Aston Clinton Parish Council

As our thoughts turn towards the arrival of Spring, and we enjoy the appearance of spring flowers and blossom, the Parish Council has been working with the Chiltern Society on the new Chiltern WildBelt project. Under the guidance of Chairman Colin Read and Clerk Samantha, the team of volunteers including members of AC Scouts & Cubs has planted a new community orchard in AC park, along with a new sapling hedgerow which will increase biodiversity and support a wide variety of wildlife in our park.

As part of the renewal process for the Trim Trail equipment in the park, we are undertaking a consultation survey to find out the kind of equipment our residents would like to see as an update to, or replacement for, the current wooden set of equipment. If you would like to take part in the consultation which finishes at the end of April, please check out the poster on the Parish Council website and follow the link or OR code.

Residents will have noticed the new mobile speed sign (MVAS) in the village as part of our ongoing speedwatch and traffic calming measures, and the Parish Council is looking for volunteers to join our community speedwatch team. Thames Valley Police have recently updated the community speedwatch initiative, and are issuing new equipment to teams, including a speed gun for easier operation when checking a vehicle's speed. Online training is available, please contact us for more information.

The events team is busy putting together the final details for the free community event in Aston Clinton Park on Sunday 7 May 2023, in celebration of the King's Coronation. This great event will run from 12-5pm and include rides, zorbs, bouncy slide, Punch & Judy and magic

shows, along with a cake competition, kiddies fancy dress competition, dog show, animal encounters, poster and allotment competitions. There will also be food concessions as well as food & drink on offer from the Café in the Park, music from the Ellesborough Silver Band, and stalls from some of the clubs & associations in the village. Look out for posters throughout the village and check out full timings for the day on our website and Facebook pages.

A review of our Neighbourhood Plan has been started, by the NP working party, to ensure that this important planning document continues to be current with local planning policy and shapes future development within the village. The process will involve traffic surveys, updating statistics within the current Plan, fact-checking, and reviewing policies amongst other tasks.

Rising Sun wildflower area





We are delighted to announce that our proposal for a wildflower area in the village has been approved by Aston Clinton Parish Council and Buckinghamshire Council.

The strip of land behind the bus shelter on the London Road, near the junction with Stablebridge Road will be named the 'Rising Sun wildflower area'. The area will be left to grow, and will be managed as naturally as possible, encouraging native species. We hope that this area will encourage wildlife, insects and bees and provide a habitat for them to thrive, as well as providing an area of interest for the village. This will be a longerterm project to encourage the wildflowers and discourage the grass over the next few years. A big thank you to everyone who turned out for our litter pick around the village on 11th February. It was great to see some of our regular volunteers along with some new faces. Thanks also to everyone who tooted, waved and gave us the thumbs up in support, it was really appreciated! We collected another large haul of rubbish, so please, everyone, take your litter home with you or place it in a litter bin. If you

Guiding in the 1920s

Aston Clinton Guides on a camp in Kent - 1920s

On 14 December 1929 Miss Adams, the captain of Aston Clinton guides officially opened the new guide hut headquarters in Aston Clinton. The costs of £300 for the land and building were raised by local fundraising over several years by the guides and other well-wishers. Miss Adams was presented with a gold trefoil badge for all her hard work. After 'loud cheering', in response she thanked everyone and emphasised the large amount of help and support from the village that meant the building could be completed.

Fund raising events included a garden fete, held at The Rookery by kind permission of Mrs Ross Todd. Glorious sunshine and the beautiful gardens saw over 500 people attending. Competitions such a baby show where class 1 (children under 1 year) was won by Jack Messenger. Winners in Class 2 for children over 1 year included Josephine Carlisle and the Cresswell twins. The varied programme also included a 'freak dog show' (not my words) with classes for the ugliest dog, shortest tail and dog with the cleverest tricks. Mrs Lowe won the cake competition and other entertainments

included a treasure hunt, wishing well and bowling for a pig. The day was rounded off with a whist drive and dance held at the Anthony Hall, where Mr H Tompkins was the MC for the evening.

Buckland and Aston Clinton CC

Music at Aston Clinton School

Music is all around us in shops, restaurants and in the car and is an important part of our world for both young and old. As Ray Charles once said: "Music is powerful. As people listen to it, they can be affected. They respond."

