Wendover Canal Towpath

TV personality to open upgraded towpath

Robbie Cumming - presenter of "Canal Boat Diaries" - is to officially open the upgraded canal towpath from Wendover to Halton. The ribbon cutting ceremony will take place at 1pm on Friday, June 28 at the entrance from the towpath to Walnut Tree Meadow, and a host of other activities are planned to take place from 10am to 3pm.



The footpath upgrade took six months to complete, cost £750,000 and is 1.7 miles long. It is part of the Wendover Canal Trust's and Canal & River Trust's wider ambition to see the entire seven-mile Wendover to Grand Union canal towpath upgraded.

"It will be an incredibly useful route for everyone who wants to enjoy the ambience of a canal side whether it's people out for a gentle stroll, ramblers, joggers, cyclists or birdwatchers," said Wendover Canal Trust Chairman Clive Johnson. "We want the day to be a community celebration and everyone is invited."

On opening day, there will be a series of events and activities for people to enjoy, including Morris dancing by Cracklewick Morris, a performance by Wendover u3a's Ukulele Band and talks on the various heritage sites along the towpath.

Kayakers and paddle boarders from Chiltern Canoe Club will be on the water during the day along the stretch of the canal.

After some wonderful volunteer effort and livestock grazing through the early months of the year, we hoped our local BBOWT reserves would be in perfect condition to welcome the arrival of spring and new visitors this year. STEM at **Aston Clinton School**

At Aston Clinton School, we strongly believe in giving children opportunities to explore the world around them and think for themselves. So much of what they do is structured and prescriptive, meaning that by the time they leave school, they have lost the ability to explore, ask questions and find their own solutions. These skills are vital for their future careers and life in general. In the school, we are addressing this through the way we teach science and the enhancement opportunities we offer.

We also recognise that 10% of the British workforce are employed in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) related occupations but only 29% of this workforce is female. When looking at university degrees, only 35% of STEM degrees are obtained by women, with engineering and computing having the lowest representation (women are obtaining 19% of these degrees). We already address science and computing through our lessons and trips, making our lessons more child-led and exploratory. However, engineering is not something that is on the National Curriculum. This is the area that we have focused on in our enhancement opportunities over the last couple of years, with great success.





Aston Clinton School has formed a partnership with Safran, a global engineering company with an engineering and manufacturing site in Pitstone. STEM ambassadors from Safran, with the support of the school, have planned and run sessions for each year group and their parents to participate in. Each session involves an engineering

problem that has to be solved through designing and building a product, with plenty of healthy competition between teams! The children have an opportunity to work not only with their relatives but also real engineers, who are also mostly female. The sessions have been a great success and have helped children, and their female relatives, see that engineering is for all and is exciting!

We are also in our second year of running Aston Arrows – our racing team. We are part of Greenpower Educational Trust, who aim to inspire young people around the world to excel in STEM through a unique challenge: to design, build and race an electric car. The children learn design and construction skills as well as how to drive and run a business. This club is supported heavily by members of our village community who guide our children through the project with real passion.

As well as these two new projects, the school has been part of the Primary Engineering Competition for many years. This is a national competition that encourages children to think like engineers by answering the question "If you were an engineer, what would you do?"

Over the years, we have had many entries to the competition, with great success. Last year, we had two regional winners, Lottie Ford and Seyi Akintayo. Both girls impressed the judges with their solutions to a problem that they saw in their lives. Seyi went on to win the top award, having had the most votes from the judges (who are all engineers) in the competition. And her success has continued. Over Easter, we were informed that her invention is going to be made into a prototype by a company in Belfast. This is an amazing achievement as only 18 out of 48,000 entries are being made! Seyi's invention is simple but very well thought out. She knew that there is a worldwide shortage of fresh water and noticed how we were having droughts more often. She

also realised that people were not aware of the amount of water they are using and designed a tap that measures the amount of water we use as we are using it and calculates the cost straight away. In this way, people would be more mindful of every drop they used. As a school, we are extremely proud of all Seyi has achieved and hope she will inspire others to consider STEM subjects as fun and a possible career path for them. We look forward to seeing where Seyi's inquisitive and creative mind takes her.

