Aston Clinton Parish Council

The past couple of months have been very busy for the parish council, and apart from the normal varied workload, our clerk has been busy finalising the end of year figures and preparing the annual accounts for audit.

The events team has also been hard at work, firstly with the official opening of the Red Kite Pavilion at the end of April. After some delays in finalising a long snagging list and the building's final certificate being issued, the RKP was officially opened by His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant for Buckinghamshire, the Countess Howe, and the Chairman of Buckinghamshire Council, Cllr Dev Dhillon, who each unveiled plaques in the foyer.

To mark the King's Coronation weekend, a major free community event was held in the park on Sunday 7th May, (see Pages 8 and 9).

Looking forward, the Gib Lane Solar Fund grant scheme is now open for applications, and the grant amount for 2023-24 is approx. £3,600. Groups in the parish can make an application to Grantscape, the fund managers, for any amount between £250 and the maximum. Please contact the parish council for details on how to apply; the closing date for applications is 20 September 2023, with decisions made by mid-November 2023 approximately.

AC Society

It's been a busy few weeks for the Aston Clinton Society as members and volunteers alike get stuck into various projects now that the better weather (debatable!) has arrived.

As many of you may have seen, our first rewilding project is underway on the piece of land behind the Rising Sun bus-stop on London Road. We have aptly named it the Rising Sun Wildflower Area and have erected a couple of information boards explaining what we're trying to achieve. Our first call to action was to give the area one final, light mow before planting out 150 yellow rattle plug plants which will gradually help to reduce the amount of grass and allow wildflowers to flourish. To help us understand the land we're working with, two members attended a course run by the Berks, Bucks and Oxon Wildlife Trust at College Lake recently, to learn how to conduct a site survey and record the number of plant species growing there. We will be doing these surveys regularly on our site and are looking forward to seeing what species are already present there. The plan is to hand-scythe the site in August/September in preparation for sowing wildflower seeds later in the year. In other news, we were delighted to see so many people joining us at our latest village tidy-up and litter-pick which coincided with the Big Help Out volunteering day as part of the Coronation celebrations. It's almost 12 months since we began regular litter-picks in the village and although we were shocked by the amounts of historical rubbish we collected, there has been a welcome decline and we are now making a noticeable difference to the village and on the roads approaching it. A bit slower has been the response of Bucks





Council to our repeated requests for more litterbins in the village but we are thankful that one of our local councillors is on the case. We have also been lobbying for the removal of the decommissioned/damaged lampposts at the top of Tring Hill. After establishing which council is responsible for this piece of land (Bucks), we are hoping that these can finally be removed as they have been an eyesore for many years.

Thank you to everyone who visited our stall and supported our cause at the Coronation event in Aston Clinton Park. The money we raised will go towards funding our existing projects. Talking of which, we are hoping that by the next edition of Village Life, we will be able to update you on the installation of the village gates on the entry points to the village. Unfortunately, this has been delayed due to a change of contractors at Bucks Council and the ensuing processes which have frustrated our efforts to have the gates in for spring.

What is Community?

The word community is well used in society today. It is taken as a group of people living in the same place or having a particular characteristic in common; however, the actual sense of community and togetherness varies widely from place to place. So, what does it mean to us?



Our vision at Aston Clinton is: 'Aspire, Care and Succeed' and, as such, we ensure that we lay strong foundations for our children to sense what it feels like to be part of a happy, diverse community. A community is home to people of different backgrounds and perspectives. Being willing and open to understanding people from different walks of life is extremely important, as it creates a healthy dialogue and encourages learning about new and exciting ideas or cultures. We have built our curriculum around these principles.

As we evolve from the impact of the pandemic it is crucial that we continue to build on the foundations of a healthy, happy and strong community. Being part of a community creates a sense of belonging which is part of our human nature and helps develop a sense of self. It also gives a boost to our self-esteem and to our willingness to take on the world and make our dreams happen.

During the summer, the Aston Clinton Beer Festival is held on our grounds, as are the Spring and Summer Horticultural Shows. These events bring our wider community together, ensuring that children have a sense of belonging with their local community. Some of our staff also help run the local Cub and Scout groups in the Clock school and it is lovely seeing them in their uniform on Remembrance Day.

We like to introduce the children to other communities that make up the fabric of the United Kingdom and this is part of the national curriculum. This term, our Year 2 children have visited the Mosque in Aylesbury to learn more about why a mosque is so important within the Islamic religion and what the different elements within the Mosque mean and represent. Our Year 3 children are visiting the Sikh temple in Milton Keynes next week. Having an understanding of different religions and faiths has been vital as this year we have welcomed new families whose first language is not English.

