Christian thoughts on family breakdown

TUTOR once told me: 'the world would be a beautiful place if it wasn't for the people'. Recent research conducted by the OECD has shown that the UK has one of the highest rates of family breakdown in the Western world with more than 25% of children living with one parent. A High Court Judge, Sir Paul Coleridge, who specialises in family law, urges us to tackle the 'destructive scourge' of divorce and family breakdown pointing to the fact that 3.8 million children are caught up in the family justice system each year. He suggested that people need to re-educate themselves about the value of stable relationships for the good of society.

'Relationship' is perhaps the most fundamental need of every human being, expressed in myriads of songs, e.g. All you need is love as much as in the Bible's early statement of Lo Tov – 'it is not good that the human being should be alone'. So why is it that there seem to be so many problems in relationships? Why do so many marriages (and partnerships) break down with all the associated heartache, distress and implications for children? Is a Christian marriage any different from a secular one? This is a vast topic, but here I would like to offer two brief aspects for consideration.

The first is that of unrealistic expectations, encouraged largely through the media and the influence of a powerful celebrity culture.

Sir Paul again:

"... all men and women, glamorous or not, are riddled with the same weaknesses and short-comings which surface even quite soon after the excitement of the wedding has died down' ... 'there is a disconnect between the nature of real long-term relationships and the dramatised and apparently more exciting versions portrayed on screen.' ... 'We all know, all of us who have been in relationships – whether married or unmarried – for a long time ... that the only way that they are made to work and the only way that they become

really qualitatively good is by absolutely grinding away at it.'

So, a good, long-term relationship is hard work indeed. However, when some unrealistic expectations are not met, the conclusion often drawn is that the relationship must be terminated. But - there is always hope and the possibility for change. It is particularly encouraging to hear accounts of amazing transformations where relationships are brought into the life-changing presence of Jesus and individuals experience a complete change in direction. Where two people put Christ at the centre of their relationship and the good of the other above their own selfinterest, a relationship has the potential for a long and fruitful partnership with forgiveness as the key to its continuous flourishing.

The second aspect – the 'nature of marriage' – is discussed by C S Lewis in the chapter on Christian marriage in his book *Mere Christianity*. There is a distinction between the feeling of being in love and marriage as a *contract/promise*. If the former is in place *vows of eternal constancy* follow naturally. The

problem arises when the feeling of being 'in love' seems to have ceased, it is assumed that there is no point of continuing the relationship – in spite of children – because what's the point of two two people staying together who are no longer 'in love'? There are in fact profound reasons why it is very much worthwhile to pursue the 'higher way'.

'Being in love' is a good thing, but it is not the best thing. We cannot make a feeling the basis of our whole life just as much as we cannot expect a thrill in any other department of our life to last forever. To quote C S Lewis:

Christian thoughts on family breakdown, contd.

'Thrills come at the beginning and do not last. The sort of thrill a boy has at the first idea of flying will not go on when he has joined the RAF and is really learning to fly! The thrill you feel on first seeing some delightful place dies away when you really go to live there'.

So ceasing to be *in love* must not mean ceasing *to love*. Love, in this second sense, is:

'a deep unity maintained by the will and strengthened by habit; reinforced (in Christian marriages) by the grace which both partners ask, and receive, from God. They can have this love for each other even at those moments when they do not like each other'. Being 'in love' first moved them to promise fidelity: this quieter love enables them to keep that promise. It is on this love that the engine of marriage runs. Being 'in love' was simply the explosion that started it.'

Those who try to make thrills a regular diet and prolong them artificially will soon discover the law of diminishing returns. Again, we may get the idea from

'novels and plays that 'falling in love' is something quite irresistible, something that happens to us, like measles. And, because they believe this, some couples throw in the sponge and give in when they find themselves attracted by a new acquaintance.'

