### A message from Laura Kyrke-Smith MP



It is a pleasure to write my first column for Village Life as the Member of Parliament for Aylesbury. I'm very grateful to everyone who voted for me. For anyone who didn't, I respect that and I am determined to serve you all as best I can. I know it was a close election result!

My first couple of months or so as your MP have been very busy.

There were some formalities that had to be completed in the opening weeks of the new Parliament, including electing the Speaker and the State Opening of Parliament. The King's Speech set out the legislative programme of this Government, and I was pleased to cast my votes in support of the King's Speech, to enable us to get on with the change that we have promised to deliver as quickly as possible.

I was also honoured to give my maiden speech in Parliament in July, in which I talked about the history and the diverse communities of our wonderful constituency and my priorities as your MP. I touched on improving healthcare and education opportunities, the much-needed revival of Aylesbury town centre, supporting small businesses and working with our farmers and rural communities too. I also mentioned the international work that I did prior to the election and my determination to remain a strong voice for people in conflict and crisis globally.

I have since asked several questions in the Commons chamber. I have asked the Leader of the House for a Parliamentary debate on our future house building plans, to ensure that house building is accompanied by the necessary infrastructure and services. Traffic has been terrible of late; a big part of this is the fact that infrastructure development hasn't kept pace with house building.

In the constituency, I've had some great introductory meetings, including with Buckinghamshire Council, Buckinghamshire Business First, and with brilliant charities like Aylesbury Women's Aid.

I had a great time at the Bucks County Show and met with organisations including the Country Land and Business Association and the National Farmers' Union. We had wide-ranging discussions on farming, planning, rural crime, the environment, small businesses, the cost of living, infrastructure and lots more. It was fantastic to hear everyone's feedback and ideas.

I look forward to working with the many great businesses, charities and other organisations in our constituency, as well as Bucks Council, the town and parish councils – including Aston Clinton Parish Council – to deliver the changes that we need to see.

I have met with Buckland Parish Council to discuss their very fair concerns about the proposed Thames Water booster station in the village and have since written to Thames Water to request an update and push the alternative options being proposed. I raised my concerns in an interview with BBC Three Counties Radio and will continue to work with affected residents.

Parliament has now returned and the new Labour Government will be cracking on with a packed legislative agenda. I have voted to bring rail operators gradually into public ownership and met with the Transport Secretary to raise the need for the Aylesbury rail link to Milton Keynes, the challenges with our bus services and the state of our roads.

The Government's plans also include a package of employment reforms and a crackdown on water companies' environmental performance. There will be lots to do in order to deliver the change our country needs.

Nonetheless, I am committed to being an active, visible and responsive constituency MP across all corners of the Aylesbury constituency.

I have held my first surgeries for residents, recruited my support team and am working to set up my constituency office as soon as possible. I am here to listen and to help you.

As I write this in early September, we are enjoying a show of late summer wildflowers, including Chiltern gentians, the county flower of Buckinghamshire. Numbers have recovered at Dancersend Extension after a couple of years when they were rather sparse due to very dry conditions.

Our new pond has retained water all year and is currently a great attraction for at least six different species of dragonfly, a wonderful addition to the previously waterless valley. Livestock have recently arrived to help us deal with some exceptional vegetation growth this summer, so you will find our flock of Hebridean sheep and three Dexter cattle grazing different parts of Dancersend reserve please keep dogs on a short lead when visiting.

Our focus now shifts to recording the autumn specialities, like fungi and plant galls, and beginning the heavy programme of winter management tasks at Dancersend, Aston Clinton Ragpits and College Lake.

At the Ragpits, volunteer warden Phil Townsend plans to hold work sessions on Sundays, October 6 and 20, both 10am-4pm. Please contact him on 01923 353410 or philjtownsend@yahoo.co.uk.

Our Autumn Plant & Produce Market will be held at College Lake on Saturday, October 12 from 11am-1pm. Our programme of monthly Wildlife Talks starts up again in September and you can look forward to Nick Marriner covering *'Conservation and Farming in the Chilterns'* on Tuesday, October 15, and Chloe Bradford taking us on an illustrated tour of *'The Upper Ray – Wildflowers, Waders and Water'* on Tuesday, November 12. The talks take place at the Memorial Hall in Great Missenden (HP16 9AE, free parking) with doors opening at 7pm for refreshments and conversation and the talks starting at 7.30pm. Admission costs £5, including refreshments.