This was absolutely the case when children from the Aston Clinton School Choir took part in the Young Voices Concert at Wembley Arena in February. It is the 7th year that the school has taken part in this event, and it is always a moving and humbling trip witnessing the power that music has over 6000 children, singing together and having fun. Hearing the wall of incredible music that this number of children produced is something that still gives me goosebumps! Months of rehearsing and preparation led up to our performance and what a performance it was! The children sang pop songs, tunes from Disney, more traditional tunes from across the four countries in the UK as well as our most popular medley based on the poems by Spike Milligan. They even got to accompany Heather Small from M People!

Following the success of the trip, we now have an incredible 70 children in our choir, and it is going from strength to strength. The choir is fortunate to have three wonderful parent volunteers who give up their time to support our children. With new repertoire building,



including songs from Matilda and other popular shows, the children are rising to each challenge presented to them and they are looking forward to performing to their parents in the future.

Not content with just the school choir, Aston Clinton School has ensured that our children have the opportunity to learn three different instruments when they are in KS2. Children in year 3 will learn djembe drums and ukulele and children in year 6 learn to play the trumpet over the course of the year. All our children learn to play a glockenspiel and read musical notation to give them good grounding for their musical education at secondary school. As Beethoven said, 'Music can change the world'. We certainly can't wait to see what the future holds for music at Aston Clinton School.

Historically, women's paid work has often been belittled and forgotten. This exhibition hunts down the hidden women's work in Chilterns villages that formed a crucial part of the local economy during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Discover how the luxury goods made by these highly skilled workers contrast with the harsh reality of working long and poorly paid hours from their homes.

Hear stories of straw plaiting in Buckland; caning and rushing chair seats in West Wycombe; lace making in Great Hampden; and braiding and beading in Holmer Green. Come to learn more about the crafts, women's lives and their impact on the Chilterns.

The six-month long exhibition at Wycombe Museum, which opened on 7 March and runs until 7 September, has been curated by the Woodlanders' Lives and Landscapes project team in partnership with Wycombe Museum & Buckinghamshire New University, and forms the museum's Summer Exhibition.

The Baptist Church

Finished

No dictionary definition has ever been able to satisfactorily define the difference between 'complete' and 'finished'. However, during a recent linguistic conference in London, attended by some of the greatest linguists in the world, the chairman was asked to make that very distinction.

The question put to him by a colleague in the erudite audience was this:

" Some say there is no difference between 'complete' and 'finished'; please explain the difference in a way that is easy to understand".

The chairman's response was thus:

" When you marry the right woman, you are 'complete'. If you marry the wrong woman, you are 'finished'.

And, if the right one catches you with the wrong one, you are 'completely finished'!"

His answer received a five-minute standing ovation.

Jesus' last word from the cross is "Telestia", which we have in the English translation as "It is finished".

One word that changed the world.

And it was the one word he uttered, as John's gospel records, because Jesus knew all was now completed.

Everything that God wanted to complete was completed at the Cross of Calvary.

Sin was punished – sinners set free, Evil was defeated - humanity liberated, Death destroyed - life eternal once again available, Enemies reconciled – both to God and to each other. The whole of creation restored and renewed.

Jesus says "It is finished" because all this had been completed. The healing work of the cross was done, the reconciling power of the cross was released onto a broken world.

All of this we begin to see and celebrate at Easter: new life, new hope, new possibilities. because everything necessary for our salvation from the captivity of Satan, the entrapment of a world gone bad and our own sinful disposition has been dealt with.



Aston Clinton **Community Orchard**

Community WildBelt, a new project set up by the Chiltern Society, made possible the planting of a new orchard in Aston Clinton Park on 17 February.

The trees were planted by volunteers from the Chiltern Society and by the Aston Clinton Cubs and Scouts. The Cubs and Scouts were absolutely brilliant and despite the ground being really hard to dig, they didn't give up. They had a great time and hopefully they will come back for many years to see the trees they planted.

The fruit trees planted were from a specialist fruit tree grower in Oxfordshire. Varieties of apple, pear and plum were selected with a heritage that originates from Buckinghamshire. Orchards are a fantastic habitat for wildlife, providing food and shelter for a number of species including bees, bats, birds and an array of insects. We hope visitors to the park will enjoy the fruits they provide too.

The team at Aston Clinton Parish Council was great in helping with the preparation of the site and organisation on the day; I extend a big thank you to Colin and Sam.

