Trained staff can connect you with a nurse, doctor, or mental health nurse. They can also give telephone advice, or book an appointment with a GP, if that is what is needed. It's also available online: 111 phs uk/

Try the app Ask NHS – it's free to download to any mobile device and provides patients with a symptom checker, self-care advice and access to the most appropriate GP appointment.

High street pharmacists are a great first port of call when anyone feels under the weather. They offer clinical advice and over the counter remedies as well as the flu jab, which is available free to those most in need.

"Many people find winter especially challenging to their mental wellbeing. So if you have concerns about stress, anxiety or depression talk to a GP or go online to Healthy Minds. You could also try Every Mind Matters, which offers practical advice" – www.nhs.uk/oneyou/

The important thing is to seek advice or help right away for any illness before it gets worse.

Everyone can play their part this winter and take practical steps to help themselves and others to stay as well as possible.

It can be as simple as offering to get some shopping for an older person – especially in icy weather so that they don't struggle out and risk a nasty fall. It's also a good idea to be ready for winter – so look out for road gritting and weather updates which are broadcast on local radio and social media to help all residents to travel safely.

## Life-saving miracle in Aston Clinton

One Saturday evening in November, Michael and Jane Stevens joined their good friends, Ruth and Sean Coffey, at their home for a quiet, relaxed evening.

But this "quiet, relaxed" evening suddenly turned into a near tragedy when, without any warning signs whatsoever, Michael collapsed unconscious, and stopped breathing! He had suffered a cardiac arrest and was now just moments away from certain death.

However, Ruth, being an ex-NHS Senior Nurse, quickly recognised that Michael was now in critical cardiac arrest, and she

immediately commenced C.P.R. (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation)

As Ruth tired from the strenuous CPR, Jane and Sean took over for a while, then Ruth resumed, until, after just over ten minutes, an excellent team of paramedics arrived and continued CPR, medications, injections, oxygen, and finally, as a last resort, three "shocks" with their defibrillator.

Michael was then rushed to Wycombe Hospital for emergency treatment and resuscitation, and then on to Ward 2A Cardiology Care for the next nine days.

After first class NHS care, including numerous tests and procedures, Michael was transferred to Hammersmith Hospital, where he underwent a three-hour operation to have

a Cardioverter Defibrillator implanted and connected to his heart. This is a small batterypowered device which sends electrical pulses to regulate any abnormal heart rhythms.

Michael, who is now recuperating back home in Aston Clinton, says:

"The hospital stressed to me how important it is to start CPR as soon as possible to keep the blood supply to the brain, so I owe my life to Ruth, her prompt, life-saving action and her first-class NHS training. Thank you, Ruth - ALWAYS!"



### Inclosure Act

In 1816 significant changes were happening to the fields of Aston Clinton.



Under the Inclosure Act of Parliament, fields and common land were enclosed, creating legal property rights to land that was previously held in common. The maps are held at the Local Studies centre in Aylesbury and if you have a chance, book a visit to see the real thing. There are two maps – one in preparation for Inclosure and the final version. There is also the Inclosure Act itself, a huge leather-bound volume detailing what land was allocated to whom, but it is not the clearest of text for reading!

 The maps show many of the roads, footpaths and buildings we know today.
 The level of detail is impressive and many buildings are marked, such as the Bell Inn, the Old Bell and Ballards Row. The footpaths between Chapel Drive and Buckland that we still use today can be seen, and who knew there used to be a pond next to where the Oak is now? Some of the changes include road names: the A41 is marked as the Turnpike Road, College Road South as Hill Way Road and Brook Street as Brick Field Lane. Some roads, such as Drift Road and Parsonage Lane, seem to have been lost. Some field names are also shown. For example, Nether Street Field on the right of the A41, Upper Street Field where we now have Rothschild Avenue and Hares Way Field to the right of College Road South. Chicken Mead and Merry Mead lie on the far side of the Aylesbury Canal.

There are tantalising clues about the older history of the village. Where we now have the cricket pitch, and before that the Rothschild kitchen gardens, the remains of a possible medieval moated site are visible. The final map is fascinating for a further reason; it includes the name of the person each parcel of land was allocated to. You may recognise some names, like Minshull or Lake, from memorials in the church. Some are familiar village names like Axtell, Thorne and Horwood. For many of the others, such as Mary Redrup, William Bull, Dorothy Parsley or Richard Slaughter their history is less well known, at least for now.




# Computing

We aim to prepare the children for life in a rapidly changing world in which work and other activities are being transformed by developing technologies. They are taught how digital systems work, and how to put this knowledge to use through programming. Computing also ensures that pupils become digitally literate - able to use, and express themselves and develop their ideas through, information and communication technology at a level suitable for the future workplace and as active participants in a digital world. We have wireless laptop trolleys, with 16 laptops in each, for use in classrooms; interactive whiteboards in every class; a digital projector in the hall; digital cameras and other ICT items for curricular use.

