### **Aston Clinton Baptist Church**

"How much more will your Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him?" - Luke 11.13

How much more than simply a ticket to heaven is the Christian life? Here and now we are promised an experience of the divine.

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus' teaching on prayer concludes with the idea of more. "We earthly parents know how to give good gifts," says Jesus. "You wouldn't give your child a snake if he asked for a fish, so how much more will your heavenly Father give you based on his complete knowledge of you and love for you?" The "more" Jesus refers to is the Holy Spirit.

- 3. The Bible reveals the how and to whom we pray, and so also is the "for what" we are to pray.

The Gift we are to seek above all others is the presence of the Holy Spirit. He is the third person of the trinity sometimes called 'the gobetween God'.

If invited, He will enliven us to the reality of the eternal and commence the work of transformation that sees the character of Jesus being formed within us.

As a church family we're passionate about pursuing more of God's presence through deeper encounters with the Holy Spirit. Our dream of becoming more than we are is front and centre of our life together. If you yearn for more why not join us - all are welcome. Revd Nick Harris

Community WildBelt volunteers, led by the Chiltern Society, have been busy carrying out pond and hedgerow management on the Estone Grange Estate. Residents of the estate enthusiastically joined WildBelt volunteers to help improve spaces for nature where they live. Volunteers cleared dominant vegetation from the pond to create a more diverse habitat and to encourage different species to thrive. Everyone got very muddy!

Just before Christmas we all met up again to gap plant a hedge that runs along a wildflower meadow. The hedge was planted by the developers a few years ago but suffered losses in the drought conditions of the summer of 2022. We planted over 300 native hawthorn trees to help thicken the hedge and make it more attractive to wildlife. As the hedge matures it will provide food, nesting habitat and shelter for birds, insects, and mammals; it will also provide a foraging strip for bats.

### Your local Wildlife Trust reserves and activities

Within walking or cycling distance, or at the most a very short car ride, you have some of the best nature reserves in the Chilterns. Managed by BBOWT, and almost entirely open to the public, the areas conserve special habitats and wildlife, including some plants and animals that are extremely rare elsewhere in the country. I hope you will visit and enjoy them during 2024 and try some of the activities organised by our Trust.



It's still downtime for most of the resident wildlife at our reserves as species adopt a range of strategies to get through the rest of the winter. But there is still plenty to see, from wildfowl and thrushes enjoying a holiday away from the harsh conditions in Scandinavia and Northern Russia, to some of our own secretive mammals revealing their active nocturnal foraging through tracks left in snow and mud. The reserves are also busy with volunteer work parties, using this time to carry out essential management tasks like scrub control, coppicing, hedge laying, fence repairs, tree safety work and path maintenance. It's a great way to keep fit in beautiful settings with a friendly group of nature enthusiasts, so do come and join us.

There are still two events left in our programme of naturalist-led talks, held at the Memorial Centre in Great Missenden. Doors open at 7pm for refreshments and chat, with the events starting at 7.45pm:

Tuesday, February 20 – Mosses and Liverworts in the Chilterns: how these small plants tell us about environmental change. Talk by Dr Oli Prescott, UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology.

Tuesday, March 19 – The Rhythm of Nature. An evening of music, song, and poetry celebrating nature with The Wick Trimmers Folk Group and readings by Trust volunteers and staff.



# **Aston Clinton** Society

We had a very busy and productive conclusion to 2023 with various village projects



Likewise, we are closely monitoring the Rising Sun wildflower area on London Road, which was sown in the autumn and later planted with an assortment of wildflower bulbs. If you see any signs of bloom when passing by either area, please do send us a photo so we can share on our social media channels.

Meanwhile, our regular village litter pick and tidy ups have been boosted by 30 new, good quality litter pickers, courtesy of a grant from the Aston Clinton Parish Council. Thank you to everyone who participated in 2023 and to our friends at Café in the Park for the complimentary drinks. Please follow us on Instagram and Facebook for details on our next village tidy up.

