Then Adam asked, 'What can I get for a rib?' The rest is history. Revd Nick Harris



Aston Clinton to the Outback

I'm Ollie Brown; I went to Aston Clinton School along with my three younger brothers and then the John Colet school. After A-levels, I followed my passion for SCUBA diving and in 2008 went to Perth, Western Australia. I spent fifteen years working in the diving and marine industry as a diving instructor and underwater photographer on live-aboard boats on the Great Barrier Reef. Then in 2019, I felt like a change and joined the Queensland Police Service.

After tough training and a year's probation, I was posted to Coen, a remote Aboriginal community, far from my home in Cairns. Coen, which is 2300km (1400 miles) from the state capital, Brisbane, sits in the centre of Far North Queensland's Cape York peninsula, the tip of which is the Australian mainland's most northerly point. It has 300-350 residents, but its policing division is roughly the size of Wales and is made up of tropical savannah, rainforest and cattle grazing country. The rivers and waterways are infested with large saltwater crocodiles and the bushland is home to the world's most venomous species of snake. It's only accessible using a fourwheel drive vehicle in the tropical dry season, travelling on dirt roads, or via light aircraft during the monsoon season when the roads are completely flooded for weeks. The distances involved when attending some calls for service are staggering by UK standards; my record is a 550 km (340 mile) round trip to attend a traffic crash.

Coen is usually a two or three-officer station, the surrounding country being part of the Ayapathu, Kaanju and Lama Lama peoples' traditional land. Usually, these clans get along but, during unrest between families, it's easy to forget that you're in Australia.







It's not uncommon for the locals to use bows and arrows, spears and machetes against each other and the police. We are always armed but I've only drawn my firearm twice in three years and some officers never have.

Coen has a courthouse of sorts: basically, a community hall much like the Anthony Hall in Aston Clinton. One of our responsibilities is to prepare the court for the magistrate and prosecutor, then drive out to the airstrip to pick them up. We're happy to do this as they fly in from Cairns (the nearest city) and one of them has already taken our orders for whatever food and goodies we can't buy locally!

There is one pub in Coen called the Exchange Hotel, the word 'Hotel' is very loosely used in this case. It has no air conditioning, a concrete floor, benches covered in red dust and an old, worn wooden bar. The walls are covered with decades-old pictures of sports teams and local heroes. It is the haunt of travellers,

station hands and bull catchers who make the pilgrimage into town for a cold beer.

The Police accommodation in Coen is a house raised on stilts called a 'Queenslander', the stilts provide a buffer from flood waters during the wet season and from snakes and rodents. We're lucky enough to have a mango tree on the station grounds that produces the tastiest mangos I've ever eaten, great for smoothies. There are also banana, mandarin, and lime trees.

When I return home to Aston Clinton, usually a couple of times a year, it's always quite a culture shock. Flying into busy Heathrow after months in the outback, it takes a few minutes to readjust. Sitting at the bar in The Oak enjoying a real beer is a far cry from the Exchange Hotel but is oddly similar with its community feel and regular patrons.

A Diverse Community

At Aston Clinton School we are incredibly proud of our diverse community and are committed to promoting the welfare and equality of all our staff, pupils and other members of the school community. The school sees all members of the school community as having equal value, regardless of any protected characteristic. The school's policies, procedures and activities do not discriminate but must nevertheless take account of differences in life experience, outlook and background, and in the kinds of barriers and disadvantages which people may face in relation to any protected characteristic. This was recognised in our Ofsted inspection last year when it was noted that:

"Pupils go beyond being tolerant of differences and instead they understand and celebrate these differences".

Our intention is that when children leave Aston Clinton, they will do so with the knowledge, understanding and emotions to be able to play an active, positive and successful role in today's diverse society. We want our children to have high aspirations, a belief in themselves and realise that anything is possible if they put their mind to it. In an everchanging world, it is important that they are aware, to an appropriate level, of different factors which will affect their world and that they learn how to deal with these so that they



have good mental health and well-being. This is why we refer to Personal, Social, Health Education (PSHE) as 'Healthy Body, Healthy Mind'.