Christian spouses will seek – apart from exceptional cases – to make a choice that is in keeping with their promise to God and to each other, finding in the process the truth of what Christ meant when he said that a thing 'will not really live unless it first dies' and also that on the road to the quieter love a world of new thrills in many other areas of life may open up.

Every marriage (or partnership) has the potential to be redeemed and transformed where one or both partners turn to God in repentance and faith for the renewal of their life and their marriage (or partnership). This is the hope that Easter has made possible.

A short history of Green Park

HE ancient Manor House of Aston Clinton was situated in what is now known as Green Park. It was surrounded by a moat and apparently part of the bank was still visible when George Lipscomb wrote his *History of Buckinghamshire* in the middle of the 19th century. By then, however, it had become run-down and was no more than a farmhouse.

The estate was purchased by Anthony de Rothschild in 1851 who built a large, square mansion of a Greek Doric design (Aston Clinton House) in place of the old house. On the right of the entrance was a spring called Wellon Head, which by means of a ram pump provided a good supply of water to the house. There was another spring opposite the front of the house which could give 20 gallons of water per minute.



The grounds were developed at this time and consisted of a formal garden adjacent to the house and the more extensive woodland around. This was planted with evergreens which were popular at the time, with many specimen trees, some of which were newly introduced into England. Many paths wound amongst the trees to give a constantly changing view of trees and shrubs and to provide the 'maximum path in the minimum area'. Walking in the garden was the only opportunity many ladies at that time had for fresh air and exercise.

The Rothschilds built a large number of workers' cottages, and two schools and a village hall were set up under their patronage. When the Rothschilds moved to the village there

was already a school, but only for boys. There were 'schools' for teaching children strawplaiting, which was the staple industry in Bucks in those days. These were managed by 'Dames' and held in the rooms of cottages. The Rothschild girls (Constance and Annie) started to help out and asked the Rector to lend them the boys' school on a Saturday. (At that time the boys' school stood on the corner of Church Lane between London Road and the churchyard.) There were a number of eager girls and Lady de Rothschild asked her husband to build a school for girls. However, there was still no school for infants and when Sir Anthony asked his daughter Constance what she would like for her birthday present, she answered 'an infant school' and got it!

On the death of Lady Louise de Rothschild in 1910, Aston Clinton House was bequeathed to her two daughters who shared it as a holiday home.

At the start of the Second World War the house was the Green Park Hotel, but during the War the stables were used by Ekco, an electronics company, as its main HQ and for radar research and development. The main house was used as a hospital for war wounded. It later became a boys' prep school (where Evelyn Waugh began his teaching career as a junior master), followed by a further brief spell as a hotel.

It was demolished in 1956-58 when Buckinghamshire County Council acquired the house and park, with the proviso that it be used for educational purposes. Today the estate is used as a residential training centre. The actual site of the mansion is now occupied by the sports complex and many of the original ornamental features of the extended garden still remain. All that remains of the buildings of the estate are the stables and the lodge.

Speak up!

IN SEPTEMBER 2012, we reintroduced the class assembly into school. With a very packed curriculum, it was something we used to do but struggled to fit in and so it slipped into obscurity. The children obviously enjoyed their theme, their confidence shone through and as a result we, the audience, enjoyed it too.

Class 6HP also had their assembly and they told us about theatre life in Shakespeare's time and re-enacted A Midsummer Night's Dream. (Mr Gove's idea of Key Stage 2 children studying Shakespeare is nothing new as we have been studying Shakespeare with Year 6 for several years now.) They made a very complicated story easy to understand and entertained all who saw it. As with class 4EP, we saw children who are very comfortable on the stage as well as those who were being very brave and speaking up in front of an audience for the first time. Some budding Oscar winners were also evident!

As readers will know, we are still undergoing building work and it is not easy to hold whole school events. Class assemblies were another way for us to invite parents in to school to see what we are doing. Comments from parents show they have enjoyed the experience and been proud of their children having the confidence to stand up and speak in public.

