Restoration of the Organ at St Michael's

AFTER TEN YEARS of fund-raising, we have nearly reached our target of £70,000 to pay for the refurbishment of the organ.

In 1894, the renowned organ-builders, Norman & Beard were commissioned to provide a two-manual organ at a cost of £280 to stand on the site of the present console in the chancel. The action would be pneumatic.

In 1968, at the inspiration of Rev. Dennis Davies, it was decided to move the whole organ to the West end of the church on a gallery built for that purpose. The work was carried out by Messrs Crabbe, a small local organ-builder. Apart from the action, which had to be electric, nothing was changed.

In 1981, in view of the difficulty in accompanying the choir at such a distance, David Jackson proposed that a chancel organ should be situated behind the organist. Roy Bullivant constructed this with three ranks and some extension, and played on the Great manual.

In 2012, the organ being basically 118 years old, things started going wrong: sound boards were cracking; glis-glis (edible dormice) were frequent visitors, chewing away the cork stoppers of some pipes; additional ranks of

pipes had been installed in a haphazard layout and there were difficulties in tuning the far side of the organ, as the tuner had to crawl under the swell-box (and above the bellows) for access.

Peter Collins, our organ builder, has come up with a scheme to correct all this by completely rebuilding the organ with new components, all digitally controlled from the console, together with some extension work. In addition, because of a complete lack of space, he has provided a digital 16ft Principal at the West end, and a digital 16ft Bourdon on the Chancel organ. He has also brightened up the whole façade of the organ, now shown off to best advantage by our new lighting system.


The organ and new lights were dedicated by the Bishop of Oxford at the Candlemas service at St Michael's on 2nd February last.

Local Area Forum helps AC clubs

Wendover Local Area Forum (including Aston Clinton, Buckland, Drayton Beauchamp, Halton and Weston Turville) is open to anyone who lives, works and learns in this area. You are welcome to come along and take part in discussions about local issues.

By attending your Local Area Forum you will benefit from:

- information on Council services and Council policies affecting the local area;
- the opportunity to give your input on issues that affect your neighbourhood;
- a mechanism to have your say on any issue related to Council business;
- an opportunity to put forward your suggestions to your councillors for allocating their Neighbourhood Funds.

The next Wendover Local Area Forum (LAF) is at 7pm on Wednesday 4th April at Weston Turville Village Hall and will include updates on local council and police services and a review of the events taking place in the local area to celebrate the Olympics and Jubilee.

The 'Wendover Decides' project has finished, a project which gave local people a say in how they would allocate £10,000 to LAF's local priority projects. The projects were decided at a meeting of people of all ages. They were projects of benefit to both old and young by supporting local activities, facilities, and services in the Wendover LAF area.

Twelve projects were put forward; these varied from supporting young carers to play equipment for Weston Turville park.

Aston Clinton Parish Council worked with village clubs and put forward three projects:

- Activities and transport for members of Aston Clinton Luncheon and Old Friends Clubs.
- Transport to activities for Aston Clinton Youth Club.
- Support for the Baptist Chapel Youth Café.

Funds were distributed in accordance with the number of votes cast for each project across the whole area, as follows:

Aston Clinton Luncheon
and Old Friends Clubs £891.04
Aston Clinton Youth Club ... £529.35
Aston Clinton Baptist Chapel
with Wendover Youth £2000.50

The Local Area Forum would like to undertake a similar project to Wendover Decides in the new financial year (starting April 2012). This time it would run over a longer time span, be simpler to operate, have wider publicity and, it is to be hoped, greater public participation.

The role of the Local Area Forum is to strengthen local democratic accountability by empowering locally elected councillors to take decisions, shape and influence service delivery and Council priorities in the local community area. Membership includes County, District and Parish Councillors and representatives from the Police, Health Authority and other organisations. Local people are encouraged to participate, and there will be time set aside at each meeting for public questions. *Cllr. Richard Maskell*

As our school grows and it becomes more and more difficult to hold whole school events, we have made a concerted effort to use our house system to ensure there are positive interactions between all the year groups. As children join our school, they are placed into one of four houses. The house names are Birch, Collyer, Griffin and Taylor. They were chosen by the School Council and originate from the war memorials local to our school.