Our PSHE curriculum develops learning, and results in the acquisition of knowledge and skills which will enable children to access the wider curriculum and prepare them to be global citizens now and in their future roles within the international community. It promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils, preparing them for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life. Our Relationships and Sex Education theme enables our children to learn how to be safe, and understand and develop healthy relationships, both now and in their future lives.

We are constantly reviewing and adapting our practices to take account of our changing world. The Equaliteach programme takes a

whole school approach to diversity, and the changes we have implemented have resulted in a significant decrease in the number of reported prejudice-related incidents.

Another initiative we are about to introduce is the 'No Outsiders' programme which promotes an ethos of inclusion and tolerance and aims to prepare children for life in modern Britain. This will help us to further develop our curriculum response to the Equality Act 2010 and encourage our children to explore identities, focus on diversity and embrace difference.

As a school we also take part in various national awareness programmes. For example, October was Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) Awareness month which provided an opportunity for our children and families to learn more about the condition and the way it impacts many members of our school community. Another programme is 'Show Racism the Red Card' which utilises the social power of football and the high-profile status of football players to help tackle racism and other forms of discrimination in society. It aims to raise awareness on diversity, foster social cohesion, and reduce physical and verbal violence linked to racism. We have seen very positive responses from the children when we have held these workshops in previous years and are looking forward to welcoming the organisation again later this month.

I hope that this gives you a sense of our school's ethos and values of 'Aspire, Care, Succeed' and that, like me, you believe that our children should be supported to challenge prejudice of all types.

Enjoy your local nature reserves

At the end of September, there was a gathering of environmental charities, local landowners and agents and representatives of Buckinghamshire Council at Dancersend, BBOWT's largest reserve in Buckinghamshire, to mark the end of a two-year project of improvements funded by the Rothschild Foundation.

Estelle Bailey, BBOWT Chief Executive, outlined the work achieved at Dancersend, including projects with neighbouring landowners, and new interpretation signs. She explained the Trust's plans for similar initiatives elsewhere in the three counties and the imminent launch of a major Nature Recovery Fund to tackle the wildlife and climate crisis.

Do visit this flagship nature reserve, which stretches across the southern part of the three parishes. Enjoy the updated Tree Trail and brand-new Audio Trail which will go live in November. Parking is at the ornate Rothschild pumping station at the Water Works on Bottom Road, which leads up through the reserve towards St. Leonards and Buckland Common. Better still, explore the footpaths that lead up into the reserve from the three villages.

Nearby, other BBOWT nature reserves like College Lake, Aston Clinton Ragpits, Bacombe Hill and Weston Turville Reservoir between them offer a complete wildlife experience on your doorstep.

A message from **Rob Butler MP**



With the nights drawing in and Christmas fast approaching, it's again time to reflect on the year gone by and look forward to 2024.

I have been proud to continue to represent Aston Clinton in Parliament, and to be in the village for some of the year's highlights, especially the coronation of His Majesty King Charles III.

It's also been good to visit local businesses and enjoy a wonderful evening at the Red Kite pavilion. I have also been out and about talking to residents about the issues that matter most to you. This is a valuable and vital part of my role as your representative in the House of Commons.

Less happily, throughout the past twelve months, traffic congestion has caused massive disruption to everyone trying to go to work or school or shop in our local area. Much of this has been caused by HS2, and I have been working hard to secure some of the savings from the scrapped Phase 2 of the railway for projects that will benefit Bucks residents. I have also been pushing utility companies to ensure that works are carefully managed to bring the minimum of delays.

In Westminster, there have again been many lively debates, and I was honoured to be asked to participate in the detailed scrutiny of the Victims' Bill, which is designed to ensure victims of crime are properly heard and treated with respect. As well as speaking in debates and talking to ministers, I remain a member of the Armed Forces Parliamentary Scheme, visiting members of our armed forces here in Britain and overseas. Many of them will be on duty throughout Christmas, and I know we are all profoundly grateful for their service at this time of year.

