On March 16th, 2020 the doors of our three churches were shut, even for private prayer. In an unknown world of fear and sadness we watched the numbers of deaths rising at a dramatic rate. Not being able to go to church, that safe and peaceful place in times of trouble, seemed so counter-cultural.

But then we found other ways of 'doing' church; Rev Alison created a fantastic weekly Parish magazine to keep us all entertained during Lockdown, and on behalf of the Church, I joined forces with Liz Tubb, our Parish Council leader to create a support group with over 50 volunteers to help those who were shielding and in need.

As the months went by, we saw churches around the country begin to record their services and then stream then on Facebook or on some other platform. This made us feel rather inadequate as we didn't have the technology to upload and reach out to our own communities. It was Rev Alison who decided to take the bull by the horns and led a beautiful Northumbrian service at All Saints', which was filmed live on Facebook. Since then, we haven't looked back and thanks to Peter Gardiner we now have our own YouTube channel where we can upload services recorded in advance. Don't get me wrong, there is nothing like a real congregation and we have missed everyone so much, but during the lockdowns the recorded services have been a lifeline to many.

And now the good news! As we approach Easter our churches will be reopening their doors where I'm sure there'll be plenty of 'Alleluias' as we come together again after so much time apart. We didn't get to celebrate Easter as a community last year, so this year means even more. Jesus lay entombed for three days, we have been entombed for nearly a year, but with his resurrection came new life and now as we begin to step outside, we too will notice the 'new' people we have become. The pandemic has a lot to answer for, especially all those precious lives lost, but it has also changed us in many positive ways as we see the tremendous efforts that have been made to help our 'neighbours' around us... and there's the Good News!

St Michael's, Aston Clinton and All Saints Buckland have re-opened and St Mary's, Drayton Beauchamp will be open from Easter Day 4th April.

The Red Kite Pavilion is complete but due to the current COVID guidelines, we will be delaying any public opening ceremony until later in the year. In the meantime, Your Café in the Park, who will be managing the facility, are looking to open it up gradually, COVID guidelines permitting.

The cafe is now opening its doors 10-4pm Monday to Friday and 9-5pm Saturday and Sunday with takeaway from inside the cafe. From Monday 12 April they expect to open from 9-5pm every day and make benches available outside for "table service". At this stage, they are hoping to be able to allow organised groups to hire the venue adhering to the government guidelines.

From Monday 17th May they plan to open up to soft play with tables inside and with a limit of six people to each table.

My brother and I were good at getting into mischief on the farm, I remember one day climbing into a big metal water carrier and closing the lid! Luckily we were found. The farm was not a very safe place for young children, and I think it was for this reason we

spent our holidays in Aston Clinton. I have so many wonderful memories of those holidays. We usually stayed with my Great Aunt and Uncle in Aylesbury Road. My mother would put us on the Number 16 bus at the Travellers Rest, Edlesborough and ask the conductor to put us off at 'King's Cottages'.

Uncle Alf worked at Hazel, Watson and Viney, in charge of the Book Binding Department. Aunt Poll was a dressmaker and kept house for Uncle Alf. We would have cream crackers for supper, stone hot water bottles and a chamber pot, under the bed. The bathroom was downstairs... *To be continued*

Centenary of the Aston Clinton War Memorial

The first World War claimed the lives of hundreds of thousands of British service personnel and obviously had a huge impact on the country as a whole. Thousands of memorials were erected in towns and villages across Britain as a focal point for the grief of those left behind. So it was in Aston Clinton, where our War Memorial was unveiled exactly 100 years ago.

The semi-circular piece of land on London Road, opposite Brook Street, was donated by Nathan Rothschild and public subscriptions raised the £230 to buy the memorial. A committee, including parish councillors and local rector Rev J R Cohu, was set up to collect the details needed after the war ended. They ordered the 4.2m tall, Cornish granite memorial, now a Grade II listed monument, from Aylesbury builders Newman and Harper.

The wording above the names of the 30 men who gave their lives reads 'To the glory of God and in memory of the men of Aston Clinton who fell in the Great War, 1914-1919.'

