Mortality swallowed up by life

2 Corinthians 5.4b

A man was taking it easy, lying on the grass and looking up at the clouds. He was identifying shapes when he decided to talk to God.

"God," he said, "how long is a million years?" God answered, "In my frame of reference, it's about a minute."

The man thought for a moment and then asked, "God, how much is a million pounds?" God answered, "Well to ME, it's just a penny." With this, the man thought a moment longer. Finally, he asked, "God, can I have a penny?" God answered, "In a minute."

In his letter to Christians in Greece, Paul, facing his own death, writes of 'mortality being swallowed up by life'. This seems odd because we'd normally say 'mortality is swallowed up by death' for to be mortal is to be subject to death. These two very different frames of reference present us with a paradox.

Paul (a tentmaker by trade) compares his life on earth as living in a tent, temporary and insubstantial in nature. He looks forward to an 'eternal house in heaven' built by God. His confident trust in this future dwelling enables Paul to live well in the present day facing various trials and tribulations.

That's true for all Christians. For now, we're in temporary, fading accommodation with all its limitations and frustrations, where decay and death holds sway. But a day will come when the tent is packed away, the homeward journey is completed and we enter our permanent dwelling place. A day when our mortality is completely swallowed by life.

Christianity presents many paradoxes concerning the past, the present and the future, about life and death and much besides, but to have such a certain hope of a secure future is surely worth every penny we possess. Nick

## **Aston Arrows Racing**

For those of you fortunate enough to be present in Aston Clinton Park for the start of the Aston Hill 100 Celebration procession on May 17, you may have wondered about the group of children who were flagging the cars off. They were in fact Year Six pupils from Aston Clinton School, who belong to a very special club - Aston Arrows Racing.







Aston Arrows Racing has been running for three years and is a wonderful partnership between the school and volunteers from our local community. The project is part of the Greenpower Education Trust, a UK-based charity that enthuses young people about science and engineering by challenging them to design, build and race an electric car.

Each year, a new group of children embark on the challenge of putting together a car framework from a kit before designing and adding the bodywork. They learn how to safely use tools and to understand the mechanics of this simple car. Much consideration is given to the theme of the car each year and the materials that will be used to complete it.

This season, we have used our local history and based our car on the 1922 Aston Martin TT1 'Green Pea' which had its racing debut at

the French Grand Prix in 1922 and at Aston Hill in the same year. At the Aston Hill 100 celebrations, the team were delighted to meet the owners of this wonderful car and be allowed to sit in it! The children researched 'Green Pea', designing the bodywork and including elements of it in their car. They were fortunate to form a partnership with the Automotive Engineering department at the University of Hertfordshire and, through this, learned about computer design and 3D printing which they used to recreate the iconic grill of this Aston Martin. Through visiting the university, the children were given the chance to learn more about how cars work and see what higher education looks like. They also had the opportunity to present our project to the heads of the engineering departments!

The children are taught to drive the car and practise throughout the school year, honing their skills ready for our race meets.

Greenpower runs many meetings across the country and Aston Arrows Racing takes part in two race days each year, ending at Goodwood on the last Sunday in June. This is a fun day out for the team and their families. The children race against up to 100 cars from other schools across the country. They enter drag, slalom and sprint races as well as driving a lap of the course and undertaking a pit stop challenge.

Each year, we have improved on our performance, learning from previous seasons. This year, we came away from both our meetings with many wins and trophies. We could not be prouder of our children and all they have achieved!

Aston Arrows Racing is so much more than building and driving a car. It teaches the children teamwork and independence, it builds confidence, it teaches them about fundraising and blogging, and it is an opportunity for children to apply STEM understanding in a practical way. We also encourage past students to come back and volunteer with us, often for



their Duke of Edinburgh awards. This year, it has been wonderful to be part of the Aston Hill events, learning about and celebrating our local racing history as well as the history of Aston Martin.

As we come to the end of our third season, it only remains for us to dismantle the car and say farewell to our current team members as they head off to their new secondary schools. We are very aware that we would not be able to offer such an exciting experience without our local volunteers who come in week after week to support the children. Special thanks need to go to Mike Stark, Andy Graham and Paul Flower, without whom, Aston Arrows would not be so successful.

This year, the annual S&T away week in May went to north Wales with a visit to the aviation museum at RAF Cosford en route. I have been to the RAF museum previously and I'm very pleased that it was thought by others to be an excellent place to visit with more exhibits than when I visited before. The north Wales part of the trip was blessed with good weather – fortunately before the heatwave. The Snowdon Mountain Railway

gave spectacular views; the summit was clear, displaying the amazing mountain scenery. Summertime is S&T's trips out period and in August they will be visiting Oxford Transport Museum and then we will revert to meetings in the Bowls Club in Aston Clinton Park with a talk on modern Medical scanning in September.