One of the highlights of my own festive season is always St Michael's Christmas fair. It brings seasonal cheer with imaginative stalls and wonderful cakes on offer. I very much look forward to seeing as many readers of Village Life there as possible in December.

All that is left for me to do is wish you and your families a Merry Christmas, and a Happy New Year.

As the clocks go back and we move towards winter, visitors to Aston Clinton Park with cars are reminded that the barrier will be closed at 9pm and will remain closed until 7am in the morning. At present, there are no arrangements in place for out-of-hours release, so please keep an eye on the time if you visit the park late in the evening, as our park-keeper closes the barrier promptly.

Heading towards Christmas, we have exciting news from the North Pole that Santa will be visiting Aston Clinton over two days again this year, so that he can meet as many residents as possible! Santa will be cruising through the village on his float, spreading Christmas cheer (and sweets) to residents young and old on Saturday 16th and Sunday 17th December 2023, starting at 4pm on both days. Full details of the route will be published on our website and Facebook page, and the village noticeboards.

For 2024, plans are underway for our first annual free Family Festival event in the park on Saturday 8th June 2024 - save the date! More information can be found on our website as activities are confirmed.

The AC Community Speedwatch team has been out and about in the village recently with the new 'speed gun' and we have successfully zapped a number of speeding drivers, whose details have been passed to Thames Valley Police. Aston Clinton Society

Eagle-eyed readers may have seen some of the Society's volunteers hard at work

recently on the Rising Sun Wildflower area on London Road as we prepared the site for next year. We started the project in the spring by giving the area an early mow and planted some yellow rattle plug plants in an attempt to tackle the vigorous grasses that dominated the site. We also planted other wildflower species donated by BBOWT. During the summer, we undertook regular surveys to see if the plants had established themselves but unfortunately the grasses, particularly wall barley, and other invasive species such as dock, thistle and ragwort had won the battle.



After consultation with BBOWT, we decided that the best way forward was to hand-scythe the grasses and remove the invasive plants and our tireless volunteers, Clive and Stuart, clocked up forty hours of back-breaking work doing this. Once that was complete, a farmer friend of the Society gave the site a light plough in September which was followed by the sowing of native wildflower seeds. Even the weather gods played their part as we had a timely heavy downpour just after we sowed. So, the site is now prepped for next spring,

and we are delighted that we can already see some early growth. A list of the seeds sown is in the bus shelter to help people identify the wildflowers while waiting for a bus or just walking by.

More planting is underway with our next project - spring bulbs. Funds from our recent annual quiz night have helped us to purchase daffodil and crocus bulbs which will be planted out at the end of October. Bucks Council has kindly given its permission for us to plant these on the grass verge on London Road between Dennis Close and Spring Brook.

A new and much longer term project for the Society concerns the state of the roads and pavements through Aston Clinton, which most residents will agree are in a bad state of disrepair. One of our volunteers carried out a detailed survey and we have shared this with Aston Clinton and Buckland Parish Councils, although responsibility for highways maintenance sits with Bucks Council. We're not expecting any immediate fixes as some of the problems require a major re-think on traffic management in the village. However, we feel such matters need to be on Bucks Council's radar, so we have invited its highways team to visit the village to meet us. Some of the smaller issues are in the process of being uploaded to FixMyStreet so we hope these will be addressed in due course.

Those of you who frequent the public footpath along RAF Halton airfield will be aware of the recent work felling the large trees lining the adjacent farmland. This has dramatically changed the landscape, but we understand the work was necessary as the trees had grown too tall for the flight path and runway. The good news is that we've been told the wood-chippings from the logging will be used on the footpath to prevent it from becoming a quagmire and virtually impassable during the winter months. Buckland & Aston Clinton Cricket Club. A nail-biting finish to the season.

In a season with more rain than any in recent history, there was still lots of cricket played and ultimately a nervous wait for other results before we could celebrate a double reprieve from relegation.

