Encounter on the road to Emmaus

The concluding chapter of Luke's Gospel sees two disciples despondently trudging back to their digs along the Emmaus road, away from the events of the first Easter in Jerusalem.

'We had hoped...' (Luke 24: 21) is the sad sigh of those disappointed in God. The couple had literally and metaphorically turned their backs on putting their hope in God's Messiah, for he had been crucified by the powers that be. Incredible reports of resurrection were too much to take in; hope was gone and so were they.

As Luke's account of Easter unfolds, the good news is that Jesus walks unrecognised with people like these, the weary and confused. In this encounter, he helps them to unpack their hopes and dreams and receive a fresh perspective on life by sharing his explanations of the scriptures - but without, at first, revealing his identity.

At journey's end, Jesus is invited to share a meal with the couple. As he blesses and breaks bread, realisation that they are in the presence of Christ dawns; their hearts are aflame. The encounter quite literally turns this couple around and they race back to Jerusalem, to fellow believers – hope restored, faith rekindled.

I wonder if 'we had hoped...' resonates with you this year? Hoped for a satisfying retirement, a fruitful marriage, a wonderful career, a happy home or a healthy life? Hoped that God might come through, and now you feel that hope crucified?

Easter on the Emmaus road suggests Jesus is closer than you might think - even in your disappointment. He awaits your invitation to share your joys and sorrows with him, to allow him to make sense of life and to receive a fresh revelation that 'It is true! The Lord has risen' (Luke 24: 33). ## Our approach to staff development

Recent changes in Teacher Appraisal guidance prompted us to reflect on our current approach, to staff development. We wanted to create an environment that emphasised a developmental, non-bureaucratic approach, one that truly reflected our vision. Our goal was to ensure that staff felt heard, supported, and empowered to grow. We saw these changes as an opportunity to rethink how we engage with our team.

At Aston Clinton, our approach to performance development is shaped by our core values: Aspire, Care, Succeed. Care is at the heart of everything we do, and we believe that by fostering a culture of growth and support, our staff will not only thrive but will also inspire our children to do the same. We want our staff to aspire to be the best they can be, knowing that in doing so, they will help our pupils reach their full potential. To help us realise this vision, we have worked closely with Leadership Edge, ensuring our approach is both meaningful and effective.

Traditional mid-year performance reviews often focus on assessing progress, identifying shortcomings, and meeting procedural requirements. However, this approach can sometimes feel impersonal, reducing the review

to a checklist exercise rather than a meaningful opportunity for development. By embracing relational practice, we have shifted towards performance development – a term that better reflects our focus on future success rather than past evaluation.

At Aston Clinton, performance development is not limited to formal reviews. Instead, we prioritise frequent, informal conversations that centre on growth, well-being, and professional aspirations. Regular, supportive check-ins enable leaders to acknowledge progress, adapt goals, and celebrate achievements in a way that is flexible, responsive, and empowering.

Relational practice is built on care – listening deeply, valuing each individual, and creating a safe space for honest reflection. Instead of merely evaluating past performance, we use coaching techniques to encourage open dialogue, goal-setting, and self-directed development. This approach recognises that people thrive when they feel heard, respected, and supported.

While performance reviews and coaching serve different purposes, coaching skills can be embedded into performance conversations to make them more meaningful. This includes:

- Allowing staff to lead the agenda and set their own professional goals.
- Practising active, empathetic listening to understand their challenges and aspirations.
- · Asking open-ended questions that encourage deeper reflection.

- Resisting the urge to provide all the answers and instead, empowering staff to find their own solutions.
- Creating intentional pauses to allow for thoughtful responses.

By adopting a coaching-style approach, we send a powerful message: *you matter; your growth matters.* This fosters a culture of care where staff feel encouraged to take ownership of their development, leading to greater motivation and engagement.

A school culture grounded in relational practice does more than enhance performance development – it strengthens the entire organisation. When leaders genuinely care about their staff, it cultivates trust, psychological safety, and a shared sense of purpose. We have seen first-hand that when staff feel valued and supported, they are more likely to take creative risks, embrace challenges, and contribute to a positive learning environment for both colleagues and pupils.

By shifting from a review of past performance to a preview of future possibilities, we can transform performance development into an inspiring, relationship-driven process. And in doing so, we reaffirm a fundamental truth: when people feel genuinely cared for, they thrive.

