Well, look at all that has been achieved within our communities, even during pandemic times: Covid support groups rallying round to help others, new relationships forged, kindness to others, patience, and compassion with one another. The end of 2021 was a busy time for the parish council, as we finished off a number of projects, organised the well-attended annual Remembrance event and, of course, Santa's float visited the village. Once again, Santa was ably assisted by his elves - in the form of AC Scouts & Guides - who enthusiastically rattled their collection buckets throughout the village and managed to collect the fantastic sum of £1031, which, when added to the monies donated via the Just Giving page, resulted in a total of £1166 which will be split equally between Rennie Grove Hospice and Aston Clinton Scouts and Guides. Well done all, and special thanks to Tim and Spencer at Dayla Drinks for providing Santa's transport and driver.

Moving into 2022, the parish council has a busy year ahead, not only with the more routine tasks like setting budgets, but also with more exciting projects such as the restoration of the fountain, renewal of equipment in the park, and more events in the park, particularly the Queens Platinum Jubilee weekend celebrations in June.

We also look forward eagerly to the longer days and a view of the many spring bulbs planted during 2021 which will no doubt transform our lovely village.

### Buckinghamshire Council awards Recycling Centre contract to FCC Recycling

Buckinghamshire Council has awarded the new contract to manage and operate its Household Recycling Centres to FCC Recycling (UK) Ltd. The contract is due to start on 1 April 2022 and run for five years with the option to extend a further five years (ten in total).

Buckinghamshire's Household Recycling Centres attract over a million visits a year and handle more than 60,000 tonnes of waste. FCC Recycling (UK) Ltd, which manages the current contract for Buckinghamshire's Household Recycling Centres, was agreed as the successful bidder, subject to contract, at the council's Cabinet meeting.

The new contract is worth £15 million over five years rising to £28.5 million over ten years if the contract is extended. Some elements of the successful bid include:

 Partnership with South Bucks Hospice to ensure more waste is reused from all sites through the shops at Aston Clinton and High Wycombe

- A Waste Awareness and Education Manager to support residents and the wider community to recycle and reuse more.
- A target of recycling at least 68% of the waste brought to the sites.
- There are no changes to current opening days or times to any sites as a result of the new contract.

Peter Strachan, Cabinet Member for Climate Change and Environment, said:

"With over a million visits a year, we know that our Household Recycling Centres are very important to Buckinghamshire residents. This new contract will continue to encourage everyone to recycle and reuse more, building on our current success with FCC and providing continuity as the new contract begins. They share our passion for customer service and value for money, so I'm confident that together we will work to deliver an excellent service, with strong environmental performance."

Steve Longdon, FCC Operations Director, commented:

"We have operated the facilities in Buckinghamshire since 2012 and we have worked hard during this time to deliver an exceptional service, so we are delighted to have been awarded the new contract to provide the management and operation of the nine Household Recycling Centres. The new contract will allow us the flexibility to work with Buckinghamshire Council to embrace new ways of working focusing on the waste prevention, repair and reuse agenda that is vital if we are to meet our Net Zero targets as a nation."

### Our school, our say...

At Aston Clinton we believe in encouraging positive relationships between adults and pupils and amongst pupils themselves. We value the thoughts and opinions of every pupil and use the principles of 'Restorative practice' to underpin how we teach the children to build empathy and self-reflections towards one another. Despite the restrictions we have worked hard to try and ensure that our pupils feel that they have a say in the decisions that are made.

Our school council is made up of two elected children from each class from Years 2 - 6. The year 6 children hold the roles of chair and vice chair; secretary and vice secretary. "Our school, our say" gives each school councillor the opportunity to lead a circle time activity to ascertain the views of the children within that class. The year 6 children summarise the thoughts and opinions and present them at the weekly school council meeting. Recently the children looked at what it means to be safe below is their report.

### School Council - Focus on Safety

#### Safety, what does it mean to you?

We found out from each class from Y2 - Y6, what safety means. Here are some results we found out.

### Rules of Road Safety

- Always wear seatbelts (the majority spoke about this, and how they need it in case a car crashes or any other dangerous events happen).
- Keep a good distance away from cars/any types of transport
- Always cross at a Zebra crossing
- Don't mess around on the streets
- Always walk on the pavement
- Do not cross near blind spots (hidden driveways/walkways)
- Pay attention to your surroundings, you never know when a car stops and approaches you.
- · Look left and right before crossing the roads, because you don't know when a car could pass.