Our Senior 1st XI had been promoted twice in a row and were competing in Division 1 of the Four Counties Cricket League for the first time since 2015. Initially we struggled, because of wet weather cancellations and the unavailability of some of our strongest players. But we were generally competitive for the remainder of the year. Typically, our final match was abandoned due to heavy rain and we had to keep our fingers crossed that other results would go our way. Fortunately, they did, and we finished eighth out ten, safe from a quick return to Division 2.

Throughout the season run-scoring was our biggest concern, but the efforts of Talib Hussain (408 runs at an average of 34), Shah Bukhari (330 at 27.5) and Mohammed Shah (304 at 38) were enough to keep our heads above water. The bowling was less of a concern; our wily veteran skipper Mike Parsonage led the way (16 wickets), with Adnan Zaib and Asrar Muhammad (both 13 wickets) running him close.

While the 1st team had been eighth for most of the season and had flirted with relegation, the 2nd XI had been rock bottom for most of the campaign but pulled off a great escape on the final day. Going into the final weekend we needed to win, and in the end, we edged over the line with just a single wicket remaining last man Marcus Painton hitting the winning run. Over the course of 2023, the 2nds also struggled with the bat and were heavily reliant



on Casey Dawson (220 runs at an average of 24) and 16-year-old Lakindu Gunaratne (173 at 17). Jasper Wright (13 wickets) topped the bowling, just ahead of James Wood (11 wickets in just 4 matches) and captain Kris Greig (also 11). There were also significant contributions from 17-year-olds, Owen Ford (9 victims as he earned the right to open the bowling) and Kyan Dawson (top scoring in that vital last match).

The Midweek Senior side coasted through the group stages of the Village T20 competition, topping our group to earn top seeding in the knockout rounds. We emphatically dispatched Leighton Buzzard Town in the Quarter Final to reach Finals Day for the first time. In the Semi-Final we beat Eaton Bray in a tense finish, before facing hosts Tring Park in the Final. We had beaten them twice in the earlier group stage, but ultimately they proved too strong for us. We were missing our top run-scorers in the destructive Mark Ludlow (245 at an average of 35) and Cypriot International Jimi Chialoufas (156 at 31) and couldn't get close to the Tring total in their absence. Casey Dawson had been wicket-keeping in Saturday games but finished top wicket-taker in the entire competition with sixteen victims at a cost of just eight apiece.

Although the Colts season finished six weeks before the Seniors, it was another enjoyable year, with the introduction of All Stars (5to 8-year-olds) for the first time under the

guidance of Mark Simpson, and over sixty youngsters were regularly training or playing with our Under-11, Under-13 and Under-15 squads. End of season awards were made to Freddie and Dylan in the youngest age group, Ollie and Oscar in the Under-13s and Rohan and Tom in the older group.

As always there remains lots to do over the close season, but planning has already begun for 2024 and we hope that it will provide as many highlights as 2023. *Phil Samuels*

Pat Rozental was, until very recently, a church warden of St Michael's and she is well-known as a local artist. She and her husband Steve have just moved to Sussex to be closer to family.

Q. When and why did you and Steve first move to Aston Clinton?

A. We moved to Aston Clinton in 2004 from Belgium where we'd been living for the previous five years. Steve was working for Duracell Batteries and was relocated to the Hemel Hempstead Office but, after a few years, he decided to retrain as an electrician and I think he was quite well known in Aston Clinton through Circuit Fix, his electrical business.

Q. Can you tell us a little about your involvement with St Michael's Church?

A. We started attending St. Michael's soon after moving to Aston Clinton, when Alan Bennett was still Rector. Then. during Elizabeth Moxley's time as Rector, I joined the PCC, and was on the founding committee of the Rhubarh Café.

Revd. Sally's arrival brought a real breath of fresh air to the benefice and a good friend to me, and in 2019, I agreed to become a church warden. I was just beginning to find my feet when Covid struck; it was a very strange and stressful time.

Church wardens are responsible for the maintenance of the fabric of the church building, among other things, and St. Michael's faces many

challenges. I am sad to be leaving at this time of uncertainty, but hopefully enough funds can be raised so that the much-needed repairs to the roof, east wall, tower and southeast buttress can be carried out very soon.

