, (which included not only all the land which is now Aston Clinton Park, but also most of the land bounded by London Road), was the home of General Gerald Lake, who was the Member of Parliament for Aylesbury and later became the 1st Viscount Lake of Delhi, Leswaree and Aston Clinton. He had a mansion built there which remained in his family's ownership for 50 years. He was a friend of the then Prince of Wales (Prinny) who used to like to come out to Aston Clinton to hunt with Lord Lake. However, Aston Clinton House was too small for the prince's entourage, so the house which is now The Bell was built to house them. There is a memorial to the 1st Viscount Lake in St Michael's Church where he is buried in the Sanctuary.

It was the 2nd Viscount Lake who put the estate on the market and sold it to the Duke of Buckingham. It is not known whether the duke actually lived there, but it came on the market again around 1850 when the house was described as 'a most desirable sporting residence, suited to a family of respectability'. The then Lady Rothschild was, at that time, encouraging her sons to move out of London and Sir Anthony

purchased the estate in 1851. He and his wife, Louisa, extended the house enormously over the years and built the Girls' School and many other houses and cottages in the village. In fact, the house and the estate needed so many servants to run it that Aston Clinton could not supply enough people and Sir Anthony had to look to Buckland for more servants. So that they could get to work over a good road, New Road was constructed joining the two villages.

Sir Anthony died in 1876 but Lady Louisa continued to live at Aston Clinton House with her daughters, Constance and Annie, and in 1894 she built **The Anthony Hall** in Sir Anthony's memory. A bust of Sir Anthony and a portrait of Constance and Annie can still be seen in the hall. Lady Rothschild died in 1910 and her hatchment hangs in St Michael's Church.

Following Lady Rothschild's death, the daughters continued to run the estate until the First World War when it was loaned to the War Office and used as the headquarters for the 21st Infantry Division. There is a photograph in the Aston Clinton Archive of King George V inspecting the troops on what are now the football pitches in Aston Clinton Park.

The estate was sold in 1923 for £15,000 to Dr Crawford who used the mansion as a boys' boarding school. Evelyn Waugh taught there for a short time and it is the background described by him in his novel Decline and Fall'. One of the characters in the book, Captain Grimes, does a moonlight flit leaving debts. This actually happened and the real man was well remembered in the village shop for his indebtedness. Dr Crawford's school was not a success and the estate was sold again. Dr Crawford died and his tomb is in the middle of the burial ground adjoining St Michael's Churchyard.

Again, the estate was sold when it became Aston Clinton Country Club for a very few years before it became, first, the Howard Park Hotel in 1933 and then changed its name to the Green Park Hotel in 1938. Both enterprises failed.

During the Second World War, the house was used as a hospital for troops and the stables were the home of the EKCO Radio Company which worked there on the development of radar.

Following the war, the house was deteriorating and over a period between 1959 and 1967, the house and parts of the estate were bought by Bucks County Council. They demolished the house and built the Green Park Training Centre, which was operated directly by the County Council but is now leased to The Adventure Learning Charity, with 80-acres of outdoor activities and is open to everybody. The activities include after school and school holiday activity courses.

The swimming pool and sports hall offer the opportunity to learn to swim and fence, whilst outside there is archery, mountain biking, high ropes and a climbing wall. A far cry from the opulence and sophisticated elegance during the estate's ownership by the Lakes and the Rothschilds but much more use to the presentday population. The 35+ acres which now form Aston Clinton Park were purchased by the Parish Council in 1973 and contain remnants of the house terraces which were in the 'Park' of the big house. Lady Rothschild found them unsightly and had them demolished.

The only thing remaining on the site of Aston Clinton House is part of the balustrade outside what used to be the front door of the house. The stables remain largely intact. The pump house (still with the pump inside it) is in the wood forming part of Aston Clinton Park. There is a memorial to the 1st Viscount Lake in St Michael's Church where he is buried in the Sanctuary. James Adam

# A New Era for **School Inspections**

In September 2019, Amanda Spielman (Ofsted Chief Inspector of Education) introduced a new inspection framework, which is in four categories: Quality of Education, Behaviour and Attitudes, Personal Development and Leadership and Management. The centrepiece is the quality of education judgement. The focus of this judgement has shifted significantly with the emphasis now being the school's curriculum. Its rationale is to put a broad, rich and balanced curriculum at the heart of learning and to dial down on a data-heavy culture. What is taught and how is it taught?

Ofsted has created a new nomenclature to describe the quality of education judgment: "Intent, implementation and impact".



So, what do they mean by curriculum intent? It is about the 'substance of education': What do we want our children to learn? How will learning progress from the Early years to Year 6? Does the curriculum provide the building blocks of what children need to know and be able to do to succeed in all subjects?

