Ralph Weston

Luther Blissett OBE DL

Aston Clinton resident, the former England international & Watford FC footballing legend Luther Blissett, was recently awarded an OBE for services to football and charity in the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Birthday Honours.



Commenting on the award he said: "To receive an OBE not just for my achievements in football but for using that career for the good of others makes me immeasurably proud. Even more so in this Platinum Jubilee year. That my career as a footballer can be used by the charities to touch the lives, not just of football fans, but their families and the wider community is a great honour."

He made his Hornets debut in 1976 becoming the club's record goal-scorer and appearance maker. He made history on December 15th, 1982, when he became the first black player to score for England, netting a hat-trick against Luxembourg.

Luther's charity and community work was inspired by the late Graham Taylor OBE, Watford's manager during the club's glory years of the 1980s. Taylor believed that the club was the centre of the community and that its players had a duty to give back to the people of the town.

Along with his partner Lauren Fox, Luther played a leading role in Watford's response to the Coronavirus pandemic working alongside mayor Peter Taylor to raise more than £250,000 for local charities. Recent initiatives include establishing the Sunflower Social Club, to support Ukraine evacuees in the county, the opening of Luther Blissett House, a social housing project in Watford, and the establishment of a peer support group for service men and women and veterans. Luther continues to make daily calls and visits to Hornets fans of all ages in need.

Last year Luther was granted the freedom of the Borough of Watford and granted a Doctorate by the University of Hertfordshire. He was also made a Deputy Lieutenant for Hertfordshire, an assistant to the Lord Lieutenant who is the King's representative in the county. It is believed he is the only former professional footballer to be appointed to this position.

The day I met the Queen



There are not that many people who actually met the late Queen in person but one local resident who did is George Brock.

George was born in Plymouth but moved to this area during the war, when he became a telegram boy in Wendover. He later joined the Royal Navy, like his father and grandfather before him, and ended up working for Rivets.

George also had a part-time job as a waiter in The Bell when it was run by Gerard Harris. Among their regular customers were members of the Country Landowner's Association and when they were organising an event at Windsor in 1954, they asked if they could borrow George for the day to serve drinks to their guests, including the Queen and her mother and sister.

Bringing the story right up to date, the day of the Queen's funeral happened to be George's 93rd birthday.

Local charity helping to make Buckinghamshire a better place to live

Community Impact Bucks is a local charity which helps people to get involved and make a difference in Buckinghamshire communities. It does this by helping people find volunteering opportunities, and by supporting charities and not-for-profit groups to get started, be effective and grow.

The charity runs the Buckinghamshire Volunteer Matching Service which has mobilised over 1,800 volunteers across the county since March 2020 to wherever they are needed from delivering food to mentoring young people. Since June 2022 it has run an Interpreter Service which provides volunteer interpreters (Russian and Ukrainian speaking) to support hosts and community groups on a task-by-task basis. Through its Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise Support Service, funded by Buckinghamshire Council, the charity helps Bucks charities and voluntary groups on all aspects of running their organisation, offering tailored support, guidance and training. Community Impact Bucks also supports communities directly: its Pub Lunch Clubs, Gardening and Handy Helpers services help people to stay connected

Simply Walk celebrates 20 years of walking and well-being



Simply Walk, Buckinghamshire Council's walking for health and wellbeing scheme celebrated its 20th anniversary this year.

The scheme has developed into a popular, evergrowing programme, attracting thousands of walkers on dozens of routes every week.

The idea behind the scheme developed from the Walking for Health initiative pioneered by GP, Richard Bird. Simply Walk is the name given to the Buckinghamshire version of the scheme. The premise is simple, hence the name. Walkers of any age and ability are invited to join one of the many walks across the county. Most take place weekly and are graded for their level of difficulty. All walks are guided by a team of enthusiastic and knowledgeable volunteers who lead and back-mark the walks.

The aim is to give participants the opportunity to walk for fitness in a relaxed environment. The walks have additional benefits for mental health and wellbeing, giving those who take part access to a social and friendly group of like-minded people, helping to tackle social isolation and loneliness.

Simply Walk currently runs 72 walks a week with just over 2,000 people regularly taking part. The scheme is supported by a team of 237 active volunteers. Over the years the scheme has had numerous highlights including several couples who met on walks going on to marry, charity events and even animal rescues!

Aston Clinton Parish Council

Summer was very busy in the park this year. Following the long-awaited refurbishment of the children's' playpark equipment which was eagerly tested out by some enthusiastic children at the start of the school holidays.



The Parish Council also hosted two wellattended sessions of the Bucks Council Play around the Parishes scheme and is now working on a programme of updates to the Trim Trail in the park.