# Design and Technology

Design and Technology prepares children for the future by encouraging them to look critically at their surroundings and improve them. The children develop creative ideas based on specific criteria and communicate their designs in different ways. They work with tools, equipment, components and materials, combining their practical skills with a thorough understanding of the technical possibilities. Children can draw on their knowledge and understanding from other areas of the curriculum. Work can be carried out individually or in groups, so improving pupils' ability to operate as members of a team. This is particularly evident in our Enterprise Week each year. Pupils are encouraged to evaluate their own work and that of others and by doing so they learn to express their opinions in relation to the design criteria. We aim to help children enjoy making things that people want and that work well.



# When it comes to food, are we Spoiled Rotten?

Over seven million tonnes of food is wasted every year in UK homes. That's not only a massive waste of the Earth's resources, but a waste of money too – about £230 per person annually.

That's why the Waste Partnership for Buckinghamshire is joining the national 'Spoiled Rotten' campaign that asks people to consider ways they can act to reduce their own food waste.

A few simple tips can make a big difference, even if you live a busy life.

- Check your fridge and your food cupboard regularly so you know what needs eating up and what's running out – especially important when you're heading off to the shops.
- Make sure everything's stored properly so that it lasts as long as possible – if something's nearing its use-by date, find a way of using it or – where appropriate – freeze it.
- Make a shopping list, and when buying fruit and veg, be realistic about what you can eat

   maybe it's better to buy one or two loose items rather than a whole bag.

# Scout Christmas Tree Recycle

Back in January 2017, 1st Aston Clinton Scout Group offered the first Christmas tree recycling service to the residents of Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp. The intention was to offer a useful service to the community and raise money for causes that the young people felt strongly about. That first year we were astounded to raise £1,500 which we shared equally between Ollie's Fund and St. Michael's Church Roof fund.



We have now completed our fourth year of tree recycling and this year we collected a staggering 280 trees, almost double what we collected in the first year. The trees were taken to Aston Clinton School playground where they were chipped by Greg O'Callaghan, from G. O'Callaghan Tree Care, who voluntarily gives up his day to help us chip the trees.

This year the chippings were taken to the housing development on Church Lane where they will be used as garden mulch once they have rotted down.

So the trees that you had in your homes continue to have a use in the village albeit in a much smaller form! In addition, you have helped us to raise over £1,600 which will be shared equally between Medical Detection Dogs and the Scout Group's fundraising towards Ollie's Hall.

I hope that those of you who met the Scouts and Cubs as they helped on the day could tell how much they enjoy taking part in this activity. As leaders we never cease to be surprised by how much fun the Scouts can have with some bits of tree and some sweeping brushes.

Elsewhere, 18 Scouts spent a day volunteering at Dancersend Nature Reserve last October. After briefly learning something about the reserve, and of course a safety briefing, most of the day was used for hazel coppicing. The Scouts learned that cutting back hazel trees promotes regrowth and encourages wild flowers to grow, which in turn attract insects and small mammals.

They set to the task with saws, loppers and lots of enthusiasm, and reduced a large grove of hazel trees to firewood, some of which was burned.

"It's fantastic to get young people volunteering outdoors.", said Assistant Scout Leader David Ball. "All the Scouts have given up a day of their half term holiday to help today. They have not only worked hard, but also used sharp tools to cut down large branches safely and responsibly. Our thanks to Mick Jones of the Berks, Bucks, and Oxon Wildlife Trust for arranging and supervising the day for us"

The Berks, Bucks and Oxon Wildlife Trust manages over 80 nature reserves, of which Dancersend is the largest, and works to promote nature and wildlife conservation across the three counties.

Aston Clinton Scout Group provides skills for life to over 70 children in the village, but has never had a permanent home. They are currently looking for support for a new headquarters, Ollie's Hall; please contact Nigel Pinder (ac.gsl@yahoo.co.uk) for more details.

Around a dozen volunteer repairers, ranging from 14 years old to over retirement age, turned up at St Michael's church on Saturday, 11 January. Social media had spread the word and Peter and Rev Sally Bottomer had been interviewed on 3 Counties Radio but, even so, no-one was really sure how many people would visit the café.

In the event, they had nothing to worry about as scores of people arrived, clutching a huge range of items - there were computers, phones, toys, coffee machines, ornaments and even a leaf-blower. People waited patiently while soldering irons, screwdrivers, drills and sewing machines worked their magic for over three hours. Visitors from at least two other churches were interested in starting similar schemes.

