This issue of Village Life marks one year since I took over the role of editor. Much has changed in that time, although some things have stayed worryingly the same.

In March 2023, it wasn't clear that Village Life would survive for another year; a combination of reduced income from advertising and the lack of backup for the editorial role threatened the long-term sustainability of the magazine. Two things have improved the situation: we received a grant from Aston Clinton Parish Council, which will help us to break even over the current financial year; and my able co-editor, Fiona Skeggs, has joined the team, bringing a welcome breath of youth - and the tech savvy that comes with it. However, despite our best efforts, advertising revenue continues to decline and the second co-editor recruited last summer to complete our team of three was unfortunately unable to continue in the role.

I believe that, despite the constant availability of digital information, Village Life continues to play an important role in the community; so we press on, hoping that the community will provide the support we need to continue. On page 27, we are advertising once again for another coeditor and we continue to seek out local businesses who might want to advertise in Village Life and benefit from the exposure to 2,700 households that each issue provides. On page 24 we also have a new feature, "Village Business", designed to give our advertisers an opportunity for greater exposure and make advertising in Village Life an even more attractive prospect.

As I've been editing this issue, I've been struck by how many of our contributors are giving advance notice of summer events and urging you to 'save the date'. I have a vision of teams in all three villages busily planning your summer entertainment. I applaud their efforts and hope you will support them as the dates come around.

However, as spring unfolds, I also urge you to pause for a moment in the present. This precious time of year is one to cherish, as trees burst into blossom, birds burst into song and life renews. Stop, look, and breathe it in and, perhaps, for that moment, feel your cares slip away. *Enjoy it while you can... Barbara Muston*

News from your local nature reserves



As I write this, I am enjoying a few continuous days without rain, periods of sun and a garden full of bird song. Could it be that the deluge has finally ended and we have the true start of spring? Even our nature reserves high up in the chalk hills have suffered from the excessively wet January and February – the wettest February since 1836! Extremely muddy conditions have interfered with woodland management work, fencing repairs and signage maintenance, but we should now catch up ready for visitors to enjoy the spring flowers and butterflies.

At Dancersend you will find some changes. New interpretation signs explain the history of the reserve and the connection with the Rothschild family, and our management for wildlife, especially on the precious chalk grassland, which is home to many regionally important flowers and animals. On the reserve's extension fields, which stretch up from the original nature reserve in the valley to the summit of the road on Aston Hill, you will see some new excavations exposing the raw chalk. These are part of a project being carried out with the national charity Plantlife to reintroduce juniper to the valley, after it was lost post WWII when grassy clearings were allowed to scrub over and become woodland. Seed collected from our reserve at Bacombe Hill, on the other side of Wendover will be used for this.

Aston Clinton Ragpits has had winter grazing by the Trust's Hebridean sheep and scrub control to create optimal conditions for the annual spectacle of wild orchids, for which the reserve is renowned. BBOWT's flagship reserve at College Lake has had several path and access improvements over the winter and there has been a revamp of the visitor centre to make both the café and the shop even more welcoming.

Our programme of monthly illustrated talks, organised by the BBOWT Chilterns Group, is just drawing to a close, but will be replaced by a programme of guided walks to help you discover our nature reserves and learn more about them. This will begin with walks at Dancersend on Saturday, 20 April and Aston Clinton Ragpits on Saturday, 25 May. All details and booking arrangements will be posted shortly on our website at www.bbowt.org. uk/events.

Please do visit the local BBOWT reserves this year – a band of keen local volunteers maintains them for very special, and some very rare, wildlife ... and also for your enjoyment and wellbeing.



Aston Clinton School



Since the pandemic, mental health has become more important than ever. As a school, we have always known that children must be mentally healthy to learn, which is why it has been a core thread of the school's ethos for a number of years.

Mental health affects how you think, feel and act. It refers to your emotional, psychological and social well-being. Following the pandemic, we used the work of Barry Carpenter to help shape our recovery curriculum and implemented 'zones of regulation' as a whole school strategy to ensure that children were and are able to 'check in' and discuss how they are feeling. In addition, we utilised mindfulness within our 'Healthy Minds, Healthy Body' curriculum and adopted yoga as part of the PE curriculum.



Research shows that people who are more connected with nature are usually happier in life and more likely to report feelings of





happiness. Having time, space and permission to play outside is essential for mental health, physical strength and creating the friendships that will support children for life.

Children who play outdoors move more, sleep more, eat better and care about the planet more. They are more active, resilient, and creative. They make deeper friendships, concentrate and behave better during lessons. They have less time off sick and are even less likely to need glasses! Finally, most importantly, they are happier, mentally healthy individuals.