#### How to keep yourself safe

- Don't go near danger eg: don't run away from parent's sight.
- Don't share your passwords with anyone, even if they are your friend.
- Don't leave your front/ back door open, unless it is an emergency.
- Think before you do it, it could cause an accident.
- Listen to trusted friends/family to keep you and others safe.
- Don't talk to strangers, you may get trapped

### Questions you asked and answered!

### What happens if you don't feel safe?

 Find a trusted adult or go somewhere a friend or family member lives.

### What would you do if a stranger approached you?

 Don't listen to them if they say they have an item like food, instead if you have a phone, call your parents and then call the police (999)

### Being safe means

- Feeling comfortable and protected in your surroundings.
- Feeling like you are in an a comfortable environment where nothing will happen.
- Having a right to feel safe.
- It means you don't feel like having any threat.
- To not feel like anything bad will happen.

# Generous residents make it a Christmas to remember for vulnerable children

The Inspire Bucks annual appeal to give Christmas gifts to Buckinghamshire's vulnerable children and young people has broken its £10,000 target, thanks to the enthusiastic generosity of the county's residents, businesses and community groups.

With the money raised – and the kind donation of hundreds of presents by well-wishers – the charity provided more than 1,700 Buckinghamshire children and young people from disadvantaged backgrounds with a Christmas gift in 2021. That's an increase of around 500 on 2020.

"Absolutely fantastic!" said Inspire Bucks Chairman Paul Irwin, paying tribute to the hundreds of donors who helped the charity burst its target in a little over six weeks. "The generosity that people have shown towards our vulnerable children and young people in difficult circumstances has been beyond our expectations. Thank you so much for enabling us to help a record number of children this year!"

Cash donations came through the charity's GoFundMe page and gifts were dropped off at collection points around the county.

Paul said: "Td like to say a big thank-you not only for this generosity, but also to the Inspire Bucks volunteers who helped with the purchasing, sorting and packing that ensured each child or young person received something suited to their age and interests."

### New Scout Hall -Ollie's Hall Update

Two steps forward, one step back

At Ist Aston Clinton Scouts we have never had a home of our own and desperately need one. A team of volunteer leaders has been working since 2018 to find a site and build a Scout Hall that will be known as Ollie's Hall after Ollie Gardiner who sadly died of a brain tumour in 2017 aged 13. Ollie was a very keen Beaver, Cub and Scout.

Having secured a site for free immediately adjacent to Aston Clinton Park as part of a small development of five new homes, planning permission was secured in 2021. The local Parish Council is fully supportive of the project, as are two out of our three Unitary Councillors.

However, the Leader of Buckinghamshire Council has refused to allow access to our site across a small strip of land owned by the Council, and the release of an old restrictive covenant so that we can deliver the new scout hall. We believe the merits of this project should be debated, and voted on, by a full Council meeting.

### Discover Bucks Museum SIT and PLAY: New sculptural exhibition and play experience

### **Aston Clinton Surgery**

Aston Clinton Surgery is now supported by AskFirst online consultation, one of a range of online tools which make it easier for you to get the help you need.

AskFirst was formerly AskNHS. It is free to download on any mobile device or is available through practice websites. It provides a symptom checker, self-care advice, and it helps you to find local healthcare services and book GP appointments.

- Available 24/7
- Check your symptoms
- · Find local services
- Make appointments
- Self-care advice

### How does it work?

A virtual healthcare assistant called 'Olivia' will ask a series of questions to assess your symptoms in a clinically safe way.

Olivia will then recommend the most appropriate care for you. This might be self-care advice via www.nhs.uk, a GP appointment, GP call back or you may be directed to get urgent or emergency care.

If you need to see a GP, the app can prioritise patients into the most appropriate appointment slots based on your needs. You can directly book an urgent or routine appointment without having to call the practice.

The AskFirst app is available to download free on both iOS and Android phones and smart devices, as well as practice websites. You can also create an AskFirst account.

### My Trees

One of the many things we have really come to appreciate in these days of pandemics and global warming is the importance of our trees. I've just completed a project photographing a group of poplars at Marsworth reservoir through a whole year in changing weather and light, and what a joy it has been.

The four Tring reservoirs have always been part of my life. They were built on Rothschild land to feed the Grand Union Canal and are now a Site of Special Scientific Interest and among the best birding spots for miles. Marsworth, built in 1806, is the smallest. As a girl I lived in Aylesbury and we cycled to Startops and bathed in the corner of the reservoir - living so far from the sea it was the only wild place for a swim and a paddle. I note that this is no longer permitted, but I don't think nowadays I would be tempted anyway!