An impressive number of items were repaired and if a repair was not possible on the day then advice was given about where parts could be obtained before trying again next time. If you have repair skills and would like to help, please contact Peter.

The concept behind Repair Cafes is to give another lease of life to damaged items and avoid the need for more rubbish to go to landfill. Linked to this, there will be a reduction in raw materials and energy used in new manufacture. Everyone wins.

There were less obvious bonuses from the day as well. As Reverend Sally Bottomer explained, it was a wonderful opportunity for people to meet and have a chat. This is good for all of us but especially for those who may be lonely and don't often have that chance.

The labour for any repair is free but many people were kind enough to make donations and, with the sale of teas and coffees, nearly £300 was raised for the church.





Thank you for your support for the annual Poppy appeal. Emma, our Poppy Appeal Coordinator, has raised over £3000 this year and thanks are due to all those who either collected or had collecting tins and supported her.

Thank you also for turning out on Remembrance Sunday at the War memorial. It shows that our village supports the RBL and its objectives.

There have been some changes following our annual meeting. Our chairman, Lee, has retired after many years of leading us and has been replaced by Robert Letton. Emma Jenkins has taken over the treasurer's post and Ian Bottomer has volunteered and been appointed deputy standard bearer. He will relieve George when he cannot attend ceremonies. The standard bearer is often called upon to attend funerals.

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The main objective of the Royal British Legion is to provide welfare and support to current serving members and ex-servicemen. We all know that one single mouse is unlikely. There are different kinds of trap: the humane ones give you the problem of disposing of your captive, and the execution variety give you a corpse to dispose of. I remember many years ago, when we had mice at the surgery, I insisted on buying one of the humane traps rather than the lethal ones. I baited it, set it and promptly forgot all about it. Days later I discovered a dead mouse, who had starved to death - I had condemned him to a much worse death than the instant variety. So, lesson learned, I bought conventional traps, and sure enough, caught several mice. Unlike what we all used to be told, cheese isn't the best bait: mice can't resist chocolate, flaked almonds or peanut butter. All my little corpses had enjoyed a last meal of peanut butter and died instantly.

I continued to set the traps, and every morning found them empty of bait but no mouse. It became clear that a Super Mouse had moved in. He or she took the bait, over and over, without springing the traps. I wondered if it was a very small mouse, and reflected that he

or she was probably an orphan as we had killed the rest of the family. The resourceful rodent was, for some reason, christened Colin, and continued to elude capture day after day. So I bought a humane trap, and eventually Colin was captured.



#### But what to do with Colin?

The weather was cold, which is no doubt what had attracted the mice in in the first place. I knew that if you released them very locally, they just came back, so Colin was taken to a nearby village (I won't name it!) and released quite near some houses.

I still think about him sometimes. I hope he had a good life and learned to keep away from peanut butter. Alison Beck

- Medicines check that they have supplies of their regular prescription medicine and, especially when the weather is bad, offer to collect them from the pharmacy.
- Shopping in very cold or icy conditions it's safer for older folk to stay indoors. Why not offer to pop out to the shops for them when picking up your own groceries - and stay for a cuppa and a chat.
- Know the signs that they may need help

   curtains always drawn? Is milk still on the
   doorstep or mail in the door? They may need
   help, so don't wait pop round and check if
   they are ok.



It's called Ask NHS, and takes you through a series of questions about how you are feeling, which results in the app offering self advice leaflets, suggesting

speaking to a pharmacist or will let you book a call back appointment at the practice. ### **Aston Clinton Parish** Council - Progress on the new Community Centre and Aston Clinton Park

At the time of writing, in mid-January, the old building has been demolished and new foundations laid. The building is already taking shape with the steel frame in place along with brick and block work being added to the first storey sections. Through February and March we should see the roof to the upper storey being installed, blockwork added to the second storey and external cladding and windows fitted to the first floor.

Between the February and Easter school holidays the Parish Council is also looking to run a repair and refresh programme to the play park.

For those who enjoy the café and soft play facilities in the park, please be aware that they are housed in smart new temporary accommodation in the old, small car park on the left as you enter the park and are open for business as usual.

# Unitary authority Countdown to a new council for Buckinghamshire

With less than 60 days to go, preparations are well underway to create the new Buckinghamshire Council that will launch in April this year.

The new council will deliver the whole range of local services currently delivered by the five existing councils.

For most people there will be no change to the day-to-day services they use, like bin collections, social care, libraries and parking. Getting in touch with their local council will be more straightforward because from 1 April residents will only need to contact one council for all of these services.