To further deter vandalism and prevent crime in the park, an extension to the existing CCTV system is currently underway, which will cover wider areas of the park, with part of the cost funded by a Grantscape grant from the Gib Lane Solar fund. Our allotment holders have been supporting the Grow to Give charity, by donating excess veggies and fruit each week in the growing season, to the Aylesbury Grapevine foodbank.

At the end of August, a public event was hosted by Transport for Bucks, as part of the consultation process for the traffic calming measures proposed in the Aston Clinton Neighbourhood Plan, and planned for five zones in the village. Following the end of the consultation, TfB will consider the response and then hopefully implement measures for zones 2 and 3 in the centre of the village. The traffic calming for the remaining zones are dependent upon Bucks Council funding, to be obtained from planned large developments outside the village and will be some time away. Anyone wishing to view the plans can arrange this through the parish office, or visit our website.

As Autumn progresses., we look forward to our annual Remembrance Sunday event at the War Memorial, on Sunday 13th November starting just before 11am. Surrounding roads will be closed from 10.30am to 11.30am and all are welcome to join us at the memorial.

We are also currently planning for the annual outing of Santa's float in December, which is being structured slightly differently this year to allow Santa to visit more of our expanding village. Gemma Collis



Aston Clinton Wheelchair Fencer and Paralympian Gemma Collis has been adding more silverware to her collection in recent months, as she continues her preparations for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games.

Only a few weeks ago, the former Aston Clinton School pupil made history at the Commonwealth Fencing Championships – taking home gold for Wales on Para Fencing's debut at the event.

Gemma dusted off her Foils in a bid to win her maiden global Championship and got off to a flying start dropping just three points on her way to a full set of victories.

That left her seeded top and saw her face GB teammate and close friend Emily Holder in the semi-finals. Experience on her side, Gemma soon pulled ahead – eventually winning 15-5 to secure a place in the final against India's Malti Panaure.

With a loud Welsh contingent behind, Gemma was not to be denied – storming to a 15-4 victory to secure Wales first and only gold of the Commonwealth Fencing Championships, and only their third senior individual gold ever. Of the experience, Gemma said: "Having just spent three weeks in bed with Covid, I was a bit worried about my fitness but having incredible support from my Welsh teammates really made the difference! I've never been part of an integrated able-bodied/para fencing team before and they honestly couldn't have made the experience any more special! Having a wall of noise from the start to finish really pushed me on, so I am absolutely thrilled to have made history by winning Wales' first ever Para Fencing Commonwealth Gold!".

Gemma's recent successes don't stop there though... back in July she picked up two Silvers at the Para Fencing World Cup in Warsaw, making the final in both the Sabre and Epee at one World Cup event for the first time in her career.

Since the Tokyo Paralympics the former Aylesbury High School pupil has won six out of a possible eight individual World Cup medals - an achievement which has seen her rise up the rankings. The 11x World Cup medallist is up to a career-high second in the world in the Women's Epee, and sixth in the Sabre.

As we go to press, Gemma is in Italy for the next World Cup, before Paris 2024 Paralympic qualification begins in November with a World Cup in Hungary and finally the European Championships in Poland in December.

Gemma is largely self-funded currently looking for sponsors (large and small!) as she bids to become Great Britain's first female Wheelchair Fencer to medal at the Paralympics since 1988. Cricket club

In the last part of the season the club became a quieter place as the Colts activity stopped for the summer holidays - although not before a keenly contested Colts vs Coaches match which the youngsters won on the final ball. However, the Senior sides carried on to early September with varying degrees of success.



The 1st XI outperformed expectations in their first season back in Division 2. 13 wins and only four defeats saw us come third and only narrowly miss out on consecutive promotions. Highlights included posting the club record score of 373 vs New City then nearly beating it again with 372 vs Old Bradwell, plus achieving the largest winning margin (bowling New City out for just 23 for a win by 350 runs). The strength in depth of the batting line up was illustrated by 10 players making half centuries, with Shah Bukhari leading the way with 444 at an average of 34 (and scoring the only century), closely followed by Talib Hussain with 421 at 32. Despite missing the final five games, Adnan Zaib topped the wicket takers with 22 at a cost of 11 apiece, with skipper Mike Parsonage next with 18 at 19 runs each. Wicket keeper Phil Samuels claimed 18 victims (15 caught and 3 stumped) and Shah Bukhari hit a purple patch of five direct hit run outs in a handful of games to go with his seven outfield catches.