### **Aston Clinton's Paralympian**

Gemma Collis from Aston Clinton has recently returned from Paris, having represented Great Britain at wheelchair fencing in her fourth Paralympics.

In October 2021, Village Life reported on Gemma's achievements at the Covid-postponed Tokyo games and this year she joined the same three colleagues in the GB team.

Gemma took part in the Category A Epée and Sabre disciplines, which were held in the magnificent surroundings of the Grand Palais. Although she missed out on a medal this time, Gemma reached the third round of the repechage in the sabre and the quarter-finals of the epée, where she lost to Amarilla Veres from Hungary.

Preliminary rounds lasted up to a maximum of three minutes or until one of the fencers made five hits. In the knock-out stage it was three 3-minute rounds or the first to 15 hits. In the sabre contest, Gemma actually won one of her bouts 15-0!



Brought up in Aston Clinton, Gemma went to Aston Clinton Junior school and then Aylesbury High School. Growing up, Gemma was very athletic and active in a variety of sports and had aspirations to compete in the London Olympics in 2012. Those dreams were dashed though at the age of 15, when she was diagnosed with Complex Regional Pain Syndrome - a progressive condition causing great pain in her right leg, which meant she had to rely on crutches or a wheelchair.

Determined to continue in sport, Gemma discovered she was eligible to play wheelchair basketball and went on to represent Wales. In 2011, while at University, she was approached by a fencing coach to take up the sport and the very next year she qualified to represent Britain at the London Paralympics, for which she was also a torch bearer. Four years later she again qualified, this time for Rio, and then again in 2021 for Tokyo.

In 2018, just a year after taking the difficult decision to have her right leg amputated below the knee, Gemma won the gold medal at the Wheelchair Fencing World Cup in Montreal, the first British woman to do this. In total,

she has 15 World Cup medals, including three golds. The most recent gold was in Pisa last year. Earlier this year, at the 2024 European Championships, also in Paris, she won silver.

When not fencing, Gemma is a motivational speaker and, as she says, "It's all about focussing on what you can do and not what you can't."

Aside from fencing and motivational speaking, Gemma is the Chair of the Wheelchair Fencing Athletes' Council and also a freelance Assistant Sports Producer with the BBC. She is also an advocate for gender equality and the athlete's voice.

Sponsorship is vital to ensure Gemma can continue in her sport. She has been self-funding since 2013 and any contributions would be greatly appreciated. ### Famous Cars to Return to Aston Hill



Aston Clinton will be a busy place next May, when one hundred year-old cars and motorcycles arrive in the area for a big celebration.

Aston Hill was the scene of some of the country's biggest motorsport hillclimb events from 1904 until 1925, with many notable drivers and motorcycle riders taking part. Most events held there in this period were organised by the Herts County Auto & Aero Club - a club that is still going strong today and forms

part of the organising group for the unique Centenary Event planned for 17 May 2025.

The final hillclimb meeting at Aston Hill took place on 28 February 1925. The following event, scheduled for 16 May 1925, never took place after an accident at nearby Kop Hill caused permits for speed events on public roads to be withdrawn. Hence the date of 17 May 2025 being selected for the Centenary Event.

The Centenary Event will feature cars and motorcycles from the period in a parade from Aston Clinton to the start of Aston Hill, where they will take part in a demonstration run up this famous hill. Many well-known cars from the past have already entered, including three Aston Martins that competed there in the period. This is significant as Lionel Martin named his now famous make of car 'Aston Martin' following his participation and success at the hill. In addition, in the days before the cars go up the hill, there will be an exhibition on the motoring history of Aston Hill.

The demonstration cars and motorcycles will then be displayed in the large show field at the top of the hill, next to the old finish line, surrounded by an array of early vehicles, some being of the same model and year as the early competitors. There will also be a significant gathering of vehicles from invited classic car and motorcycle clubs, along with displays, stalls and refreshments. Tickets for the show will go on sale later this year.

The Aston Hill Centenary Event is being organised in partnership with the Herts County Auto & Aero Club, Vintage Sports Car Club and Aston Clinton Parish Council

### **Aston Clinton Parish Council**



As we wave goodbye to a summer filled with changeable weather, we reflect on a season of fun events attended and enjoyed by many, along with equipment renovations and additions to our park. Following on from our very successful Family Festival in June, a well-attended free play session for Teens was held at the end of August in the park. We welcomed the installation of gym stations to replace the old worn out Trim Trail and between the football seasons, a rounders pitch was marked out and proved popular with all ages.