Our recent heatwave has slowed the Walking Netball to actual walking but this is another very active group that welcomes new members on Wednesday lunchtime at Aston Park Tennis Club.

Using the funds raised from our Jazz Night last year, it was great to see a group of men from the village get together to dig in the flower beds in front of our village gates and then another group take on the job of planting them out with plants recommended by the Aston Clinton Horticultural Society. However, this would not have been possible without those who have given up their free time to monitor and care for it. Clearly, nature is doing the heavy lifting in creating such a beautiful space for the community, but the area still needs to be cared for and in the coming few weeks our volunteers will be out to cut the meadow, hopefully employing the traditional method of hand-scything. ## **Aston Clinton Parish** Council

Summer has finally arrived, and a large number of visitors to the annual Aston Clinton Family Festival in the park on June 8 enjoyed some wonderful sunny weather at this free community event.



The annual Family Festival in the park is the event highlight of the year for the parish council, and a huge amount of planning and work goes into making the day run smoothly. This year was no exception. The weather on June 14 was kind to us again, and a large number of visitors made the most of the day, enjoying dance and Zumba demonstrations, fairground rides, vintage cars, Zorbs and slide, animal petting zoo, a fantastic dog show sponsored and run by Carly of Clips Dog Grooming, plus a larger number of community groups and retail stalls than in previous years. The stalls offered crafts, face painting, homemade cakes, books, jewellery and more. Food and drink was available from a wide range of concessions in the park, although the ice cream vendors appeared to have the longest queues of the afternoon.

The community groups also did well with their fundraising activities, ranging from penalty shoot-outs, crockery smash, cakes and other products on sale, raffles and more.

Our charity partner was again local cancer charity Kirby's Herd, who raised an amazing £1300 from the raffle which was well supported with prizes kindly supplied by local businesses, and an auction for a hot air balloon flight. We've listed them all on our thanks banner below.





These events cannot function without volunteers, and apart from the Events Team at the parish council and supporting councillors, we must also thank the following people for their invaluable support. Set-up helpers, Ashley, Chloe, Bryony and Jon who assisted stallholders by unloading cars and setting up gazebos, and managing traffic and car parking until the marshalls arrived. Our park keeper Ken, for keeping the park tidy and helping with setting up. And finally, our grateful thanks to the Wendover & Villages Community Board for a grant to help with the cost of the event.

Once again this year, our very artistic poster competition artists from Aston Clinton School were in action and the prizes for winners, runners-up and a new highly commended category were presented to some of the recipients who were present at the Family Festival. Winners each won an Amazon voucher and a framed copy of their poster.

## **Aston Clinton Parish Council** continued

May and June were busy months for the events team at the parish council.

In May, we welcomed the one-off Aston Hill Centenary event to the park, with an exhibition of the history of Aston Hill during the week running up to The Climb, which saw about 80 pre-1926 vehicles leave the park at timed intervals, recreating the original Hill Climb that was due to take place almost 100 years to the day ago. It was a spectacular sight! The

park was packed with visitors admiring the vintage cars and motorcycles taking part, the roads were lined with spectators catching a glimpse of the vintage parade as it left the park for the climb up to Aston Hill, where they joined the Show at the top. This non-profit event was a great success and has provided two local charities with sizeable donations from the proceeds - the Chilterns Neuro Centre, and local cancer charity Kirby's Herd.

Other events coming up in the next few months include two play sessions in the park on August 11, from 1.30 - 4.00pm - a 'Messy



Imaginative play's ession for younger children up to 12 years, and a teen/pre-teen session for ages 11-16 years – both run at the same time but in different areas of our park. Check out the poster (left) and also our Facebook page and website for further details and a QR code that you'll need to use to book a place on this free event - book early to avoid disappointment as places are limited on both sessions. Following last year's very successful weekend, we will be running the Aston Clinton community groups' Scarecrow Trail again. Planned for Saturday/Sunday, September 27/28, this will run in conjunction with Aston Clinton Churches and the wonderful Reverend Sally, in support of Aylesbury Foodbank, and celebration of Harvest Festival. Look out for posters and more information on this weekend event on our Facebook page and website.

Looking further forward, we're pleased to announce that we will be bringing two Punch and Judy shows to the Red Kite Pavilion during October half-term week. Please check the parish council website for further details and information on how to register for this free event.