The 2nd team came 8th out of 10 in Division 5, although never in danger of relegation. Their haul of just four wins reflected problems with availability and the deserved promotion to the 1st team of a couple of key personnel. The silver lining to these issues is that we were able to give senior match experience to seven of our Colts, including our first ever female player in the adult teams. Batting was the biggest problem and if it were not for Neil Roberts (458 runs in just 7 matches including two centuries) then relegation would have been much more likely. Liam Smith was the only other player to pass 200 runs. Casey Dawson topped the bowling again with 20 at an average of 17. Excitingly, 16 year olds Kyan Dawson and Owen Ford contributed well with 13 and 12 wickets respectively.

With the growth of the Colts and the some excellent performances from the Senior Midweek T20 (with a 100% record in the group stages) it has been another very busy season and there have been lots of highlights. We will now start to plan for how we can make 2023 even better, and are actively looking into the possibility of introducing the All Star Programme for 5 to 8 Year Olds.

And the beat goes on, the beat goes on...

As life was getting back to some normality earlier this year, I decided to add to my list of activities in retirement. Not sure that activities is the right word as bridge, grandparenting duties and the u3a discussion group don't actually require too much physical activity on my part. Bowls does, as you do have to walk quite a distance during a match even if the pace is described best as pedestrian.

Believing that I have a sense of rhythm, I've started learning to play the drums. So far, the belief in my sense of rhythm is well founded as my teacher seems reassured by my ability not only to get back on the beat when I make a mistake but also my awareness that I've made a mistake in the first place. Some of his students seem oblivious to any mistakes and just carry on regardless. I will stop, curse and try to get back on beat.

How is drumming a physical activity you may ask? Drummers are usually positioned at the back of bands and at times there seems very little movement. Even facial expressions rarely change – the recently deceased drummer of the Rolling Stones, Charlie Watts was a perfect example of not even looking as though he cared what was going on around him.

But drumming does require both arms and legs to be constantly on the move but not necessarily in synch with each other. The base drum and hi-hat are operated by the legs while snare drum, tom-toms and cymbals with the arms.

For one beat your legs may move just like when walking. Then you start hopping on the right leg while still walking with the left and then hopping with the left and so on. Meanwhile with the arms you may be hitting the snare drum with the left while the right is alternating between cymbals and tom-toms. And all these independent of each other.

When it does all come together it is very satisfying, even if the process to get there can be frustrating and tiring at times. The good thing is that drummers can do no wrong – if a mistake is made, it's called jazz!

The Squirrels' Tale

How do you feel about squirrels? Not the cute and rare red ones, but the grey ones who visit our gardens? My partner buys peanuts just for the pleasure of watching our squirrels come and collect them. Then we discovered that when they had eaten enough, the squirrels were burying the surplus in our neighbour's garden and causing havoc in his veg plot, so now they only get as much as they can eat at one sitting. They sit up and eat them quite close by – deft, efficient, and endearing. They shake each nut first to check that it's worth the effort of opening it. Once they ate all our sunflower hearts and peanuts, so we had to buy expensive 'squirrel proof' bird feeders to enable our avian visitors get a look in, and these work perfectly. But are grey squirrels really so bad?



They have certainly had a very bad press. They were first brought here from America in 1876, and over the next few years many more were introduced, including by the Duke of Bedford at Woburn. Woburn squirrels were sent to sites all over the country. They adapted well, and the popular belief that they have 'driven out' their red cousins is not entirely true: the real answer is more complicated. The two species thrive in different habitats: reds live high up in conifers, whereas greys are more adventurous and forage on the ground. Although they are not very different in size, greys carry more body fat, and can weigh twice as much as the reds, which helps them survive hard winters.

In the Chilterns, grey squirrels damage many trees, including beech, oak, birch and maples. They cause great damage to the timber industry, and thus considerable cost to the British taxpayer. But the reds have a long history of human persecution too: in the late 1800s they were slaughtered in their thousands because of the damage they caused to trees, nesting birds and gardens. By the early 1900s they had disappeared from most of England.

In 1931 an Anti Grey Squirrel campaign was launched by The Field magazine, encouraged by The Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. But by then, much of Britain had been colonised, and over the next six years the greys' range doubled despite the cull. The Wildlife Trusts have supported culling in some areas, and in 2017 a petition of 100,000 signatures was handed in to their Headquarters calling for an end to the practice. It became apparent that the culling of grey squirrels was not an effective approach to conserving the reds.

There are also many reports in defence of the greys. The naturalist Chris Packham describes them as Britain's most unpopular non-native invader', although he feels that those seeking to eradicate the greys are misguided. Their introduction was undoubtedly a mistake, but many non-native species are now an integral part of our flora and fauna.

The latest initiative is a governmentsponsored scheme involving a hazelnut paste spiked with a contraceptive which makes both sexes infertile. This may reduce local populations, but how will fertile individuals moving in be stopped?