The most recent addition to the park was the installation of a zipwire in memory of young Dylan Mitchell, which was formally opened on 5 September by Dylan's brother Elliott and his friend Sammy. They 'zipped' through the pink ribbon, supported by Spiderman, who put in an appearance. Dylan's Mum Jess read a short speech to the crowd, which included children from Aston Clinton School and Barnowls Nursery, along with representatives from Turpin's Charity (who had provided funding) and the Parish Council. The zipwire has proved very popular so far with children of all ages!

A free defibrillator training course was held in late August, providing vital instruction on how to use this life-saving piece of equipment. The course was well attended and will hopefully give attendees the confidence they need to use any of the defibrillators in the village in an emergency. On planning matters, August saw a public inquiry into the appeal regarding an application for 93 houses off Brandon Close, which members of both the Parish Council and the public attended over a number of days. Buckinghamshire Council had already refused this application and ACPC was aligned with Bucks Council in defending that refusal. The decision will now be made by the Planning Inspector who has the final say. His report will, we hope, be published in late October.

For the October half-term break, we will be welcoming back the amazing Matthew Garrett with his magic and Punch & Judy shows for a free children's event in the main hall at the Red Kite Pavilion on Wednesday, October 30. There will be two sessions - 10am-12pm and 1pm-3pm. Attendees will need to register beforehand as numbers are limited for each session. The beginning of November brings our thoughts back to Remembrance Sunday and all are welcome to join us at the War Memorial on Sunday, November 10 from about 10.50am for the annual service. Please remember that there will be road closures in place from 10.30-11.30am that morning on London Road at the Weston Road roundabout, the junction with Brook Street, the junctions with Twitchell/ Church Lane and at China Water mini roundabout.

Looking further ahead, we have received exciting news from the North Pole that Santa will be visiting Aston Clinton again this year, closer to Christmas. Further details will be published on our website and on posters around the village at the beginning of December and of course in the next edition of Village Life, so keep an eye out!

Finally, as the clocks go back and we move towards winter, visitors with cars to Aston Clinton park are reminded that the barrier will be closed each day at 9pm and will remain closed until 7am. At present there are no arrangements in place for out-of-hours release, so please keep an eye on the time if you visit the park late in the evening as our park-keeper closes the barrier promptly.

The Rainbows are young, so there's every chance they might not remember me when they grow up, but I

know that they'll remember the good times they had and the skills they learned that will serve them well as they navigate life. Friends of mine often say to me, 'How do you know how to do that?' and I tell them it's because I learned it through Guiding.

Aston Clinton is part of the wider Wendover Division, which also covers Wendover, Halton, Stoke Mandeville and Weston Turville. We have 14 units in total, all run by dedicated volunteers. However, we are desperately short of leaders, many of us running two units each just to keep them going. We need volunteers to step up and help run the units so that as many girls as possible have the opportunity to be a part of Girlguiding.

So, are you a potential volunteer? If you're fun, friendly, good with children and willing to learn then yes, you are! Volunteering benefits you as much as it does the girls. I've learned so much from being a leader and I know for a fact that I've been awarded jobs because I was able to include those skills on my CV. Being completely honest, sometimes it's hard and I go home and wonder why I do this, but then a girl will have a big breakthrough and learn something she's been struggling with, or we'll have a really fun trip out, or a girl that struggles at school will work really hard and achieve her Gold Award and I remember why. ### Council launches on-demand flexible bus service for villages around Aylesbury



Buckinghamshire Council has introduced an on-demand flexible bus service for some villages surrounding Aylesbury – linking them with the town and wider transport connections. This service will better connect the communities of Aston Clinton, Bishopstone, Halton, Hartwell, Hulcott, Stoke Mandeville, Weedon and Weston Turville.

The new service, called *Village Connect: Aylesbury*', started in August and complements the local bus network, providing a service for those who cannot easily access existing bus services or those who prefer to leave their car at home. Passengers can book a journey online in advance, using an app or by telephone. The bus will pick them up at an agreed time and location nearby. Alternatively, the bus can be booked in real time for a pick-up within 30-60 minutes.

The service operates from Monday to Friday between the hours of 6am and 7pm. Journeys will cost between £2.50 and £4.50 with Concessionary Bus Passes accepted for free travel after 9am.

