# Village Life

THIS IS A TIME of change and anxiety for Aston Clinton. In January 2014 the government-appointed planning inspector rejected AVDC's Local Plan, mainly because it was considered not to provide for an adequate number of new homes across Aylesbury Vale. Since then, two things have been happening.

The first is that AVDC have been trying to come to an agreed figure for new homes (so far unsuccessfully), taking acount of the growth in demand between now and 2031. The second is that developers, noticing the absence of a current Plan, are rushing to submit planning applications to build hundreds of new homes in and around one of the most desirable villages in the Vale: Aston Clinton.

This apparent stampede threatens to change the character and quality of the village. Already, the large development in Stablebridge Road will be completed soon. Residents are worried that unless something is done to avert it, we will be swamped with huge extra demand on school places and GP services, leading to chaos.

Aston Clinton Parish Council has had an injection of new people and new ideas. Two big ideas are to build a new community centre to replace the old Pavillion and to create a Neighbourhood Plan for Aston Clinton (NHP).

The purpose of our NHP will be to help ensure that our village will continue to be a desirable place to live. You'll be hearing more about both over coming months. On pages 10-13 you can read all about the progress so far with the NHP.

On all the other pages you can read something of the rich tapestry of life in Aston Clinton and its neighbouring villages. From that you'll begin to understand why so many people want to live here.

# My path to priesthood

JUST before the first anniversary of our arrival in the Parish, I was ordained into the Holy Order of Priest in a magnificent and emotional service at All Saints' Church, Chalfont St Peter on 27th June 2015. This was my second ordination, the previous being celebrated last year at Christchurch Cathedral on 5th July 2014, where I was admitted into the Holy Order of Deacon. It sounds a little confusing doesn't it, so please allow me to explain what this all means.

My journey began five years ago when I felt a strong calling to a leadership role in the Church. After talking it through with my local priest, he arranged for me to meet with a Vocations Advisor: the first port of call or rather discernment for what seems quite a long journey. After a couple of meetings with him, I was then referred to a Diocesan Director of Ordinands (DDO for short!). After several meetings with my DDO and lots more discernment,

I was then recommended and sponsored by Bishop Colin of Dorchester to attend a Bishops' Advisory Panel which is how the Church of England selects candidates for ministerial training. On 23rd May 2011 I went away for three days with 15 other candidates sent from all over England to be interviewed by three Bishop's Advisors, two men and one woman with the huge responsibility and task of discerning who they feel is being called by God into the ministry of the Church of England.

Anyway, to cut a long story short, I was selected for training and went onto to train at Ripon Theological College for three years. The process is then very much like any other academic process, where you begin with studying the theory and then move onto the practice. My curacy here in the Benefice is now where I can finally put into practice all that they teach you at college, although there is so much for which they don't prepare you! My first year as a Deacon was a gentle introduction into ministry. It focuses heavily on pastoral

ministry. As a deacon, one can baptize and lead funerals, an important ministry to be alongside people in good times and in sad times.

This second year, now as a Priest, will allow me to participate in more sacramental worship, like presiding at the Eucharist (communion or Lord's Supper) and celebrate weddings, to which I am really looking forward! Although as a Priest, I have more responsibilities, I am well aware that I am still in training and will forever be learning more about us, God's people. I look forward to what God has in store and give thanks for all the love and support my family and I have felt from the whole community here in the Benefice. It has been an amazing journey so far ... Revd. Sally Bottomer

#### GP Corner ...

AT PRESENT if you are signed up for and are using patient online access you can already book appointments, order repeat prescriptions and start your registration process online. If you have not signed up for this or would like more information please ask at reception.

We are currently developing and re-vamping our website which will allow patients to access information and advice on services provided by the GP surgery. It will also advise on the best way to get prescriptions, travel jabs, registrations, insurance forms and a whole host of other services. It will give access to online forms for completion to save you coming to collect them from us, although registrations will still need a final visit to the surgery for verification of identity.

So far in the NHS we have continued to rely largely on face-to-face consultation and the telephone, and very little use has been made of modern media to facilitate self-help and consultation with health professionals. This is all set to change! Alongside developing the new website, Westongrove will be launching an online consultation tool called WebGP in the next few months. With this, patients will be able to access information on about 100 common health conditions, including advice on self-help treatments and what symptoms might indicate a serious problem. WebGP will also give patients the opportunity to consult electronically with a doctor by completing a special form on-line. It is accessible via a computer or a mobile device such a smartphone.

Please keep an eye on the notices in the surgery and our website for the go-live date for the WebGP service.

# The village has a new dentist: Leila Thawley

THIS August I start a new job at Aston Clinton Dental Clinic. A new job is often daunting, filled with first-day trials. Where to go? Where to park? What will the people be like? Not this time.

For me this is a return to the familiar environment of my childhood (or more specifically, teenage) dental practice. To be returning twenty



years later as their newest dentist is both strange and rather wonderful.

I have lived in the village on and off since I was eight years old. My parents, Graham and Marilyn Johnson, have lived on New Road

for 30 years and in 1994 when the practice opened I was studying for my A-levels at Aylesbury High School.