On Sunday 3 April, 1921 the official unveiling was performed by Major-General J C Swann, of the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry in the presence of Lord Rothschild, Rev Cohu, other dignitaries and many ex-soldiers and grieving families. The Aston Clinton Brass Band was there to accompany the hymns and to play the Last Post.

Major-General Swann thanked all those who had served and said how the epithet desired by all soldiers was that 'he did his duty'. During his speech Lord Rothschild looked to the future and said that the audience should 'follow in the footsteps of the men on the memorial and to strive to live up to their example and to see their sacrifice was not in vain,'

Despite the general feeling that this had been 'the war to end all wars' it was only another generation before another 13 names were to be added after World War II.

The memorial is still in excellent condition and for this we have to thank John Disbrey who ensures it is kept clean and tidy all year round.





In Aston Clinton, we are only a small branch of a much larger organisation. However, we meet when we can (currently we do everything by telephone or video link). Our main effort is raising funds for the Poppy appeal. In 2020 we raised approximately £900, which is much less than the several £1000's we normally achieve through the sale of poppies and other events. You can still donate to the appeal by going online to the RBL website. Here you will also be able to purchase a wide range of merchandise.

This year, we would like to recruit more members. You can become a full Poppy Supporter by giving £10 or more each month and support our Armed Forces community with the assistance they need all year round. A bigger team will enable the branch to organise the poppy appeal properly and to cover the three villages. It will also help us to support a wider range of events such as trips to London for the annual Battle of Britain service, the annual service of remembrance and to the National Memorial Arboretum, which is part of the RBL.

We support some of the most vulnerable people in society, and during the current pandemic, they need us more than ever. Last year, RBL spent £49.3 million providing support for serving and ex-serving personnel and their families. Regular donations raise vital funds to ensure we are here to provide life-long support for those in need.

We ensure they get the assistance they need to recover, physically and mentally. This includes financial advice, support in adjusting to civilian life and providing care homes for older veterans. We will keep working until their needs have been met. *Ralph Weston*

Reluctantly we have had to go back down to two teams, at Under 13 and Under 15 level and could do with more players for both. We continue to welcome children from Year 4 upwards to training and hope we can reinstate a younger age group soon. Action Fraud has received hundreds of reports from members of the public who have been sent text messages claiming to be from the NHS, offering them the opportunity to sign up for coronavirus vaccinations. The texts ask the recipient to click on a link which takes them to an online form where they are prompted to input personal and financial details. In some cases, the online form has looked very similar to the real NHS website.

How to protect yourself:

In the UK, coronavirus vaccinations will only be available via the National Health Services. You can be contacted by the NHS, your employer, a local GP surgery or pharmacy to receive your vaccination. Remember, the vaccinations are free of charge and you will not be asked for a payment.

The NHS will never:

- ask for your bank account or card details
- ask for your PIN or banking passwords
- arrive unannounced at your home to administer the vaccine
- ask for documentation to prove your identity, such as a passport or utility bills

If you receive a call you believe to be fraudulent, hang up. If you are suspicious about an email you have received, forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk. Suspicious text messages should be forwarded to the number 7726, which is free of charge.

To us, Dylan Mitchell was our very own superhero - his everyday actions and achievements made him one of the strongest, and most courageous superheroes we have known. Every day he fought the 'bad guys' with a smile and a sense of humour, something that continued even on his darkest days.

Dylan loved Superman, and he would emulate his hero by hiding playfully and jumping out, catching us by surprise! He was also a watchful protector ensuring that anyone who entered the medical room knew where to sit and what to do; then he would comfort them by gently patting their shoulder. Once he had assured himself that his work was done, he would leave.

Dylan's school friends were very important to him, as he was to them. He loved working in groups with his friends, but mainly he loved playing with them. It always made us adults chuckle to see him arrange to meet his friends on the playground (planet Krypton). He would stop them in their tracks and say "Hey guys, you go outside and I'll meet you there – ok!" He always said "Hey guys" and finished with "ok", and his friends were always there waiting to play football with him. On rainy days, another favourite activity was Play-Doh. He loved making food especially pizza and had a team of Play-Doh chefs eager to play with him.