The Society is now entering its third year in 2024. Although we are proud of all we have achieved in a relatively short space of time and the work we've done to improve the village, we feel it's time to lift the bar and tackle one of the bigger issues that concerns us; the lack of servicing of Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp by Bucks Council.

Even during informal discussions we have been repeatedly told that Bucks Council doesn't have the funds to carry out road maintenance and improvements, which means the state of our roads and pavements

continue to deteriorate to a dangerous and unsafe level. The Society took it upon itself to carry out a detailed review of the conditions of road surfaces, white lining, pavements and the identification of traffic hazards and safety issues in the villages. We shared the extensive findings with both Parish and Bucks councillors, before distributing the report to a wider group of key Bucks councillors and those responsible for the relevant departments.

We are now monitoring all work in the village and sending a monthly update report to the same group of people, acknowledging work that has been successfully completed but also hammering home the issues that have still not been addressed. We are not expecting miracles, but we do expect our constant lobbying to be heard and thus ensure the roads and footways in Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp receive the investment needed and are kept safe and fit for their purpose.

# **Buses on Demand** - coming soon to an area near you!

Residents of the Aylesbury area will soon have an exciting new choice of public transport after Buckinghamshire Council is set to partner with WeMove to launch a 'demand responsive' bus service. The three-year trial follows the successful introduction of a similar scheme in Wycombe earlier last year, which has already proved so popular that it has expanded to new areas to meet demand

The new service is part of a pilot scheme funded by the Government's Rural Mobility Fund and covers a specific geographical area, enabling passengers to request a pick up from one of the fully accessible minibuses at a convenient nearby 'virtual bus stop' as the buses travel through their area.

The areas covered by the service include Aston Clinton, Weston Turville, Halton, Hartwell, Stoke Mandeville, Bishopstone and Weedon. The service will drop off passengers anywhere within the operational area, which includes Stoke Mandeville Hospital, Aylesbury town centre and the railway stations at Aylesbury, Aylesbury Vale Parkway, Stoke Mandeville and Wendover.



- "This new service is planned to start during the spring of 2024 and will benefit residents in villages around Aylesbury by providing another travel option to supplement existing public transport services," says Steven Broadbent, Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet Member for Transport.
- " The established Wycombe scheme has demonstrated that demand responsive services are convenient and affordable for travellers," he says. "We're looking forward to sharing more details about this new service soon."

### Council enforces higher penalties for fly-tipping in Bucks

Those caught fly-tipping in Buckinghamshire face the consequence of paying a higher penalty for their crime following changes to the law which have been adopted by the council.

Last year, the government increased the maximum Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) for fly-tipping from £400 to £1,000.

The penalty for Failure in Householder Duty of Care, has also been raised from £400 to a maximum of £600. This penalty relates to people who have waste removed by a thirdparty waste carrier. By law, householders have a duty to check that the carrier they are using is legally authorised to carry out the work and will do so responsibly. If the waste they have given the carrier is found dumped illegally, the householder is deemed to have failed in their Duty of Care regarding their waste and can be liable for prosecution.

FPNs are generally used for smaller scale offences and avoid court proceedings and a criminal record. However where possible the council will always seek to impose the maximum penalty and for larger scale or more serious offences the defendant may be summoned to

court where fines are set by magistrates and can result in custodial sentences and costs totalling thousands of pounds.

"I would urge all householders to fully check the credentials of any waste carrier they employ to dispose of waste on their behalf," says Gareth Williams, Cabinet Member for Climate Change and Environment.

"The best way to do this is to use a traceable method of payment for the service and never, ever pay cash. Make sure you use a waste carrier properly registered with the Environment Agency and pay traceably online – if that isn't an option, find a different waste carrier."

Buckinghamshire Council's enforcement team uses a variety of methods to catch fly-tippers in the act. In the past year they have dealt with 68 cases, resulting in court prosecution fines and fixed penalties totalling more than £55,000. Since 2003 the team has succeeded in achieving 868 convictions resulting in a total of £1.4m in court fines and fixed penalties.

# Changes to household waste disposal

Residents in Buckinghamshire can now dispose of small amounts of DIY waste for free at Household Recycling Centres (HRCs).