Turning away now from events, the parish council has been actively engaging with Buckinghamshire council to conclude the current phase of traffic calming within the village. Additional measures have been added to the original design at no further cost, including the new islands to prevent vehicles driving through the centre of the speed cushions. Residents' feedback has been listened to, including reducing the slope of some of the raised tables to better accommodate wheelchair users. There will be a period of defect remediation, as well as gathering speed data from the highway data strips in place currently, which we're positive will show a much-wanted reduction in speeding.

Future schemes at other locations in the village are reliant on the Woodlands development progressing and will hopefully see preliminary design start in the next 12 months – the parish council aims to be involved from the outset to ensure the budget is used effectively.

In other news, the remainder of London Road (between Weston Road and Lower Icknield Way) and the entirety of both Green End Street and Brook Street, are all scheduled for a full resurface, with London Road anticipated to commence in late July, the latter two being done in October.

We continue to work well with enthusiastic residents, including the Aston Clinton Society, as well as our new Buckinghamshire county councillors to devise an 'idealistic' five-year plan for future capital projects (anything other than small patching and planing) - this is all governed by the Buckinghamshire Highways budget, but we are all keen to see improvements to our infrastructure and will continue to keep pushing for worthwhile projects within Aston Clinton.

As always, we thank residents for their continued patience whilst work is completed and look forward to the positive outcome that the various schemes will bring to the village.

Finally, a word about security – as we write this article, we have been made aware of a spate of thefts from houses and vehicles in various locations around the village. Please make sure that your property is made as secure as possible. Work together with neighbours, perhaps setting up a Neighbourhood Watch scheme, and report all incidents to the Police, supplying any doorbell or camera footage to help make Aston Clinton as uninviting to potential thieves as possible!

## A message from Laura Kyrke-Smith MP

I'm delighted to write for the latest issue of Village Life. This July marks one year since I was elected to serve you as your Member of Parliament for Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp.

You may or may not have voted for me, but I aim to represent you all. I promised to be an accessible and active MP, and I've been out and about across the villages that are part of the constituency, meeting residents and supporting local organisations.

Most recently, I have met with Mr Choudhary, the owner of Aston Clinton Stores and Post Office. He has had issues with unexpected road maintenance works taking place outside the shop and deterring business. The works have also been delayed and ineffective. I am on the case with Buckinghamshire Council.

I have also met with Buckland Parish Council to talk about the speeding and road safety issues on Tring Hill and Buckland

Wharf. I'm worried about the risk to residents - I was caught in the aftermath of an accident there not so long ago. Again, I am following up on this with Buckinghamshire Council.

The issues raised by Aston Clinton, Buckland and Drayton Beauchamp residents have helped inform my work in Parliament, where I've spoken more than 100 times in the last year to raise the issues that matter to you.

For example, I met Jess and Hannah from Aston Clinton, who are doing brilliant work to encourage parents to delay giving their children smartphones. I know from my own kids how hard it is to navigate smartphones and how important these parent-led initiatives are. Off the back of my meeting, I raised this issue in a parliamentary question to the Secretary of State for Science, Innovation and Technology, Peter Kyle MP, who assured me the Government is actively looking at how we can act to keep children safe and benefit their welfare. I will pay close attention to this.

Bus provision is another issue I have acted on. Earlier, this year I launched my Aylesbury constituency bus survey. I wanted to understand your experiences of local bus services, so I could push as your MP for better, more accessible public transport for everyone in our community. A recurring theme among respondents from Aston Clinton was the disappointment felt by many regarding Arriva's decision to cut yet another bus service, the X5.

I wrote to, and subsequently met with, the Red Eagle bus company to see if they could adjust the timetable of their 500 bus service. I'm grateful that they did, boosting the number of services for Aston Clinton. I know there are some ongoing teething issues with the new timetable which Red Eagle are working on and I'm in touch with Aston Clinton residents about this.

Alongside being out and about in the constituency and in Parliament, the breadand-butter work of an MP is answering correspondence from residents and helping them solve issues they're having. Since being elected, I have set up my small and dedicated team from scratch. They help me to reply to the large volume of letters and emails that come my way. We have processed over 7000 enquiries since the election, and I have corresponded with constituents on a wide range of subjects from animal welfare to potholes, HS2 to fly tipping. We have also held five village 'Meet and Greet' in Ivinghoe, Edlesborough, Cheddington, Wing and Bierton, and a 'Meet Your MP' village hall event in Slapton, which provide an informal opportunity to meet with me and discuss issues both local and national.

These are just some of the things I've prioritised in year one. I am always open to feedback and ideas. Let me know what you'd like me to focus on in year two.