I don't have any answers: I just hope that after so many generations of persecution, we can find a way of living alongside our squirrels of either hue. I'd be very sorry not to share our garden with ours. Alison Beck

We had two full days in Yorkshire, the first in Whitby and the second in York. We enjoyed the quintessentially British seaside fishing town of Whitby with its excellent fish and chips, Captain Cook's ship and Dracula's castle. Buckland Neighbourhood Plan

The Buckland Neighbourhood Plan, part of the planning policy for our Parish, has been revised and updated. A planning inspector held an examination of the proposals earlier this year. His report asked for some amendments to be made, which have been done. The next stage is for a referendum to be held, and this will take place on 3rd November. All electors in Buckland Parish will receive their poll cards very soon. The referendum will be on whether the revised Plan should be adopted as planning policy for our Parish. Buckland Parish Council would be grateful for your support for this revised plan at the referendum.

The revisions made include a new policy setting out a Settlement Boundary for future development within the Parish, as well as revised and updated policies on heritage and on the environment.

The Inspector's report states: 'The output is a Plan which should help guide the area's development over that period (i.e. up to 2033), making a positive contribution to informing decision-making on planning applications by Buckinghamshire Council.'


Nature Reserve & Community Orchard

Password security



The explosion in popularity of online apps and services means we have to remember an increasingly long list of passwords.

Unfortunately, some of us cope with this by using the same password across multiple accounts, or with simple passwords that could easily be guessed. Bad password practice is more prevalent than you might think - more than 23 million users worldwide used 123456 as a password.

Make your accounts more secure by:

1: Creating memorable passwords

A good way to create passwords is by using three random words. You can include numbers and symbols if you need to. For example, "RedPantsTree4!"

2: Saving passwords in your browser

Saving your password in your browser means letting your web browser (such as Chrome, Safari or Edge) remember your password for you. It is safer than using weak passwords or using the same password in more than one place.

3: Email account passwords

If a hacker gets into your email account, they could reset your other passwords and access personal information. Your email password should be strong and different from all your other passwords. This will make it harder to crack or guess.

Thank you to everyone who completed our patient survey. We had 3150 responses which was amazing, and 450 people who have shown an interest in joining our PPG (Patient Participation Group). We are currently working on the PPG membership so please keep an eye out for an email soon. We are using the survey responses to plan for the Enhanced Access that all GP Practices have to offer from October. We are required to offer additional access to our team between 6.30 -8.00pm Monday to Friday and are working hard to be ready with that by launch date - more news to follow.

We have had lots of feedback about difficulty getting through to the practice on the telephone so are working hard on how we can help this. It is very challenging as we are currently 50 hours short on receptionist time at Aston Clinton, and despite a very active recruitment campaign it is proving very difficult to find new team members. This means there are days when the reception team consists of one or two people and we are having to manage that safely by diverting some calls to our other sites, and on occasion with only one member of our reception team, closing the doors for queries other than clinical appointments.

We understand that this isn't ideal but thank everyone for their support and kindness to our team members who are holding the fort and working extra hours to try and cover.

If you or anyone you know would be interested in working within our team, all of our vacancies can be found at www.westongrove. com/practice-information/vacancies/ We'd love to hear from you.

We have also been looking at how we can reduce the number of calls coming into the surgery and are pleased that having worked very closely with AskFirst, cervical smear appointments can now be booked by eligible patients directly through the AskFirst app, so no need to call the practice. We are now working on making other appointments available to be booked via the app.

Flu season is nearly here, and we plan to start our flu clinics on Saturday 8th October. Once our supplier has confirmed our delivery date we will post on Facebook and our website, send text messages, and advertise within the surgery. The appointments will also be available to book via the AskFirst app which we hope will be a convenient and quick way for many patients, but of course you will still be able to make an appointment by telephoning or popping into reception. - 7. Harvest apples.
- 8. Don't worry about yellow lawns, they will bounce back.
- 9. Make your own compost.
- 10. Water house plants less frequently.

Wendover Canal Trust volunteers recently removed no less than 1400 tonnes of old domestic rubbish in five days! The waste had been tipped in the disused canal by the local council between 1919 and 1928.

This was part of a project which will later enable the Wendover Arm to be re-lined and re-watered.

The tip waste consisted mainly of ash and stretched for 270 metres. It was one of the final barriers to rewatering the Wendover Canal, and its removal is a significant milestone. It will also allow the re-opening of the towpath through the area, avoiding the need for walkers, runners and cyclists to divert down the busy Little Tring Road. For the first time in 100 years, there will be a continuous towpath from the Grand Union Canal to Wendover.