The service is partly funded for 3 years by the Department for Transport's Rural Mobility Fund, with further financial support coming from local developer funding.

Steven Broadbent, Buckinghamshire Council's Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Transport said: "This on-demand flexible bus service will enable better connections into, around and out of the urban centre of Aylesbury and Stoke Mandeville Hospital, as well as supporting onward journeys using other public transport services. The Village Connect service is accessible and user-friendly and provides flexibility to meet users' individual needs. I am pleased that it will enhance the local public transport network and hopefully encourage more people to travel by bus."







### **Buckland and Aston** Clinton Cricket Club

It has been a strange season in many ways for Buckland and Aston Clinton Cricket Club. Perhaps more than any other popular sport, the weather has a big say in conditions for any particular match and also on how many matches you get to play. Our Senior 1st XI has lost more games to the rain than any other season in recent memory, with five out of 18 fixtures cancelled or abandoned. And the same was true for the Colts; a record number of training sessions and games were cancelled - and not all were able to be rescheduled, despite an extended deadline to play them. This all meant that it was hard to get into a rhythm, especially in the first half of the season and it definitely made life harder for our volunteer groundsmen.

In the end, Mike Parsonage's Senior team has comfortably maintained its status in Division 1 of the Four Counties Cricket League. We finished sixth out of 10 teams, winning six and losing seven of our completed fixtures. Our batting was the main reason we didn't challenge towards the top end. We had five batsmen score over 150 league runs but we struggled to get big totals on the board. We have good depth to our line up but consistency and large individual scores eluded us until the last match of the season. Safeer Ahmed's superb unbeaten 109 clinched his place at the top of the run charts with 344 at an average of 34.4. Our bowling has been the stronger suit in 2024, with five players in double digits for wickets. Leading the way has been Max Burgess with 19 (costing 16 apiece), followed by Asrar Muhammad on 18 (average of 19).

Our midweek Senior side, skippered by Liam Smith, comfortably made it to a third Village T20 Finals Day in the four years of the competition. However, the trophy still remains



elusive after we were beaten in our semifinal by Eggington Foresters. Unfortunately, our stand-out performer in the season, Jimi Chialoufas (275 runs in five games, averaging 92 per dismissal) was unable to make Finals Day and he was missed. We were a little under par in all areas in the semi-final and didn't really deserve to progress to the final.

As mentioned in a previous issue of Village Life, we were unable to field a Saturday 2nd team this year, but remain committed to trying to rectify this next year. We were, though, able to play seven matches on Sundays this year to partly compensate for a lack of games for some of our members. In context, we had three last year and even fewer in 2022. The stand-out performer in these matches was Lakmina Gunaratne, with 171 runs at an average of 43 and 11 wickets, costing just 11 apiece.

In overall terms, it was another good year for the club. Our total number of Junior members exceeded 100 for the first time, we continue to make progress to improve our facilities and our beautiful ground remains a lovely place to spend a sunny summer afternoon or evening. #### RSV Vaccinations

From September, we will be offering a new vaccination against RSV (Respiratory syncytial virus) that has been advised for adults aged between 75 and 80 years. Unfortunately, we can't give this vaccination at the same time as a flu vaccination, so will need eligible patients to book a separate appointment - ideally with the vaccines one week apart. Appointments are now available to book via the Ask First app or by contacting the surgery. ### Post-operative wound care update

For some time, we have been providing an unfunded post-operative wound care service for the convenience of our patients, even though the funding to provide this care is actually received by the hospitals. We regret that due to increasing demands on our nursing team and



financial pressures on NHS General Practice overall, we can no longer continue to provide this service for which the hospital receives payment, as continuing to do so compromises our ability to deliver our core General Practice Services.

From 1 September, patients contacting us with wounds or requiring post operative wound care will be signposted back to the hospital which carried out their surgery or to the nearest A & E department.

#### **Pharmacy First**

Did you know that our local pharmacies can help you with lots of common ailments without needing to contact us at the surgery?

If you contact us and you are suitable for the swift pharmacy service, we will offer to refer you, or you can attend the pharmacy yourself, which many patients prefer, as it saves time.

#### Accessing Pharmacy First services

pharmacy directly without the need for referral.