Walking around the school with Dylan was quite something. We couldn't go more than a few feet without someone saying "Hi" or high fiving him. It was amazing to see.

Dylan always tried his best and worked hard. He was proud to show off his work to his friends and teachers. He would proudly take his achievements around the classroom to show everyone and would often ask for a picture to be taken. His sense of pride was seen in lots of things he did. For example, when asked to lead the class into assembly, his head would be held high and he'd say "Come on guys, follow me", and with great authority he'd march the class into the hall, checking they were following.

Dylan didn't let anything hold him back. He taught us how to be brave, to fight and persevere, no matter what.

It is rare that a superhero dies, but when this happens, they deserve to be eulogized by those who knew them best. We celebrated Dylan's birthday at school on 8 January by setting off confetti cannons and dressing up as Superheroes. What's in a Name? How Lionel Martin met Aston Hill.

This is one of very few photographs from the actual 1914 Hillclimb and is of my great grandfather, Stevie Statham.



As you look from the new Community Centre in Aston Clinton Park beyond the greater park area to the Green Park Centre and on to Aston Hill, you may not realise that this land was once Lord Rothschild's back garden!

The gates to Green Park by the traffic lights on Stablebridge Road are almost all that remains of a magnificent stately home. And it was from these gates that the Aston Hillclimb, a timed race up the back drive of the house, was run.

It was not a genteel stroll up into the woods but the cutting edge of motor sport of the day. The cars were powerful, with poor brakes and steering by today's standards. The road surface was gravel with ruts, chalk and stone.

Hundreds turned out to watch, which was almost as dangerous as being the 'riding mechanic' in the passenger side (usually with no seat to sit on).

The cars and motorbikes represented all makes and models many of which were modified for competition by the owners or their mechanics.

One such sportscar was the self-modified Singer 10 of one Lionel Walker Birch Martin. He won at his first attempt on 4th April 1914.

Lionel was an entrepreneur running a small workshop in London's Kensington district with his business partner and engineer, Robert

Bamford. They were just working on a project of building and selling their own vehicle.

Knowing a great opportunity to sell when he saw one, Lionel combined his surname with that of the most challenging hillclimb in the Chilterns.

The company became Aston Martin, the luxury sportscar brand, loved and respected by motoring enthusiasts, international spies and persons of good taste throughout the world.

A passion for puffins

In the best forgotten year of 2020, holidays became something you looked back on or forward to – very little chance of actually having one for most of us. I have been lucky enough to do a great deal of travelling, so I found myself thinking about some of my favourite trips of recent years.

No matter how keen a birder you are, your chance of seeing a puffin in Aston Clinton is pretty remote. What is it about these dumpy little seabirds that appeals to so many, even those who have no particular interest in birds? I remember Puffin books as a child: the children's imprint of Penguin Books, founded in 1940. That's probably why so many of us know what a puffin looks like.

My love of puffins has taken me to some wonderful places over the years: Iceland, the Faroes, the Farnes, Skomer, Orkney, Shetland and several other places where puffins are promised. Such is their appeal that many sites attempt to lure the keen birder with the promise of a sighting, but nowadays many of their former strongholds are deserted, or contain just a few pairs. They are not doing well. Their main food is sand eels, and they are having to fly further and further to find enough - for the Shetland birds, up to 200 miles in some cases. The sand eel population is thought to be affected by global warming, causing the eels to leave their usual areas and be replaced by less nutritious fish. Over-fishing is also taking its toll.

The puffin's Latin name, Fratercula arctica, translates as 'little brother of the north', a reference to the fact that they look a bit like dumpy friars. In Shetland they are known as Tammie Nories.


In 1982, whilst the Falklands War was in full swing, I was hanging off the edge of a cliff in Iceland trying to get a good puffin photograph. More recently I was doing the same thing

in Shetland. We drove our camper van right up to the tip of Unst, where we camped at the lighthouse – that night we were the most northerly people in the UK. We climbed the remote cliffs of Hermaness, covered with gannets and the occasional puffin, to look out over Muckle Flugga. The next land is the North Pole – unforgettable.