Children earn points for their house within the classroom. They can be for their work, good manners, kindness, perseverance ... in short anything that shows hard work and effort. Just by turning up to school, the children earn house points. The total percentage of children in each house in school each week is converted into bonus house points! This can make all the difference some weeks between first and second place.

This year we expanded the interhouse competitions so that there is a sporting event each half term. The children get points for participation, but also for the final results. Bonus points enable attributes such as sportsmanship to be recognised and celebrated too. We feel the children have benefitted from the opportunity of working with other children from across the school. It was truly delightful to see the year six children running alongside the reception children in the interhouse cross country. They showed themselves to be considerate of the needs of the youngest children and encouraged them all the way around the

course. Recently we had a fitness circuit in the hall where the class order for participation was mixed up so the younger children could watch the older ones before having a go. Once again the older children proved to be fantastic role models.

Last term I was approached by two year-six boys with the idea for an interhouse quiz. This idea was eagerly taken on board as it would allow the children who are less interested in sport to have an opportunity to shine. So after February half term the children in each year group entered a quiz and earned points for their house. The three top scorers for each house were selected to go in to the grand final. Each day for a week in late February the assemblies were taken over by the first Aston Clinton school quiz. Each year group was allocated a day for their Grand Final and the rest of the children sat enthralled as the audience. I saw many children counting the correct answers for their teams as they went along! Each team had a specific time in which to answer questions and the questions covered things from topics they had covered in class to general knowledge. Over the week their scores were added to the accumulating total. On Friday the scores were announced.

These opportunities are so valuable for all children. To be part of a team and develop loyalty, comradeship, perseverance, as well as doing your bit for the team, are important lessons to learn.

Aston Clinton's 2014 Winter Olympics hot prospect

BEN REID from Aston Clinton is 19 years old. He's also an extraordinarily good skier; so good, in fact, that he was picked to open the Men's Senior FIS Tour Slalom at Westondorf, Austria in January. He's on course for his target of representing Great Britain at the 2014 Winter Olympic Games in Russia.

Ben first started skiing at four years old at Hemel Hempstead Dry Ski Slope, and also went on annual skiing holidays with his family. At the age of 12, he decided he

wanted to become a professional Alpine FIS Ski Racer.

His family has set up 'Team Reid', a support organisation to mobilise sponsorship for Ben. With that support, he's already spent three years' full-time training with the best ski coaches in Austria with two years to go before 2014.

Ben is a great role model and an inspiration to the young people of Buckinghamshire to excel in their chosen sport. To complete his final period of training and challenge the

world's best in competition, he needs as much support as possible.

Ben has come to a milestone within his initial 7-year ski racing plan. This season sees the third anniversary of him living in Austria full-time. He has also recently moved from living at the Hotel Kramerwirt into his own apartment giving him more independence and closer access to SportMed and his training slopes. Aston Park Tennis Club

Volunteer: Somebody who works without being paid.

IN 1992 a group of dedicated individuals did exactly that to make possible the formation of Aston Park Tennis Club situated in Aston Clinton Park. Raising the money to construct three courts, obtaining the necessary planning permission, recruiting the support of the Parish Council and the local community may have seemed like a daunting task. Nevertheless, they tackled the problems and overcame all the obstacles to achieve their goal. Twenty years later they would, and should, be proud of their achievement, not only as a result of being able to play tennis themselves but for the many since then who are able to enjoy the game of tennis locally.

The club is still going strong with tennis beginners, and teams in the local leagues. And today, the current team of volunteers face the daunting task of reconstructing the playing surfaces, and updating the facilities to meet demanding modern standards. A lot has already been done. Planning permission is in place, the club is supplying plenty of opportunities for both adult and junior players in coaching and competition. In recognition of these achievements the LTA has recently awarded Clubmark accreditation to the APTC. If you are not aware of Clubmark, it was introduced by Sport England in 2002 and is currently being implemented across thirty-four sports. To obtain Clubmark we have been required to meet core standards in management, policies and procedures, programme and planning. Currently, there are over 900 Clubmark LTA accredited places to play in the UK, with a further 600 working towards the best practice accreditation.