Community WildBelt is a pilot project that is looking to increase biodiversity and Nature Recovery on a local level, working with Parish councils, community groups, farmers and private landowners. 
I mentioned before that in this centenary year of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society, it's an ideal time to raise awareness



This is a series about the people of Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp. Not just about the people who live in these villages but the people who are a part of the daily life of the villages.

Richard Vincent is the recently 'retired' editor of Village Life.



Q. How long were you editor of Village Life?

A. I took over from the original editor, Alec Just, in February 2018.

Q. How did you first get involved with the publication?

A. I had always had an interest in writing and asked if Alec would like an article about the 1915 Brides in the Bath murder case. There was a local connection as one of the victims, Alice Burnham, was from Aston Clinton. Around the same time Alec was looking to stand down and I offered to take over.

Q. How has the magazine evolved during your time as editor?

A. Village Life has always tried to reflect as many aspects of the local area as possible. My focus has been to encourage people to make the most of what is available locally and also to find ways they can contribute to their community.

Q. There are other publications that claim to be 'local' - how is Village Life different?

A. Village Life is run by volunteers who have an interest in what is happening in and around our three villages. Obviously, we need

to fund the printing costs so rely on our splendid advertisers for funding. The other publications are run as commercial organisations so they start from the advertising and then add articles. From what I have seen, these appear to be syndicated articles with almost no local content and may well have counterparts all over the country that look exactly the same, just with different advertisers. Obviously, there is a place for that sort of publication, but we chose a different route.

Q. How long have you lived in Aston Clinton?

We moved here from Epsom in May 1983.

Q. Are you involved in any other activities or groups in the area?

A. Like many retired people, I have some free time and like to do voluntary work with some local organisations. My wife, Pam, and I are members of u3a and have joined some of their activity groups.

Q. What are your hobbies, what do you do to relax?

A. Apart from the above, I do a little walking, jogging and photography and during lockdown we discovered an unexpected liking for Scrabble. When I was younger I played and coached football for many years and still retain an interest. I have always supported Tottenham so that explains my usual worried expression.

Q. What's your favourite music?

A. I grew up as a fan of Tamla Motown but have broadened my range to include many genres of music, including almost anything apart from Country.

Q. What's your favourite film?

A. Until recently I would always have said The Third Man but then I saw 1917 and so I am now a bit undecided.

Q. What was the first car you owned and what do you drive now?

A. The first car I drove was a bright red Triang pedal car I inherited from my brother when I was about four.

Later I drove a black and yellow Ford Consul, which would now be something of a classic. Currently I drive a Skoda Fabia.

Q. What changes to village life (good or bad) have you noticed in recent years?

Like many people, we moved here as it suited the life we wanted for our family, and it would be selfish for us to think no one else should have the same opportunity. There are pressures on local resources but that is probably the same in almost every village and town in the country.

News from Bucks Council

New food waste toolkit for **Bucks** residents



Buckinghamshire Council has introduced a new 'food waste toolkit' to help local households get the best value for money out of their food shopping.

The new toolkit is part of a package of wide-ranging support the council has put in place to help counter the impact of high costs, high inflation and high energy prices that are affecting everyone.

For those facing hardship, targeted help is available through the council's Helping Hand service - measures like the new food waste toolkit are designed to help everyone to make their money go further.

Estimates show the average family of four could save £60 each month by reducing food waste, as well as lowering the negative impact that food waste has on the planet. Buckinghamshire homes produce at least 30,000 tonnes of food waste every year, enough to fill 250,000 wheelie bins, and two thirds of that is edible!

The food waste toolkit gives some simple facts and advice about food waste and how to reduce it in your home, ultimately to help more local people save money and make their food shop go further. The new toolkit is now live on the council's website within the dedicated 'cost of living' section, which gives full information on what help, advice and support is available around the cost of living, and how to access it.

Importantly too, the toolkit includes information on where residents can find their nearest community fridge - a space with fridges and freezers where local people and businesses can donate fresh, good quality

surplus food that would otherwise be wasted; the donated food is then made freely available for local people to collect.

The toolkit also tells people how to set up a community fridge in their area, including how to access food to fill it, for free.

New photo ID requirements for local and national elections

From 4 May 2023, voters in England will need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations in some elections. This will apply to:

- · Local elections
- · Police and Crime Commissioner elections
- UK parliamentary by-elections
- Recall petitions

From October 2023 it will also apply to UK General elections.

The Electoral Commission's website lists the accepted forms of photo ID.

People who do not have an accepted photo ID can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate. Applicants will need to provide their name, address, date of birth, national insurance number and a recent digital photo of themselves.