I'm sure you can recount numerous fond memories of your childhood: building dens, climbing trees, and playing games on the streets until you were called in for tea or dinner. Today with busy lives, busy schools, busy roads and busy neighbourhoods, most children don't get nearly enough time to play outside. We are therefore excited to extend our curriculum by introducing the OPAL project (Outdoor Play And Learning). This scheme has been developed over the last 20 years by Michael Follett, previously a teacher, playworker and school advisor, and we believe it will allow us to truly transform the way our children play and interact with the environment.



The programme helps schools to plan for and invest in play in the same way as they plan for English and maths.

As part of the programme, we will introduce:

- · more space to play
- · more stuff to play with
- a risk-benefit approach so children are safe to take the risks they need
- training for the staff that look after children's play.

ACSA, our wonderful PTA, has started to fundraise for the scheme and we are also extremely grateful to Laxton Properties who have very generously match-funded the amount ACSA raises so that we can speed up the implementation.

We are delighted to have appointed two staff to lead the project and their training has already begun. We have also started collecting resources for our mud kitchen (pots and pans), dens (old fabric and pegs), science laboratories, old car tyres, old suitcases, small world figures. Our top tips for outdoor play at home.

- Explore the outdoor places near home.
- Let the children decide how they play and be there to support them when needed.
- Check the weather. There is no such thing as bad weather, just the wrong clothes!
- Introduce stuff to play with to build/make/ create. If they build a den or structure, can they leave it up for a while?
- Let them take some risks and make mistakes!
- As soon as you think you can trust them, leave them to it ... and enjoy some welldeserved time to yourself.
- Children love physical play with friends and you. Tickling, wrestling, play fights, chase and horseplay build bonds and emotional intelligence.

Aston Clinton Parish Council

Looking back to the end of 2023, it was a busy time for the Parish Council, not only with the day-to-day council business and budget planning for 2024, but also with our end of year events which included the annual Remembrance service, Christmas tree lighting at the Red Kite Pavilion (RKP) with students from Aston Clinton school singing carols to the gathered crowd, and, of course, the annual outing for Santa's Float.

These events are only made possible with support from volunteers, and sincere thanks go to Dayla Drinks who kindly supported Santa again in 2023, by providing transport for the float and Spencer, our lovely driver. Also, thanks to the collectors who gave up their time to walk with the float, particularly the Scouts who walked the long routes with great enthusiasm. Our residents are also due applause, having donated a record sum of £1,678, which has been split equally between Aston Clinton Scouts, Rennie Grove Hospice and the Chilterns Neuro Centre. Thank you so much! Thanks too go to Nick, Phil, Chaz and the team at the Red Kite Pavilion who supported our events in 2023; we look forward to sharing more projects in 2024.

As we look forward to better (and drier) spring weather, we'd like to mention that the excessive amount of rain experienced over recent weeks has had a significant detrimental effect on all areas of the park, and we ask that all visitors please take care to avoid those that are particularly muddy by restricting walking to the edges and other areas that are not so wet, to help the damaged areas recover as quickly as possible. In addition, a reminder regarding roads/pavements and footpath safety, that a variety of problems, such as potholes, pavement issues, fly tipping, street lights on main roads, and more can easily be reported directly via





the Buckinghamshire Council Fix my Street website: fixmystreet.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/.

Our battle against speeding drivers through the village continues, with our Community Speedwatch programme in conjunction with Thames Valley Police, and our MVAS (mobile vehicle activated sign). A number of speeding vehicles have already been successfully reported to TVP. Any resident can become part of the Speedwatch team; if you have a couple of hours per month to spare, please email assistantclerk@astonclinton.org or call 01296 631269.

There have been several delays to the start of the proposed traffic calming measures by Bucks Council, but the works will now start at the beginning of April. Up to date details can be found on the Parish Council website, and also on the Bucks Council website under the following link: buckinghamshire.gov.uk/parking-roads-and-transport/view-road-projects-in-development/traffic-calming-london-road-aston-clinton/. Further meetings with Bucks Council are proposed for 2024 to discuss the short and longer term strategy for the village highways and footways along with updates on both the capital projects and the local area teams.

As 2024 progresses, various projects will get under way - the proposed renovations to the Trim Trail in the park, AC Neighbourhood Plan review, participation in the allotments Grow to Give initiative supporting Aylesbury Vineyard foodbank, the official opening of the Halton canal path in June, and planning for the AC Family Festival in the park on Saturday, 8 June.