Q. Many of us know you as an accomplished artist. What is your favourite style of painting and what professional association do you belong to?

A. My favourite painting medium is watercolour; I've tried others, but I'm always drawn back to it.

I'm predominantly a figurative, still life artist - I paint common, everyday objects, old tools, oil cans etc. and I've recently found a love of depicting vintage silver cutlery... and bees!

I also enjoy printing and have enjoyed making landscape works based on much loved walks around Aston Clinton.

I have been a member of Bucks Art Society for many years and have frequently exhibited locally with them. I have been shortlisted in the Sunday Times Watercolour Competition, won Wildlife Artist of the year in original print and I regularly show with the Royal Institute (RI) of Painters in Watercolour, the Society of Graphic Fine Art and the Society of Women Artists. It is my absolute dream to become an RI one day.

Q. Through your involvement in art, you have become a key member of the local group that exhibits each year as part of Bucks Art Weeks. How did that start and what does it entail?

A. I had exhibited in Bucks Art Weeks a couple of times and I realised that there were several artists living in Aston Clinton who had a connection to St. Michael's. Luckily, they were all keen to take part, so I volunteered to organise an event at the church. Everyone joined the Bucks Visual Group and Art at St. Michael & All Angels Church was put on the map. Our first exhibition was staged just as we were

all emerging from lockdown and we couldn't believe how many visitors came. Attendance has increased every year since, and the week is now a firm fixture on the church calendar.

Q. Were you involved in any other activities or groups in Aston Clinton?

A. We were members of Aston Wine Club for many years; both of us served on the committee and both of us were chairman.

Q. What's your favourite music?

A. I have adored Bruce Springsteen since I was sixteen and have lost count of how many times I've seen him live, but I have quite eclectic tastes - Bowie to Beethoven, Eagles to Elgar, Lloyd Webber to Puccini and I love Gregorian Chant... depends what mood I'm in really.

Community WildBelt **Project Update**



Community WildBelt, a project set up by the Chiltern Society in June 2022, has made great progress in engaging with communities in the local area. The project is looking to increase biodiversity and Nature Recovery on a local level working with Parish councils, community groups, farmers and private landowners. Creating the right habitat for nature, even on a small scale, can make a big difference. All those little places for wildlife to hang out in, do add up. We want to connect people with nature and help them take ownership of where they live. I'm a great believer in the power of nature and how it can improve people's wellbeing.





We have recently been active in Aston Clinton, helping to improve a pond in the Estone Grange Estate and were delighted to have residents of all ages come out and get muddy with us. Getting people involved and enthused about the nature around them is key to the project.

Ponds are a fantastic habitat for wildlife, supporting a number of species. One of the reasons for this is that they have been commonly and continuously around for millions of years, during which many plants and animals have become well-adapted to the conditions they provide. Fortunately, ponds, although now mostly man-made, are still common. This is just as well, because many freshwater species depend on ponds for survival.

Ponds can provide different habitats, including dense reeds, diverse plant communities and muddy banks. Our aim is to create a varied habitat for different species. Build it and they will come!

If you have a project you would like to pursue or know of a patch of land that you think could be improved for nature, no matter how small (or big!) then we would like to hear from you.



A visit to Halton House

On Saturday 1 July, members of a local history group enjoyed a fascinating tour of Halton House.



We were met by Trixie Brabner, the Archivist and Tour Co-ordinator. Most of us knew that the house was originally built by Alfred de Rothschild in the early 1880s, but personally, I had no idea about the lavish lifestyle there which preceded the Great War, and the great number of famous people who had been guests - the Visitors' Book is a veritable 'Who's Who' of the times.

The House has been owned by the Ministry of Defence since 1919, when the House and estate changed hands for £112,000. Thus in 1919, Halton became RAF Halton and the House became the Officers' Mess.