For people registered to vote by post, no photo ID will be required. This is because postal voting requires other identification checks, such as signature and date of birth verification.

Riding For The Disabled Motto "It's what you can do that counts"

Aston Clinton resident, Phillip Palmer, has qualified to take part in the Special Olympics World Summer Games taking place in Berlin from 17 - 25 June. These Games will see thousands of athletes compete in 26 summer sports. It will bring together people from across the world to celebrate and promote recognition and inclusion of people with intellectual disabilities.



Phillip is aged 38 and has moderate learning difficulties. Through taking part in Regional and National Championships, he has qualified to compete in the Dressage competition at the World Games. For the uninitiated, dressage is the foundation of all riding because it depends on the horse obeying weight shifts as well as leg and rein aids. Equestrian sports have been part of the Special Olympics since 1987 and it is estimated that over 140 athletes will take part in these sports at the games.

Phillip started riding when he was at junior school and now rides once or twice a week at the Riding for the Disabled Centre, Digswell Place, Welwyn Garden City, a purpose-built voluntarily run riding stables for adults and children with most kinds of disability. In the past, Phillip spent a year at Moulton College in Northamptonshire, where he gained a Level 1 Diploma in Horse Management. He has also taken part in English Equitation classes, where the ability and style of the rider and overall horsemanship is judged rather than how well the horse moves.

On a day-to-day basis, Phillip works as a Farm Park Assistant at Willows Activity Farm in London Colney where he enjoys working outside, and particularly tractor driving.

Taking part in the Games will involve riding horses Phillip hasn't ridden before but he isn't daunted by that prospect, as it "makes you ride properly".

Training has already started with a weekend at Sparsholt College where Phillip was introduced to his team mates and learned more about the trip to Germany. He also rode two different horses and a mechanical horse during the weekend.

Milk Pudding and beyond...

Some readers will remember that in the last edition of Village Life I wrote about my late Mum's hand-written cookery book, started in 1931. It has prompted so many memories, and I'd like to share some of them with readers.

My Mum was quite a keen cook, and in the immediate post-war years of my childhood, food was pretty basic, and much of it was grown in the back garden or on the allotment. We had chickens at the top of the garden who ate all the kitchen scraps, and produced eggs, somewhat erratically. The hens subsequently ended up roasted, although my Dad had to get a neighbour to wring their necks, and I was always told they were rabbits so that I didn't get upset. I remember being served things like stuffed lambs' hearts and also stuffed peppers, which at the time was very unusual, and made a change from the stuffed marrow. The absence of spices must have been felt by my Dad, as he was occasionally treated to a Vesta curry, a dreadful dried concoction which bore very little relation to a proper curry, but Mum always complained the house smelled for days afterwards.

Some of the recipes brought back stories I'd been told. I remember my Dad relating the tale of 'Star Gazy Pie' which my Mum had produced in the early days of their marriage. He took one look at the protruding fish heads and dashed out of the room to be sick - a reaction which he never heard the last of. Lots of rabbit recipes too - very common in my childhood before the devastation of myxomatosis. And the things we had every week - shepherd's pie, rissoles, liver and bacon, bacon clanger. No meals without meat then. Mum always struggled with her weight, so there were lots of miracle diets and slimming recipes too, and lots of cakes and biscuits!



My Mum has been dead for over forty years now, so I can't imagine what she'd make of cookery today. About the only 'convenience food' I can recall having was fish fingers - there were no 'ready meals' that I can recall. There were no microwaves, deep fat fryers (we had a chip pan), air fryers, slow cookers or any of the gadgets we take for granted now. She loved her pressure cooker though, and I still use one. Looking back, she devoted far more of her day to producing meals (she worked part time at Hazell, Watson and Viney) than most of us do now, but I'm not sure we ate much better for all that effort - more healthily probably, but a far cry from the varied international cuisine most of us now eat, influenced by our foreign holidays and imaginative TV chefs.