Starling spectacular

Every autumn, thousands of starlings from northern Europe come to Great Britain searching for better weather. Here they join their British cousins to form large flocks. If we are very lucky, they form a murmuration - and that is exactly what happened at Tringford reservoir this winter.

Most evenings, around dusk, small groups of starlings come to the area and start to join others to form larger and larger groups, containing many thousands of birds.

No-one is entirely sure why they do this but it seems to be based on the principle of safety in numbers. There are plenty of predators that would like to catch a starling, but it is far more difficult to pick out one individual in a huge swirling mass.


The murmuration flies round and round above a roosting site and each bird tries to find its way to the centre of the group to keep away from predators. They are very proficient fliers and always avoid the birds around them, manoeuvring at around 30 mph. As the birds dive and swoop, the murmuration creates spectacular changing shapes, making one of nature's most breathtaking displays.

The aerial dance lasts for around 20-30 minutes, or sometimes more. The end comes very suddenly, when all the birds drop down into the roost and settle on their perches. The crowding of thousands of little bodies helps to keep everyone warm through the long winter night.

The murmurations normally end in about March as the weather warms. The continental birds go back to their breeding grounds and the locals look to start their own new families

The groups do not always return to the same area every year, but Tringford has been used on many occasions. This year some of the murmurations coincided with beautiful sunsets and spectators were able to take some memorable photos. Richard Vincent



Spring is well and truly in the air around Aston Clinton, and we're pleased to report that the spring bulbs we planted last autumn are currently in full bloom and have created a lovely, colourful display along London Road between Dennis Close and Spring Brook.

Similarly, the Rising Sun wildflower area has awoken from its winter slumber and although it's still early days as we write, we are beginning to see signs of growth, including ox-eye chamomile, spotted knapweed, common corncockle, noble yarrow, cow parsley and cornflower, while winter aconite have already flowered. We've just completed a light thinning of chickweed which was threatening to overgrow the meadow but there's still plenty left to attract seed-eating birds. We've also put up a couple of nesting boxes so we're looking forward to seeing if they get any lodgers this spring!

We held our first litter-pick and tidy-up of 2024 at the start of February - once again we were graced with fine weather and a good turnout of volunteers who collected 34 bags of rubbish in two hours. Having conducted regular litter-picks for the past two years now, it's evident there are several hotspots around the village where rubbish is repeatedly dropped from passing vehicles. In a bid to try and shame the worst offenders, we are applying for funding so we can erect no littering signs around the village. Hopefully, it won't be too long before these start to appear. In the meantime, if you spot anyone littering in or around the village, please let us know the details (vehicle registration) so we can pass them on to the relevant authorities for action.

Still on the subject of litter, Twitchell Lane has traditionally been one of the worst areas in the village for litter, so we are pleased to report



that our request to install a litter bin outside the school gates has now been approved by Aston Clinton Parish Council and it should be in place very soon. We have also put in a similar request to Buckland Parish Council for a litter bin on Tring Hill. *Ann Webber*

Local scams and fraud calls – be fraud aware! Scammers usually attempt to call elderly and vulnerable people in the community, and they don't care who gets hurt along the way.

The call will often involve a scammer pretending to be a police officer, even quoting a shoulder number of a current serving officer.

Scammers will call, claiming to be a police officer and explain there is a problem with your bank account. They may say that the staff at your bank are corrupt and cannot be trusted, or that your bank details have been cloned and they now require your assistance with their investigation.

They will tell you to transfer money into a secure account allegedly in your name, and they may also ask you to provide cash, vouchers or valuable items to a courier. In reality, this bank account will belong to the scammers and a victim will end up transferring money straight into their pockets!

If you receive a call like this, **HANG UP** – a police officer or even a bank fraud team will never ask you to transfer money to a 'safe account'. You may also receive calls pretending to be from your bank, HMRC or other government organisations.

Protect your bicycle

With the weather improving as we move towards the spring months, please see below a few hints and tips on keeping your bicycle safe and secure when you go out and about.

- Fit a good bike lock, such as one with a Sold Secure rating, and attach your bike to something secure.
- Always lock your bicycle, even if you are leaving it for a couple of minutes.
- If you have quick-release wheels or parts that are easy to remove, lock them up as well or take them with you.
- Have your bike's frame security-marked or etched.
- Keep your bike in a secure garage or shed when at home.
- Register your bike with schemes such as Immobilise.


Fiona Skeggs, who recently joined the team as the other co-editor really enjoyed producing the February/March issue,

Parish churches have been serving the communities in which they are set for hundreds of years and have invariably been at the heart of creating and supporting community. Parish church buildings are important meeting places for all sorts of community activities and special occasions and can also be a place of peace and sanctuary in our busy world.