This year for the first time, we were able to alleviate those first day jitters and help these children instantly feel part of our family and community with the help of Pocketalk, which was loaned to us. Pocketalk is a Pocket Translator and it revolutionised our ability to instantly create a common language and understanding of each other. The look of excitement and relief on the children's faces when they realise that we can fully understand them has been priceless. This device has brought friendship and smiles to what could have easily been alienation.

School community events this year have included a cake sale to help raise money to support the relief efforts after the earthquake in Turkey & Syria. Our parent association (ACSA) have also held a Christmas Fayre and more recently a Coronation Tea Party.

Knowing that Aston Clinton doesn't have a library, we have also been working with Aston Clinton Pre-school, who have been making use of our new Reading Tree in the school office foyer, and our recently refurbished library by bringing their children over for weekly reading visits.

The quality of a community is often dictated by the degree of engagement and happiness individuals can draw from community interactions. When communities come together, they create real strength and resilience. As Headteacher, I see part of my role as supporting the community to thrive. In a community like this, the possibilities are endless, and the dreams of our children are supported so they can flourish. This is our community. This is our place.

Twentieth century coronations

With the recent celebrations of King Charles's coronation in mind, Helen Sharp, well-known for her knowledge and interest in local history, has been delving into old press articles and has found out more about how previous coronations were celebrated locally.

There were four coronations in the twentieth century, starting with King Edward VII, who was crowned in 1902, a year after the death of his mother, Queen Victoria. Rather like the 2023 coronation, it had been several decades since the previous similar event and Aston Clinton wanted to celebrate in style.

A committee of 18 was formed to raise funds and, largely thanks to a £30 donation from Lady Rothschild, a total of £95 19s 6d was raised. As well as her financial donation, she also made the Anthony Hall and Model Farm available for festivities. An afternoon tea was arranged for all local residents under the age of 15 and everyone else was invited to a meat tea. Parcels were distributed to the "aged and infirm".

Several entertainments were organised including a cricket match, a concert and sports competitions, plus a hat-trimming competition, a bicycle carnival and a potato-peeling competition. There was no potato-peeling competition for the 2023 coronation for some reason.

The next coronation was in 1911, following Edward's death in 1910. He reigned until January, 1936, when his oldest son, Edward VIII succeeded him. His coronation date was set for May 1937 but he abdicated in December, 1936, after just 11 months, and the crown passed to his brother, George VI. This meant that for the second time in our history, England had three kings in one calendar year. The previous time was in 1066, with Edward

the Confessor, Harold and then William the Conqueror. As the arrangements were in place, the coronation went ahead in May 1937; it was just the King who had changed.

On that occasion, local residents had a full day of activities, starting with a procession, with prizes for the best decorated motor or horse vehicle, cycle or perambulator and fancydress for pedestrians. During the afternoon there was a programme of sports events for children and adults. Tea was served to local residents at the Anthony Hall and the children were presented with commemorative mugs. The evening concluded with a whist drive and dance, also at the Anthony Hall.

The 1953 coronation of the present King's mother, Elizabeth II, was the first time many British people had seen a television broadcast. Friends and neighbours were invited to the TV owners' homes to sit around screens not much bigger than a modern tablet. We don't know about what local events took place, but we do know that local housewives got together to collect 3d (about 1.5p) per week from each village family to help finance the celebrations. We read that "it was thought that mothers who took their children for walks would be ideal collectors." We must hope that their efforts were rewarded.

Celebrating Dancersend **Nature Reserve**

We are in the final stages of a programme of Rothschild Foundation funded enhancements at BBOWT's Dancersend Nature Reserve. You should notice some changes over the next few months.

Last year we carried out a lot of re-fencing, bought new kit for managing the grassland and scrub areas, wrote up the history of the reserve (see www.bbowt.org.uk/dancersend-nature-reservehistory), held special events to mark the 80th birthday of the reserve being established in memory of Charles Rothschild and ran extra fun events for children in the school holidays.

We also carried out extra wildlife surveying - for invertebrates on the restored chalk grassland of the Extension and for fungi, with a series of special visits by the Bucks Fungus Group - revealing a number of new species, including one small cup fungus Humaria solisequia that is new to the UK!

We are currently refreshing the Tree Trail, working on a new Audio Trail and designing new welcome and interpretation boards, all of which should make a visit more enjoyable and informative. There will be new trail signage using recycled plastic posts and some path improvements.