What we can do when we work together

ANY readers will, hopefully, have heard of the annual Chiltern Hills Vintage Vehicle Rally, but I wonder how many of us know how it all started.

The Rally is organised by The Game Club, an Aylesbury area charity that raises money for local worthy causes. The Club started in 1985 when a group of a dozen or so friends decided to meet three times a year for lunch at the Partridge Arms in Aston Clinton. At one of those meetings the landlord invited those present to put some money in a collection box he had been given that morning. Funds were being raised to help finance Diane Coates, a wheelchair-bound patient at Stoke Mandeville Hospital's National Spinal Unit. She hoped to compete in the rifle-shooting event at the Paralympic Games taking place after the 1988 able-bodied Olympics in Seoul.

We asked what the target sum being raised was, and were told it was around £2000 to cover flights, carer's expenses, etc. It was suggested that we raise the lot; this was agreed, and fund raising events such as 24-hour sponsored snooker, a sponsored walk and race nights started immediately. After we had raised the money we decided that we should find a proper title for ourselves to use at the official presentation. The name 'The Game Club' was decided upon, and a partridge was adopted as the club emblem (taken from the Partridge Arms where we enjoyed our lunches).

About three weeks before the event Diane discovered that in order to satisfy the competition rules she needed a special wheelchair costing £1650. It was decided that having got so far we should make every effort to raise this amount as well. We achieved it and literally

The Astons are coming ...

Classic Aston Martins on show at The Hub on Sunday 1 September

HIS year is Aston Martin's centenary. It is 100 years since Lionel Martin and Robert Bamford first registered their company to build cars with a sporting flavour for like-minded enthusiasts. As most residents of Aston Clinton will know, they part-named their new company after the Aston Hill Climb event, where they had built an enviable reputation for developing competitive cars.

Their first vehicles were built in Kensington but they expanded into larger premises at Feltham in Middlesex in 1926. The cars were entered in the major pre-war races and soon



to new levels of racing success with the DB series of cars, culminating in the company winning the World Sports Car Championship

in 1959.

About the same time, the company moved its works to Newport Pagnell. Production of the latest Aston Martins is now based in Oxfordshire but Newport continues as the home of Aston Martin Works Service, where restoration and servicing of the older models is carried out.

The Astons built between 1926 and 1959 are known as the 'Feltham cars' and it is



gained an international reputation in events like Le Mans and the Mille Miglia. But the company was frequently in dire financial straits and shortly after the war was taken over by David Brown. He was a successful engineering magnate with a penchant for fast cars and took the marque



The Arla Dairy-latest news

OST people now accept that the Arla development, just off the A41, near Buckland, is not likely to have the environmental impact at first feared.

Now, with commercial production just months away, the dairy is an impressive sight. In little over a year since the start of building, the monumental scale of the development is very apparent. The view most of us have is what we see from the A41 and the Household Waste and Recycling Centre facing the Arla site.

In February, your Editor had a tour of the partly-finished complex, conducted by Mr Jakob Nielsen, Arla's Aylesbury Dairy Project Director. As his name suggests, Mr Nielsen hails from Scandinavia: Denmark to be precise. Arla Foods itself is a global dairy business co-owned by over 12,000 dairy farmers in Denmark, Sweden, the United Kingdom,

Germany, Belgium and Luxembourg. Its global head office is at Aarhus in Denmark.

History of Arla

The word 'Arla' means 'early' in Swedish and alludes to the time dairy farmers have to begin their day. In 1881 a co-operative dairy was founded in Sweden. Over the following decades many more co-operative dairies were formed. Through the 20th century many of these small co-ops merged until, in 1974, the name Arla was given to the large dairy business that finally

emerged from this process.

In Denmark, much the same went on although the pace of consolidation was slower than in Sweden. In 1999, MD Foods, the biggest dairy co-operative in Denmark, and Arla in Sweden merged to form Arla Foods.