When you live within a parish you have the legal right to have your children baptised, to get married and to have your loved one's funeral in your local Church of England Parish Church.

Baptism: previously better known as a Christening, is a free gift from God and can be celebrated in any of our three churches in the Benefice regardless of the village in which you live. We baptise both children and adults in our Parish churches and the services are usually held on the third Sunday of every month. The number of Godparents required has now changed to a minimum of two per baptism applicant, but in order to be able to be a Godparent they must themselves be baptised. If they are not, they can still take part in the service and be a 'sponsor' for the applicant.

Weddings: despite the national decline in church weddings, here in this benefice we are very fortunate to have a good number of couples wishing to be married in our Parish churches; in fact we have eight awesome weddings this year. In the past, in order to be able to marry in your Parish church you had to reside in the parish but nowadays there are more qualifying connections which will allow you to marry there even if you are no longer a resident. These range from your parents/ grandparents having lived/living in the parish to the wedding couple committing themselves to six months of habitual worship before their marriage ceremony. The good news is that you can choose any of our three churches for your special day.

Funerals: if you live in the Parish (or die in the Parish) you are entitled to have a funeral service in one of our three churches. There is no requirement to be 'religious' or have a regular Sunday worship attendance record. We have so many residents who say to us, "but we aren't churchgoers so it wouldn't be right to have the funeral in church...". The Parish church is at the heart of the community, it's a community building to be used by everyone in the community – what better place for the community to come together to celebrate the life of a dear member of that community? Nowadays, we appreciate how families have connections to a Parish church, with family members past and present being baptised and/or married in that particular church, even though they may no longer live there themselves, so we try to respect their wishes as far as we are able.

The occasional offices, baptism, marriage and funeral are just some of the amazing events that go on in our Parish churches. What we believe we do best is offer the warmest of welcomes to each and every person who comes through our doors, a hospitality like no other! Buckland Parish Council

Parish Councillors

Cllr Susan Gillingham has retired from Buckland Parish Council (BPC) after many years of service. She has been a valuable member of the team helping with many of the issues in Lower Buckland. BPC would like to thank her for all her hard work over the years.

We now have vacancies for Parish Councillors. If you are interested in helping your local community, please do get in touch. Council meetings are held on the second Monday of each month in the evening. Parish Councillors represent the views and concerns of the residents of the parish to the parish council itself and, through it, to the local authority; they report back to residents on issues affecting the parish. The role is very varied and interesting and is a good way to find out what is happening within Buckland. Thames Water Booster Station

BPC has been continuing to put pressure on Thames Water to move the location of the proposed booster station away from Hope Cottages and nearer to the A41 bypass. Bucks Councillor Mike Collins and Cllr Carole Paternoster met with representatives from Thames Water to discuss the issue. Cllr Nigel Hayward and Clerk Jane Lewis held a meeting with Rob Butler MP on site, to explain residents' concerns. Rob Butler then invited two Thames Water Representatives to discuss the plans. Both meetings have resulted in Thames Water agreeing to review BPC's proposals. At the time of writing the Parish Council is also organising a petition for residents to sign; this will be presented in the House of Commons to the Business Secretary, Penny Mordaunt MP.

Lower Buckland

BPC has been made aware of large lorries using the bridleway between Puttenham and Buckland. There are bollards with padlocks preventing vehicles from using the bridleway, but these are constantly being removed. BPC is working with Bucks Council to stop this.

Community Orchard

BPC has received a donation from Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp Horticultural Society for trees for the Community Orchard. The council thanks the Horticultural Society for their generous donation which will be used to plant native trees from the approved list: alnus glutinosa (alder), prunus padus (bird cherry), carpinus betulus (hornbeam), acer campestre (field maple), sorbus aucuparia (rowan), ilex (holly), malus sylvestris (crab apple), and prunus spinosa (blackthorn). These trees will be planted during the next planting season at the end of this year.

Speeding Drivers

BPC continues to pursue ways to slow down speeding drivers. It has held meetings with local residents to discuss solutions to slow traffic at Buckland Wharf and has been in contact with Bucks Council regarding this issue. However, Bucks Council's response is that there is not enough data to show that accidents are a regular occurrence on Tring Hill or at Buckland Wharf. If you have been involved in an accident (however small), please get in touch with us to let us know the details so we can add them to our database.