The changes, brought in by the government, make it easier for people to freely dispose of small amounts of waste created from at-home DIY projects like re-tiling, renovating a bathroom or digging a pond.

Following this change in law, the council is reintroducing a digital e-permit for DIY waste. From December 31, 2023, any resident wanting to dispose of household DIY waste at a HRC will need to have an e-permit printed out, or on a portable device like a smartphone or tablet, before they visit.

# The DIY e-permit will allow residents to dispose of one load of DIY waste each week for free.

One load of DIY waste is no more than 100 litres of loose DIY waste which must fit into *two 50L bags*, *or one large item no bigger than 2m x 0.75m x 0.7m*, such as one bath tub, one door or one kitchen unit.



Permits are single-use, but can be renewed after seven days to allow residents to dispose of another load of DIY waste for free. Anyone wishing to dispose of more than one load of DIY waste in a week can do so, but will be charged.

The changes only apply to DIY waste. Residents bringing garden waste, electricals, general and other types of waste commonly brought to HRCs will not be affected and can continue to use the sites in the same way as before.

Commercial traders, landlords and residents disposing of waste produced by traders still need to pay for commercial waste disposal.

opened with trepidation, however, I was delighted
to receive the following report from PC Dawn
Seston back in July:

Sophie was on the footpath after school in Aylesbury when a young school girl the same age as her walked through a line of stationary cars and then across a bus lane. Unfortunately, although the cars were stopped they actually had a green light to go and were just held by a roundabout and the weight of traffic. The bus lane however, was still free running.

The young girl was hit by the bus. Poor Sophie and others were alerted by the noise of the impact. As a car blocked the bus lane protecting the girl, Sophie ran to her aid shouting at people to get an ambulance. She then bent down and supported the girl's neck and head, and tried to stop the bleeding while reassuring the girl she would be ok and that help was coming.

It was after Sophie had run to help that she realised she knew the girl. Even from the CCTV footage, Sophie controlled the scene and there was nothing else she could have done. Others walked away while Sophie continued to reassure the girl.

Afterwards, I was speaking with Sophie, who was clearly upset and shaken by the whole thing, when she gave me her account of what happened and what she had done. I told her there was nothing else she could have done and that everything she had done, she had done perfectly. Sophie, through the tears with a big smile, told me she had learnt what to do in the Guides.

PC Seston joined us for the presentation, and we were all very pleased to learn that the young lady involved in the accident has subsequently made a full recovery.






#### Why you should join Scouts



# Florence Nightingale **Hospice Charity**

As for most people, the festive period is a very busy time for Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity. Throughout the month of December, we ran or attended several community and fundraising events. The highlights of this period were our schools, Haddenham and Buckingham Santa Dashes, our annual Christmas wrapping station, and our Tree of Light dedication service honouring loved

Across Buckinghamshire, hundreds of people took part in a Santa Dash fun run to raise money for Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity. An incredible 18 primary schools partnered with us and led their own Santa Dashes. Members of the Charity visited each school and hosted assemblies to raise awareness of the Charity, explain the Santa Dash, and help to sensitively describe what hospices are and why they are important. As well as these school events, we also hosted two Santa Dashes in Buckingham and Haddenham. These were festive fun events for the whole family and were both greatly supported by the communities. Haddenham Community Support Group, and Buckingham and Stowe Running Club were both crucial in the delivery and promotion of the events. Collectively, our 2023 Santa Dashes raised about £16,500 - which is fantastic news for the Florence Nightingale Hospice and could fund over 20 Day Hospice Sessions.





One of our seasonal traditions is our Christmas wrapping station in Friars Square Shopping Centre, Aylesbury. For a donation amount of their choice, shoppers can leave their Christmas gifts in the capable hands of our talented volunteer wrappers and pick them up later. The stall was open from December 15 to December 24 and raised about £600 - which could fully run the Day Hospice for four hours. A huge thank you to all the volunteers who gave up their time over the Christmas period to help make our wrapping station possible.