But back to the puffins. The best spot for them is at the opposite end of the Shetland Islands at the southernmost point at Sumburgh Head. To get to the lighthouse, built by Robert Louis Stevenson's grandfather, you drive across the airport, pausing to look both ways carefully as you cross the runway. Another quiet camping spot, and it was wonderful to get up at first light to watch the puffins busy at their burrows, or watch them as the simmer dim falls - the nearest you get to darkness that far north in June. You need luck with puffins: they are communal birds, and when they decide on a fishing trip, they all go. This means you can visit an area overrun with puffins one day, and return the next to find it deserted. We camped there for three nights, and spent many hours just watching these amazing little birds. I got some lovely photographs, and those days are some of the happiest memories of recent years.

This year? Who knows? That kind of choice and freedom feels very much in the past, and I realise now how much we took it for granted. Let's hope for better times for the puffins and for us. *Alison Beck*

This is one of the reasons for introducing the NHS App, and many patients are already using it. The App, run by Sensley www.sensely.com/ asknhs/, can be downloaded to your i-phone or android device. You can also access it via the Westongrove website www.westongrove.com

We ask that you use it if you are age 16 and over, and you have an acute symptom you are concerned about. A virtual nurse will then ask you a series of questions related to your problem. You may be given some self-care advice, or it will direct you to a pharmacy or a health care professional. The information obtained is put into your medical notes. Your details, including your answers, will be reviewed by a clinician and they will decide the best way to deal with your concerns. It may be a text message with advice, a telephone call by one of our clinical team, or you may be offered a routine appointment with the doctor or nurse who knows you and your condition better for ongoing issues. You will have a response from us within approx four hours.

You can also use the 'self-care' option from the menu. This allows you to get advice on specific medical problems, for example, 'Back pain'. The App will direct to the NHS website where you can obtain advice about how to manage your condition.

The App also allows you to self-refer to Healthy Minds, without needing to contact us at the practice.

Please use the App when you can, and if you need help with it, let us know. Give us feedback on how helpful you feel it is. The App is not designed to deal with ongoing problems or for under 16-year-olds.

1 egg white


Soda water to top up

Village People

A series about people who are a part of the daily life of the villages.



Carole Paternoster is a District Councillor.

Q. How long have you been a councillor?

A. I joined Aylesbury Vale District Council in 1999, but have been a parish councillor since 1978.

Q. What are your responsibilities and what does the role involve?

A. My responsibility is to represent the interests of all the residents of my ward in the unitary council. This means that I must be there to help them when required with issues such as planning, housing, environmental health, refuse collections, highways, transport, etc. I also need to know what is going on in the local community, by staying in

touch with parish councils, social media, etc. Until March 2020 I was cabinet member for strategic planning with AVDC, and this role included representing the interests of the Vale in discussions about housing development and major infrastructure projects with neighbouring and regional authorities.

Q. How do you become a local councillor?

A. As a parish councillor I was asked by a political party if I would stand as a candidate for them in the District Council elections. You can stand as an independent councillor if you wish and details are available on the Buckinghamshire

Council's website. The next elections are due to be held in May 2021.

Q. What advice would you give to anyone wanting to become a parish councillor?

A. It does take up much more of your time than anybody will admit! There are the inevitable meetings, but work within your ward, whether with individual residents or with groups, will also take up a lot of your time, and you must be available for them when they need you. It's definitely not a 9 to 5 job. You need to be approachable, willing to listen and help people overcome the issues that are troubling them. For this you will need to know

where you can find the necessary information or the right body to help them find a solution.

Q. Do you live locally?

A. Yes, I live in Buckland village.

Q. How long have you lived in the area?

A. I have lived in Buckland and Aston Clinton since I was 3 months old. I attended Aston Clinton School before moving on to secondary school in Berkhamsted.

Q. Are you involved in any local groups or activities?

A. Not as many as I wish. Council meeting timings are unpredictable and make this difficult. However, I already have a list of local groups I am hoping to join when I retire in May.

Q. What are your hobbies, what do you do to relax?

A. My main hobbies are gardening and family history. I have a fairly large garden which takes up a lot of time in Spring and Summer, but which was invaluable during the Covid lockdown. I have been researching my family

history for several years – it is addictive! I have managed to make contact with long lost cousins, which is very satisfying, as well as finding the occasional 'black sheep'.