Speedwatch Volunteers

With the approach of better weather, Buckland Speedwatch will be in action again to deter speeding on roads within our Parish. The group was set up last autumn and has been successful both in moderating speeds and in passing details of drivers exceeding safe limits

to Thames Valley Police. We are looking for further volunteers to join our Speedwatch Group. For information, please contact our group coordinator, Jane Lewis, at clerk@buckland-pc.gov.uk. No experience is necessary and full training will be given.

News from Bucks Council - Planning

Aylesbury - Eastern Link Road South (ELRs) update

The delivery of the ELRs will connect the ELR north (Bellingham Way) A418 to Aston Clinton Road A41 as part of a long-term strategy to deliver an orbital traffic route around Aylesbury. Some of this is already in place and has been many years in the planning and making. The Woodlands Development achieved planning consent in the latter part of 2023 and the current strategy to deliver the ELRs will be developer-led as part of the Woodlands site, with the SLR (Southern Link Road) being delivered by December 2025 as part of the Hampden Fields development.

Buckinghamshire Council will begin the process of procuring a developer for the Woodlands site within the next few months. The council is committed to the delivery of the ELRs and local councillors, alongside Rob Butler MP, have been working hard for several years to ensure a successful outcome. Timescales for delivery will be dependent on the procurement process.

Horticultural Society

All the snowdrops have now disappeared and our daffodils, tulips and other spring bulbs will be in full bloom. The Society had a lovely outing to Touchwood in Great Missenden to see Katharine Hersee's wonderful two-acre garden filled with drifts of snowdrops, including a few unusual ones. Our visit started with a short illustrated talk by Katharine about snowdrop varieties before we explored the snowdrops lining a shrubbery path, woodland path and rockery.



How to keep garden pests under control, the natural way

It's always good to see the snowdrops and spring flowers coming out, a sure sign that spring and warmer weather is not too far away. However, as well as the plants and flowers, the common garden pests will also emerge and can obliterate your cherished plants, vegetables and fruits if you're not careful!

Here are a few things you can do in your garden to try and keep the pests at bay without using chemicals...

Handpicking pests - Regularly inspect your plants and remove any pests you see, such as caterpillars, aphids, or snails.

Encouraging Biodiversity - One effective natural pest control method is to encourage biodiversity in your garden by planting a variety of different plant species. This helps create a balanced ecosystem that can naturally control pest populations.

Encourage Natural Predators - Ladybirds, birds, frogs are natural enemies of many garden pests. By attracting these beneficial creatures to your garden, you can help maintain a balance in your ecosystem.

Companion Planting – Utilising companion planting techniques, like planting marigolds among your vegetables, can help deter pests. Marigolds emit a scent that repels many common garden pests.



Midges may seem like insignificant insects but they can cause major issues with fruit in the garden. Below is an article written by one of our members, Katy Todd, about the dreaded Pear Midge.

More than just annoying

Five years ago we planted an orchard in the bare garden of our new house. We chose semi-mature trees for faster impact. Bramley seedling and Melrose apple, Victoria and Regina Claudia plum and a Gieser Wildman pear. While the other trees produced increasing and delicious crops, though by no way perfect, the pear has yielded nothing but disappointment. When it arrived in August 2018 Gieser Wildman was decked with two of the most beautiful speckled yellowy fruits. We were given strict instructions NOT to eat these as the tree had been sprayed. We only had to be patient and there would be pears.

Every spring when the Chanticleer ornamental pear in neighbouring gardens were in flower, our Gieser Wildman also flowered, leading to high hopes. Hope heightened when clusters of pearlets formed. But all hopes were dashed when every potential pear dropped off.

On close examination they were all filled with tiny grubs.

Google anything and you shall find. And so it was that I discovered a pear-midge that rises from hibernation to lay its eggs in the flower buds. We could spray, but that wouldn't be good for wildlife. Frequent sightings of ladybirds on the tree confirmed it was right not to use poison. We could cover the ground beneath to prevent the midge from getting through but here grow my prized lily-of-the-valley. One bizarre suggestion was to hoover the midges when they appeared in the evenings! We could pick off all the affected pearlets. And pick them off we did, every one, every spring. Anything to eradicate the midge. I consulted blogs and advice and after weighing up the various options I decided to remove all the buds well before even a hint of blossom occurred.

And so it was one warmish February afternoon this year our little grandson arrived and on being asked what I was doing up a ladder, I explained the cycle from hibernating midge, to grub, leading to no fruit. "That's so annoying," he said. He was right. I cut off every promising bud in the hope that one day there might be big juicy pears.

I'm not sure what the ultimate decision will be if this doesn't work. Do nothing and just enjoy the beautiful blossom in years to come, or replace the tree? 