It was just as well we had extra hands on deck, as there was a lot of litter in and around the village on the surrounding roads, and we collected 39 bags of rubbish over a two hour period. We still need to do more on Upper Icknield Way and Buckland Road as they were particularly bad, so if you're walking those roads frequently and want to help pick up litter, let us know and we can provide you with bags and litter-pickers. It's worth saying that although we organise regular litter-picks, we know there are many people in the village who do this of their own accord, for which we're extremely grateful. However, we'd like to encourage more people to do so. This year's Great British Spring Clean and Great Big School Clean - initiatives of the Keep Britain Tidy campaign - take place from March 21 to April 6 if you want to get involved. Speaking of litter, we will be installing a new

litter bin, purchased with funds from our jazz night last November, on Tring Hill by the bus stop. We hope people will make use of it.

We thank Pat Williams, who has gifted the Society a limited number of unframed prints of the Aston Clinton map which was commissioned by a committee of councillors in 1997 to mark the new millennium. The map was based on the 1997 Ordnance Survey Parish of Aston Clinton map, and enhanced by the artist Myrica Jones, whose amazing drawings, each accompanied by a brief description, depict many of the historic properties and landmarks still seen in the village today.



We've been told that the original idea was that any profit from sales would go towards the repair of the water fountain in London Road after the top had been stolen. Although it took a little while for the work to be done, it was finally completed and thus the original purpose was fulfilled. Pat felt that any future sales should go to other projects for the good of the village and that's why she has given them to our society and the church. We are selling the prints for £10 each and they can be reserved by emailing us at info@astonclintonsociety.org.uk.

We have been contacted by Bucks Council recently regarding the long saga of the old lamp posts on Tring Hill. We have been campaigning for their removal on behalf of the residents whose properties front on to them. The good news from the street-lighting department is that its design engineer has completed the drawings and the schedule of work required. He has also been in touch with his counterparts at Herts County Council to agree asset ownership and detailed proposals for the work. In the first instance, Bucks will be disconnecting and removing the relevant stumps and will also replace certain lanterns, repair cables and fit a new cycle plate. The work is scheduled to start in the new financial year. We look forward to its completion.

A big thank you to the kind-hearted and quick thinking young resident who rushed to help a walker who had slipped and broken her ankle on mud on the RAF Halton airfield

public footpath late last year. Not only did he help to carry her to his house before she was taken to hospital, but he took wood chippings from his own stockpile and put them down on the path in the hope of preventing a repeat accident. We have campaigned for a long time for the RAF to address this problem as it's unacceptable that the public footpath is not maintained to a satisfactory standard and safe enough for residents to use all year round. Hopefully, this might get their attention.

## News from your local nature reserves

As I'm writing, at the meteorological start of spring, our earliest hedgerow blossom, Cherry Plum, has just started to flower, outshining its more common close cousin, Blackthorn, at the moment. By the astronomical first day of spring on March 20, we can expect Blackthorn to be starting to clothe the hedges and scrub blocks with its similar delicate white flowers. By the end of the month, many more wildflowers will be decorating the reserves at Dancersend and Aston Clinton Ragpits, taking advantage of the spring sunshine while it can still reach the ground through the bare canopy of the skeletal trees.

It will be a great time to get out and explore both sites and get your eye in again for the different types of flower that form the basis of the rich ecology and are crucial for those insects braving the still cold mornings to kick off another round of astonishing life cycles. There will be swathes of primroses, especially at Dancersend, probably being visited by remarkably colour-matched Brimstone butterflies and beeflies hovering like miniature hummingbirds. Dotted around, and brightening up any otherwise unoccupied nooks and crannies along woodland edges, will be tiny plants of Wood Sorrel, Barren Strawberry and violets.

Did you realise that you can find four different species of wild violets at this time -Early Dog Violet, Common Dog Violet, Sweet Violet and Hairy Violet? It can be fun to take along a flower book (or the very handy little guide available from the Botanical Society of

Britain & Ireland at https://bsbi.org/wp-content/ uploads/dlm\_uploads/dinkymoira-Violets.pdf) and see if you can find all four, and also learn to recognise some other flowers while the variety actually in bloom is still quite limited!

From around mid-April, much of the woodland at Dancersend will be carpeted with Bluebells, Greater Stitchwort and Yellow Archangel and in the grassy clearings an amazing variety of chalk grassland plants will be starting to show. There are few other sites in the county to rival the two reserves on your doorstep for botanical riches, with over 420 different species of flowering plants, ferns and conifers - enough to ensure something new for each visit!