The tour took us through the ground floor, from the salon with its electric chandelier, the dining room, which is now a mess bar, the cleverly symmetrical billiard room with an amazingly intricate ceiling, to the elegant and imposing grand staircase. Alfred was clearly very keen on symmetry, and the north and south drawing rooms mirror each other, one being used for the gentlemen and one for the ladies. We also visited the smoking room, which featured in the film 'The King's Speech'; its gilded ceiling is reputed to have





cost £25,000 in the 1880s. The tour finished with Alfred's room (his private office), the ante room, and the boudoir, reputed to contain a fireplace from le Petit Trianon in Versailles.

The rooms contain a range of paintings (including a Reynolds and a Gainsborough) and some excellent framed photographs: it was particularly interesting to see those of the gardens as they were at their height in Victorian times. I can recall my father telling me that once the estate contained a tree of every species growing the British Isles, and no doubt many survive.

It was a most enjoyable and enlightening visit, and most years there are open days when you can tour the House and the Trenchard Museum – all free and on our doorstep!

All ten of Buckinghamshire's Household Recycling Centres (HRCs) have now switched over to the usual winter opening hours of 9am to 4pm.

The days each centre is open will remain unchanged but the change in hours reflects the fact that after the clocks go back and over the winter months, the number of visitors to the sites decreases rapidly once it starts to get darker earlier.

To find out which days your local HRC is open and also further details of what can and cannot be taken to a centre, visit: buckinghamshire.gov.uk/waste-and-recycling/

Did you know you can also view live webcam footage via the council website, to check if the site is busy and avoid having to wait in a queue? If you are unsure about the best time to visit, take a look at the cameras and plan your trip accordingly.

Don't forget, any items such as furniture, garden equipment, bicycles and household equipment in good condition that you are looking to get rid of, can be taken to any HRC where they are collected for re-use. Items donated are sold on by the South Bucks Hospice which runs the re-use shops in High Wycombe and Aston Clinton HRCs.

Items for resale can be taken to any of the 10 sites and will be transported to the re-use shops.

Buckland Parish Council has received notification from Thames Water of its intention to build a pumping station within Buckland Parish. Proposals received by the council show a location beside Hope Cottages in Buckland Road near the former Rothschild Arms pub. Buckland Parish Council is working with residents and proposes to invite Thames Water to a public meeting to explain its plans. A planning application is expected in the New Year. We have received a number of complaints from residents regarding the removal of the dog waste bin at Buckland Wharf. This bin was not owned by the Parish Council, it belonged to the Canals and Rivers Trust which has removed all dog waste bins owing to the cost of maintenance. Buckland Parish Council is in the

process of ordering a replacement bin which will be its responsibility.

Residents will remember that in 2022, the Parish Council shared plans for a Community Orchard in Lower Buckland. The Parish Council planted some trees and wildflower seeds but had to wait for the heatwave to pass. Photos were shared of the beautiful wildflower meadow earlier this year. This year we have installed an irrigation system to aid with watering. In November we will be planting fifty more fruit trees. These have all been funded by local community grants. The Parish Council will provide public access to the area in Spring 2024. Keep an eye out for more information.

The Parish Council has a small number of allotments available for use by local residents. The allotments are on the London Road - Tring Hill, behind Buckland Wharf cottages. If you are interested in renting an allotment, please get in touch with the clerk.

Speed watch volunteers have been busy monitoring traffic speeds with the Community



Celebration of 800th anniversary of the founding of St Mary's

On Sunday 3rd September, a service led by the Rt. Revd. Dr Alan Wilson, Bishop of Buckingham, took place to celebrate the 800-year anniversary of the church at Drayton Beauchamp. The congregation, from across the benefice and beyond, filled the church and enjoyed an uplifting service well supported by the nine-piece Village Brass band and The Ridgeway Chorale.

Bishop Alan, in his sermon, outlined the history of the church and the significance of the local community of the parish coming together over the centuries to use the building, and the changes to both community and building over that period. He noted that in all likelihood, the church would have existed before 1220, when the parish fell within the diocese of Lincoln and the first rector was recorded. Church records were poor prior





to then and it was thanks to Hugh of Wells, Bishop of Lincoln from 1209, that a register of ordinations was introduced which still survives today.