OPAL



The events team has been busily finalising our action-packed Family Festival event on Saturday, June 8. This free community event, which runs from noon until 6pm, will feature music from the Ellesborough Silver Band, and local band Keira and The Reckerz will serenade us with performances from the balcony of the Red Kite Pavilion. There will be attractions and rides, including Zorbs, bouncy slides, chairplanes, teacups, and a twister ride (rides are free until 4pm), as well as Punch & Judy, balloon modelling and magic shows for the children, a mini petting zoo, vintage car display, and a fun dog show.

We also welcome side stalls this year, featuring the community and charity groups in the village, along with some craft retailers. There will be dance and fitness displays with Zumba Rox, JoAnn Latus School of Dance, Salsa group, and Lucy Clark Scottish Country Dance Club, along with try-out sessions at the Tennis and Bowls Clubs.

Our charity partner for the festival will be local cancer charity Kirby's Herd, and a raffle supported by local businesses will be held at the end of the afternoon – all proceeds go directly to the charity, so please do support them.

Ample food and drink will be on offer, both from Your Café in the Park and other concessions near the all-weather pitch. There will be parking restrictions in place from mid-morning, and marshalls will be controlling traffic entering the car parks. Overflow parking will be available at Aston Clinton School.

We look forward to welcoming as many residents as possible to enjoy this wonderful event, which could not run without the hard work and dedication of our events team councillors, volunteers, and office staff. We are also very fortunate and grateful to have received funding from the Wendover and

Villages Community Board to help with the cost of the festival.

In other news, the unaudited year end accounts have been finalised and were presented at the Annual Parish Meeting held on Thursday, May 23. This meeting offers the opportunity for residents to engage with Council projects and share their views, and for local groups and organisations to report on their activities throughout the past year.

A new defibrillator has been installed at the Guide Hut on Aylesbury Road, which was part funded by London Hearts. Returning to the park, a new zipwire is planned and due to be installed adjacent to the playpark in time for the summer holidays. This exciting piece of equipment has been donated to the children of Aston Clinton by Jessica Mitchell in memory of her son Dylan. She has generously provided this from the remaining charitable donations collected for Dylan's care. Also planned are new outdoor gym workstations to replace our ageing trim trail. We are also working on the installation of an information board at the Lady Louisa de Rothschild fountain area which was recently rebuilt and renovated.

Traffic calming measures have started in the village by Buckinghamshire Council, and it is forecast that these will run until late summer – updates on these can be found on our website.

Our community speedwatch team continues to deter speeding drivers and are actively seeking new members, so please contact us if you have some time to spare.

The Council meets on the 3rd Wednesday of every month, and residents are always welcome to come along to raise any issues with us – our committees also meet regularly and the public are welcome to join us at those. Community WildBelt update





WildBelt volunteers have been busy working in Aston Clinton over the colder months, when there's less chance of disturbing local flora and fauna. The project, which is helping people achieve nature recovery in their local communities, is really starting to gain momentum thanks to the National Lottery Heritage Funding and support from local people.

We have been helping residents of the Estone Grange Estate improve a pond they have to increase its benefits for nature. We were joined by families who came out and got wonderfully muddy! The children particularly enjoyed helping; it's great to get them out helping nature on their doorstep. We also did some hedge planting along a wildflower meadow which, in time, will act as a refuge for birds, mammals, insects and foraging bats.

Over in Aston Clinton Park, we did some "gapping up" on a hedge we planted last winter. As in all newly planted hedges you will get some losses in the first year or two but through WildBelt project funding were able to replace those. We are really pleased with the progress of the hedge, and it will be due for its first trim next winter to encourage thick bushy growth.

The community orchard planted in the park in the winter of 2022 by the Aston Clinton Scouts and Cubs is showing great success – all the trees are looking healthy and currently supporting beautiful blossoms. We are looking for a local volunteer with experience to look after the orchard trees and prune them when needed. Please get in touch if you would like to help.

We are always on the lookout for new volunteers and opportunities for nature recovery projects in the area. Check out our website to find out how to get involved and help Chilterns nature thrive.

I know, too, that villagers take great pride in local civic celebrations, and I'm delighted to have taken part in two recently. The St George's Day parade saw many members of local scout and guiding groups in Aylesbury's Market Square, led by St George and the dragon. It brought back wonderful memories of my own time as a cub and scout, and I was thrilled to have the opportunity to retake my scout promise.