Curriculum implementation is how we go about ensuring that what we intend is put into action and that our curriculum can be measured in terms of how pupils have developed new knowledge, understanding and skills that they can use and recall with fluency.

The inspection team will use a methodology referred to as a 'deep dive' to gain a deeper understanding of a school's curriculum. They will carry out inspections through subject areas to make overall judgements. They will be going into lessons and observing teachers and children, looking at children's work, talking to children, having deep discussions with curriculum and subject leaders, talking about curriculum intention, coherence and sequencing as well as its translation into the classroom. Subject leaders will be asked why particular knowledge has been selected, how it is sequenced and embedded and how it links to stages in development. Inspectors will usually carry out deep dives into between three and six subjects.

Our journey... we were last inspected under the previous framework where data was the driving factor. We have, therefore, had to follow two development plans this year, one to address the issues raised in the inspection report and the other to ensure we are working towards a judgement of 'Good' in the new framework. We have analysed our curriculum to ensure that it reflects our vision statement: Aspire, care, succeed. This includes analysing the impact that our enrichment activities have on our children. As children are the most important people in the whole process, we have asked them for their feedback and consulted them about their learning journey. They have given us 51 things that every child at our school should experience/achieve by the time they leave us. These are listed on our school website www.astonclintonschool.co.uk.

We are now working hard with the children to ensure these things are built into our curriculum and are excited about the future!


**Aston Clinton** Pre-school has been part of the village community for over 50 years.

It is difficult to get people to talk about VE day 75 years on. I was just seven years old and away at boarding school so cannot remember anything about that day at all. My patchy memories of that time include the 'blackout' paint on windows, the wartime fire engines parked in a shed alongside our playground, walks to the searchlight field and going down the shelter when the siren went off.

However, I managed to speak to a couple of people who remembered that time. Ann Wheeler (nee Donahue) remembers a VE Day party at Mr Cook's bungalow on the corner of Twitchell Lane. She said that Mr Cook went to Watford Market and brought lots of lovely goodies that they had not had for a long time.

Eileen Brooker, one of our older members, lived in Isleworth at the time. She was 11 years old and remembers having a street party with tables down the middle of the road and bunting hung across the road.

In Aston Clinton, VE day is remembered each year with a Poppy wreath being quietly laid on the war memorial. The picture shows it being carried out by our chairman, Robert Leyton.

Whilst we celebrate this 75th Anniversary, we must also remember that the war continued with great hardship and losses in the Far East and VJ day is not celebrated until August 15.

#### **VE Day 75 Celebration**

The Parish council, in conjunction, with St Michael's, will be holding celebrations to mark VE Day 75 on Friday 8th May. It starts with a short commemoration at our War memorial at 2.30pm. The Royal British Legion will be there with our standard and will lay a wreath. After prayers, a speaker and a bugler playing the Last Post, we will walk to St Michaels for a church service at 3pm. This will be followed by refreshments in the church.

The celebrations will continue at the Rothschild Arms in the evening. At 7pm St Michael's Bells will ring out in conjunction with all other churches around the United Kingdom.

# Remembering VE Day 8 May, 1945

Our issue 44, in November, 2018, remembered the 45 local men who gave their lives in World War I. We have now come to another anniversary - 75 years since the end of World War II in Europe. It seems hard to believe that only 21 years passed from the industrial levels of death in the first war until it started all over again and millions more died across the world from 1939 - 1945.

Although our villages did not lose as many in the second war, each of the 17 men and one woman who died also had lives cut short and left behind families and friends.

There are 13 names on the Aston Clinton memorial and five in Buckland. Although there were people with connections to Drayton Beauchamp it seems they have been commemorated elsewhere.

Because of the passage of time we do not have much information about many of our service personnel but here is a reminder of the people whose names you can see on our memorials. There is more information about each person on our website. www.acvillagelife.co.uk/warstories

Captain Jean Nelson is particularly interesting as very few women appear on war memorials. Before the war she had been an anaesthetist at University College Hospital in London and was killed in an air raid on VJ Day.

### Your Council

On 1st April your council changed. The new

Buckinghamshire

Council will replace all five of the district and county councils in Buckinghamshire, and over the coming weeks and months you'll start to see some changes as you come across the new look council.

#### What does the new council mean for me?

- The same services, better together. For most people there will be no change to the day-to-day services you use. This includes bin collections, looking after our elderly and young people, libraries and parking. The focus for the future will be on improving these services as a new council together.
- One council. Getting in touch with the council will be simpler because you'll only need to contact one council for all the services currently provided by the county and district councils.
- Face-to-face advice, support and information from your council through a network of 17 local Council Access Points based at the heart of your local community - in current council offices and libraries across the county. The five council offices in Aylesbury (Walton Street and The Gateway), High Wycombe, Amersham and Denham will be 'access plus' points, geared up to handle more complex enquiries.
- Stronger links with local communities. Buckinghamshire Council councillors will work closely with local people and community organisations to understand and respond to the key issues affecting their local area through 16 Community Boards.

