10 tips from the Battersea Dogs & Cats Home for keeping your dog safe through winter



1. Wrap up on walks

It may be cosy indoors, but your dog needs regular walks regardless of the weather. When out on walks it's important to make sure your four-legged friends are wrapped up warm. Put a dog coat on them when you go out, especially if you have a fine-coated dog, such as a Greyhound or Staffie.

2. Check for snow between their toes

Check your dog's paws and dry them thoroughly after they've been outside. This is especially important with long-haired dogs as they are prone to snow compacting between their toes and turning into ice balls which can prove very painful. If they are agreeable, you could trim the long hair between your dog's toes to help prevent this.

3. Check for salt and grit between their toes Clean their paws at the end of your walk as salt and grit from roads and pavements can also get lodged between their toes.

4. Keep them warm and dry

Dry off wet and muddy dogs after walks and make sure they have a cosy bed to return to which is away from any cold draughts.

5. Keep them active indoors

Some dogs can be very reluctant to venture out into the cold. If this is the case, do not force them out but make sure you provide them with lots of toys for them to play and keep them occupied while indoors.

6. Adjust their food if necessary

If you do find that your dog is less active in the winter months, make sure you adjust the amount of food you give them accordingly to avoid weight gain.

7. Make sure they have good recall

Cold weather often brings reduced visibility in foggy or snowy weather conditions. If you're letting them off the lead, make sure your dog has good recall to avoid them getting lost and, as always, make sure their microchip details are up to date with your correct contact information.

8. Make them visible

As the nights draw in earlier and the sun rises later, attach a small light to your dog's collar so they can be seen when out on walks in reduced visibility.

9. Never leave your dog in the car unattended Just as cars can become fatally hot in summer months, temperatures can drop very quickly in cold weather. Always take your dog with you rather than leaving them in the car for any length of time.

10. Stay away from frozen lakes and rivers Keep your dog away from stretches of frozen water as it's impossible to tell how secure the surface is. Keep them on a lead if you think they'll be tempted to jump in.

Help your health and care services by choosing them well this winter

This winter Buckinghamshire's health and care services will be working hard to make sure you stay safe and well - and you can help them by using the right service at the right time.

You can find lots of advice and links to a range of local services at our 'Ready for Winter' information page, along with guidance on travel and how to be a good neighbour - www. yourcommunityyourcare.org.uk/ready-for-winter.

With coronavirus still spreading, some people may feel nervous about using health services. It is vital, however, that they still seek care when they need it - delaying could have extremely serious consequences for their health.

The health and care options available in Bucks include:

- A&E remember, A&E should be used for serious and life-threatening conditions. If it is an emergency, don't delay - call 999.
- The 111 online service at 111.nhs.uk is a great source of information and advice, especially if you are not sure which service to use for your illness or injury.
- *Pharmacies* are staffed by healthcare professionals and offer excellent advice. At the first sign of illness, check to see if an over-the-counter treatment or medicine is suitable.
- Contact your GP surgery for an appointment - this will probably be over the telephone or remotely at the moment, but your GP can still invite you for a faceto-face appointment when it is appropriate. And if you are concerned about possible

- cancer symptoms, don't delay contact your GP today.
- Self-care many minor injuries or ailments can be treated at home, with medicines or treatments you may already have. Make sure you keep some of these in stock.

And remember, if you should develop one or more symptoms of coronavirus, no matter how mild, please book a test at nhs.uk/coronavirus or by calling 119.

Happiness is... Scottish country dancing!

Readers might like to know how we Scottish dancers are maintaining our interest and fitness since coronavirus restrictions caused us to suspend dancing in March.

Thanks to the wonders of technology, the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society masterminded a weekly online tuition class... but this is no ordinary class. Scottish country dancing has an international membership and each week over 1000 enthusiastic dancers from all parts of the globe log in to the webinar to practise steps and refine their technique. Every class has a different teacher whose identity is kept secret until the last minute when we discover where we'll "travel" to for the lesson. So far, teachers have been in Germany, Japan, USA, Canada, New Zealand, Australia, Italy, France, Austria and Tenerife as well as Scotland and England – all leading



the classes from home because of coronavirus restrictions. Because of time differences, some teachers pre-record the lesson which is then transmitted from Edinburgh at 7pm GMT every Wednesday. However, the time difference doesn't seem to dampen the enthusiasm of some dancers who rise at 5am to participate in the 30-minute class!