When watching Wimbledon, Olympic tennis this year, or any of the other Grand Slams, one could be forgiven for assuming that tennis is an individual sport and it's true that playing the game, even as part of a league team, is a fairly individual activity.

However, when it comes to administering the sport, a very different picture emerges. Those early volunteers and the current team that runs Aston Park Tennis Club could never have succeeded without an extraordinarily high degree of outstanding teamwork.

Although the club plays all year round, the new season begins on 1st April with the AGM on 18th April. The new committee will follow the example of those volunteers who started it all off in 1992, and continue to provide a warm welcome for anyone who wants to play tennis. The wisdom of crowds

IN 1906 Francis Galton made his discovery of what is known as the wisdom of crowds. He attended a farmers' fair in Plymouth where he was intrigued by a weight-guessing contest. The goal was to guess the weight of an ox when it was butchered and dressed. Around 800 people entered the contest and wrote their guesses on tickets. The person who guessed closest to the butchered weight of the ox won a prize.

After the contest Galton took the tickets away and analysed them. He discovered that the average guess of all the entrants was remarkably close to the actual weight of the butchered ox. In fact it was under by only 1lb for an ox that weighed 1,198 lbs. This collective guess was not only better than the actual winner of the contest but also better than the guesses made by cattle experts at the fair!

Aston Clinton Penny Bank

(from Aston Clinton Parish Magazine April 1884)

Tilla writes: There was an article in the February 1882 Parish Magazine about a Penny Bank which was started in Aston Clinton in November 1881. The Penny Bank was a philanthropic organisation aimed at providing a means of saving for the poor, embodying the Victorian selfhelp ethos at a time of extreme poverty in industrial Britain. Each depositor was given a bank book in which every penny paid in was entered and acknowledged by one of three Trustees. These Trustees were then the depositors in the Post Office Savings Bank and were jointly and severally answerable to the small investors. The extract below is from the April 1884 magazine.

C THE completion of the first cash book in which are recorded all the transactions of the Penny Bank seems a fitting occasion for briefly reviewing the course of business. It is to be understood that the Penny Bank is nothing else than a collecting agency for the Post Office. It receives pennies where the Post Office will not receive less than a shilling, and the Penny Bank agents take the trouble of calling upon the depositors, where the Post Office must of course require them to bring their deposits themselves. In Aston the agents who give their services with ready kindness are the District Visitors, and they render for nothing a service which any Insurance Office would charge as much for as the deposit itself amounts to.

Thus, for instance, for every sixpence put into an Insurance Office which sends agents to collect the premiums, at least five pence must be paid for management and agency. In the Penny Bank the management and agency cost nothing at all. But there is a farther recommendation for the Penny Bank. The

money is quite safe; directly it is received it is paid into the Post Office, and a receipt for it is given by the Rector in the bank book of each depositor. That the money is so invested is vouched for by the Trustees, Lady de Rothschild, Mrs Cyril Flower and the Rector. Of course, except these Trustees and in particular the District Visitor receiving the payments, no one is allowed to know anything of the amount standing in each person's name. The interest is not large (21/2% per annum or six pence in each pound) but is guaranteed by Government and is perfectly safe. The Government does not allow interest on any sum under a pound but the Penny Bank allows it on all sums over ten shillings.

In 1884 the total number of depositors had reached 129. Unfortunately, I have been unable to find any further references to the Penny Bank in Aston Clinton. How long it lasted and what happened to the scheme, I do not know. If anyone does know it would be interesting to hear. – T.A.

indeed both pretty and 'sort-of' rural (at least it will be until Europe's largest Bottling Plant is built at the bottom of the garden). There are a few floral tea dresses in my wardrobe although the ones that get worn are obviously those with a pattern to hide the shiny smears of snot or flying splashes of spaghetti sauce (ergo those that can go in on a 40 degree wash and, if hung up to dry properly, don't need ironing). As for the smiling children? Well, there are four of them now. Oh, and I forgot – the playing happily at my feet

part. Well, they do play. It's just more often than not at the expense of each other's happiness. And my sanity, of course.