## News from your local nature reserves

After last year's very wet spring, the reserve at Aston Clinton Ragpits had a considerable amount of lush vegetation, but that has been tempered by this year's exceptionally hot and dry spell. Despite these extreme weather challenges, the wildflowers, including the orchids, have fared very well. White Helleborines and Greater Butterfly orchids were both impressive and persisted well into June, allowing many visitors to enjoy them growing alongside the mid-summer peaking orchids which include Common Spotted, Chalk Fragrant and Common Twayblade.

As usual, a group of willing volunteers came along in June to help count the orchids. Always a challenging task, but the weather was kind, and we managed to count a total of just under 20,000 flowering orchids (19,045 to be precise). A very good figure, considering the lack of rain, and one which compares very favourably to previous years. We will add more to this number when we count the two species that peak slightly later in the year - the Pyramidal Orchids and the Broad-leaved Helleborines.

A huge thank you to all those who helped with the count. Shortly after BBOWT took on the management of the Ragpits in the early 1980s, there were approximately 1000 orchids counted. It reflects the many hours of hard work by BBOWT staff and countless volunteers that we can trace such an increase in the wealth of biodiversity at this small reserve.

Guided walks so far this year have been wellattended. Participants have been able to see good numbers of early-summer butterflies on

the wing - lots of Marbled Whites, Meadow Browns and Ringlets eagerly nectaring on the abundant Knapweed and Scabious. It remains to be seen how well the late-summer flowers will look. Hopefully if we get some muchneeded rain, we should see a burst of colour from plants such as Marjoram, Wild Basil, Wild Carrot and Wild Thyme.

Please come along and visit your local reserves at the Ragpits and Dancersend, or any of the other wonderful BBOWT reserves in our area. There are further guided visits you can enjoy. On Sunday, August 31, join Mick Jones to explore the amazing variety of wildlife sharing space with the industrial heritage of Dancersend Waterworks. Then on Sunday, October 5, join Phil Townsend at the Ragpits where he hopes to point out some of the special grassland fungi such as waxcaps and pinkgills, as well as a coral fungus or two. You can book for both events on the BBOWT website at www.bbowt.org.uk/events.

There are plenty of other events coming up for both children and family groups at our flagship College Lake Reserve - details on the website. You can also look forward to a fresh season of wildlife-themed illustrated talks organised by the local BBOWT Chilterns Group taking place through the autumn and winter at Great Missenden Memorial Centre. These begin with Jon Mason talking about 'Creating a Wildlife Garden' on Tuesday, September 16, followed by Sarah Hooper from the Environment Agency unpacking the issues around 'Biodiversity Net Gain' on Tuesday, October 21. All are welcome.

## A Gift That Keeps on Giving: The Legacy of Widow Mary Turpin

If you've ever wandered into St Michael and All Angels Church in Aston Clinton, you may have noticed a framed document on the south wall. It's the will of Mary Turpin, a widow who, in 1736, made a remarkable bequest that continues to support the parish nearly 300 years later.

In her will, Mary Turpin left all her freehold and leasehold land within Aston Clinton to Mary Hockley for life, with provision that, should Mary have children, they would inherit the land. However, in the absence of heirs, Mary decreed that the estate should pass to "the poor of Aston Clinton forever," to be managed by the parish's overseers of the poor.

This enduring legacy is still very much alive today. For many years, the rental income from Mary's land helped provide bread for the poor of the parish, traditionally on the Feast of St Michael and the Annunciation of the Virgin Mary. The estate originally included seven and a half acres of land in College Road North - now the site of the Land Rover Jaguar dealership - and allotments in London Road, still owned by the Turpin's Charity.

At the time, Aston Clinton was administered by the Vestry Committee, which appointed the overseers responsible for supporting the village's most vulnerable residents. Interestingly, an identical version of Mary's will - differing only in the name of the village - is displayed in the church at Weston Turville. There, her bequest provided for the poor of that parish under the same conditions, with land including a ten-acre field off New Road, which is still rented out for grazing. It's a rare example of a double legacy written with clear foresight and generosity for both communities.

Mary Turpin, née Mary (surname unknown), was the wife of Thomas Turpin Senior, a Yeoman (landowner) of Halton. They had a son, Thomas, baptised in 1682. This younger Thomas and his wife Deborah had five children between 1708 and 1716.

Thomas Turpin Senior's own will, dated 1702, left all his land in Aston Clinton and Weston Turville to his wife Mary, and then to his kinsman Joseph. He died the following year and was buried in Halton. Curiously, although described as a substantial Yeoman farmer, his will makes no mention of a house. It's possible he was renting a local Palladian-style house owned by an absentee landlord, which stood near Halton church until its sale to Francis Dashwood in 1720. That year Thomas Turpin Junior and Deborah were living in Amersham and arranging for the sale of their crops in Halton.