During December, we also held a lovely Tree of Light service. Christmas can be an emotional time of year when we remember loved ones who are no longer with us. The service was designed as a way for people to honour, cherish and reflect on those who have passed on. Visitors could dedicate lights and write

messages about their loved ones.

The tree, located outside the Hospice itself, shone brightly throughout the festive period as a symbol of light to those whom we have loved and lost, and who brought joy to our lives. It was an emotional and rewarding service, and we hope it brought comfort to those in attendance.

# Village People

This is a series about the people of Aston Clinton, Buckland, and Drayton Beauchamp. It's not just about the people who live in these villages, but it's also about those who are an integral part of village daily life.



From the Parish Council to the Horticultural Society, Marion Richards has been involved in a variety of village matters for nearly 50 years and has three children and nine grandchildren.

#### Q. When did you first come to Aston Clinton and what brought you here?

A. My husband, Peter, and I moved here in 1973. We'd been living in Reading but wanted to move somewhere more rural and more convenient for his commute to London. We found a house in Putnams Drive, which was convenient for the school, and loved it there. In 1980 we moved up to Chiltern Way, where we had more land and could fulfil our dream of keeping chickens, ducks and geese!

#### Q. How did you first get involved in village affairs?

A. First of all, I helped at the playgroup in Anthony Hall. Then I joined St Michael's church and helped with Sunday School. As time went on I became a member of the Parochial Church Council and a churchwarden, and I got involved in fundraising for the upkeep of the church. Then, as there is today, there were problems with the roof, and I still help with fundraising now.

#### Q. What other roles have you held?

A. I helped with the Luncheon Club in Anthony Hall, providing lunches for some of the older members of the community. When Win Thomson, who established the club, retired, a group of helpers

took over the organisation, and we carried on until 2016 when the club stopped due to lack of demand. Lalso became a member of the Parish Council and was there when the bypass was completed; I remember the excitement of being one of the first people to travel along it and realising what a difference it would make to the village. Then for the Millennium it was decided that we'd make a historic parish map, and a group of Parish Councillors persuaded the Council to provide a loan to get this project going. It was a huge amount of work, but well worth it, and it was successfully completed in time for a launch during the Millennium celebrations. It proved to be such a success that we were able to pay back

the loan in a very short time, and we recently donated over £1000 of the proceeds to the Florence Nightingale Hospice. The original of the map is in the church, and there are still copies available for sale.

I also helped start the Wine Club. Nearly 30 years ago
I attended a concert at
Mentmore Towers with a group of friends from the village, and over a number of glasses we decided we'd like to take our shared love of wine to others in the villages. From those small beginnings grew the Wine Club – which is still going strong today!

# Q. Are you involved in any other activities or groups in Aston Clinton?

A. I'm a member of the u3a and the Horticultural Society, and I enjoy entering my flowers in the shows. I was a stockwatcher for BBOWT for many years too. I've also been involved in raising funds for the Chilterns MS Centre (now the Chilterns Neuro Centre), and I hope to continue with this in the spring. I also enjoy attending the Ladies Group meetings.

# Q. When you have some spare time, what do you do for fun?

A. I enjoyed playing badminton until three years ago when hip and knee surgery stopped me. I love my garden and can while away many hours there, and I love a good book and going to the theatre. One of the most important things though is spending time with my friends – many of whom I've known since I moved to the village 50 years ago.

# Q. What's your favourite music?

A. I love jazz and choral music, but I don't sleep well so I often find myself listening to the shipping forecast and Sailing By by Ronald Binge, which is my favourite piece.

# Q. What's your favourite film?

A. It used to be Breakfast at Tiffany's, but recently my grandchildren persuaded me to watch Top Gun, which I thought was fantastic.

#### Q. What would you say is the best thing about living in Aston Clinton?

A. The sense of community, its location in the Chilterns, and the easy access to London - it has everything..

#### Community Orchard

A further 50 plum and pear trees have been planted in the community orchard in addition to the 25 apple trees planted two years ago. This completes the planting of fruit trees, the cost of which has come from grants.