#### Who will be my local councillor on the new council?

There will be 147 councillors elected to Buckinghamshire Council. Elections for the new council have been postponed because of the Covid 19 pandemic so until the newly elected councillors take up their posts, your current elected members from the five existing councils will continue to serve your communities.

### Crime prevention advice - Faraday pouch

There has been a spate of theft of and theft from vehicles in Aylesbury and the rural areas. Because of this, here is some advice regarding keyless entry vehicles.

Metal-lined key wallets to stop hi-tech crooks in their tracks

Keyless entry and starting for your car is convenient and user-friendly, but it does leave you vulnerable to hi-tech thieves. These criminals use relay attack devices to 'read' the key from outside your house. With the code copied, they can simply drive off in your vehicle.

Storing your key in a Faraday bag, lined with layers of metallic material, is the way to foil them and keep your car safe. The key needs to be placed inside the bag from the moment you clip the locks. If it's large enough, you can also put in your mobile phone and credit cards to prevent hacking and fraud. Keep your keyless car safe.

#### Rainbows

Five years ago the Rainbow unit in the village opened its doors to 15 excited young girls. It seems unbelievable that some of these girls will be off to secondary school soon! Since then we have welcomed many more girls in to Girlguiding and seen them all grow and flourish. It's been a very busy five years including earning many badges, going on trips, welcoming visitors to talk to us about a whole range of subjects and a successful first Rainbows sleepover!



Rainbows is for girls 5-7 years old and offers a valuable opportunity to have fun, build confidence and gain experience in a safe and nurturing environment, with the emphasis on learning by doing. A new programme was introduced last year and there is now a wide range of topics that the Rainbows can earn badges for, including Express Myself, Skills for My Future and Be Well. Some of the badges we have completed so far are First Aid, Make Change (which involved choosing a charity and raising money) and Innovate (which involved doing science experiments and inventing).

40 minutes later a chap arrived from Leighton Buzzard equipped with a large carrier used specifically for the safe transportation of large birds.




It took a while to round the swan up but once he was secured he was on his way to Tiggywinkles to be fixed up.

# Pharmacists - help on the high street from experts in medicines

Where can you get prompt help or advice from a qualified health professional who is an expert in medicines, without an appointment? From your local high street pharmacist, of course.

With the NHS under intense pressure it's wise to make the pharmacist your first port of call if you feel unwell. Nine out of ten people live within 20 minutes of a pharmacy.



Everyone is familiar with going to the pharmacy for a prescription, or painkillers, but did you know that pharmacists have five years of training in the use of medicines? As well as being qualified to dispense your NHS prescription, pharmacists can offer advice on a wide range of health problems.

If you have a cold, cough or other common ailment such as a tummy bug, earache or eye infection, seek advice from your local pharmacist right away before you start to feel worse. Pharmacists can give clinical advice on how to manage your illness, or recommend over the counter remedies, and they know when to refer you to the GP if they suspect it is more serious.

The great thing about a local pharmacy, is that it is so easy to access. Over 84% of adults in the country visited a pharmacy last year.

Pharmacies have a consultation room, so patients can discuss health problems in private just as they would with their GP, but without the need to make an appointment.

When you contact 111 for urgent medical help, you could be referred to a pharmacist. It's a good thing if this happens because it means that your condition is not serious enough to need hospital or a doctor, but you are still able to get immediate access to the right clinical advice and possibly medication to help you.

With extended opening hours at evenings and weekends, pharmacies should be top of the list for anyone seeking convenient, quick, professional health advice.

# Village People

This is a series about the people of Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp. Not just about the people who live in these villages but the people who are a part of the daily life of the villages.



Claire and Neil Walker are actively involved as Scout leaders.

#### Q. How long have you been with the Aston Clinton Scouts?

A. Claire – 10 years. I run the Beaver section. *Neil* – 7 years. I run the Scout section. We both run the Explorer section.

#### Q. How old are the scouts and how many are there?

A. Ages range from six to 18 years. There are 80 young people across all the four sections: Beavers, Cubs, Scouts & Explorers.

#### Q. What does the role involve?

A. Main responsibility is to organise activities of our section. Main aim is to have fun and ensure that the children have fun too.

#### Q. Did you require any specific training?

A. All volunteers have training in safety, safeguarding and GDPR. Those wanting to have a full leadership role are trained in the fundamentals of Scouting, how to deliver a balanced programme of activities and first aid. Adventurous activities such as camping, hiking in mountainous terrain or water activities require further training/experience.

#### Q. Has the role changed over the years?

A. Not a lot. It's still trying to be the same organisation Baden-Powell started at the beginning of the last century but with more focus on safety and safeguarding. Tents have a got a lot lighter since those early days but many of the activities remain the same.