Like her, I also keep a book of favourite recipes. Mine was started in 1968 when I got married, and like hers, you can trace the increasing confidence in what we cooked, see the dietary fads we went through, and in mine a slow progression towards far less consumption of meat and puddings. And the ingredients I use would probably have meant nothing to her - Harissa paste? Halloumi cheese? Sweet chilli jam? Maybe in another ninety years someone will find mine and be amazed at what we ate! Alison Beck

Lindengate Mental Health Charity celebrating its 10th **Anniversary**

Garden Transformations, Programmes and **Events**

In 2013, hoping to operate a pilot scheme that would provide horticultural therapy for local adults with mental-health issues, Lindengate's founders asked for a small plot on an underused allotment adjoining Wyevale Garden Centre near their homes in Wendover, Buckinghamshire. Instead, the garden centre offered them the entire five-acre site. The site was waist-high in thistles and brambles, broken greenhouses and sheds. 10 years on, the weeds have gone, the sheds are repaired and painted and two huge polytunnels have been constructed and we have a yurt (which you can hire). Our secret garden is now a stunning six-acre wildlife garden with a Heritage Orchard, Nature Reserve, Kitchen Gardens and two RHS Chelsea Gold Award Winning Exhibits based next to Dobbie's Garden Centre.

Every year we support over 2000 people through our nature-based wellbeing programmes, sessions and Open Garden visitors. We provide adult wellbeing sessions, programmes for schools, young people, anyone needing support with low to moderate mental health, as well as those living with dementia and memory loss and their carers. Alongside this we now have a dedicated staff team and over 200 volunteers from horticultural experts to people who just want to get their hands dirty and meet new people.



The gardens continue to undergo transformations....

To celebrate our 10th anniversary, volunteers and staff are currently transforming part of the gardens into a brand-new Apothecary Garden. Yew Trees are now in place, with landscaping and planting due to commence shortly.

The Apothecary Garden will contain herbs and flowers grown for their natural healing properties. The new garden will create a new space for visitors and participants to learn, work and relax. Next to the Heritage Orchard, we are creating a swale. Swales are a type of sustainable drainage system which slows run-off, intercepts and filters pollutants as well as helping natural infiltration into soil. We will enhance the swale habitat by planting and sowing wildflowers and other native wetland species. It will also provide shelter and food for invertebrates, birds and mammals. Both gardens should be completed by the end of April.

With Spring in the air at Lindengate, new life is appearing across the site on a daily basis. Our team, volunteers and programme participants have also been busy weeding & planting across the whole site, in preparation for the summer months. Our gardens are open to the public on Wednesdays 1.30 - 3.30pm and Saturdays 12.30 - 2.30pm (but see forthcoming change to summer timetable opposite).

Chalk, Cherries & Chairs is an ambitious five-year scheme which aims to connect local people to the wildlife and cultural heritage of the Central Chilterns. The scheme operates under three themes – wildlife, heritage and people – but the projects which fall under these three themes are all designed with the Chilterns landscape in mind. As part of this project, Lindengate is hosting the play 'Sour Cherry Soup' by Sarah Clifford. This one-person play will be performed in the Heritage Orchard. Venue opens at 5.30pm to allow you to enjoy the gardens, have a picnic or sit back and relax in our heritage orchard. Play lasts for around 45 minutes.

Horticultural Society

Hoping you are all looking forward to the new gardening year? The snow took its toll on many regions, I lost quite a few mature plants, but am hopeful they might recover.

There's lots to do now, with the explosion of new growth, so here are some tips that I do every year, which you may find useful.

I cleaned the greenhouse, and washed the old pots etc, and had a good tidy up, in readiness for sowing and planting etc. You know it makes sense!!

Assuming you have tidied up the flower beds, weeded around and mulched, that's a good start, I always check my pot plants for growth, and pot on if necessary. The weather will warm up, but we still need to keep bedding plants frost free. But you can sow tender annuals and vegetables under glass. Now's a good time to sow sweet peas and other hardy annuals. In April the weather remains unpredictable, and we can have anything from a heatwave to ground frosts and sleet; be prepared. The best protection for tender vegetables and bedding plants if frost strikes is cloches or a horticultural fleece. Cover the tender plants until the frost or cold weather has passed.

Once your potatoes have chitted, plant your early spuds and keep adding and mounding up as the leaves appear. Check the variety as planting is dependent on the variety etc.

As the weather warms up, the pesky sneaky snails and slugs start arriving; this year I am trying a solution of garlic (1 bulb) - steep in water for a day, drain and transfer it to a sprayer, hoping this works, as I am running out of beer!

If you enjoy sowing seeds they can be grown on a windowsill with all round light or in porches etc if you have the room. For some, seed sowing can be timely and frustrating; if you prefer buy bedding plants, keep them covered until the frosts are over. If you buy plug plants, pot them on in the next pot size as soon as you can. Pinch out the tips to encourage growth. Wait until there's no chance of frosts before planting them out, usually at the end of May. Most bedding plants are not hardy.