If you would welcome more help with identifying the plants and animals you see on walks and understanding more about the ecology and management of our reserves, please consider booking for one of our guided reserve visits. Our programme of FREE Introductory Visits and more specialised Guided Field Visits is just being compiled and more details and booking instructions will be on the BBOWT website at www.bbowt.org.uk/events from around mid-April. Otherwise, just come along to our nature reserves and explore on your own, but please keep any dogs on a lead.

There are plenty of other events for both children and family groups coming up at our flagship College Lake Reserve, as you can see in the update from the Learning Team on page 15.

## Wild Estone Grange: A walk with BBOWT's **Community Ecologist**





It wasn't under ideal conditions on February 28, after a long wet autumn and winter. Everywhere, February finished with a deluge, leaving the ground well under water in some places and mud where grass was trodden underfoot, and Estone Grange was no exception. By 10am, fog descended but the date had been set to meet Katie Horgan, the Community Ecologist for Future Nature, BBOWT's wholly owned ecology consultancy.

Katie previously worked on BBOWT's Community team and is familiar with the estate, having supported the Wild Estone Grange project from the start. A condition of the 2016

planning consent was the implementation of the Land Environmental Management Plan. This applies to all larger developments but is rarely implemented and is unlikely to be enforced. "It is commendable that the management company is following the LEMP guidelines. This kind of management will become more common with the legal requirement now for all new developments to meet 10% biodiversity net gain (BNG)," Katie says. "I know it hasn't been easy for the Management Company, but the alternative would have meant next to nothing for nature. What we have here is designated space, managed for wildlife to exist alongside the human residents, something to be celebrated."

Around 25 people came on the visit, all active in their communities, volunteering to make space for nature, some wondering how to set about turning round an open space. It was hoped that they drew inspiration from the morning. Getting down to grass-roots, literally, participants identified a good variety of flowers and grasses in the wildflower meadow. Bird enthusiasts spotted a pair of stonechats and pointed out that nesting had already begun in the big pond among the dense growth. A pair of mallards flew in to claim the old field pond and towards lunchtime, the sun emerged and the birdsong grew louder.

We learned a lot about Aston Clinton that puts it, and Estone Grange in particular, on the ecological map. The following facts are from the MAGIC\* Website:

- There are 2 SSSIs within 2km Aston Clinton Ragpits and Tring Reservoirs
- Priority habitat lowland calcareous grassland at the Ragpits (1.5km away)
- · Priority habitat lowland meadows at Wilstone Reservoir (2km away)
- · Ancient and semi-natural woodland at Dancersend (2km away)
- Deciduous woodlands mostly to the south on London Road (less than 400m away)

- Five traditional orchards less than 1km away in and around Aston Clinton
- Great Crested Newt licence returns show presence less than 1km away along A41
- A veteran Black Poplar tree near Gordon
   Smith Close (there is another on Barker Lane)
- Very near a B-line (insect pathway) that passes over Wendover
- Just outside the Chilterns Important Invertebrate Area (IIA).

Estone Grange is grateful to the Chiltern Society's National Heritage Lottery funded Wildbelt Project for leadership, volunteers and resources that have made it possible to achieve so much.

Wildlife sightings can be reported on the Wild Estone Grange FB site and provide a valuable record of nature on our doorstep.

## **Aston Clinton Parish Council**

With the clocks going forward at the end of March 2025, visitors to the park are advised that our park opening times switch to summer hours, so from April 1, the park will be open between 7am - 10pm each day. New signage to the park is due to be installed within the next couple of months and will clearly show the seasonal times, along with other important information.

Our ANPR parking charges public consultation ran from February 20 - March 2 to gather the views of residents, businesses, sports clubs and more on the proposal for selective charging for vehicles in the park. At the time of writing, although the consultation has concluded, the large number of comments, both online and in-person, have not been correlated and summarised, nor the results discussed by Council. When you read this, all comments made directly to ACPC will have been carefully discussed and considered, and a decision will have been made at the full Council meeting on March 18. Details of the outcome will be published in the minutes of that meeting on our website, on various notice boards around the village and our Facebook page and reported on in a future edition of Village Life.

Looking ahead to our busy events calendar, we are very excited to be working as part of the organising committee for the Aston Hill Centenary event happening on Saturday May 17. Full details can be found on pages 26 /27. Tickets for the Show can be purchased from www.astonhill100.com. Do join in - it's going to be a great event!