Some of the work will not be so apparent to visitors, like the improvements to our volunteers' base in The Forge at the Water Works and habitat improvements carried out with neighbouring landowners which will benefit wildlife generally in the valley.





The final phase of the project includes completing a new pond and planting up an area of around 600 mixed trees and shrubs on the reserve extension below Aston Hill. The pond has filled nicely with all the recent rain, and we have started to landscape and seed the banks with butterfly food plants and other wildflowers. All the work will be completed for a celebration event in September.

Visiting Dancersend by car is not so easy as I write this, due to major pipe laying operations by Thames Water closing our car park at the Water Works, but we expect that work to be completed in mid-June, when the appearance of many of our special wildflowers and butterflies will make it a wonderful time for a leisurely walk.

There is a programme of guided walks through the summer at BBOWT nature reserves in the area, including Dancersend, Aston Clinton Ragpits and Bacombe Hill. For more details and to book a place go to www.bbowt.org.uk/events. Mick Jones

Defibrillators and CPR

Sadly, many of us will, at some time in our lives, witness a cardiac arrest. The British Heart Foundation (BHF) wants to encourage all of us to be prepared if we are ever faced with that situation.

A cardiac arrest is an emergency that usually happens without warning. If someone is in cardiac arrest, they collapse suddenly and:

 will be unresponsive, unconscious and may or may not be breathing normally

If you see someone having a cardiac arrest, phone 999 immediately and start CPR.

BHF has excellent advice and there is a free course where you can learn in just 15 minutes on your mobile phone or tablet how to do CPR and use a defibrillator with their RevivRTM CPR Training. Don't delay in learning this life saving skill, you never know when you'll need it.

Many shops and other public places have defibrillators and more are being added to the list. Locally you can find defibrillators outside Aston Clinton school, outside the Aston Clinton council office in the park and outside the Buckland parish council office.

80@80 and St Michael's **Open House Project**



As you may have read in the last edition of Village Life, I'm celebrating my 80th birthday and the fact that I'm still reasonably fit, by walking 80 sponsored miles to raise funds for St Michael's Open House Project.

The aim is to provide an accessible toilet with access from inside the church and a proper kitchen so that we can really say the church is open to all, and so that we can hold a desperately needed Dementia Café.

Phase one of the Open House Project is to remove two blocks of pews at the back of the church and level the floors in those areas and also in other parts of the church where they constitute a trip hazard. This will provide a flexible, more open space to allow us to expand the Rhubarb Café and Repair Café, and for other community activities such as Bucks Art Week and the Christmas Fair. The Turpin Charity has undertaken to fund this part of the project and we hope to commence the removal of the pews very soon. Gib Lane Charity has given us a grant towards the extra tables and chairs that we will need.

However, the outside fabric of the church is in need of considerable repair, and we have to

undertake these renovations before we can fully proceed with the Open House Project. The east wall needs replastering, there is a buttress that must be rebuilt, the south aisle roof must be replaced and some of the stonework needs urgent attention. All in all, we're looking at a cost of over £500,000. We have engaged a professional fundraiser who will advise us on larger grant-making bodies, but those bodies need to be able to see that we're 'doing our bit' and have raised a large proportion of the total ourselves before giving us any money.

So far, we've raised over £60,000 but every penny counts and, at the time of going to press, my little 80@80 contribution has raised £1,800.

Diane Kolonko is the Chair of the Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp Horticultural Society.



Q. How long have you been a member of the Horticultural Society?

A. I've been a member of the Horticultural Society for about 10 - 12 years. I've enjoyed my garden and visiting other gardens for some time and it's been a great way to meet other people with similar interests.

Q. What does the role of the Chair involve?

All Saints' 750th **Anniversary 15th - 18th** June 2023



In June 2023 we will celebrate the 750th Anniversary of our beautiful village church, All Saints, Buckland. Celebrations will take place from Thursday 15th June to Sunday 18th June. The church, which is mentioned in the Domesday Book, will be open daily from 10am to 4pm from Thursday to Saturday and will include an exhibition of Buckland Historic Memorabilia, an historical display by Aston Clinton schoolchildren, a Flower Festival, a 'Book of Presence' and refreshments. There will then be a 7pm Saturday evening reception with live piano-playing and a cash bar. The celebrations will culminate in a Benefice Sung Eucharist service led by Bishop Alan at 11am on Sunday 18th June, followed by music and refreshments in the churchyard. Everyone is welcome to all the events over the four days. Since 1273, All Saints has had 55 rectors and

seen 33 monarchs - including our new King Charles III. Some 3,000 people have been buried in our lovely churchyard since 1273, and we feel we owe it to the generations who have gone before to keep the church in good order for the next 750 years.