Mary Turpin died in 1712 and is also buried in Halton. Her husband's will wasn't proven until 1734, two years before it formalised her charitable legacy. One of the signatories on the will was Thomas Turpin, a nephew.

The story takes an unexpected international twist. In 1951, The Cincinnati Enquirer ran a story on Mary Turpin's will, mistakenly implying that there were no longer any poor people in Weston Turville. This prompted a letter to the Weston Turville Parish Council from a director of a charity in Cincinnati, requesting funds to provide bread for their own poor! Quite how the story reached the United States is unclear, but records show that by 1788 a Philip Turpin owned a homestead in that area of Ohio, and there is even a 'Turpin's Wood' on the map, suggesting a possible family connection across the Atlantic.

Today, the Turpin Charity is still active. The Aston Clinton land was sold in 2016, and the proceeds were invested to support those in hardship - whether physical, financial,

or mental – within the parish. The charity also helps fund education, training, and residential accommodation. It also supports village organisations with similar aims.

The trustees of the Turpin Charity include the Rector of St Michael and All Angels, a nominated trustee from the Parish of Cholesbury-cum-St Leonards (in 1736 St. Leonards was part of the parish of Aston Clinton), and three co-opted Aston Clinton residents.

Nearly three centuries later, Mary Turpin's thoughtful bequest continues to enrich not one, but two communities—a legacy of generosity and compassion that still bears fruit today.

The Overseers of the Poor, legally appointed by the said Parish, and their successors shall let, to the best advantage, all the above Estate, and the Rents of the same shall be laid out (deducting for their trouble) in 4d loaves of good wholesome bread, which they shall equally distribute by equal portions, on the Feast of St Michael and the Annunciation of the Virgin Mary."

This Estate came into the possession of the said Parish according to the provisions of the above mentioned Will in 1736.

Nigel Roach and Martin Routley, owners and directors of Smashing Windows.



#### Q. How long have you been involved with Smashing Windows?

A. We started the company now called Smashing Windows as a partnership back in 2003, following an idea that Martin had to replace double glazed window units without changing the frames. Back then, and for the first few years, we were changing around 2000 window units a year, as well as carrying out repairs to dropped doors, broken handles, basically anything that could go wrong with a door or window, we were there.

#### Q. Who are the people behind the business and what services do you provide?

A. Our original strap line was 'Don't change the frames, just change the glass!' However, over the years since, we have expanded into the installation of new doors and windows, as our customers wanted not only to replace ageing systems, but also to create a new look for their property.

Our team has evolved and survived through a global financial meltdown, plus Brexit and also the exceptional period during Covid lockdowns, resulting in our being in better shape going forward. As with all companies, big or small, that success is predominantly down to our team. Charlie Nash is our highly experienced genius of a senior fitter,

who has been with us from almost the beginning and is responsible for the installation side of the business, and Alison Kennie who keeps us all in line, and the administrative wheels turning. Currently our core business is split 60% new windows and doors and 40% replacing misted-up double glazed units. On the repairs side of the business, if it's something we're unable to help with, we always recommend MAK Window and Door Repairs, which is run by Mark, who just happens to be Alison's husband.

# Q. Have you always worked in this industry, where did you start?

A. Nigel trained as an accountant and spent over 20 years in the hotel sector, whilst Martin trained as a specialist motorbike mechanic, balancing that career with his love of professional motorbike racing and taking part in racing himself.

# Q. What are the rewards and challenges of running a local business?

A. We both agree that building something like Smashing Windows has been incredibly satisfying, giving us not only the freedom to be our own bosses and manage our own time, but also to build a company that we are proud of. The challenges are varied and not helped by the complexity of the various compliance issues faced by all companies, such as IT through to legal and employee issues.

## Q. Do you live in Aston Clinton?

A. We both used to live in Aston Clinton, which is where Smashing Windows was created, but now Martin lives in Bedgrove and Nigel over in Wingrave.

## Q. When you're not busy at work, what do you do for fun?

A. We both enjoy taking time out to be with our families, grandkids included. Also meeting up with friends over a beer or eating out. Success is predominantly down to our team.

## St Michael's Tower Outing - 'The Reminiscence Tour'

Saturday, May 31 dawned warm and sunny for our annual bellringers' outing. This is when we spend the day touring the countryside and ringing the bells at local towers. This year, the day was dubbed 'The Reminiscence Tour', as we were due to visit several places where various band members had previously lived and rung in the past.