I remember photographing my dad standing right out on the frozen reservoir in the winter of 1962/3. Herons used to nest in huge numbers in the reeds fringing Marsworth, although now they have taken to the trees. Egrets are frequent now, unknown in my youth, and this winter a great white egret spent some time there, attracting many





birdwatchers. One year I spotted a bittern lurking in the reeds during a cold winter. On any visit I enjoy the swans, great crested grebes, geese, mallards, coots and moorhens as well as the more unusual migrants on passage.

I've photographed 'my' trees in frost and fog in the depths of winter, in the spring when

the new leaves emerge; in high summer when the shades of green were too many to count, and in autumn when everything turns to gold. I've been there at sunrise and sunset to capture the changing light. I've met many interesting people: seldom did I visit and not see anyone. I've met walkers, runners,

birdwatchers, photographers, fishermen, picnickers and Canal and River Trust workers. I've had special moments like murmurations of starlings just before dusk, wheeling overhead before they drop into the reeds to roost. I've seen wonderful cloud formations reflected in the water and sat just watching the shifting light and changing colours.

At first, I was just photographing the trees, but as the year progressed I noticed that the colours and forms of the reeds below them changed just as much, so they began to form part of the shots too. I ended up with well over 300 pictures of 'my' trees and would be the first to concede that there would be a limited market for looking at that many. The project was at the request of the Chiltern Society, so I eventually trimmed them down to 25, and wrote captions about my thoughts at the time. The project deepened my affection for the reservoirs I have known for so long, made me notice so many details that I had missed over the years, and provided solace at a time when the natural world has never mattered so much nor needed us to care for it more wisely.

We are encouraging residents and community groups to support tree planting as part of the Bucks Tree Mission - a shared mission to plant trees for a greener future.

The Bucks Tree Mission is an important part of our Climate Change and Air Quality Strategy. The strategy will reduce our carbon emissions by 75% by 2030 on the way to achieving net-zero no later than 2050.

Older residents of the village will remember Margaret Lowe, who lived her whole life in Aston Clinton. She died in 2005. James Adam recorded some of her memories. Here are some of her memories of the village during World War I. There will be a further instalment next time.

### Childhood in the First World War

I was born in Aston Clinton in 1915, during the First World War.

It was then still very much a Rothschild Village. Old Lady Rothschild had died, but her daughters kept on the Estate, visiting their old home for Passover and Jewish New Year. They visited the Girls' and Infants' Schools that they had founded when they were children. New babies were inspected, and I was carried out to the Rothschild limousine for this purpose.

Less publicised than the Halton handover, the Aston Clinton Estate was placed at the Government's disposal and the 21st Division from Lancashire was encamped at Catsbrains, and what is now Aston Clinton Park became their Parade Ground. Villagers, including me in my pram, were admitted to the Park when King George V came to inspect them prior to their departure to France where they sustained heavy losses at the Battle of Loos.

Soon after my first birthday in 1916, my father, Allen Lowe, the Headmaster of the village School, departed on Mr Howe's horse bus en route to join up in Oxford. He fought with the Royal Artillery in the Salonika Campaign, was gassed, contracted malaria, and never once slept in a bed until he returned in time for my fourth birthday in 1919.

During his absence, my mother helped in the YMCA Canteen in the Anthony Hall. A pound of tea had to produce 240 cups of

tea at an old penny a cup. There was no fresh milk and I enjoyed scraping out the tins of Nestles milk with a lead spoon. I remember the excitement when it was discovered that I had bitten off the tip of one of the spoons and, presumably, swallowed it!



There were concerts for the troops in the Anthony Hall at one of which a large soprano sang 'Let the great big world keep turning'. I demanded to sing too and mounted the stage. My mother's attempts to remove me were shouted down with cries of 'Let her sing! Her Daddy's out there fighting the Germans!' My childish rendering of 'Burlington Bertie' was received with applause.

# One of our bells is missing!

Some of you may well have heard us ringing in the New Year at St Michael's. This is a long bellringing tradition up and down the country, but this year was very different for us as one of our bells is missing.