Moving ahead, on Saturday, June 14, the AC Family Festival 2025 will take place in the park from 12 noon-6pm. This free community event will include entertainment, attractions, petting zoo, zorbs, food concessions, dog show, auction, raffle and more. Do come along and join us; visit the local craft and community group stalls and support your local community. Timings and more information can be found on our website and, closer to the event, on posters throughout the village and social media. We're looking for volunteers to assist with a variety of activities, including games, event setup and more. We'd be delighted to have your support. These two events form the start of a very busy year in the village, and the Parish Council is pleased to be working alongside St Michael's Church, the Aston Clinton Society, AC School, Pre-School and other community groups in organising complementary events in Aston Clinton.

We continue to work on our Neighbourhood Plan review; it is particularly important that the Plan be updated in accordance with

current national planning legislation to ensure that it will be passed by the local planning authority once submitted. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) which is set by the Government, and to which all local planning authorities must adhere, was changed in December 2024, with one of the most significant changes being to the way in which housing target figures for all councils are calculated. Locally, this means that Bucks Council has to increase its housing target figures by 48% and apportion that housing throughout the county. In addition, the fact that Bucks Council cannot demonstrate a five year housing land supply, means that planning officers and inspectors must find in favour of development applications unless it can be demonstrated that significant harm will be caused by allowing them. Following these changes to the NPPF, it would be reasonable to expect an upturn in the number of speculative planning applications coming our way. However, our councillors are in ongoing discussions with the Bucks Council planning team in order to fully establish what these changes will mean for our parish and, wherever possible, to limit the amount of housing allocated to Aston Clinton. It is worth pointing out that any decisions/comments that we as a council make and submit on planning applications are not final, as the local planning authority, in our case Bucks Council, has the final say.

The planning system, particularly the way in which decisions of central government can affect us in Aston Clinton, is complicated, and for that reason, we are more than happy to help residents gain a better understanding of the implications and procedures either at our regular Planning Committee or Council meetings (dates and details on our website), or contact us separately.

Members of the public are welcome to attend any of our meetings, to get a view on the way that democratic decisions are reached by the Council on a wide range of projects, as well as the day to day running of the Parish Council.

We are delighted to invite all residents to the Annual Parish Meeting at the Red Kite Pavilion, at 6pm on Wednesday, May 21; refreshments will be provided. This is not a council meeting but an opportunity for you to meet representatives from many local community groups and to chat with parish councillors. In addition, Mick Jones, volunteer warden at BBOWT's Dancersend Nature Reserve, has kindly agreed to give a talk on 'Dancersend: 100 years of conservation in our parish'. *Aston Clinton Parish Council*

## A message from Laura Kyrke-Smith MP

I know that buses are vital for residents here in Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp. People depend on buses for getting to work, school, the shops or to see friends and family.



Lots of constituents speak to me about their local services. I know that whilst there are some good services, there are many problems that need addressing as well. My constituents across Aylesbury have for too long put up with unacceptable delays, cancellations and scrapped services, including Arriva's decision to end bus services to Oxford and High Wycombe.

I know in Aston Clinton there are also specific issues with buses (and other vehicles) speeding through the village, which I have raised with the bus companies and I will continue to press them on this.

Since being elected as your MP, I have been pleased with the Government's announcement that it would allocate £6.7m to Buckinghamshire Council to improve bus services, in addition to maintaining a cap on fares. We are moving fast and taking bold steps to deliver better buses for local communities in Buckinghamshire.

#### However, I know there is more to be done.

That's why I have recently launched an online survey to help improve bus services in our area. I want to know your views in order to make a stronger case to Buckinghamshire Council and local bus providers.

The survey will be used to help understand how many residents travel by bus, how satisfied they are with the current service, what improvements can be made to the passenger experience, and how to increase passenger numbers across Aylesbury and the surrounding villages. I would encourage both regular bus users and people who don't use public transport to take part in the survey. I want to understand your experiences of local bus services, so I can push as your MP for better, more accessible public transport for everyone in our community.

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

## We're getting revved up for the Aston Hill **Centenary Celebration!**





Final preparations are now underway for the eagerly anticipated Aston Hill Centenary event in May, when local people will be joined by enthusiasts from all over the country to celebrate the amazing motorsport history of Aston Hill.