The class includes warm up and stretching exercises, followed by formation and technique practice which are then included in a new dance to finish. This is the tricky bit because we're all dancing on our own and, as most dances require eight people, we have to imagine the position of our own "ghost" partner as well as the other six! Quite a challenge but, of course, it's always the "ghost" partner who makes the mistakes!

While it's frustrating not to be dancing the thrilling reels, jigs and elegant strathspeys we love, these classes give us the chance to be taught by many teachers worldwide, all possessing different teaching styles. Perhaps a small silver lining on our "Covid cloud"?

We're looking forward to our return to dancing at Wendover Memorial Hall when it's safe to do so. New dancers are always welcome at the club and anyone who'd like to share in the happiness that is Scottish country dancing can contact me for more details.

Winter Burglary Advice

During the winter months, we often see an increase in Burglaries. This is due to a number of factors so we wanted to give you some advice on how to make your home less desirable to burglars.

- · Leave lights on during the hours of darkness -This makes it appear as though someone is home. We advise that you invest in some timer switches. This way if you leave your home during daylight hours you can set them to come on when it gets dark.
- Key lock your doors Don't just pull them shut. Most modern doors have a 5 lever lock system (or similar) which requires you to lift the handle and turn the key.
- Take keys out of the inside of doors If you are inside your home, don't leave keys in the locks on the inside of doors.
- · Make sure valuable items cannot be seen through windows - This includes keys, laptops, phones, tablets and cash.
- Alarm If you have an alarm, please ensure it is set when you leave your property.
- Garages If you have a garage with a door which goes into your home, ensure it is locked and the garage door is secure.
- CCTV Consider installing CCTV or a Ring doorbell. This makes your home less desirable to burglars.
- *New items* If you purchase a new valuable item such as a TV or laptop, do not leave the empty box outside your home as this advertises what you have in your home.
- Security lights Consider installing sensor security lights outside your home. This illuminates the outside areas of your property

so it makes it harder for anyone to do anything under the cover of darkness. This also alerts you when someone or something is outside your home and lights it up for neighbours and passers-by to see if there is something that needs reporting to us.

If you note anything suspicious around your community please contact us via 999 if it is an incident in progress or via the *non-emergency* number 101.

It was a very different start to the new academic year! We were delighted to welcome the children back into school in September and our immediate focus was their well-being. We had developed a recovery curriculum to help re-engage them with learning, and worked hard to ensure they re-established friendship groups and a sense of community. The children were given time to get to know their new teachers and teaching assistants and to reinforce the school's values so that everyone was aware of our expectations.

We have re-established as many of the 'normal' routines as possible although these have taken place against a backdrop of children and staff being in year group bubbles. This included appointing our new school councillors who had to prepare a speech and undergo a rigorous election. The contest was so hotly fought that we had to wait some days for the results from one of the year 6 classes; a bit like the US Presidential Election! The committee will be working remotely across our school, assisting me with the school development plan which has been put online.

In addition, we have elected our House Captains, received Harvest Festival donations, fundraised for Breast Cancer Research and held a Remembrance Day assembly beamed live to each classroom. Many of our extra-curricular

activities have also re-started, including music lessons; it has been lovely hearing the banging of drums and tooting of trumpets again.

So, school life has, to some extent, returned to normal. I am extremely proud of the staff, who have ensured that they continue to provide an aspiring, caring environment which enables our children to be the best they can be. They have worked together as a community and supported one another; I think that we'd all agree that one of the things that we have missed the most is the sharing of experiences. Despite all the challenges our attendance rate has been an outstanding 97%, similar to the same time last year.

I am immensely grateful to ACSA, who always seem to pull us together, and their commitment to provide opportunities for our children has been greatly appreciated. I also thank them for the purchase of our new IT equipment, and PSHE scheme which supports the children's emotional well-being

Every child deserves parents and teachers to work alongside one another to support and nurture them. For me, the saying: 'it takes a community to raise a child' has never been more relevant.