New from April, residents will be able to access information, advice and support on a range of topics near where they live or work through a network of 17 local Council Access Points (CAPs). These will offer a face-to-face contact point at the heart of the local community - usually in a library or a council office in one of the county's main towns. The current council main offices located in Aylesbury, High Wycombe, Amersham and Denham will become 'access plus' points, geared up to handle more complex enquiries.

In addition, 16 Community Boards will be set up across the county to help the new council build strong links with local communities and respond to local needs more effectively.

Buckinghamshire Council councillors will work closely with local people and community organisations to understand the key issues affecting their area. Each board will be made up of local people, town and parish councils, community groups, police and healthcare organisations who will focus on finding solutions to local issues. These could include improving facilities for young people, tackling social isolation of older people or helping to set up a community bus.

All the current elected members from the five existing councils will continue serving their communities until the councillors elected to the new Buckinghamshire Council in May take up their posts.

# Spare Change or Real Change?

New 'diverted giving' campaign launched in Aylesbury Vale



Visitors to Aylesbury Vale are being encouraged to donate to local charities rather than to give money to people begging on the street. The 'Spare Change or Real Change?' campaign highlights the fact that many people begging have drug and alcohol issues and giving them money enables them to feed their habit, rather than engaging with agencies that can help them to make positive changes to their lives.

#### How can you help?

If a member of the public sees a person sleeping rough and has an immediate concern for their health and wellbeing – they should call 999. Overnight, at weekends and on Bank Holidays, contact StreetLink who will connect with local services by calling 0300 500 0914 or contact: www.streetlink.org.uk. And, Monday to Friday 9am to 4.45pm reports can be made directly to AVDC's Housing Service by calling: 01296 585168

The campaign highlights ways that members of the public can support people with genuine needs. This includes talking to beggars and offering them food or a drink, rather than cash; encouraging them to engage with support services – including the free overnight emergency accommodation; and supporting local charities working with homeless people, either by donating or volunteering their time.

#### Councillor Mark Winn said:

"No one should feel guilty if they don't give cash to people begging, as there is a network of support ready to help people make real and positive changes to their lives.

"There are a number of local charities and church groups that provide free hot meals to people in need. Given that the life expectancy of someone living on the streets is early to mid-40s we are desperate to engage with people and offer them assistance as soon as possible. Our dedicated team of outreach workers is trying to help them on a journey from addiction, so that they don't live on the streets. There have been real success stories."

# Horticultural Society

### Climate Change

Our Horticultural Society contributor, Ralph Weston, here puts forward some of his thoughts on climate change. This year, in Glasgow, there will be another climate change conference but what can we do in these three villages?

As we look forward to a new year in our gardens, I am conscious of the uncertainties in the weather. Late last year was no exception, with one day very wet and the next, blue skies and bright sunshine leading to frosts. This is all helped by climate change. Last year was kinder to us in that we did not have months and months of hot dry weather. What will 2020 bring? I don't know, but we must be prepared for anything.

As you know, I have a 'thing' about trees. Many people including me, scientists and politicians (All parties have promised to plant millions of them) know that trees absorb carbon dioxide (CO<sup>2</sup>) from the atmosphere. Planting trees is a great way to help CO<sup>2</sup> removal from the atmosphere to slow or reverse pollution and to mitigate global warming. Through photosynthesis trees absorb carbon dioxide to produce oxygen and wood.

If we all planted a tree in our garden then perhaps it would absorb the pollution from our car exhausts.

How much CO2 does a tree consume per year? One mature tree can store 48 lbs CO<sup>2</sup> and give out 260 lbs O<sup>2</sup> per year. Trees absorb CO<sup>2</sup> + Water (H2O) and generally store hydrocarbons.

In 2007 the Society planted 50 field trees in Aston Clinton Park to celebrate our 50th anniversary. The picture shows some of the stalwarts that were involved in the original planting. With a bit of luck the trees will be

there in 100 years' time absorbing the pollution we are putting into the atmosphere.



During the year, when I am out in the garden, I often hear the sound of chain saws cutting down trees and these need to be replaced. Whilst I don't think your Society could plant another 50 trees today - we are all 13 years older, but I ask you, the reader, to support your Horticultural Society to initiate a tree planting programme to start this Autumn. There is plenty of space around the villages where they could be planted

#### Which trees are best for absorbing CO<sup>2</sup>?

Recently there was an item on the news about elm trees resistant to the disease that wiped them out in this village and it would be good to plant a small stand of them in the park.

While oak is the genus with the most carbon-absorbing species, there are other notable deciduous trees that sequester carbon as well. The common horse-chestnut is a good example. The black walnut bears hard nuts and can be messy as a landscape plant but is great in a grove. The London plane and American sweetgum sequester a large amount of carbon and are great landscape trees.

By ensuring that the trees planted are native broad leaf species you can help to preserve the

UK's environment and biodiversity.