### Nature performs better with humans than machines whatever the weather

This year has been very different; the long cold, wet autumn and spring into early summer seemed endless. It was as if nature had given up. First the insects didn't appear when we needed them as pollinators and the birds suffered because of their diminishing food supply. When things warmed up it was almost too much and the dry late summer brought its own problems. Young trees may not survive because they need so much water in their early years. At the time of writing, the spring flowering bulbs had not arrived, delayed because of the earlier weather conditions. And they are likely to be smaller than we have come to expect.

From the end of August we start to anticipate autumn and shutting down for the winter. The harvest is well on the way and the hedgerows yield their bounty - blackberries, damsons, cherries and plums, fruits we preserve for the larder and on which birds and small mammals rely until the spring.

Last year, the mowing of the new Rising Sun Meadow was done by Clive Latimer and Stewart Todd. The wildflower display was amazing and they moved it again this year, though there was more of it and it was tougher. The seeds were allowed to drop and take hold before the cuttings were taken away. They came across a range of creatures, a bees nest, mice and voles, frogs and toads. After a bare winter it will regrow. Maybe not with the same effect though; this is nature after all.

At Estone Grange, the wildflower strip was cut by trainee scythers under the direction of Nicole from the Chiltern Society. Here the going was good, so much so that they want to return next year. Volunteers came along to help rake up the risings and children played in the clean hay, while making habitat piles for the





frogs, toads and newts who live beside the adjacent watercourse, along with mice and voles and a lively family of wrens and other hedgerow dwelling birds. Having people to do the mowing rather than machines is so much kinder overall.

There have been some stunning wildflower displays in meadows and hedgerows. Over the next few months, we will do the winter jobs, plant bulbs and help nature to hunker down until the spring when life will start all over again.

Wild Estone Grange has a FaceBook page where you can report sightings from nature. This is starting to build a picture of the flora and fauna that live on the estate and fields beyond. While untold disruption was caused by the building of the new houses, careful management of the open spaces, ponds, hedges and trees is creating a beautiful and calm environment for people and wildlife.

# Community Wildbelt – Apply for up to £500 for your nature project

The Chiltern Society's Community WildBelt project, funded by The National Lottery Heritage Fund and the Rothschild Foundation, is creating a lasting and joined-up approach to nature conservation through local people. The project develops and supports individuals, Parish Councils and community groups to take practical and positive action and help nature recovery on their doorsteps.

Key to the success of the Community WildBelt project is facilitating local people to actively care for nature in their own neighbourhood.

The Community WildBelt Small Grant Fund aims to encourage local initiative, engage more people and add to the legacy of stewardship for the natural environment. It recognises that there is a strong desire within local communities to take positive action to improve nature, but they face a wide range of barriers to realising their aims. Often these can be overcome with a small amount of support.

If you or your organisation care passionately about nature in your local area, if you want to protect it and have some ideas on how to get more people involved and you need a small amount of financial support to help get things going, please get in touch. It may be that your project can get started with a small budget or that your larger project is looking for additional funding to make it even stronger.

Marion Mason has recently been elected as Chair of Aston Clinton Parish Council.



### Q. How long have you lived in Aston Clinton?

A. I've lived in AC since 2007 and have seen quite a few changes since then!

#### Q. And how long have you been on the Parish Council?

A. I joined in 2016 and my first task was to work on the emerging AC Neighbourhood Plan as one of the Steering Group.

### Q. What made you want to become a Parish Councillor?

A. Alongside my work and family, I felt that I could spare some time and had a passion to give something back to the community that I lived in, to contribute what I could to help improve our village lives.

### Q. What gives you satisfaction about being a Parish Councillor?

A. I've been involved with

various projects, joined committees to learn more about how the Council (and village) ticks, and whether it's planning matters, facilities, finance or events, there's always something new to learn, or a new skill to develop. To be part of a great team, and to see small ideas turn into big projects, for example the funding and building of the Red Kite Pavilion, the improvements and additions to the equipment in the park, the annual events in the park, the Aston Clinton Neighbourhood Plan, to name a few.

### Q. And what are your aspirations as Chair?

A. In short, to be a good team leader and help make our parish council the best that it can be. To try and bring out the best of our councillors in meetings and encourage everyone to have a say,

no matter how controversial. To encourage good relations with our residents, businesses etc. and to help solve problems where necessary.

### Q. What are the challenges?

A. We have a great team of councillors, each bringing something positive and different to the Council. This sometimes creates passionate opinions, but also generates great ideas and we all work hard to do our best. We are all volunteers, giving our time freely to the community; sometimes public opinion can be harsh and critical and at those times it's important to stay positive, support each other and carry on! ## Q. What is your life outside local government?