Clearly, we will encounter more challenges but I am confident that as a community we can continue the journey which has just begun. For this I thank Covid-19 for reminding us that the whole is greater than the sum of its parts.

Being back at school has been great for our morale and seeing the smiles on the children's and staff's faces has made all the hard work worthwhile.

A More Colourful Spring - the project to plant bulbs around the village



Last Spring, when we were gathering each Thursday to thank the NHS, I had the idea of a more permanent record of the effort of NHS staff in the form of planting daffodil bulbs that would flower next Spring, when we hope that the virus will be under control. I was assisted by Graham Thirkettle, who not only came up with the daffodil bulb "Rainbow" – one of the symbols used by everyone to thank the NHS – but organised the bulk purchase of the bulbs. Meanwhile, I started to canvas as many organisations and companies in the village to raise funds. The picture below shows all the organisations who contributed.

During the last few weeks, all around our village, there has been the sight of groups and individuals, planting spring bulbs in honour of our community, key workers and the NHS, and adding colour and loveliness to our village. Over 13,000 bulbs were bought by villagers, with 10,000 daffodils, half a tonne in weight,

being delivered from Spalding via a special order arranged by the Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp Horticultural Society.

The young people of the Pre-school, the Youth Club, the Cubs, the Beavers, the Brownies and the Scouts, focused their efforts in the park. Adults, including the WI and ad hoc groups, planted by the churches, The Oak, around the pond in Estone Grange, and in the verges on London Road and Lower Icknield Way.

The Rotary Club has an ongoing campaign to Eradicate Polio and donated 800 purple crocuses to raise awareness of their campaign which have been planted predominantly along London Road and around the church door of St Michael's.

And then there are the 5000 daffodil bulbs which have been planted by individuals in gardens and verges around the village.

A huge thank you to everybody who has been involved. We even received a letter of support from our MP, Rob Butler.



Bulb planting season is now coming to an end. No doubt some bulbs won't make it, but many will, and we can all look forward to a more colourful spring, and our village being just that little bit lovelier.

If there is interest in bulb planting next year we will focus on crocuses, snowdrops and bluebells.

A different Christmas Eve

I was supposed to be in Jordan that Christmas Eve: a trip starting at the pink city of Petra and finishing camping under the stars in Wadi Rum where Lawrence of Arabia was filmed. Thanks to some unexpectedly heavy snow, I couldn't get out of Heathrow, and I ended up spending the day marooned in Aston Clinton with an empty diary.

So what to do on Christmas Eve, when you are single, have no family, and all your friends are either cooking for England or trying to get to far-flung relatives? The obvious answer: go to the zoo. We are lucky to live so close to Whipsnade, and I decided that if I could get up the hill to the entrance, that was where I'd go. So well wrapped and armed with camera, off I went.

The zoo itself was well-nigh deserted. I parked my car and decided to start with my friends the Asian elephants. They were all stomping around in their shed, being given power-washes by the keepers, looking a bit bored. I could watch elephants for hours that wonderful reverse gear, the gentle tread, and the exquisite sensitivity of those questing trunks. It didn't look as if the elephants were going to go for their daily walk, so I moved on to the Siberian tigers. On most visits, these big cats are asleep, but that day they paced the deep snow, in magnificent condition, looking regal and quite at home. I managed to get a good close-up as the male regarded me, with more curiosity than anything, before deciding I was of no interest and moving on.

I walked up past the zebra paddock and was surprised to see the Grevy's zebras dashing around their paddock, kicking up the snow with what looked like pure delight. The European grey wolves looked relaxed and happy, gathered on a mound and watching

the few visitors, hoping for a keeper to turn up with some food. I wondered if the lions, also usually boringly inactive, might be out. Sure enough, the rather moth-eaten old male was stalking round with a bone in his mouth, eventually setting down to gnaw on it, surrounded by his wives. The thick glass was too smeary for good photographs, but I enjoyed one of the lionesses rearing up, scratching the glass and roaring impressively, to the terror of a small boy whose Mum wanted him to stand next to the glass for a photo.