At the end of the service Bishop Alan cut a celebratory cake and all present were able to enjoy sparkling wine and a piece of cake.

Music at St Mary's **Drayton Beauchamp**



On Saturday 7 October, the big moment finally came for St Mary's Church, Drayton Beauchamp, when the Stradivarius Piano Trio arrived. The Trio comprised Andrew Bernardi, playing the famous 1696 Stradivarius violin, Maria Marchant whose fingers flew across a beautiful baby grand piano, and Jonathan Few, playing a wonderfully resonant cello. The violin has quite a history; it was stolen from a café at Euston station in 2010 and was missing for three years before being found at a house in the Midlands and bought at auction by a consortium headed by Andrew Bernardi.

A sell-out audience enjoyed a repertoire ranging from Beethoven, Rachmaninov, Dvorák, Schubert and Delibes to a modern piece by Roderick Williams OBE, the British baritone who was one of three soloists who sang at the King's Coronation. The fantastic acoustics of the church really added to the occasion. Our local village saxophonist, Alistair Dunbar, treated the audience to more music during the interval whilst they enjoyed their wine and homemade canapés. All the musicians were so friendly and chatted about their instruments with the audience at the interval and after the concert.

A huge thank you to everyone involved musicians, audience and organisers - for making the evening such a memorable one and raising much-needed funds for St Mary's Church. Lucy Kibble

In your garden

Autumn is a beautiful season to be in the garden, with its warm hues and crisp air. While it may be tempting to retreat indoors as the weather cools down, there are still plenty of things you can do to keep your garden thriving and looking its best. Here are some tips and ideas for things to do in the autumn to get your garden winter-ready, so grab your gardening gloves and let's get started!

Prepping Your Garden for Winter

- · Clean up garden beds begin by removing dead plants and debris from your garden beds. Clearing out the old growth will help prevent pests and diseases from overwintering and causing problems in the spring.
- Mulch after cleaning up your garden beds, apply a layer of mulch, which acts as insulation, protecting plants' roots from freezing temperatures. It also helps retain moisture, which is especially important during dry winter months.
- · Trim back perennial plants to promote healthy growth in the spring. Cut back any dead or damaged foliage but be careful not

to cut into the live stems. This will encourage strong regrowth when the warmer weather returns.

- Plant your tulip bulbs in November, either straight in the ground, at a depth two to three times the height of the bulb, or in pots.
- Before the ground freezes, take the opportunity to improve the soil quality. Turn the soil and incorporate compost or organic matter to enrich it for the next growing season.

Protecting Your Plants from Frost

It's important to take steps to protect your plants from frost and freezing temperatures.

- Cover delicate plants: Use frost blankets or cloths to cover delicate plants, such as tree ferns or more delicate perennials. This will help insulate them and prevent freezing.
- Move potted plants indoors. If you have potted plants in your garden, bring them indoors or move them to a sheltered area, such as a garage or porch, to protect them from frost damage.
- Water deeply before a frost: this can help insulate roots and provide additional protection for plants against freezing temperatures.
- For added protection, you can use plant covers or cloches to create a mini greenhouse effect.
 These structures trap heat and shield plants from frost. And... mulch!

Sort out your garden tools and equipment

Before putting your gardening tools away for the season, take time to clean and give them a bit of TLC. Remove any dirt or debris, sharpen blades, and oil moving parts. Proper maintenance will ensure that your tools are in good condition and

ready to use when spring arrives. Or you can always take them to the Repair Café at St Michael's Church.

Nature Friendly Autumn Gardening

If you want to attract more wildlife to your garden, then don't worry too much about tidying your garden and consider the following:

- Don't cut back perennials birds will often feed off seed heads.
- Leave piles of fallen leaves and garden waste as shelters for wildlife.
- Plant native trees and shrubs to provide food and shelter for birds and wildlife.
- Install bird feeders and bird baths to support local bird populations.