### Q. You're a very busy person; how do you relax, what do you do for fun?

A. I am busy, but I wouldn't have it any other way. I love family time, and my love of photography extends beyond work. Walking the footpaths in our lovely countryside is a great way to relax. And when I have the chance, I retreat to a small village in the Eifel in Germany (just like the Chilterns!) and enjoy the wonderful landscape there too.

## Q. What's your favourite music?



It is now possible to search for what is happening in the diary and individual groups have a much clearer indication of meeting frequency, location and timing.

The new site follows much of the National u3a format and has a new address: astonclinton. u3asite.uk. Do take a look and see how easy it is to get specific information on group activity. If you are not yet a member of Aston Clinton u3a, there is full information on how to join. We welcome people to come and try us before joining formally.

In the summer, the Trips group visited Brighton. Although it was quite windy, we were blessed with lovely weather and excellent visibility so that those who ventured up the 'i360 experience' had fantastic panoramic views of the coastline, the Downs and the town. Others saw the Brighton Pavilion and there was shopping in 'The Lanes'. We have more trips coming up (see the website). The next one is to Leicester on Wednesday, October 16 before we consider Christmas lights and market excursions.

The Science and Technology group has recently been to an automated dairy farm near Quainton. That was an eye-opener for many of us who remember early morning and evening milking sessions, getting the cows in to start with, then a hectic milking session before the cows returned to their pasture. Now the automated farms have computer-controlled milking machines and the cows have collars and transducers so that they can activate the machine and get milked when they wish or need to do so, which apparently the cows prefer. I still have my own concern that they are not in big fields, but they benefit from regulated food in the large airy barns and a good life in the dry. ### **Buckland Parish Council**

#### Grass and Verge Cutting

We have mentioned previously the need to carefully assess the expenditure of Buckland Parish Council (BPC). As a council, we took the decision to reduce the number of grass cuts to four times per year. In addition, we are determined to ensure that Buckinghamshire Council carries out the two cuts per year that are expected.

#### Bridleway, Lower Buckland

We have seen increased usage of the Bridleway at Lower Buckland leading to Puttenham. We believe this was caused by development work occurring in Puttenham with Buckinghamshire Council allowing access on a number of occasions for work vehicles to access the site. We have been working closely with residents in Puttenham, Dacorum Borough Council and Buckinghamshire Council to stop vehicles using the bridleway. Dacorum Council has now installed bollards and other preventative measures and Buckinghamshire Council has installed a bollard at the Buckland end.

#### New Road

Residents of New Road in Buckland have seen a large number of vehicles using (bumpy) New Road as a cut through to Aston Clinton. This is happening particularly during school run times. This road is an unadopted highway, meaning it doesn't belong to Buckinghamshire Council or BPC and the cost of any maintenance falls to the residents. Many years ago, this road belonged to the Rothschild family, but despite many searches we have been unable to identify the current owner, if there is one. Please do NOT use this road unless you live there. It is certainly not safe for your car.



#### Community Orchard

BPC continues to work on the Community Orchard in Lower Buckland and wildlife is flourishing. Recent sightings include a large variety of butterflies and crab spiders. Later this year we plan to install three benches and also plant more trees thanks to the generous donation from the Aston Clinton, Drayton Beauchamp and Buckland Horticultural Society. We are also working with The Chiltern Society to improve the area. In August, we carried out our first event with the Society, working to improve the recently planted hedgerow and later in the year, we will be planting further hedging with the Society's help. If you are interested in getting involved with this project, please do get in touch.

### Community Notice boards

At the time of going to print, we are working with Wendover Shed to get our community notice boards refurbished. Wendover Shed is a project which establishes a community workspace in Wendover. Practically-minded people are able to meet, work on joint projects (or their own) and share ideas and experience.

There is access to tools, electricity and, most importantly, a kettle! This is a voluntary group and more information can be found at www.wendovershed.org.uk.

### Tring Hill Junction and Buckland Wharf

Road traffic accidents continue to occur at the junction on Tring Hill and also at Buckland Wharf. BPC is keeping a list of accidents in these locations. This information has been passed to Buckinghamshire Council and we are currently awaiting a response. Please continue to pass any relevant accident information to the Clerk.