I was getting a bit chilly by now and discovered that what other visitors there were were gathered in the cafe, where a warm fug pervaded, and smells of tomato soup, chips and coffee mingled. I settled for a Christmas sandwich and a coffee. I'd read that the Greater One Horned rhinos had produced a calf that year, and as this animal is a special favourite, I trudged off to their enclosure. To my delight, there were two calves born to different mothers. Baby rhinos are a delight – they are still an amazing pink where the folds of their armourplating meet and have cute little faces. Imagine having a 10 stone baby!

A cold coming we had of it, 'I recited to the Bactrian camels, who didn't appear to appreciate Eliot, and also seemed quite content in the icy wastes. There is something at once touching and superior about the camel's face, and I enjoyed photographing them as they gazed at me indifferently. I decided somewhere warmer would suit, and headed for the hippos, who spend most of their time pretending to be rocks in poo-filled warm water. They had a small fountain, and one spent ages, mouth agape, letting the water run over those terrifying teeth. I somehow suspect their breath wouldn't be very appealing.

The views across the snowy Downs were lovely, and I made my way over to the penguin pool just as the young keeper appeared with her bucket of fish. The Humboldts and

Rockhoppers hurried up, waddling energetically, and enjoying their Christmas lunch. Nearby, some European eiders watched contentedly, and a horde of black-headed gulls swooped around, trying to snatch the odd discarded fish without much success.

I decided the light was beginning to fall, and what few visitors there were were making their way towards the exit. I walked past the wolverine, a strange looking creature also quite at home in the snow, and into the gift shop where I treated myself to some chocolate. Back in the car, and down the hill and home, with what turned out to be some great photographs, and memories of an unusual, but very rewarding, Christmas Eve.

The following year I got to Jordan. But that's another story. *Alison Beck*

BBOWT - Your local Wildlife Trust



The Berkshire, Buckinghamshire & Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust (BBOWT) manages over 80 nature reserves across the three counties. Two of these, Dancersend and Aston Clinton Ragpits, are situated very close to our villages and three more are just a few miles away - College Lake, Bacombe Hill and Weston Turville Reservoir. Our reserves are open and available to you for your allowed exercise. Go to www.bbowt.org.uk/nature-reserves for more details.

The BBOWT Chilterns Group is made up of volunteers who provide much of the management resource to keep these reserves in good condition for both wildlife and visitors. We also organise guided wildlife walks (currently suspended), fundraising events and a programme of evening wildlife talks. These talks normally take place in Great Missenden on the third Tuesday each month at 7.45pm, but due to the Covid-19 restrictions we are now offering them online via Zoom. 
Buckinghamshire Council has partnered with AccessAble to provide these guides, with support and funding from Aylesbury Town Council and the Garden Town Delivery Board.

Village People

A series about people who are a part of the daily life of the villages.



Sam Howard is a parish councillor.

Q. How long have you been a parish councillor?

A. I became a parish councillor in the middle of 2017.

Q. What are your responsibilities and what does the role involve?

A. All parish councillors are members of the main parish council, but also sit on other committees. I am a member of the Facilities Committee (which manages the park and the facilities within it) and Planning. But being a parish councillor does not just involve attending a couple of meetings a month. It can involve gate locking and bin emptying, liaising with members of the

public and even doing general repairs. It is very varied and takes up more time than most people would think.

Q. How has Covid-19 impacted on the work of the parish council?

A. Covid-19 has had many impacts - for example, our meetings are all virtual now. The build of the community centre has been delayed, but in the main there has been little difference - we have implemented all the plans we had hoped to do, and still provide a full range of services. We do have to study the rules to ensure that we do not breach any of the restrictions.

And of course, the Chairman of the Parish Council set up the Covid-19 support group with the rector of St Michael's church. Some councillors became volunteers on that group, so the parish council was able to contribute to a large extent to the village throughout lockdown. The group remains in place.