At a recent inspection of the church bells by the bellhangers, the 10th bell (the heaviest, known by ringers as the tenor bell, weighing 11cwt) was found to have a small crack near the bottom. The bell was cast in 1806 but, as we have the bells inspected every two years this crack is quite recent. So, what is to be done? We could carry on ringing it but eventually the crack would spread, sound terrible, with disastrous possible consequences or we could have the bell recast at vast cost. Fortunately, there is one company in Newmarket that specializes in welding church bells that have cracks. This is a complicated process involving heating up the whole bell in a furnace in order to apply the weld.

Firstly, the bell has to be removed from the tower right at the top. This was done at the end of November. This bell was originally made and hung in the tower long before the porch was built and is wider than the entrance arch. No problem for the bellhangers as they just tilted the bell sideways and passed through with 1cm to spare! The next problem was to hoist the

bell onto the lorry. We are grateful to Richard Nicholls of Park Farm who drove his tractor round and used the baler hoist. He made this look easy.

The bell is now in Newmarket and we hope to have it back soon, but this is not the end of its journey. It has to go back to the bellhangers' works to be re-drilled and re-tuned to match the other nine bells. Finally, they will hoist it back up the tower so that it can be rung again, hopefully for another 300 years.

The total cost of this small crack will be £8,000. We need to raise about £3,000 to pay the final bill so if you would like to contribute to this project, please get in touch with me. We would love to hear from you. If you would like to learn how to ring the bells, this would be a real bonus or just to see what goes on, come any Friday night. 

### Village People

This is a series about the people of Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp. Not just about the people who live in these villages but the people who are a part of the daily life of the villages.

### Richard Maskell has spent a lifetime in Aston Clinton.

Q. You were born in Aston Clinton and have lived here pretty much all your life. What do you miss most about village life compared with life in the 1970s or 1980s for example?

A. There is no longer a butcher or a hardware shop or for that matter a draper in the village. Also, at one time there were more than a dozen public houses. What I don't miss is the traffic which queued through the village at peak times prior to the opening of the by-pass.

Q. You were a police officer for many years and must have seen a lot of changes during that time. What were the most significant that affected the way you operated?

A. I joined the Bucks Constabulary in 1963 and was stationed in Slough. At that time constables patrolled



on foot, nearly always alone, with the only equipment being a truncheon and a pair of handcuffs. No personal radio. While on patrol I disturbed two men committing a burglary who made off in a vehicle. There was no way of calling for assistance, so I stopped the next motorist and pursued them, we caught up with them and with the aid of the motorist I made two arrests. Help from the public was not unusual.

Personal radios were not issued until late in the 1960s in Bucks and about the same time 'Panda' patrol cars replaced most of the foot patrols.

In the 1960s, fingerprints and the scientific examination of articles were the only addition widely used in the detection of crime. The greatest advance came with CCTV in 1970 -1980 which was of assistance

in the detection of crime. DNA came into use by the police towards the end of the 1980s - a great improvement!

Q. You were involved with setting up some community bus initiatives in the county. Did that work and should there be more?

A. On retirement from the police, I worked for Bucks County Council as the Community Transport Officer. Community buses are successful, and their numbers over the years have increased, but their success relies on an identifiable need, and when set up that they are actually used, but to be successful volunteers are needed to operate the service. Community buses can be very expensive to setup and run and few can operate without local authority financial or charity support.

A good local example is the Wendover Community Car, which is a small wheelchair accessible mini-bus operating since 1996. It provides a door-to-door service to the people of Wendover and surrounding villages who need a bit of help getting out and about. The drivers are volunteers.

# Q. You were a parish councilor and then Chairman of the parish council. Has that role become more complex in recent years?

A. For all councils' issues arise, some are more complex than others. I am not aware that they have become more complex in recent years.

As soon as I was appointed Chairman of the council a survey form was sent to each household to identify what the residents considered to be the issues in the village. Over 500 were completed. The first need identified was for affordable housing to rent or buy, particularly for the young and elderly, so they can continue to live in the village. The second, a pedestrian crossing in the London Road between Twitchell Lane and Putnam's drive, and a speed camera in the London Road near Putnam's Drive.

# Q. Are you involved in any activities and/or groups in Aston Clinton?

A. I am a member of Aston Clinton u3a and also a Trustee of the Turpin's Charity, a village charity which provides grants to persons who are in need, hardship or distress.