The following week, personnel from all ranks at RAF Halton exercised their right to the Freedom of Aylesbury, marching through the town with bayonets fixed, King's Colour flying, bands playing and drums beating. The parade has been a tradition for many years, but was especially timely as a reminder of the debt we all owe to our armed forces in an ever more dangerous world. I was in Parliament to hear the important announcement from the Prime Minister of an increase in our defence spending to 2.5% of GDP by 2030 – an extra £75 billion.

This money is vital to ensure our Army, Navy and RAF have the resources they need to take on our adversaries from all quarters – land, sea, air, cyber and space.

I've also asked many other ministers questions in the House of Commons about the topics that matter most to people from our area, ranging from access to GPs to better roads and help for small businesses.


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Aston Clinton **Youth Club**

Village People

This is a series about the people of Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp. Not just about the people who live in these villages but the people who are a part of the daily life of the villages.

Peter Elwin lives in Buckland and has been closely involved with many local activities, including the church and the Wendover Arm of the Grand Union canal.



Q. How long have you been a director of the Wendover Canal Trust, and when and why did you first become interested in their work?

A. For about four years, in particular because I wanted to see the beautiful seven-mile towpath be made accessible to the whole community all year round. In general, I believe in public investment for public good.

Q. This is a special year for the Wendover Arm. What will you be celebrating?

A. On June 28 we shall be celebrating the formal opening of the upgraded 1.7 mile canal towpath between Wharf Road, Wendover and Halton Village, with our celebrity patron Robbie Cumming cutting the ribbon. The upgrading of this

length cost £750,000, and I must admit that it has been extremely satisfying to have managed to raise this sum.

Q. How long have you lived in Buckland, and where did you live previously?

A. We've lived here across the road from the church since 1985 and moved from near Sevenoaks in Kent, where I grew up. Our children were two and four when we moved here.

Q. Can you also tell us about your involvement with the church?

A. I was PCC Secretary at All Saints for 20 years until March and have been churchwarden for four years, with responsibility for capital projects and maintenance.

Last year's 750th anniversary reminded us that the building has seen daily life under an amazing 33 monarchs since Edward I in 1273.

Q. If you have any time left after these activities, what are your hobbies - what do you do for fun?

A. I try to cycle up into the Chilterns every day, with a bit of electrical assistance, and recently returned from a five week trip to New Zealand to visit my sister - from the first time my mother married my father! Janet and I often go to the Oxford Playhouse and occasionally to the opera. We also now have three grandchildren, which is wonderful, and love going on holidays with them in this country or the continent. I enjoy playing chess, but at best I am about average.

Q. What's your favourite music?

A. A wide range from folk through pop to classical, including some opera such as Handel or Britten. Music has always played a big part in our life with Janet being a singer, teaching the piano and playing the organ across the road, and my brother being a pianist.

Q. What's your favourite film?

A. The hardest question, because I have so many favourites – most of them emotional. For sheer easy enjoyment I'll choose a Richard Curtis rom-com such as Notting Hill.

Q. What was the first car you owned and what do you drive now?

A. When I was 17 I had a Ford Popular, which became particularly tricky to drive when the steering wheel came off on a trip down to Cornwall; you could either drive up a steep hill or have windscreen wipers – but not both! We now have a Passat Estate but want to move to electric when bi-directional charging comes so that its battery can power the house. We'll then have 100% renewable energy.

Q. What changes to village life (good or bad) have you noticed in recent years?

A. The Buckland Society may have gone, but we still have a good sense of community, with the Buck Pub, Music Under the Stars, church, local WhatsApp groups, Flicks and coffee / produce mornings in the church all thriving.

Q. What changes would you like to see locally?

A. Buckinghamshire Council is currently giving a good impression of wanting to merge Aston Clinton and Buckland with Aylesbury; I'd like to see this trend halted. Buckinghamshire Council should also fulfil its obligation to once again give the bypass a porous, sound-deadening surface, which Carole Paternoster worked so hard to try to achieve.

Q. Do you have a favourite place or building to visit in the village?

A. It has to be Dancersend, from which the views across to Ivinghoe Beacon are outstanding.

Buckland Parish Council has approved our request for a litter bin in the bus layby opposite the Crow's Nest. It is in touch with Buckinghamshire Council about the installation, and we hope to see it in place soon.