Q. What advice would you give to anyone wanting to become a parish councillor?

A. Do it! It's interesting, varied and you give something back. We need another councillor as we are one short. Apply!

Q. Are you involved in any other activities or groups in Aston Clinton?

A. Yes, I am heavily involved in Aston Clinton Football Club and have been for many years. You'll generally find me marking the pitch out and putting up the goals on a Saturday morning before the games. I am also responsible for renewing the club Charter Standard accreditation each year with the FA. As well as the football club, I also help the village Covid-19 support group delivering newspapers, shopping and dropping off leaflets to other volunteers.

Q. Do you live in Aston Clinton?

A. Yes

Q. How long have you lived in the area?

A. I have lived here all my life apart from about a year in my early twenties when I went and did a bit of travelling

Q. What are your hobbies, what do you do for fun?

A. I don't have a lot of time for hobbies to be honest. As well as doing my day job, the football club and parish council, I also work in the Rothschild Arms in the village but when I do get bit of time to myself I enjoy growing a bit of veg in my garden.

Q. Were you involved in the 'rescue' of the Rothschild Arms?

A. I was just one of the many villagers who helped in the campaign. We had a large publicity campaign and a number of us went and visited the Punch head office to put our case across. The turning point though was the judicial review. The judge agreed it could go to the High Court for review and at that point Punch started really talking to us and landlords Stuart and Gemma were able to buy the pub.

Q. What's your favourite music?

A. I don't really have a particular favourite type of music. I will happily listen to everything from jazz to chart music and anything in between.

Q. What's your favourite film?

A. It would have to be a film from the mid-90s called Leon.



Q. What was the first car you owned and what do you drive now?

A. My first car was a Mk 1 VW Polo and now I drive a VW Jetta.

Q. What changes to village life (good or bad) have you noticed in recent years?

A. This village has always had a fantastic community spirit which has been very much prevalent throughout this challenging year. On the downside the obvious over development of our once sleepy little village.

Aston Clinton Covid-19 support group

If asked last year, I don't think many of us would have believed the conditions we live under now, and in our first lockdown I don't think anyone avould have helieved ave avould have a second alheit a lesser one.

The COVID support group though has operated since March. It was an idea that Sally Bottomer and I acted upon when we held our first meeting in St Michael's Church just before the first lockdown. We had lots of volunteers and immediately delivered leaflets (printed free by our very helpful local printer Mediaport) to all in Aston Clinton.

Lockdown came a few days later. We had agreed that Sally and I would be the focal points and all requests would be made to us

and we would delegate each task to a volunteer. All volunteers had to sign a document and join the Whatsapp group.

We were inundated with calls ... over lockdown 1 we received over 1000 (more, I think!) and our wonderful volunteers delivered prescriptions plus large and small food shops, took parcels to the post office, took pets to the vets, delivered newspapers daily (I still do, as does another volunteer) and did gardening. No request was too small or too large.

As lockdown eased, the tasks reduced but we still had regular shopping trips to complete and the prescriptions to deliver.

The volunteers also delivered a reminder leaflet which detailed the parish council and St Michael's church's ideas for VE Day. As the weather was excellent the village celebrated in their front gardens, while we live streamed the toned down service from the war memorial. A wonderful day which showed how Aston Clinton really pulls together.

Just before lockdown 2 we delivered another leaflet (paid for now by a community grant) but knew demand would not be the same as before.

We are though, still very much here and doing various tasks. Recently we have taken someone to a doctor's appointment, set up a small support group to someone living alone and delivered numerous prescriptions. We will continue to operate while COVID is still a risk.

Sally and I also hope to continue the group for general support once the COVID emergency eases.

The Challenge of the Lockdown

My aim was to walk seven miles a day. I felt that was the maximum I could comfortably cover. As Gemma said, 'Well Mother, if you walk one mile per hour we will still be able to finish in daylight'.

We researched accommodation within the area and found 'The Garden Chalet' in East Meon. This turned out to be brilliant - a huge room with every amenity we needed and parking for both cars. It was truly beautiful: just outside the village with sheep at our back door,

alpacas in the nearby field and acres of open space. The owner lived in the farmhouse nearby and couldn't have been more helpful.



Next came reading the maps and the logistics of safely parking two cars every day, one at the start and one at the finish. Mentally challenging but rewarding.

What happened?