To kick off the celebrations, from May 14 to 17, there will be an exhibition on the history of Aston Hill in the Red Kite Pavilion in Aston Clinton Park, open from 9am to 4pm each day. Everyone is welcome, so do come along and learn about the pioneering and exciting events that took place at Aston Hill between 1904 and 1925, when Aston Hill was one of the country's premier motorsport venues.

Then on May 17, we have the main event, the Vintage and Classic Vehicle Show in the grounds of Hill Farm at the top of Aston Hill, which will run until 5pm. All profits from this show will be donated to the event's nominated charities, some great local causes including the

Chilterns Neuro Centre, an organisation that supports people affected by multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's and stroke, and Kirby's Herd, a local group that raises funds for Cancer Research UK.

On display at the show will be approximately 500 vintage and classic vehicles, many of them as part of club displays.

The centrepiece of the show will be 80 very rare cars and motorcycles manufactured over 100 years ago. Five of these cars actually competed at Aston Hill in the early 1920s, with the rest of them being of the same type as those that participated there between 1904 and 1925. These vehicles will first assemble in Aston Clinton Park from 9am on the morning of May 17, before, at 10am, starting the drive from the park, through the village, to the bottom of Aston Hill, which they will then climb to enter the showground.

In addition, we are excited to announce that the Aston Martin Heritage Trust (AMHT) is bringing the famous Aston Martin A3 to display at the show. Manufactured in 1921, this car was the third Aston Martin ever built and is the oldest still in existence. This car is a significant piece of automotive history and rarely leaves the AMHT Museum. Visitors to the show will be able to see A3 close up and talk to experts from the AMHT to find out all about it. Three of the event sponsors - Ecurie Bertelli, Chiltern Aston and Bicester Sports & Classics - will also have some fabulous vintage and classic cars on display, as will a number of the trade stands.

Throughout the day, there will be commentary on the event within the showground, including interviews with owners of period cars and motorcycles as well as with vintage motoring experts. This will give show-goers the opportunity to learn more about the machines that competed at Aston Hill over 100 years ago, and about the history of the hill itself.

As for refreshments, there will be various catering outlets serving a wide range of good quality food and drink throughout the day.

To ensure that all visitors to the show are parked as efficiently as possible, the experienced stewards from the Hellfire Motor Vehicle Club will be supervising the parking in both the display area and the visitor car park. We are very grateful to them for their assistance.

Finally, for those wanting to discover more about the history of Aston Hill before the event in May, a book has recently been published, entitled "The Motorsport History of Aston Hill". This provides an account of the hillclimb events that took place from 1904 to 1925, along with a foreword by Nick Mason CBE, competitor profiles and over 100 photographs, many unpublished previously. People in the Aston Clinton area can purchase the book by emailing astonbill100@gmail.com.

The Aston Hill Centenary is being organised by a partnership including Aston Clinton Parish Council, Vintage Sports-Car Club and Herts County Auto & Aero Club (HCAAC). It is fitting that the HCAAC is involved since it was the club that organised the majority of events at Aston Hill between 1904 and 1925. It is also the third oldest motoring club in the country that is still active.

## New system update

Since January 8, when we started our new system, in which we ask patients to complete an online form via our website www.westongrove.com, for all appointment requests and admin queries, Westongrove has dealt with 13,101 contact forms over a 29 day period.

Of those, 3,291 appointment requests were dealt with urgently by a GP, 1,569 appointment requests were for non-urgent GP appointments and 793 patients were advised to self-care. The remaining contacts included requests for smears, blood tests, private letters, fit note requests to name but a few.

Each site now has a tablet available for patients to use if they do not have a suitable device or access to the internet at home. We ask patients to complete the form themselves, or ask a friend or relative to help, so that our receptionists can be available to assist those who do not have anyone to help them.

Using the online form is also the quickest way to contact us with any admin queries including, but not restricted to:

- Sick/Fit note requests
- Updating your details, including email addresses
- Chasing referrals
- Non-NHS Work
- Online access queries
- NHS app
- Registration queries.

We are also introducing appointment booking links that can be emailed or sent to the patient allowing them to select a date and time that is suitable for them. Please be sure to provide us with your current mobile or email address if you would like to take advantage of this. If this is not for you, we can still call you to make your appointment.