During their tour they stayed in Kanchanaburi on the River Kwai, close to "the death railway". Here at the war graves cemetery many thousands of prisoners of war were laid to rest.

These POWs perished under terrible conditions while being forced by the Japanese to construct the Thailand to Burma railway. Robert brought a poppy wreath with him, which was laid at the cenotaph in the cemetery on behalf of the Royal British Legion and u3a. It was a very poignant moment, shared by their fellow travellers, while standing among so many young lives lost.

Buckland Parish Council

Parish Councillors

Sue Gillingham has been a Buckland Parish Councillor for many years, and we thank Sue for all she has done for our parish during that time. She has brought us a wealth of experience, knowledge and support. We send Sue our very best wishes for the future.

We would like to welcome Heather Mckenna to the parish council. She was co-opted at the April meeting. Heather has lived in Buckland Village for over 20 years. She is a great believer in supporting village life and preserving the things that make Buckland a real community, as well as having robust views on external threats such as inappropriate building proposals and other unwanted encroachments on our village.

Thames Water update

Buckland Parish Council presented its petition to Rob Butler MP with 298 signatures in March. This was then delivered to the Houses of Parliament on April 24. The issue can now be looked into by the Business Secretary Penny Mordaunt. To date, Buckland Parish Council has not heard anything back from Thames Water about moving the location of the pumping station.

Precept

Every year, Buckland Parish Council carefully reviews its finances and plans for the forthcoming year. Our parish precept is a tax that is shown in your annual council tax bill and covers any spending the parish council makes, including areas such as street lighting, graveyard maintenance, grass cutting, land etc. Buckland Parish Council has been very

prudent over recent years and continually reviews contracts for services with the aim of trying to deliver services that residents expect within reasonable means. Buckland Parish Council's costs have increased 150% since 2018, 42% in the last 12 months, and our precept has not kept pace with this. With increasing costs, difficult decisions had to be made. In the past we have cut the grass verges through the parish every month. However, due to increased costs this has been reduced to four times throughout the spring/summer months. We will be putting more pressure on Buckinghamshire Council to ensure they carry out their regular cuts.

New Road

Reminder to all residents: New Road is not a public highway. It should only be used by those accessing the village hall or homes on New Road. There has been an increasing number of vehicles using the road as a cut through, particularly at school times, and travelling at speed. This is causing more damage to the road. Buckland Parish Council is looking at ways to prevent use by non-residents.

Parish newsletter

Buckland Parish Council delivered its first newsletter to residents over Easter. We aim to produce this newsletter on a quarterly basis to help keep residents up-to-date with what is happening within the parish. Thank you to everyone who has given us positive feedback on the first copy. Our aim is to send this out as a digital copy and we would ask residents to email *clerk@buckland-pc.govuk* to be added to the mailing list. 
Spring into summer at Discover Bucks Museum



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Fundraising for St Michael's essential repairs

Last year, over a hundred generous donors sponsored me in my 80@80 walks and raised just over £3000 for the much-needed repairs at St Michael's and All Angels church. The photograph shows me with Steve and Pat Rozental before one of those walks.



This year, I'm walking again but in a much simpler way. On Saturday, September 7, I'm going to walk across Bucks from Tring, in Hertfordshire, to Chinnor, in Oxfordshire. I would like you to sponsor me again, or join me and collect sponsorship from your family and friends. You won't have to walk all the way if you don't feel able, as there will be lots of stopping-off and picking-up points on route.

The restoration project has three phases. The first was to remove the two blocks of pews at the back of the church and level the floors where they had been in order to eliminate trip hazards, as we aim to establish a Dementia Café and a Mother and Toddler group. This phase has been completed with funds from the sale of the 11 pews and a generous donation from the Turpin Charity.

Phase two is to carry out essential repairs to the fabric of the church. This includes repairing a buttress, which is holding up the south aisle roof, replacing the worn out lead on the roof with terne-coated steel, which isn't worth stealing, repairing the stonework on the outside of the south aisle, which is crumbling, and re-rendering the east wall with lime mortar where the Victorian cement render fell off in 2022. All this is likely to cost about £300,000.

Once this is completed, we can then go onto Phase three, which is to build an extension containing a disabled-friendly toilet accessible from inside the church and a catering kitchen. As St Michael's is a Grade II* listed building, the extension must be to very exacting standards and it is estimated to cost a further £300,000.