### **Bloor Homes Development**

Recently, Buckland Parish Council and two Aston Clinton Parish Councillors met with the developers, Bloor Homes. The purpose of this meeting was for Bloor Homes to share plans with BPC for the development of land for housing on the Lower Icknield Way between Dean Way and Buckland Road. Bloor Homes has put forward this site to Buckinghamshire Council as potential development land for up to 190 homes. Bloor Homes appears to be working on submitting an outline planning application for this site in the not-too-distant future.

BPC and Aston Clinton Parish Council made it clear to Bloor Homes that they will oppose any such plans which are not in line with the Buckland Neighbourhood Plan or the Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (the current planning policy for our area). The increased pressure on local services such as schools, health services and other social infrastructure was also noted.

### Public Inquiry for Appeal APP/ J0405/W/24/3342894 - Land north of Brandon Close, Aston Clinton

BPC spoke at the recent Public Inquiry into the proposed building of 93 homes north of Brandon Close in Aston Clinton. The Parish Council raised issues involving serious negative impacts of the further coalescence between Buckland and Aston Clinton, landscape issues and the very significant negative impact the development would have on the wildlife conservation area at Moat Farm, Buckland.

### Community Broadband

Buckland Village Hall recently had Community Broadband installed by Gigaclear. Gigaclear provided this for use by the community free of charge. It will be available to all users of the hall.



#### Vandalism within Buckland

BPC has received reports of vandalism to parish property within the village. All vandalism is reported to Thames Valley Police. BPC does not tolerate any kind of vandalism to property. Ultimately it comes back to the residents, as all parish funds are provided through Council Tax.

### **Horticultural Society**



We are now into autumn and it's time to think about preparing our gardens for winter and cleaning and putting away tools. It is also time to plan ahead for spring colour in the garden by planting bulbs. There is a great choice available from garden centres or, if you are looking for something more unusual, specialist bulb suppliers from whom you can order online. The Society hopes to have some bulbs for sale at its October meeting (see below).

### **Bulb Planting Tips**

Bulbs are easy to grow and suitable for all kinds of garden - you can plant in drifts, small clumps or in containers and window boxes.

- When buying, look for bulbs that are plump and firm with no sign of mould; give them a light squeeze between finger and thumb to ensure they are not soft - a sure sign of disease.
- · Most prefer a sunny site with good drainage but there are bulbs for shade, such as bluebells, aconites and anemones.
- Bulbs should be planted with tips pointing upwards at a depth three times their height and watered after planting.

- If you have a problem with squirrels or other wildlife digging them up, try protecting them with wire mesh or chicken wire.
- When planting in containers, plant close together for the best show. You can also layer up for a succession of flowers, for example, plant tulips lowest, then daffodils and then crocuses nearest the surface.

### **Bulb suggestions**

The first bulbs we see peeking up are, of course, snowdrops. These can be planted as dry bulbs in the autumn, but are best planted 'in the green' after flowering in spring. Divide any clumps you have then or if you don't have any, maybe talk nicely to any neighbours who do, or watch out for the Society ordering 'in the green' next spring.

Bluebells are also best planted 'in the green'. Ideally, we should be planting the native English bluebell, rather than the larger Spanish variety. The charity Plantlife recommends that you don't grow the Spanish ones if you live near a native bluebell colony to prevent any accidental hybridisation and to protect our native bluebell.

No garden is complete without a show of daffodils, which are a type of narcissus - a genus with thousands of varieties. To see some of these, come along to our Spring Show in April for a fabulous display. You can have a succession of blooms by selecting early flowering varieties such as Tête-à-Tête, February Gold or Ice Follies, followed by later flowering varieties such as Sun Disc and Cheerfulness.

Tulips too can have a succession of flowers from March through to May in colours from white to near black depending on the variety chosen. Crocuses are a symbol of cheerfulness and can be used for container displays, carpeting under trees, studding lawns with

colour and in the border. Iris reticulata are perfect for pots and popular with early bees.

As well as these favourites, why not try something different? Scillas Glory-of-the-snow (Chionodoxa) are early flowering bulbs with pretty blue flowers. Camassia can be blue or white and flower in May, while the later flowering alliums (which have flower heads from three to 20cm in diameter and grow to various heights) appear in May and June. Fritillaries can have small delicate flowers and also dramatic large exotic blooms.

With such a variety, there's something for every garden and preference and the addition of even a few will bring colour, food for pollinating insects and a smile to your face.

Thanks also go to everyone providing the exceptional tea and homemade cakes and a very well stocked plant sale. 