During the same time frame, Westongrove had 26,286 calls, including 99 patients who used our telephone facility to check or cancel an appointment - this meant they did not have to wait on the phone for the receptionist. A further 2,636 used the call-back function, when we call the patient back so that they don't lose their place in the queue or have to wait on the phone for the receptionist to take their call. The average queue time for the patient waiting to be answered was 8min 51sec and, once through to a receptionist, the average call lasted 3min 3sec.

## Mark's Challenge

Not many of us have traumatic experiences at a young age and we may not be aware that friends, neighbours or even relatives live with unimaginable PTSD, the onset of which might be delayed for years. Mark Waller, formerly a Coldstream Guard, is living with PTSD that resulted from his experiences when deployed to support the UN Protection Force in Bosnia in 1992. Thousands of troops were tasked to secure humanitarian aid convoys and in peacekeeping duties and they witnessed horrific atrocities. ## **Buckland Parish Council**

### Traffic in Buckland

In November 2024, BPC carried out a traffic survey along Buckland Road. Two sets of truvelo strips were laid, one just after the Hope Cottages in the 40mph zone and the second within the 30mph zone. The data received shockingly revealed that 48% of vehicles using this road were travelling above the speed limit of 30mph. Residents have also reported that the road has become busier since the installation of traffic calming measures in Aston Clinton. BPC has contacted Buckinghamshire Council for advice on what can be done to help slow the traffic on this road. If you are using the road, please be mindful of the speed limit; the road is used heavily by pedestrians, cyclists and dog walkers and there are many school children who walk along here as well but there are no footpaths for pedestrians to use.

Speeding vehicles also continue to be an issue on Tring Hill both at the junction with the Upper Icknield Way and also at Buckland Wharf. BPC has written once again to Buckinghamshire Council about this and has requested that traffic calming measures be installed. We will update you when we have received a response.

### Littering in Buckland

Over the past few months, we have noticed a large increase in the dumping of rubbish along with drug paraphernalia. Many residents have been kind enough to don thick gloves and take a sack to help clear this and we thank them for their efforts. We would ask everyone to take their litter home with them. We have identified an increase in people visiting the lower part of Buckland for drug use. We have informed Thames Valley Police who have said they will increase the number of drive-bys in the area

but if you notice anything, please report to TVP or let BPC know.

### Hedges, ditches, verges and footpaths

The weather over the last few months has been wet! Buckland Parish Council (BPC) and Buckinghamshire Council (BC) have been mindful of the general appearance of the hedges and verges throughout the Parish. Last year saw an unprecedented amount of rain leading to increased growth on the verges. Unfortunately, Buckinghamshire Council did not cut the grass when scheduled, which also added to problems of overgrowth throughout the Parish. Many local landowners have recently cut their hedges to ensure that they are not overhanging ditches and pathways. It is important to ensure that the ditches are kept clear to avoid blockages and flooding. All landowners and householders are responsible for clearing any verges and ditches that are on their land. If you have any concerns about this, please do get in touch.

Councillors have been working hard to get footpaths, stiles and bridges repaired. Unfortunately this is the responsibility of Buckinghamshire Council and we have been badgering the relevant people to little or no effect. There are some areas that were reported in 2022 that are still awaiting repair. If you are using these facilities while out walking please do take care.

## Green Lane, Burial Ground

Councillors and residents of Buckland have been working with The Chiltern Society to improve Green Lane access to Buckland Burial Ground (this is off Peggs Lane). In October, they spent a few hours clearing the pathway and removing a large amount of dead

hedgerow. The group returned in February and planted new hedging. This project has been completely funded by The Chiltern Society and with the help of volunteers.



### **Buckland Community Orchard**

Over the last couple of months, we have continued our work on the community orchard. BPC would like to thank Aston Clinton, Buckland & Drayton Beauchamp Horticultural Society, the Chiltern Society and Wendover Community Board for donations which, taken together, allowed us to purchase and plant 16 trees, 250 hedge plants for the far side of the orchard, and some wildflower seeds, which will be sown in the coming months. We also thank the Gib Lane Community Fund, which provided funding for both the benches that have been installed and the new kissing gate to allow access to the orchard. All of the funds spent on the Community Orchard have been from grants and not from parish precept.