# Q. You've had an interesting and varied career. Which role has given you the most satisfaction?

A. I had just two careers, both helping the public but in different ways.

For the last four years of my police service, I was responsible for the Rural Section around Aylesbury. Having one's house burgled is most distressing. During that time the officers on the section targeted areas where burglaries were taking place, this led to arrests from Stewkley, to Aston Clinton and Wendover. For over two years during the winter period houses were being broken into at dusk. Police observation led to the offenders being identified and arrested. They admitted to having committed more than five hundred burglaries across the County. While working as a transport officer I was involved in the instigation of the Winslow Community Bus which has now been operating for more than 20 years, providing a very popular bus service and days out for the people living in villages around Winslow.

### Q. What are your hobbies, what do you do for fun?

A. My wife are I are both member of The National Trust and English Heritage, so we regularly make visits to their properties. We are keen on walking and gardening and taking holidays both home and abroad.

#### Q. Your favourite music?

A. Elton John and Queen.

#### Q. Your favourite film?

A. The Battle of Britain.

## Q. What was the first car you owned and what do you drive now?

A. An Austin Mini. I don't now own a car, I sold it last year. My wife owns a car which meets our needs

# Q. What changes to village life (good or bad) have you noticed in recent years?

A. The opening of the by-pass in 2003 was a real necessity. An increase in the population of nearly 30% in the last 10 years. The village park has always been a great asset to the village and remains so. The pavilion which was built in the 1970s and needed to be updated, thanks to the parish council and the New Homes Bonus, it has been.

### **Buckland Paris Council**



In December the Buckland Parish Council office moved from Halton to the upstairs committee room at Buckland Village Hall. We also welcome Fiona Richardson, who lives locally, as she joins us as our new Parish Council Clerk.

The former Parish Clerk, Fiona Lippmann, retired in December. We thank Fiona for the help and support she has given during her years as our clerk and wish her well for the future.

The Buckland Neighbourhood Plan, now over five years old, is currently undergoing a review. Despite delays caused by the pandemic, it is now in its final stages and a referendum to approve the changes is due to be held in the Spring, giving parishioners an opportunity to engage with it. The main changes are a policy defining the settlement boundary, and additions to the heritage and environmental policies to make them more robust. Additional changes have been made to ensure that the

Plan conforms with the newly adopted Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan. Details of the replacement Neighbourhood Plan can be found on the Parish Council's website www.bucklandpc.org.uk.

With the recent sale of farmland in Lower Buckland, Buckland Parish Council took the opportunity to buy 1.86 acres near Monks Court to use as a community orchard, nature reserve and wildflower meadow. The parish council gained planning consent to change the use of this site from agricultural. The landscaping plan was approved just in time for the 2021 planting season. We were lucky to receive a donation of 22 standard native trees, including black poplars, as well as a grant from Buckinghamshire Council for 25 heritage variety apple trees, which were all planted just before Christmas.

The plans include a copse of native trees with glades, heritage fruit trees planted in a wildflower meadow, a hazel coppice, and an area densely planted with shrubs to provide a safe wildlife habitat. It will be a nature reserve with a large variety of flora and fauna as well as becoming a focal point for future community activities, and a place for residents to enjoy. The project will take several years to complete. Full details are available on the Parish Council website.

We are awaiting further action from Buckinghamshire Council to solve the damp problems affecting public footpaths near Cherry Tree Farm.

### Apple Dumplings

This time our recipe is supplied by Pam.
It comes from a Belling recipe book that her mother received when she bought her new Belling Compact Cooker in the late 1950's.
The recipes were meant for use in electric cookers, but no doubt you will be able to make the necessary alterations. The recipe we chose was a reminder of an almost forgotten comfort food which will probably take many of us of a certain generation back to our schooldays.

#### Ingredients:

Cooking apples (average size) Sugar Butter Short pastry

#### Method:

- Peel and core apples, leaving them whole.
   Cover the bottom of each centre hole with butter and fill up with sugar.
- To make the short pastry, mix 8 oz plain flour with ½ teaspoon of salt. Rub in 2 oz marge and 2 oz lard. Mix to a stiff paste with very little cold water.
- Roll out pastry and cut into strips about

   inch wide. Dampen edges and, starting
   at the centre bottom, mould the strips of
   pastry around the apple until it is completely
   covered.
- Put on a flat baking tin and brush over with egg or milk. Cook at 400 degrees. Time about 45 minutes.

### St Mary's, Drayton Beauchamp - a Festival Church



On 1 November 2021, a large congregation attended a unique event, conducted by Alan Wilson, Bishop of Buckingham, and the Archdeacon of Buckingham, Guy Elsmore, to celebrate the granting of "Festival Church" status to the church.