Our first tower was Chalfont St Giles, a ground-floor ring of eight bells and not too heavy. It was early enough to be cool, with everyone still concentrating fully, so we sounded pretty good! It was a lovely way to start. Next, on to Chalfont St Peter, a nice light six where, with Jeanette in charge, we rang an accomplished touch of Cambridge Minor with an all-female band.

Our third tower of the morning was Denham, set in a pretty village, with old houses full of character and a little stream running through the middle. This was a challenging, slightly heavier ring of eight bells, and some members of the band found their energy levels waning. Luckily we were offered tea and

chocolate digestives to perk us up, served in the ringing room, which was a first for many of us! Janet Stiles took charge as she used to ring here between 1974 and 1979, when these bells were a ground-floor ring (another floor has been added since, and the shorter draft makes things much easier for the ringers). She told a slightly terrifying story of when access to the internal ladder up the tower was accessible from the back of the church, and a couple of youngsters decided to climb up to the bells one day. They somehow dislodged the tenor from its stay, and quite how no one was hurt, or even killed, was a minor miracle!

Next we headed to Hughenden for a picnic in the park. Long-time Aston Clinton ringer Roger Hazell rang here for many years and his ashes are now buried in the churchyard. His partner Liz Mitchell, friend of the band, was able to join us for lunch and it was great to see her. Everyone could quite happily have sat in the sun all afternoon and not bothered with the ringing. We were glad we did, because this eight are an absolutely lovely ring of bells probably the highlight of the day for me. Roger Powell took charge, as he and Sue used to ring



here when they lived locally. The Aston Clinton band also used to ring here relatively frequently when our own augmentation from eight to ten was being completed and the St Michael's bells were out of action. A happy return for those who remembered that time.

Then on to Penn, where Alison Bayley took charge. She and her husband Michael know the bells well having lived in Winchmore Hill and rung here from 1970 to 2022. Alison was tower captain here for over forty years! A ground floor six, we were able to open the door from the ringing room to the sunshine outside, and ringing some challenging London Minor (one of our special methods for the day) was made easier by the promise of tea and flapjack.

A final push for the last tower of the day at Beaconsfield. These bells are a nice eight, and Richard White was in charge. Setting the bells for the final time, he commented, "I've been coming on Aston Clinton ringing outings for decades and I've never been asked to run a tower before. Which goes to show that if you hold on to your dreams for long enough, they just might come true!"

We finished the day with a hearty meal at the Harrow Pub in the Hughenden Valley. Howard Collings joined us for dinner and it was lovely to see him, he's not ringing much at the moment due to a couple of health problems (well, he is in his nineties!). On the way home, driving round Chequers, Alan Frost regaled his car with a story of driving his old traction engine along that road and berries from the overhanging trees dropped onto the engine – apparently by the time he reached the end of his journey the berries had got so hot they had turned to jam!

It was a beautiful, warm and sunny day, full of laughter and reminiscing. We had two dogs and several visitors along for the day, including Richard White (whose family rang, sang and worshipped at Aston Clinton for many years, and who recently paid for the return of the

restored weather vane to our church roof), and Kath Bentley (an ex-member of the band who now lives and rings down in Dorset).

## **Buckland and Aston Clinton Cricket Club**

The first half of the 2025 season has been a busy and largely successful time for the cricket club. It is a very different story from the start of 2024 when we lost much of the first month completely to bad weather. This year to the end of June has been remarkably dry, with only a single weekend of Senior cricket and one Junior match lost to rain. The lack of rain and the recent heatwaves have caused a very different set of issues for our volunteer groundsmen and have made preparation of good quality pitches quite tricky.

On the pitch, the Senior 1st team have been inconsistent and currently sit mid-table in Division 1 of the Four Counties Cricket League, with our batting not really firing (with the notable exception of the perfectly timed run chase at Newport Pagnell), and the bowlers doing their best to compensate for this. After a difficult 2024 when we had to withdraw our 2nd XI from the league, we have happily bounced back so far. Although results again are not quite where we would like them to be (batting again being the weak point), we have had good availability, a great team spirit, and have managed to get a number of current and former members of our Junior teams playing in open age cricket. The Senior midweek team has again reached the T20 Finals Day, and will be looking to finally break our duck in this competition after a series of near misses.

The Junior section has been a hive of activity, with weekly training sessions bringing large numbers of young people to practise and equally large numbers of parents to socialise on a Friday evening while enjoying the bar and BBQ. Our U15s have had fewer games than the others due to drop outs in their division but have so far won two and lost two.