### Parish Precept

Over the last few months, BPC has been working hard to finance Parish needs. Like many, we have seen our costs rise over the past few years and we strive to ensure that we have the best contracts, offering good value

for money. A large part of the budget is spent on grass cutting throughout the Parish. In addition to this, BPC has to maintain the Burial Ground and other property owned by the Parish Council. As a goodwill gesture, we currently cut the grass in the All Saints' Churchyard. However, owing to financial constraints, we have had to reduce the number of cuts this year to four, instead of two weekly cuts over the Spring/Summer. BPC is working closely with Rev Bottomer to create a Community Group to help with the grass cutting in the Churchyard as well as creating wildflower areas. Other areas of expenditure include the cost of street lighting. We have taken the decision to gradually replace our light bulbs in the street lamps with LED bulbs. Whilst this requires upfront investment, the environmental benefits and the fact that LED bulbs have a longer life make the change worthwhile.

### Parish Council

Many members of Buckland will know that Nigel Hayward has been a member of Buckland Parish Council and also Chair of the Council for many years; he also represented BPC on Buckland Old School Trust. Nigel has decided to step down from both roles within the parish. BPC would like to thank Nigel for all his hard work over many years.

## **Upcoming events:**

## Spring Show on Saturday, April 12

at Aston Clinton School from 2pm. Do come along and admire the beautiful spring flowers, handicrafts, photographs and cookery entered by our talented exhibitors. You can also snap up some bargains on our plant stall and enjoy a delicious slice of cake from the refreshments team. Why not enter something yourself? There are many classes to choose from and sections for novices and children. The proceeds from our raffle will be donated to the charity Lindengate, providing gardening and nature-based activities to improve mental and physical wellbeing. Full details about the show, including the schedule and entry form (last date for entering is Thursday, April 10), can be found on our website at www. astonclintonhorticulturalsociety.co.uk/spring-show.

Monthly talks, which start at 7.30pm in the Anthony Hall, continue with:

Wednesday, April 9 "Bees & Wannabees", a talk by John Catton from the Bumblebee Conservation Trust. We know how important bees are for pollinating crops and wildflowers and this will be a great opportunity to learn more about how we can provide habitats to support these amazing insects.

Wednesday, May 14 "The Chiltern Wildbelt Project", a talk by Amanda Barnicoat, from The Chiltern Society. The project develops and supports individuals, Parish Councils and community groups to take practical action to support nature recovery. We now have a community orchard in Aston Clinton Park with support from this project.



Plant Sale on Saturday, May 10, 10am -1pm, Aston Clinton Park, which is a great opportunity to stock up on vegetable and bedding plants for the Summer and find some new perennials to fill gaps in the borders and refresh your garden. Our selection of tomato plants is second to none! Of course, with longer days and warmer weather, there is lots to do in the garden, so here are some tips for key tasks over the next couple of months.

#### **Borders**

- In April, sow hardy annuals such as marigolds and native wildflowers for summer colour.
- Watch out for the voracious red lily beetle. Avoid pesticides by removing by hand and encouraging wildlife such as birds, frogs, wasps and beetles who will eat the larvae.
- Lift and divide overcrowded spring bulbs.
- Divide established border perennials such as hardy geraniums and sedums.
- In May, plant out summer bedding, but beware of late frosts and wait until after the last one. Pinch out tips to encourage bushy growth.
- Put supports in around perennial clumps such as peonies, delphiniums and phlox.
- Check for birds' nests before pruning shrubs, bushes and trees.

#### Greenhouse

- In April, sow vegetables such as runner and French beans, cucumbers and squash. Growing vegetables can be a great way of getting children interested in gardening and where food comes from. Start hardening off the young plants in May by moving outside during the daytime.
- Clean the glazing to let in as much light as possible. Open doors on warmer days, but remember to close at night.

#### Lawns

- New lawns can be sown and damaged patches repaired.
- When mowing, why not leave some areas uncut to encourage wildlife and wildflowers?

However, with all the new growth, out comes the gardener's foe, the slug! There are over 40 species and although not all eat young plants, controlling their activity is important if you do not want damaged plants. Slugs are most active after dark when it is warm and damp.

To combat them:

- Create habitats for slug eaters. Hedges and trees will attract birds and a pond will bring in frogs and toads.
- Go out after dark and remove slugs. Also check under their favoured cool, dark and damp hiding places during the day.
- Put fabric or mesh underneath pots so slugs cannot get in from underneath.
- Put copper rings around vulnerable plants.
   Other barriers to try include bark, cat litter, sand and coffee grounds. Beer traps can also work.
- Delay planting out seedlings until they are a good size.
- Choose slug resistant plants such as aquilegia, penstemon and euphorbias.