I aim to make my walk family friendly, and if you would like to come and bring the children, there will be certificates and prizes for the children. James Adam

The Anthony Hall

The Anthony Hall is a Grade II listed building that was built as a memorial to Sir Anthony Nathan de Rothschild Bt. by his widow Louisa, who gifted it to the village. The hall is one of a few reminders of Sir Anthony's Aston Clinton estate, the substantial country house that formed its heart having been demolished in 1956 – the only one of the six Rothschild mansions in the area to have suffered that fate.

The Anthony Hall is available to hire for birthday parties, regular classes, family celebrations, meetings and much more. It is a superb space which can seat up to 80 people at tables and a closely seated audience of up to 180.

Hire costs £25.00 per hour, which includes use of the fully equipped kitchen, a small meeting room, toilets, including a disabled toilet, and ample free parking. The hall must be hired for a minimum of four hours for a one-off party, and we do not accept teenage parties or bookings on New Years Eve. We do have a music licence, but we are not licensed to sell alcohol.

Hello fellow gardeners. Hopefully the weather has now warmed up, the constant rain has dissipated, and we are all out in the garden enjoying the summer. Although there is still plenty to do in the garden, don't forget to sit down and enjoy your handiwork with a cup of tea or something stronger; the weeds can wait a few more hours!





Bee and pollinatorfriendly flowers



Our gardens are really important for bees and other pollinating insects, providing them with nectar and pollen as well as nesting habitats. It's good to grow a variety of flowering plants and shrubs to support bees and insects throughout the year - even if it's just a small patch.

Here are some suggestions of the types of flowers that are particularly good for bees and other pollinators:

Single flowers (those with a single row of petals) where you can see the central part of the flower are easy for bees to access the nectar and pollen. For example hardy geraniums, hollyhocks and dahlias.

Purple flowers - apparently bees can see the colour purple more clearly than any other colour: for example, lavender, alliums, buddleja.

Tubular-shaped flowers such as foxgloves, honeysuckle and penstemons are an important food source for long-tongued bees like the bumblebee.

It is also important to have a variety of plants and shrubs that flower at different times of the year, providing flowers all year round if possible to give bees and other insects the best chance. Some bees emerge from hibernation as early as February, while others are still flying in November.

Here are a few examples of early summer perennial plants that are bee-friendly: campanula, hollyhocks, snapdragons, geraniums, thyme, oregano, honesty, potentilla, comfrey.

Decline in the wild and hope for restoration

In our gardens, essential buglife is dwindling. This spring was so cold and followed one of the wettest winters on record. The odd bumble bee ventured out to feast on the winter-flowering honeysuckle and coltsfoot, but spring brought little of the insect activity normally seen and heard in our orchards and gardens. Rosemary particularly hums with bees. This year though, the flowers are numerous, but no bees. I have seen plenty of ladybirds, and there are aphids on some plants and greenfly on roses providing food for birds. But the buzz once heard coming through the garden gate has decreased year on year, so that, at the time of writing, there is silence where there was once life. And life that matters.

When I was a child, we would drive to Cornwall or Wales for our summer holidays. A feature would be the bugs of all shapes and sizes that splattered on the windscreen and front bumper of the car. These trips now take half the time at twice the speed and yet hardly a midge will be caught while driving. Pesticides and mono-culture have achieved their intended industrialised removal of the very means of

natural pollination. The soil itself is poisoned so that the organisms that sustain growth are no longer present. Chemicals that kill, that promote growth, that deter wildlife are heaped on fields and gardens.

Whole areas of garden centres are devoted to products to apply to lawns, paths and plants. I wasn't sure at first if our wild garden would work on a new estate – it has, but all is not well.

It is not just because of the exceptionally wet and cold spring; the diminishing insect population year on year is worrying. I used a paintbrush to pollinate some fruit blossoms this year. And in the sky above, the insecteating swifts no longer arrive in screaming squadrons, a further indication that wildlife is in decline.

It is marvellous to watch the Rising Sun wildflower meadow come into life, and it is projects like this with kinder manual management in gardens, roadsides, parks, and towns and villages that bring hope that nature will be restored. *Katy Todd*


Horticultural Society Show

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
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
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






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