The U13s (an increasing number of whom are stepping up and contributing well to U15 matches) are challenging for their league with a crunch match away to Waddesdon likely to determine the winners. Our U11 team has mainly been filled by Year 5s who are gaining in experience and confidence and will see the benefits of their efforts when they come back as Year 6s to play in the same age group next season.

The All Stars for five to eight year olds has expanded slightly this year, with new Lead Activator Jack getting great support from other new Activators Nic and Shah. Getting kids involved in cricket at a younger age than we used to be able to do has been really important to us and the majority of the Year 5s playing in our U11 team are graduates from our first cohort of All Stars in 2023. Hopefully this pathway will continue strongly in the future too. Phil Samuels

#### Grass Cutting in the Parish

Buckland Parish Council went out to tender in Autumn 2024 to find new grass cutting contractors. Prices varied greatly. Councillors have joined forces with the team at Amersham Town Council who we believe offer best value for money.

### Grass Cutting in All Saints Church Buckland and Buckland Parish Council **Burial Ground**

Buckland Parish Council currently cuts the grass for All Saints churchyard as a gesture of goodwill. Rev Bottomer and the PCC have expressed their gratitude and thanks for this. However, due to financial constraints, BPC are unable to cut the grass every week of the year. Presently we cut the grass for eight cuts over the grass-cutting season (April -September); we will not be cutting the grass in July and August. In the meantime, we are working closely with a community group for the churchyard that has been set up by Rev Bottomer. The group is working on several areas within the churchyard and creating a plan of action which includes creating wildflower areas, bug hotels and other areas of interest.

If you are interested in joining this group, please contact Rev Bottomer on 01296 632488. Last year, volunteers from Buckland Parish and the Chiltern Society worked on Green Lane (access to the Burial Ground) and the BPC burial ground itself. At present there is a large area within the burial ground that is being developed for a wildflower area. Yellow rattle was sown in the autumn, and we are now waiting to sow some wildflower seeds later in the year.

#### Reminder to landowners

A gentle reminder that all landowners are responsible for ditches and hedges on their land and ensuring that the ditches are kept clear to prevent blockages and possible flood damage.

#### Thames Water Update

Members of Buckland Parish Council met with Thames Water representatives in December 2024 and were promised an update at the end of March 2025. As none was received, BPC continued to chase Thames Water regarding this matter, but to no avail. MP for Aylesbury, Laura Kyrke-Smith, kindly chased them up for us a couple of weeks ago. The response received was: As discussed at our meeting during December, there have been some delays to the Hawridge Alleviation of Low Flows project due to challenges associated with the wider scope of the project, including the pipe crossing under HS2. We have now appointed a design partner to progress the feasibility assessment of relocating the water booster station and we are currently waiting for confirmed timescales for the exercise. It is anticipated the assessment will take a few months to complete and there will be some on-site investigations to be undertaken, which will need to be agreed with the landowner. We can provide a further update once a programme for the feasibility

study is confirmed with our design partner. Unfortunately, this does not give us any further insight into timescales or plans etc. Laura has kindly asked Thames Water to provide this information to help keep local stakeholders updated on progress.

## A Milestone for Aston **Clinton Simply Walk**

Our Simply Walk Group passed an impressive milestone on May 29 by welcoming its 10,000th Walker! With a current average of around 30 walkers every week throughout the year, the numbers have soon added up and we were both surprised and delighted to have reached this milestone in what is only our 9th year.



Since the group was first formed on November 10, 2016 under Buckinghamshire council's Walking for Health scheme, it has regularly provided gentle weekly health walks around the villages of Aston Clinton, Buckland, Drayton Beauchamp and Halton, not to mention our monthly excursions to the Reservoirs and Wendover Woods.

We have also recently been able to welcome another new Leader - Clive - who we hope will enjoy many years helping us to provide walks for our local folk.

For those who aren't familiar with the group, Simply Walk provides up to three regular weekly walks in our beautiful countryside for people of all abilities, which promote health and help combat against the negative effects of our increasingly sedentary lifestyles.

· Our 'Short Walk' is ideal for beginners or those recovering from an injury or illness. It lasts up to 60 minutes and is free from stiles, gradients or other obstacles.

- Our 'Long Walk' lasts up to 90 minutes and is ideal for those who have walked before and wish to maintain their current level of fitness.
- Our 'Progression Walks' are slightly more challenging, lasting from 1½ - 2½ hours. They take place on the first Thursday of each month and normally take us up into Wendover Woods. They are primarily designed to help walkers who are looking to progress to one of the shorter walks offered by other walking groups, such as the Ramblers or Chiltern Society. We suggest if you can successfully complete each of our 3 Progression Walks then you should be fine to join one of their shorter walks - and enjoy it!