As a born-and-bred Londoner, I firmly considered myself to be a city girl through and through. However I recently found myself stranded on Park Lane, on a Sunday morning, unable to get on a bus because I didn't have

BCC Committee meetings now webcast

Aston Clinton Park Trim Trail

THE PARISH COUNCIL has investigated options for a 'Trim Trail' in Aston Clinton Park. Currently the Park has an excellent fenced facility for families with younger children and a skateboard area which is also being developed further. The addition of a Trim Trail would build on these facilities with the intention of encouraging all age groups to undertake exercise while exploring the whole Park. A Trim Trail could be used by the occasional visitor and by the serious exercise enthusiast; but most importantly it should be viewed as a recreational activity that can be used by all age groups to have fun while visiting the Park. If this proposal is supported. the exercise stations will be placed around the perimeter of the Park with a cluster of stations around the existing play facilities to cater for the whole family.

The equipment would be provided by an experienced manufacturer who would install each piece with a station indicator sign showing an explanation of the activity; the Council's preferred manufacturer has an attractive portfolio and a good reputation for the quality of their equipment and after sales service.

Additionally, the company supplies a data board to direct Park visitors around the activities. It is proposed to finance the project through development money available to the village for the improvement of recreation activities.

Having explored the type of equipment available and where it should be erected the Council considered it was appropriate to consult the village community to assess the Trim Trail's viability before committing significant funds to the project and building up to eighteen individual Trim Trail equipment stations. Consequently, the Council would like to invite comment on this proposal to inform a decision on the erection of a Trim Trail in our Park. It was agreed at the Parish Council meeting held in February that efforts should be made for the Parish Council and residents to work in partnership with Arla to ensure that Buckland Village becomes a "Good Neighbour". It was considered that this would be in the interest of all parties.

Street lighting

The Parish Council will ask Bucks County Council if it can review the decision to remove street lighting.

Arla site excavation findings

ARCHAEOLOGISTS have now finished a twelve-week investigation on part of the site of a large milk-processing facility at Aston Clinton being constructed by Arla Foods (UK). When the project is complete, Yorkshire-based Arla Foods will produce one billion litres of milk from British farms every year, creating 700 jobs.

Archaeological works undertaken revealed part of the long history of this part of Aylesbury Vale. The excavation finished at the end of February 2012 and followed archaeological desk-based assessment, geophysical survey and trial trenching to identify areas of activity. Despite terrible weather and ground conditions for most of the excavation, and illegal metal detecting by unknown individuals when the team weren't on site, a fascinating picture of past occupation was identified and painstakingly recorded.



A late Roman burial, c. 250-350AD. The wet conditions from the time of burial onwards have meant much of the body has slumped into the ditch fill into which the grave was cut, whilst his feet sit on the undisturbed natural soils above.

In modern times the two-hectare area of excavation is known as a boggy field. The excavations suggested that it was just as wet 2,000 years ago as it is now, with considerable effort exerted in managing and using the area. Occupation on site started in the late Iron Age and continued into the Roman period. Ditches were the principal means of managing and draining the site and defined enclosed paddocks for livestock. Also present was evidence for cultivation in the late iron Age. A Roman timber post-built structure was also found and investigated.


The main focus of the Iron Age and Roman enclosure ditches occupied a slight ridge of ground between two naturally silted old river channels, clustered around a large pond. The enclosures were repeatedly rebuilt over two or three centuries, as each set of ditches silted up. Quantities of pottery, including high status Samian ware, and animal bone were recovered from the ditch fills. After the site was abandoned, the ridge was further emphasised by the accumulation of rich organic material. This must have been a very visible feature in the landscape as it later defined the medieval parish boundary between Buckland and Aston Clinton. Some of the last occupants of the Roman settlement were buried on the edges of the site and their remains will be reinterred in the Buckland Burial Ground once analysis is complete.

The archaeological investigations were managed on behalf of Arla Foods by Prospect Archaeology Ltd, a consultancy based in Leeds and Lincoln. The works were undertaken by Northamptonshire Archaeology for Buckinghamshire County Council as part of the planning process.