The first decade or so of the 21st century saw a rapid expansion of Arla Foods across

northern Europe and into North America. In 2007 Arla acquired Express Dairies in the UK and Arla Foods UK plc was formed. In 2008 UK dairy farmers were invited to become partowners of Arla Foods UK.

Finally, to bring the story up-to-date, last year Arla and Milk Link, one of the biggest dairy co-operatives in Britan, merged to form the biggest dairy in the UK with milk processing factories across the country. The name Arla is less well known to UK consumers than some of its branded products such as Anchor and Lurpak butter and spreads.

Over the last ten years Arla has established ventures in the Middle East and China and now claims to be a truly global company.

Why Aylesbury?

With its recent rapid UK expansion, Arla faced the need to realise economies of scale if it was

> to retain its competitive edge whilst protecting the interests of its dairy farmers. The Midlands and South-East are where most British people live whereas most UK milk is produced in the West Country. Taking account of the trunk road network, Arla concluded that the Aylesbury area was the best strategic location for what was planned to become the largest fresh milk dairy in Europe, providing a billion litres of milk every year to millions of

people in London and SE England.

As we all remember, when the plans were announced, some of the people in whose 'backyard' this large industrial complex would be built, were understandably up-in-arms. The loss of countryside was seen as desecration. Faced with that loss and fearing traffic chaoswith milk tankers bringing raw milk to the dairy 24/7 plus even more vehicles leaving,

laden with bottled milk – the angry protestors got together to mount a determined campaign to stop the development.

Like most enlightened big companies, Arla understood that to risk alienating their future neighbours was not the best way to do business. The planning application was postponed for many months while Arla sought to address the objections.

A liaison group with residents most closely affected was set up on an ongoing basis. As a result of the consultation process, Arla agreed to change the exterior of the buildings to pastel autumnal colours. They also agreed to provide an all-weather surface to the canal towpath to enable employees to cycle between Aylesbury and the dairy site. Many other changes to the original proposals were made to minimise the visual impact of the complex.

Corporate responsibility

Arla's philosophy for its dairies is that they should be 'lean, mean and green'. That translates to an aspiration that they should be built with simple, functional forms; that they should be operationally efficient, conservative in their

use of energy and that they should seek not to contaminate and pollute the environment. Mr Nielsen told me that Arla's aim for the new dairy is that it will have zero carbon emissions.

I saw for myself how the dairy is designed as a self-contained, integrated unit, or rather a series of inter-connected units. The refrigerated raw milk tankers will arrive from the farms – their raw milk will be pumped into an array of storage silos from which it will go to the purification, grading and bottling hall – a vast space. The bottled milk will be stored in another vast chilled space – bigger than several football pitches – and then allocated by a computerised laser-controlled delivery system to the delivery lorry loading areas on the far side of the dairy. The dairy will have its own energy centre from which and to which heat will be delivered or extracted depending on processing needs.

The Arla Aylesbury dairy will be one of the most modern fresh milk processing facilities in the world. There will be a visitor centre, school visits will be encouraged and importantly, there is the prospect of training and jobs for our young people.

Adjusting to change

None of us is instinctively willing to accept change in what is agreeably familiar to us. We especially value the natural environment and feel almost a sacred duty to protect and preserve what we have enjoyed and pass it on to future generations.

However, change in our environment is unavoidable if our nation is to remain prosperous into the future. What really matters is how we manage change. We have a fair and democratic process for considering proposals to alter the appearance of our surroundings through development. In this instance Arla was required

to make its case why Aston Clinton was the best site for the mega-dairy. Arla also had to show that every possible step would be taken to mitigate its impact on the natural environment. Those most closely affected were free to make their case in opposition. All arguments were heard and a decision was eventually made.

Aylesbury Vale is a large area. It is probable that the Arla dairy, despite its size, will be absorbed into the local landscape which will remain predominantly green and pleasant. The liaison body, set up by Arla and local residents, shows that change can be managed intelligently and sensitively.