All our walks are led by qualified Leaders and Backmarkers, so nobody needs fear getting lost or left behind. Membership is free (although voluntary contributions are welcome) and registered members can also enjoy automatic access to around 70 other walks run by similar Simply Walk groups in other towns and villages throughout Buckinghamshire.

Our walks start at 10.30 sharp from the Car Park in Aston Clinton Park (by the Pavilion), just look for the person in the hi-viz jacket. All we ask is that, if it's your first time, please turn up 15 minutes early so we can ensure you end up on the right walk and also please ensure you wear clothing and footwear appropriate to the prevailing weather conditions.

## Wild Estone Grange

Nature continually produces surprises. No more so,

than to find three pyramidal orchids beside the big pond for the first time. This special habitat is now subject to minimum interference, the growth cut back in late summer being the only management necessary to allow wildflowers to thrive. Nature was given a small helping hand early on, together with a little selective "weeding" of uninvited species. Previously, the area was machine mowed very close to the ground, but seeds were harvested first to ensure wildflowers, including some that had been planted by the developer, survived. Last year, due to the long wet summer and autumn, many of the seeds perished in-situ. They either didn't set (lack of insect activity may have contributed) or if they did set, they became mouldy and useless, evident this summer with far less of the stunning purple vetch. Other species have arrived and taken hold. Last November yellow rattle seed was sown across much of the area and this year it has taken. Known as a "meadow-maker", it is a

more vigorous grasses. How different the displays are this year. The wet conditions in 2024 led to enormous growth whilst this summer, the flowers are shorter and thrived in the drought. Their seed has set which bodes well for the future. It has been scythed and the arisings raked up and removed. Organic matter, like grass cuttings, enriches the soil. Wildflowers definitely enjoy poorer conditions. It is also much kinder to the frogs and other creatures that the pond and its environs are home to. It has taken around seven vears to achieve the conditions suitable for a natural meadow where species will come and go, where each year yields surprises that will attract birds, butterflies, moths and dragonflies. All to be celebrated.

Estone Grange can't compete on the orchid count with the 80+ that Alison Beck has in her marvellous wild garden in Aston Clinton. However, action to put nature first, rewild, biodiversity net gain, or whatever it is called, is a global movement to create space for all wildlife to have a chance to survive. Space we humans share and enjoy. Increasingly more of us are doing our bit to leave our parks, gardens and verges not just rough around the edges, but at the centre too.

Encouraging gardeners of the future is important to the Society and our environment and we have been supporting youngsters to develop their skills. For Barn Owls Nursery, we have provided plants, bulbs and seeds for growing and some basic equipment and gardening advice. The staff have now started gardening activities with the very enthusiastic children. Aston Clinton School has Forest School and Outdoor Play and Learning (OPAL) teaching staff. Committee members have engaged with the staff and supported the school with donations of plants, the development of a memorial garden, new flower bed by the entrance, and clearing other areas for planting. We hear that the children have noticed the changes and are excited to care for the plants and see the visiting insects.

Of course, whatever the weather, there are always tasks to be done in the garden.

### Top Tips for August and September:

- Continue to deadhead plants to encourage new flowers, leaving those that produce decorative or bird-friendly seeds and fruits, and those you want to collect seed from.
- Continue to feed tomato, cucumber, pepper and sweetcorn plants.
- Cut out old fruited canes on summer fruiting raspberries and lift and pot up rooted strawberry runners.
- Sow hardy annual seeds like calendula,
   Californian poppy and forget-me-not directly in their flowering positions for early blooms next year.
- Keep ponds and water features topped up, remove debris and clean out, if very overgrown and/or silted up. Net ponds in September to prevent leaves entering.
- Summer prune fruit trees.
- In September, plant out and transplant biennials such as wallflowers and lift, divide and replant congested clumps of perennials, such as achilleas, once they finish flowering
- In September, raise the height of your mower blades as grass growth slows down, and feed your lawn with an autumn fertiliser.
- Gradually reduce houseplant watering in September and consider moving to a lighter position.
- Start planning your Autumn bulb planting and remember to come to our October talk!

### **How Equity Release is Being Used.**



Research from Equity Release lenders suggests more people are using the value within their property to meet their aspirational needs with 20% of new customers are now listing either holidays (11%) or cars (9%) as the primary reason for borrowing. These levels are the highest seen with holidays now the third most popular reason behind home improvements (24%) and paying off debts and mortgages (21%). 