Pruning

In April, prune Hydrangeas, Buddleia, Lavender, and Cornus; don't go mad though, there are certain plants that are very fussy, and may not flower, if incorrectly pruned.

As the flowers fade on tulips and daffodils, dead head the actual flower, but leave the foliage to die back naturally and do not tie it up, as the foliage aids feeding the bulb for flowering next year.

If you have had baskets of indoor bulbs, these can be planted out after flowering for display in the garden next year, except for tulips which are best treated as annuals. Always plant bulbs 3 x depth of the bulb.

Give your plants a treat, don't forget to feed your shrubs and plants etc.

Plant a Wildflower Patch

I'm going to plant a wildflower patch, and hoping to create a splash of colour, and you don't need lots of room and time. There is a simple way to create a wildflower patch, by using a pre-seeded roll or matting, which is quick, easy, and fool proof. I have seen seed mats in most garden centres and supermarkets.

Leek and Potato soup

Leek and potato soup is a delicious all-year-round favourite and very easy to make. Once you know how to make a basic soup recipe you can adapt it as much as you want. Make it more substantial by adding pasta, rice or pulses or add your favourite herbs and spices, the possibilities are endless!



Ingredients (serves 4):

- 1 leek
- 1 onion any colour

500g potatoes (you can use leftover cooked potatoes)

- Vegetable stock cube
- 1 litre boiling water

25g butter

Salt and pepper

Optional extras: Use whatever vegetables you have in your cupboards such as broccoli or peas, fresh or tinned, all will taste good. You can also add meat, meat substitutes, grains or pasta to soups; chorizo works particularly well. Add some cheese, too or grate some on top, or add extra herbs and spices.

Method:

- 1. Wash and chop the leek, chop the onion.
- 2. Peel potatoes and chop them into small cubes.
- Melt the butter in a large saucepan, add the onion and leek and cook on a gentle heat until soft (approx. 5 mins).
- 4. Add the potatoes and stir.
- 5. Make the stock by dissolving the cube in the boiling water.
- 6. Pour the stock into the pan and simmer until the vegetables are cooked (approx. 20mins).
- 7. You can blend the ingredients to make a smooth soup. Alternatively leave it chunky.
- 8. Taste and season with salt and pepper.

Other WCT news

On Saturday 18 February, the Wendover Canal Trust held an event at the headquarters of the Dunstable & District Boat Club at Cheddington to thank its volunteers for the continuing hard work in restoring the canal. The DDBC has been very supportive of the Trust and has raised over £7000 towards the restoration costs.

Various Trust Officers gave a progress report on the restoration, including Clive Johnson,

Chairman, Mikk Bradley, Site Manager and Peter Elwin, Partnerships Director, who has been very successful in securing £762,500 of funding for the towpath upgrade, starting at Wendover, together with £155,000 towards removal of the Old Tip at Little Tring.

In recent weeks the Canal & River Trust, owner of the canal, has been clearing weed growth, staring at Wendover, to improve water flow.

Further applications for funding are in the process of being submitted, including to the Heritage Lottery Fund. There are concerns that work may have to be suspended after 2024 if further funding is not obtained.

Wendover Community Car celebrates 25 Years of Service

It was 25 years ago that a group of community activists decided that Wendover and its adjoining parishes, including Aston Clinton, needed to have locally based transport to help those members of the community who were less physically able to travel. The plan was for them to use a car adapted for their needs so that they could live as normal a life as possible. That vision from 25 years ago has stood the test of time and the community car is still helping lots of people to get about. The car takes folk to Aylesbury for shopping, to social events and to church events such as Christenings; the list is endless.



Roy Coates, the acting Chair of the management committee, says "I am in awe of the foresight of those who saw the need for a community car and turned it into reality. It is amazing how many dedicated volunteers in Wendover and surrounding areas have made the community car such a success. Many have made their contribution and retired; others are still supporting the bus today. So many people have used the bus over the years and been grateful that it is there. This photo demonstrates how folk continue to use the car today. I just want to say thank you to all the volunteers, present and past, and our supporters, such as the Parish Council and the Lionel Abel-Smith Trust. We couldn't do it without you".

We have a co-ordinator called Joanne who arranges journeys – just call on 01296 317769 – and she will book in the time and date for the journey together with the return.