#### Q. How many people are involved in Aston Clinton Scouts?

A. Forty people have provided help at some point over the past year. Each section is supported by between three and five volunteers and there's a committee that acts as trustees for the group and assists with the admin. Keen parents also come on camps and hikes.

#### Q. What advice would you give to anyone wanting to help with the scouts?

A. Change your mindset to that of young people. They come to meetings to have fun and try out new things. Stop worrying about whether you know how to tie knots or pitch a tent. Plenty of us already know how to do that and we can teach you. Also, stop worrying about whether you have the time, but don't believe anyone who tells you it's just an hour a week!

#### Q. How long have you lived in Aston Clinton?

A. Almost 17 years. Neil moved work from Leeds to Watford and we travelled up the A41 until we found somewhere that looked nice and we could afford. We said we would give it 18 months!

#### Q. Are you involved in any other activities or groups in the village?

A. We try and attend and support as many village events as we can.

### Q. What are your hobbies, what do you do for fun?

A. Claire - Scouts, running, camping, cycling, climbing up mountains, skiing down mountains. Neil-trying to keep up with Claire.

#### Q. What's your favourite music?

A. Claire – heavy metal, rock & anything I can run to. Neil - heavy rock, I was in the Guns N Roses video for their song Paradise City.

#### Q. What's your favourite film?

Claire - Amelie, we once spent a weekend in Paris, visiting the cafe where it was filmed. Neil - Whisky Galore, occasionally bottles from the original shipwreck come up for auction but they're quite expensive these days.

#### Q. What was the first car you owned and what do you drive now?

A. Claire - bright orange Mini Clubman that overheated on steep hills. Volvo XC60 with large boot for kit for scout campsites. Neil - rust brown Mk1 Ford Escort. Cost £15 and sold as scrap two years later for £5. Nissan X-trail with tow bar, large boot and 'Scout-resistant' wipe clean seats.

Since they come from such illustrious stock I am going to call them Princes William, Harry and George. I am now looking at winter 2020 for further planting of trees in the village. I would like to reintroduce a variety of Elm trees that are completely resistant to Dutch Elm Disease (DED). Elm or Ulmus 'New Horizon', to give it its scientific name, is a medium to large tree which is completely resistant to DED. In maturity it forms an attractive rounded canopy with fresh green leaves. The leaves continue to look fresh even in drought conditions. This tough tree is a fast grower and quick to establish itself. The particular qualities of interest are: DED free; native wildlife habitat including the rare White-letter Hairstreak butterfly; fully hardy in extreme cold; drought resistance; tolerant of periodical waterlogging; mid green leaf colour; yellow autumn colour; thrives in coastal conditions and poor soils. Unfortunately, they are not cheap to acquire but the Horticultural Society will be making various bids for grants. We would welcome support from the villages to buy about half a dozen. #### Ingredients:

10 oz self-raising flour cinnamon ½ tsp 8 oz demerara sugar chopped apricots melted butter 2 large eggs, beaten

6 fl oz milk

8 oz apples, peeled cored and chopped

#### Method:

Sift flour, cinnamon and salt, add sugar and fruit. Mix in butter, eggs, milk and apples. Beat well. Turn into a lined, greased 8 inch square tin. Bake gas 4, 180°C for 11/4 hours. Cool a little and turn out. Sprinkle with caster sugar to serve.

I have two cooking apple trees - one producing apples quite early, in September, and a Bramley, which ripens later but the apples keep really well. I still have a few in storage so I can make the apple and cinnamon cake from September to April. When the apples finish and the rhubarb has started to grow I can make the rhubarb and ginger version from April to August.

# TfB Targeting Potholes

We're all only too well aware of how wet this winter has been, and all this extra water has meant a rise in the number of potholes and other defects on Buckinghamshire's roads.

Transport for Buckinghamshire's inspectors are busy identifying these defects, helped by reports made on the FixMyStreet web page by members of the public. Repairs are prioritised according to the maintenance and repair policy, with each defect being assessed for risk and severity so an appropriate timescale for repair can be set.

In cases where multiple defects are present, it's often best to carry out significant patching or resurfacing of the area. However, if individual defects within these areas have reached a high-risk level, they have to be repaired quickly. This is often a temporary repair until the larger more permanent repair can be undertaken – usually requiring dry conditions.

Transport for Bucks is now starting a substantial programme of 'Plane and Patch' treatment across the county, which will continue throughout the Spring of 2020. This is aimed at addressing the weather-related deterioration seen in recent months, particularly where there are multiple defects. Members of the public are asked to continue reporting potholes through https://www.fixmystreet.buckscc.gov.uk/ so that they can be correctly assessed and prioritised for treatment.