Q. What's your favourite music?

A. When I am working, I like easy listening music – something to help me concentrate.

Q. What's your favourite film?

A. My favourite film is Dunkirk, and I am currently reading the book of the film. My uncle was at Dunkirk and returned on one of the last boats to England. I have researched the part his unit played and found the film captured the despair and relief of those desperate days.

Q. What was the first car you owned and what do you drive now?

A. Our first car was a Hillman Minx – now I have a Corsa.

Q. What changes to village life (good or bad) have you noticed in recent years?

A. Aylesbury has been a growth area for many years and is destined to continue.

New rainwater goods at All Saints - at 2.5% of cost!

The gutters and downpipes at All Saints' Church, Buckland had long been inadequate for the task. Many of them were made of plastic, or were too small, or both, and those that were iron were generally severely rusted.



They had contributed to numerous damp problems in recent years, and an inspection had highlighted the need for them to be replaced urgently.

In December, All Saints received a generous grant from the National Churches Trust (NCT) for half the net cost of upgrading the rainwater goods to cast iron; and on the back of this, an appeal was launched for sponsorship of individual items such as gutters and downpipes to cover the balance of £4,820.

The response was exceptional, and by mid-January, 51 items had been sponsored, raising £4,514. Remarkably, the NCT grant, sponsorship and VAT reclaim together reduced the total cost of the project from £11,568 to £306. All Saints' PCC would like to say a big thank you to all those who have donated so generously.

The excellent new cast iron, high-capacity gutters, hoppers, downpipes, swan necks and shoes were fitted by N. R. Green Builders of Aston Clinton, and the photo shows Russell Green, Liam Hickey and Ian Green fitting the last downpipes just before Christmas.

Cobblers' Pits

Among the hidden gems of our local countryside are the Cobblers' Pits. Although many people will know the location, they may not know what the area is called.



It is an area of mixed woodland on an old chalk pit and runs up a slope from the Wendover Arm of the Grand Union Canal to join the Icknield Way, not far from the Aston Clinton Ragpits. Formerly part of the old Rothschild Green Park estate it has been managed by the Chiltern Society for many years.

There is speculation about the path running through the woods but it may have been a link track between the ancient Upper and Lower Icknield roads. One story about the name is that during the Civil War Cromwell's troops had a camp there where their boots were made and repaired.

To find the pits, join the towpath of the Wendover Arm of the Grand Union Canal at the bridge in Stablebridge Road and walk about 500 metres towards Wendover. The entrance is via a kissing gate on your left. The path runs up steep and often muddy paths through mixed woodland with plenty of interesting yew trees.

For an area of its size there is a surprising diversity of flora and fauna.

Traffic regulations in Buckinghamshire



A new, single point of contact has been introduced for residents regarding legal orders that control traffic and roads throughout Buckinghamshire.

There is a legal order, known as a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO), behind every speed limit, double yellow line, council owned car park, parking bay, one way system and anything else that controls traffic or pedestrians. Over the last year, all the legal orders have been merged into one system, which can be found at www.buckinghamshiretraffweb.uk and is now one single point of contact.

As well as being able to view the legal orders in one place, you will also be able to view any proposed changes to the parking controls, speed limits, weight limits and other regulations, which will also be displayed. It is also possible to use the website to comment on any proposed changes.

Wendover Arm Trust

During December 2020 volunteers from the Wendover Arm Trust planted 420 saplings in the area behind the completed winding hole. The saplings were kindly provided by the Woodland Trust and comprised a wide variety with Goat Willow, Crab Apple, Hawthorn, Hazel and Downy Birch.



This follows a previous planting of 130 trees near the former pumping station at Whitehouses. They have been registered with the *'Plant Britain'* crusade which was started by BBC 'Countryfile' in December 2020.

The Trust has now cleared and re-lined the canal to Bridge 4 and re-watering of this section is planned for the Spring. This will add a further 246 metres to the 960 metres already in water from Drayton Beauchamp. A further 852 metres needs completing to join up with Phase 1 which is fully navigable from the junction with the Grand Union canal.