With the help of further funding from the Gib Lane Community Fund, the Parish Council will be installing disabled-friendly pedestrian access and benches. This will allow members of the public to enjoy the wildflower meadow when it's in bloom. The Parish Council has received a generous donation from the Horticultural Society and plans to use this for further planting within the copse area later this year.



#### Thames Water Pumping Station

In December, a public meeting was held with Thames Water to discuss the proposal to locate a large booster station on land next to Hope Cottages on Buckland Road. The large buildings will be as tall as the cottages, and will run the length of their gardens - a mere 5m from their boundary. The Parish Council asked Thames Water to use a site on Lower Icknield Way next to the A41 bypass and away from houses, but Thames Water is unwilling to consider this. We have arranged meetings with our MP, and also with the Local Planning Authority, to explore options prior to a planning application for the booster station being submitted in the spring.



# The Rev'd JR Cohu and Canon Clifford Cohu



Jean Rougier Cohu was Rector of Aston Clinton from 1904 to 1930. Previously, he had been a Fellow of Jesus College Oxford (the Patrons of St Michael's both then and now), a master at Dulwich College, the Headmaster of Plymouth College - then of Richmond School – and finally Rector of Aston Clinton. He was a deeply spiritual man and the author of a number of books; I have a copy of one of them entitled Oremus (Latin for let us pray).

On a holiday in Jersey back in 2021, I noticed that a Canon Clifford Cohu was one of the 17 Jersey men and women who were killed by the Germans. Subsequent research showed that Canon Clifford was the son of our former rector.

Clifford John Cohu was born in Guernsey in 1883. He was, therefore, 20 or 21 when his father became our Rector and while a student at Oxford, he would have lived with his parents in what is now The Old Rectory on London Road. Following his priesting in 1908, he moved to India in 1912 to serve as a minister in several communities until 1935. He then retired to Jersey in 1937 with his wife, Harriette, and became acting rector of St Saviour's Church in 1940. He was an eccentric but popular man. His particular act of defiance during the occupation was to spread the BBC news, both in the General Hospital in St Helier, where he was chaplain, and (on at least one occasion) while riding down the parade in St Helier on his bicycle.

Canon Cohu's source of news was the parish cemetery worker who, in turn, got it from a friend who still had a radio. Newsheets were produced, then taken to Cohu, who distributed them. He was arrested in March 1943 by the GFP, the German Secret Police. In total, 18 people in the network were tried and even more were interrogated. He was sentenced to 18 months imprisonment for "failing to surrender leaflets and disseminating anti-German news". He was locked up in Jersey prison for three months and then deported to occupied France in July 1943.

His first destination was St Lô, then Fort d'Hauteville, near Dijon. He stayed there until December 1943 and was joined by others from Jersey who had been sentenced with him. They were then transferred via Saarbrucken to the prison at Frankfurt-am-Main. Conditions in Frankfurt were severe, but up until the D-Day

landings, the inmates could communicate with their relatives in Jersey once a month. Canon Cohu was put in solitary confinement, spending 10 and a half hours each day inserting hooks into cardboard frames. His wife sent him food parcels, but these were confiscated on arrival and his weight dropped from 64.9kg (10st 3lbs) when he left the island to 44.5kg (7st) by May 1944. The prison diet was wholly insufficient and consisted of a weekly bread ration of 2kg (4.5lbs). In his letters to his wife, Cohu often referred to the gruelling conditions in prison. Prisoners frequently had to join work parties, clearing rubble or removing unexploded bombs from the streets of Frankfurt. Some were also executed by guillotine at the prison, although this was not the fate of any of the Channel Islanders.

In July 1944, the Channel Islanders were moved to Naumburg, where dysentery and dropsy were rampant and no medication was made available to British prisoners. Prisoners "were not allowed to smoke, talk, sing, hum, or smile". Canon Cohu was not even allowed to bury the Channel Islanders who died in prison.