It was simply amazing – sunshine every day, manageable hills (*I was concerned about this*), fantastic views and the sighting of lovely wildlife particularly the deer. Lots of self-catering, but a couple of superb meals out too.

The Unusual An enterprising gentleman with a van in the middle of nowhere selling delicious cake, biscuits, coffee etc and seats to sit on!

The Unexpected The huge number of semi-professional cyclists that were on the roads

The Disappointments The number of cafes, information kiosks and tea rooms that were closed.

We walked it in five days, so had extra time to explore the area. Next year, hopefully another 35 miles staying in FOG – Flat Over Garage

At one time it was a sheep holding field for the abattoir in Green End Street. Anyway, my rear garden is back to normal even though it took some time to stop squelching when you walked on it. My harvest has been pretty good this year and I have an excellent range of produce. I have been harvesting apples and pears and some of the apples are huge. I still have leeks, curly kale and brussel sprouts growing so the lockdown has done me some good.

She was always heavily involved in setting up our shows and stewarding on the day. Joan always entered a number of show classes and the handicrafts section, often gaining trophies. She served on the committee for many years and contributed her knowledge and skill to its decisions. Joan was an inspiration to us all.

New Elm Trees -Ulmus New Horizon

As many of you already know from previous articles in Village Life, the Horticultural Society has acquired five virus resistant elm trees.

We have permission to plant them in the park. One tree will be planted near the other commemorative trees as a thank you to NHS staff for their work in combating the Coronavirus. Two more will be planted to the front of the new Pavilion and the last two will replace trees from the Horticultural Society collection that have died.

I think it is quite fitting that these trees be planted in the park. Not only will they replace trees that died of 'Dutch Elm disease', but as virus resistant trees they have been grown from stock that has been vaccinated. Whilst we are waiting for a vaccine for the Coronavirus, we can watch these trees grow. It has taken many years to develop a vaccine for elm trees and I remember whilst on a garden holiday in Holland in the 1970's reading about experiments to develop resistant trees.

They were due for collection in November when they are fully dormant, as they are 'bare-root' trees. They will be heeled in the ground until they can be planted. I am looking for volunteers to assist the planting in December. This will include digging out a hole for each tree, preparing the soil and knocking in the supporting stakes, as can be seen in the picture.



I am also looking for sponsors for the stakes themselves. The cost is approximately £10 per tree. Does anyone know the best place to get the stakes from? If you can help please contact me at muchpottering@btinternet.com

Wendover Arm Trust

Restoration volunteers of the Wendover Arm Trust have continued to work through the Autumn. October was the wettest on record, with the result that much valuable time had to be expended in pumping out excess water. Normally working parties are arranged for one week each month but the Trust has been organising two weeks of work each month in order to try and catch up following the lockdown earlier in the year.

Then the announcement by the Government of a second lockdown resulted in the decision to cancel the November work session.



Major landscaping has been carried out in the vicinity of Whitehouses (the former pumping station) requiring 680 tonnes of topsoil imported by 36 truckloads. This was spread with grass seed suitable for sheep grazing. In other nearby locations hundreds of saplings and thousands of bulbs have been planted. A further planting of about 400 trees, donated by the Woodland Trust, was planned for the end of November but has had to be postponed owing to new restrictions.

Extensive building work has also been carried out at Whitehouses and the call for volunteer bricklayers was successful.

Cheese Muffins

Helen Lonsdale bought this recipe back from NZ and when made for her family and friends, they disappear immediately on presentation.



Ingredients:

- 2 cups (200g) grated tasty cheese
- 1 1/2 cups of self-raising flour
- ½ tsp salt
- 1 tbsp sugar
- Pinch of cayenne pepper
- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk

Method:

- 1. Mix dry ingredients together in a large bowl.
- 2. Beat egg and milk together.
- 3. Pour liquid onto dry ingredients and fold two mixtures together. (Take care not to over mix).
- 4. Spoon mixture into 12 medium muffin pans which need to be sprayed with non-stick oil.
- 5. Optional: sprinkle extra cheese or Paprika or Chilli powder on top.
- 6. Bake at 210c or 200c fan, 6 gas for about 12 minutes until muffins spring back when pressed and are golden brown.