Considerable costs will be incurred to complete this section and the Trust is seeking funds from various potential avenues.

In February the Inland Waterways Association, Chiltern Branch, in conjunction with the Wendover Arm Trust, held a webinar on the "History and Restoration of the Wendover Canal". There were 223 attendees from all over the country listening to an illustrated talk by Clive Johnson with a question and answer session afterwards.

Aston Clinton's First Pub?

In a famous Monty Python sketch, a group of Britons asked "What have the Romans ever done for us?" After much moaning they reluctantly admitted that the Romans actually had brought many benefits. What has this to do with the first pub in Aston Clinton you may ask?

Aston Clinton has an important Roman Road, Akeman Street, running through its centre. It is known that the Romans built tabernae alongside Roman roads to serve soldiers who were travelling along them. Tabernae sold wine, but the local population preferred ale, so they soon adapted to serve that too.

The Romans used vine leaves outside tabernae as a trading sign to tell passers-by that wine was available, therefore creating the first pub sign. They changed to hanging bushes in Britain as vine leaves were in short supply and 'tabernae' gradually changed to become 'taverns'.

Archaeological excavations on the site of the new housing estate on Stablebridge Road found evidence of an Iron Age-Romano-British settlement and a 'substantial trackway' which appeared Roman because it was straight. When viewed on maps it appears to align with the course of the Lower Icknield Way and so may have origins in the Iron Age or earlier.

Roman historian and archaeologist Paddy Lambert says settlements in Britain occurred at crossing points on Roman roads. Although Aston Clinton had some settlement before the Romans, it is probable that it expanded because the ancient Icknield Way and Roman Akeman Street crossed here.

It is therefore not fanciful to imagine Roman legions marching through Aston Clinton perhaps on their way from Londinium to Cirencester, where there was a Roman fort, stopping

for refreshment at a taberna in Aston Clinton.

From archaeological evaluations it seems Aston Clinton was quite busy in Roman times with soldiers marching up and down, travellers on the Icknield Way and drovers driving their cattle across Akeman Street, creating quite an opportunity for trade. Evidence of a long-lived settlement that lasted into early Saxon times, was found at the site where the A41 bypass crosses the Lower Icknield Way.

There was also evidence of a settlement near College Road North where there was a short-lived attempt at cultivation in the early Roman Period.

As I walk around the village I like to think about its history and the people that came before me. The historic crossroads in Aston Clinton might not have been the most important along a Roman road, but I like to think that it was probably significant enough to warrant a taberna or 'pub' as it has now evolved to become. *Rosemarie Storr*

Signs for Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp are a familiar sight locally, but it can come as something of a surprise when these names, or parts of these names, are seen in other parts of the country.

It was while on a scenic drive down to Cornwall for a holiday last year that these familiar names were spotted. A sign for Aston appeared in Oxfordshire, for Buckland in Gloucestershire and for Drayton in Somerset. None were spotted in Cornwall.

Further research has found that there are approximately 101 towns and/or villages throughout 23 counties in England whose name includes the words Aston, Beauchamp, Buckland, Clinton or Drayton. These stretch from South Yorkshire in the

North to Dorset in the South, Norfolk in the East to Devon in the West. Aston is the most popular with 53 examples, followed by Drayton on 21, Buckland on 19, Beauchamp on 6 and just two Clintons.

I use the word 'approximately' because the research was a close scrutiny of the 29-page index of a 2.5 mile to one-inch scale map of Great Britain & Northern Ireland. This index contains more than 28,000 place names, so I may have missed one or two.

The names of our three villages have their origins in Old English and with one from pre-Brexit French. Aston is 'east town' or 'ash tree settlement'; Clinton can be a place name meaning 'settlement on the River Glyme', alhough our one is named after the de Clinton family; Buckland is land held by right of a written charter; Drayton is from dragan 'to draw or drag' + tun 'enclosure' while Beauchamp is borrowed from the French beau 'handsome, fine, attractive' + champ 'field'. As with most things found on the internet these days, other meanings are available!