Cohu's sentence officially ended on September 24, 1944, but on August 30, 1944, he was released from Naumburg into the hands of the Gestapo and taken to Zöschen Forced Labour Re-education Camp – which was run by the SS. Up to 30 men were crammed into small round paper tents, with nothing but soil on the bare ground. Canon Cohu attracted attention as the only British prisoner and as a priest. He was too weak and thin to lift a shovel when on a work party and was given continual beatings and subjected to streams of abuse from the guards.

Canon Cohu died at the hands of a sadistic guard who beat many prisoners to death for no reason. He was so badly beaten that he died two days later. He was just 60 years old.

We are delighted to announce that work on the upgrade of the 1.7mile (2.7km) canal towpath between Wendover and Halton is now complete.

This high-specification upgrade was supervised by the Canal & River Trust and the work carried out by its contractors Kier plc and The Rothen Group.

The new all-weather, 1.5m-wide, path now has bank reinforcing, a strong membrane, a solid 100mm foundation and a 50mm surface of limestone-based Centrack - which is highly durable, widely used and particularly suited to this rural environment.

The improvement enables people of all ages and abilities to use the towpath year-round; families, schoolchildren, walkers, runners, cyclists and those with reduced mobility can now enjoy the towpath whatever the weather.

This project was made possible through funding from the HS2 Chilterns AONB

Review Group (with the substantial support of Chilterns Conservation Board), Wendover

Parish Council, Wendover Community Board, Lionel Abel-Smith Trust and Halton Parish Council. We are grateful to all of these organisations for their support, which is much appreciated.

Over the coming months, Wendover Canal Trust will be replacing the railings at Wharf Road and erecting signage along the entire route from Wendover to Halton. This is largely being funded by the EKFB joint venture (Eiffage, Kier, Ferrovial Construction and BAM Nuttall).

The upgrading of the towpath will be celebrated with an event in the spring - more information to follow.

Society members had a joyful afternoon at the volunteer-run workshop, and enjoyed prosecco and mulled wine while they used greenery from local gardens to make their wreaths. An incredible £400 was donated to Brain Tumour Research. and it was such a success that we're making it an annual event; it's booked for Saturday, November 30, 2024!







#### In your garden

There are plenty of things to do in the garden during winter. If the weather is bright and dry, head out into the garden for a bit of pruning. If it's not, there are still things you can do indoors: organise your seeds for sowing, research new plants and shrubs to include in your garden, and plan gardens to visit during the year.

#### Prune your roses

Most types of roses should be pruned in January or February before the leaves start to emerge. Modern roses can be cut back hard while older types should be pruned more gently. Always remove any dead, damaged or diseased stems.

#### Planting and pruning fruit trees and bushes

Bare-root trees and bushes can be planted between November and March if the soil isn't frozen. You can also prune apple and pear trees, gooseberries and currant bushes. Remove dead or rubbing branches, shorten new growth a little and try to keep an open centre to the tree or bush.

#### Herbaceous perennials

Don't be tempted to be too tidy; leaving some growth on your perennials will provide a winter habitat for the wildlife in your garden. Some dry stems to hide in will make the winter months easier for many insects and also give the plants some protection against frost.

#### General maintenance

Winter is a good time to do those general maintenance jobs around the garden like cutting back hedges, shrubs, and trees, and repairing fences, cleaning patios and weeding.

#### Gardens to visit

Winter can be a great time to visit gardens to see early spring flowers with February being the best time to see snowdrops. Nearby gardens renowned for their snowdrop collections include:



#### Thenford, near Banbury

Snowdrops have grown in Thenford's woodlands and churchyard for decades, carpeting the ground with a wash of white flowers each February. The collection of snowdrops has been expanded over the years, and there are now over 600 species and cultivars. The garden is owned by the Heseltine family and is open on limited dates during the year, with four open days in February 2024.

#### Benington Lordship, near Stevenage

Benington Lordship's grounds come alive in February with winter-flowering shrubs, hellebores, and naturalised snowdrops.

The Norman keep and moat create a lovely background with acer, cornus, and willow stems in various colours. A century-old planting, the snowdrop path presents a striking show of common and double snowdrop species.

The centrepiece of the exhibit is an assortment of both common and unusual snowdrops.