Our fund-raising drive to pay for two essential repairs to the fabric of the church was launched in April and is progressing well. The two projects are the replacement of the louvres on the South side of the tower and the repair and refurbishment of the clock, which has stopped working, and its face. The total cost of these has risen by £1,000 since March, due to the need to replace the oak support behind the clock face and is now £6,870. Would you please participate in these two essential projects and keep watch on the march of time, beyond 750 years?

Buckland Parish Council update

On Monday 8th May, Buckland Parish Council (BPC) hosted a Coronation celebration in the village hall. Villagers and friends were greeted with bubbles and lots of freshly homemade cakes. There were around 60 people in attendance, both new and old to the parish. It was great to see so many join in the celebration and a formal toast to the new King.



Buckland residents cannot have failed to notice the road disruption recently in the village. This has been due to a number of factors: Gigaclear has been laying new superfast fibre optic broad band, Thames Water has been laying new water pipes, and builders from Puttenham have been given access to the village via the bridleway at the end of the village. BPC is continually monitoring road work plans via the OneNetwork site. Unfortunately, the Parish Council is given no notice of the planned works and has no control over Bucks Council issuing licences to companies to close the road. We repeatedly contact our Bucks Councillors and BC officers to remind them that Buckland

village road cannot be closed because there is no possible legal diversion. New Road, Buckland, is not an adopted road.

Residents may have heard rumours of a Thames Water pumping station development being built in Buckland Road next to Hope Cottages. BPC has met with Thames Water to discuss these plans, which are very much in the early stages. The Parish Council has asked Thames Water to hold a public meeting as soon as more details are available.

Finally, several residents at Buckland Wharf have had cars damaged on a regular basis due to drivers speeding down Tring Hill. BPC arranged for Truvelo strips to be placed on the road to monitor the traffic flow and speeds. The data has just been received and is currently being analysed. More on this next time.

Here are some gardening tips for June and July.

June

- Summer has arrived so now is the time to position your hanging baskets and containers; don't forget to water and feed them.
- Plant out your summer bedding now that the frosts have disappeared.
- Sow poppies straight into the ground.
- Harvest lettuce, radish and other salads and early potatoes.
- Support tall growing perennials such as hollyhocks and delphiniums.
- Leave your lawn a little longer in length during dry spells.
- Keep weeding...

July

- Deadhead bedding plants and repeatflowering perennials.
- Cut lavender for drying.
- Give dahlias a liquid feed.
- Feed sweet peas regularly, pick the flowers every few days, and remove seed pods to prolong flowering.
- Take softwood cuttings.
- Resist the temptation to water established lawns, even in dry spells – grass should cope well with drought and although it may die back, it will soon recover once rain returns.
- Keep weeding...

Estone Grange Pond

At Estone Grange we have a large attenuation pond (SUDs Sustainable Urban Drainage Scheme) created to slow the flow from the run-off from the estate. There is considerably more runoff than before the houses were built. SUDs are created on most newbuild estates.



The pond serves not only as a safe and efficient means for surface water to enter the local watercourse but also as a habitat for wildlife. The thick reeds and other plants have made a haven for birds, insects, frogs and more. It has become a special place where birdsong fills the air at dusk and dawn and dragonflies, damselflies and butterflies flit about in the sun.

The pond has performed well but there had been a considerable amount of silt and debris, much of it from the construction phase, that had accumulated at the point of entry. A Sunday morning volunteer working party led by the Chiltern Society removed vegetation and mud from the area to allow the water to flow. This has also opened up some water for ducks, heron and other species. Further areas will be cleared later, though the major part of the pond will be left as habitat. It will be interesting to see new wild visitors on the pond, which retains water all year round even in the driest of times.

We are blessed that we have such a large pond that provides plenty of interest. Once the water has cleared and the muddy mess

from the working party has dried and greened up, the pond should continue to give pleasure to visitors and residents, human and wild. We are enormously grateful to the Chiltern Society's Community Wildbelt Project Manager, Amanda Barnicote and her team for undertaking the very hard and muddy job and working around the many frogs present.

The open spaces on the estate are managed by Estone Grange Management Company Limited, a not-for-profit company. This is a considerable responsibility but the directors are getting to grips with it and a new local managing agent, Neil Douglas Management Limited has been appointed. Not all new estates include public rights of way but there are definitive routes through Estone Grange that connect Aston Clinton to Buckland, Putnam and beyond. Katy Todd