A Festival Church is no longer viable for weekly services but still valued for local events. It must hold at least six services a year (likely to be on church festivals, eg Christmas and Easter) as well as weddings, baptisms

and funerals as required. St Mary's has long suffered from difficulty delivering the legal requirements for officers and the finance for proper maintenance due to a dwindling congregation. Given these threats to its viability, the "Festival" model was clearly ideal for its future.

There were many upbeat contributions including those from our Revs Sally Bottomer and Alison Roberts. Guy Elsmore noted that St Mary's is the first in the Oxford Diocese to achieve Festival status - a mark of a church going somewhere new for its community. "These are tough times for churches in smaller rural parishes" he said, "and initiatives like this help churches survive and breathe new life into communities. Rather than staying locked away for the few they can become welcoming to the many, for hospitality, learning and leisure, as well as worship".

Guy saw the partnership between the clergy, the Parochial Church Council and the Drayton Beauchamp Parochial Charities Trust as a model of co-operation. "When assessing a proposal for revitalisation, I look at finances, leadership, the number of people involved, and the mix of skills and energy. Your partnership

has all these - with energy in abundance! This augurs very well for a bright future," he concluded.

So, as a Festival Church, St Mary's can legally remain open, as a church and a centre for the community, responsive to Drayton Beauchamp's needs. Much recognition for achieving St Mary's Festival Church status is due to Rev. Alison Roberts. Without her great enthusiasm for the church and the local community, this milestone would not have been achieved.

St Mary's plans to hold a service on the first Sunday of every month, plus Easter and Christmas services. Please look for the times and dates in Village Life, Pews News or on the benefice website ac-buck-db-churches.org.

### Random Acts of Kindness

It's a simple concept but it can make a whole lot of difference. Do something kind, however minor, to make someone's day a bit (or a lot) better.

It is thought the modern version was first put forward by Anne Herbert in 1982. She proposed "Practice random acts of kindness and senseless acts of beauty" in response to the phrase "Random acts of violence and senseless acts of cruelty". The idea, though, has been around for much longer, and it is enshrined in many philosophies and religions.

There is now even an annual Random Acts of Kindness Day, this year on 17 February. The world would be a better place if we could all practice these acts every day, rather than just once a year. The key to it is that, whatever you do, you should expect nothing in return – just do it. These altruistic acts don't need to be grand gestures. Yes, people do pay for a stranger's meal in a restaurant, or you may choose to buy the coffee for the person behind you in the queue, but the acts do not need to cost anything financially.

Even a smile and a kind word can work wonders for someone having a rotten day. Is there an old friend or neighbour you haven't spoken to for some while? Give them a call and the gift of a few minutes of your time.

Then there is the idea of 'paying it forward'. The American statesman Benjamin Franklin told a friend not to repay a loan to him but, when the chance came, to pass the money to someone else in need, asking that person to pass it on in turn, rather than pay it back. Franklin's idea was that the same sum of money could be used time and again to help several people. He realised that someone would eventually break the line but despite this, hoped the money would help many people first.

Again, it doesn't have to be cash. If you receive a favour, why not do a favour for someone else? Don't do it expecting a reward but one day it may be your turn again.

So, what can we do? Pay a compliment to a colleague or friend, buy flowers, take food to the food bank (The two in Aston Clinton are at St Michael's Church and the Baptist Chapel), even let a car into the traffic queue ahead of you. More long-term, could you spare a few hours to volunteer at a local charity or organisation?

Whatever you decide to do, you do not have to wait until 17 February, and it could become a habit. You never know, you might even find you feel better for it.

'Pulling the plug' by the existing bund was carried out by both the oldest and newest volunteers to the Trust. Permission had to be obtained from the Canal & River Trust, the owners of the canal, and it has been estimated that re-watering will take up to a fortnight. However, this will not be to navigable depth and completion of the remaining section linking up with the Phase 1 restoration at Little Tring will be necessary before boating is possible.

Removal of a major obstruction by way of an old tip at Little Tring will cost the Trust a very substantial sum and funding for this work is being investigated. Any contributions will be very welcome!

Whilst re-watering was in progress seven scouts aged 11-17, three scout leaders and two mothers all braving the blizzard conditions at the winding hole, planted 60 saplings along the back fence and weeded around last year's trees. This was for their Community Service badge.