After school I headed into the wild north to study dentistry at Sheffield University. It was certainly a city I loved and the dental students I met on my first day eventually became bridesmaids at my wedding many years later.

In the end I stayed eleven years but began to hanker for home so as I turned thirty in 2007, I came back to the village. # Aston Clinton, Buckland & Drayton Beauchamp Horticultural Society

SUE LIPSCOMB, our Chairman, visited the Chelsea Flower Show in May. This is her report on one garden that caught her imagination: "I always love going to the Chelsea Flower Show, but after visiting the main show gardens (before the crowds build up and I can't see a thing!) and then the magnificent floral marquee of course, I always head for the Artisan Gardens.

This year the one that caught my eye was 'A Trugmaker's Garden', designed by Serena Fremantle and Tina Vallis. It celebrates the



traditional skills of the Sussex trugmakers who produce the iconic willow and sweet chestnut garden trugs that are still made in the region today. This lovely garden won a well-deserved gold medal. It contained some beautiful natural planting and lots of indications of the trugmaker's skill. It was good to know that after the show, many of the plants would be replanted at a children's hospice in Sussex run by the charity Demelza.

#### Our Horticultural Show

We cannot quite match the quality of a Chelsea Flower Show but our Village Show is always of a high standard whether it is in our floral art, flowers (particularly dahlias), or in the vegetable sections. We do not have 'show gardens' but we always have a children's section displaying the skills of the younger members of our village. Our show is a traditional village show and fete similar to many others that have been put on all over the country for many years. In its present form our show has been going for over 50 years, in fact this will be our 58th and will take place during the summer holidays on the third Saturday in August. We do not have Gold medals but we have plenty of cups, medals and rosettes to compete for in every section, so please come along and see what the village can do or better still - enter a class. There is something for everyone. Our website www.astonclintonhorticulturalsociety.co.uk has the full schedule. Printed copies are available from Maureen Ridler and Ralph Weston (01296 630456).

The Show and Fete will take place in the Old Clock School and on the playground on Saturday 15th August at 2pm. Entry night is on Wednesday 12th August in the Anthony Hall from 6 to 7.45pm. Most of the classes are similar to last year, however the schedule should be consulted for detailed changes. This year, the adult photographic subject is 'Clouds' and the children's is 'Animal(s)'. The main floral art subject is 'A Day at the Seaside'.

Entry to the Show & fete is just £1 and free to children. There will be a range of traditional stalls and side shows such as tombola, cake and produce stall, plant stall, books, raffle and teas to help defray costs. A number of local charities have been invited, including St Michael's Church, Royal British Legion, WI and RNLI. Rosemary and Graham Brown will also be bringing their plants. We will again be enter-

tained by the Great Horwood Silver Band who will play throughout the afternoon.

As always, on the Friday afternoon we need additional support to set up the show, to help man the stalls and to help clear up afterwards as we have to be clear of the school that evening. If you can help, even in a small way, please contact Maureen Ridler or Frances Farley.

Apart from the shows, the Society provides monthly talks and occasional visits to gardens. Recent talks have included one on Home Composting and a photographic journey through Cornwall with John Cornwall. In June we also had an evening Garden Visit to Montana, Shire Lane, Cholesbury, and in July we visited the RHS garden at Hyde Hall in Essex. There are no talks in August but they start again on Wednesday 9th September with a talk about wildlife around Milton Keynes amusingly titled Orchids and Owls – not Concrete Cows. Visitors are always welcome but there is a charge of £2 to non-members. We meet at the Anthony Hall at 8pm.

Our website is continually being updated and includes advice and guidance, gardens to visit as well as our latest programme of events.

We are always looking for new members, so

# Neighbourhood Plan to launch in September

PREPARATIONS are now well underway to create Aston Clinton Neighbourhood Plan (ACNHP). Our Parish Council has been preoccupied in recent years with other matters in its own immediate neighbourhood. This may have contributed to a delay in starting the process needed to develop a Neighbourhood Plan for Aston Clinton.

Now we have a new Parish Council eager to make up lost ground. Under the rules laid down by the Localism Act 2011, a parish or town council may set up a Steering Group to manage the process leading to a Plan being approved in a local referendum. The Steering Group should comprise some councillors but also volunteers representing the wider community.

The Steering Group is guided through the plan development by professional consultants whose fees are partially offset by a government grant.

The present membership of the ACNHP Steering Group is set out below. Its first task is to consult with local people, businesses and other interest groups to find out how they wish to see the future of the village unfold.

The consultation process begins in earnest with the Launch Event at the Anthony Hall on Friday/Saturday, 4th and 5th September (see page 13). At this event, information panels

Regular meetings of the Support Group are held to monitor progress of a Project Plan agreed in advance with professional consultants. will describe how a Neighbourhood Plan (NP) can benefit a local community and what can be included, such as:

- The extent and location of new housing development in its area.
- · The design of buildings.
- Designation of sites for commercial and business development.
- · Transport and access issues.
- Development of schools, health centres and other community facilities.
- Protection and creation of open space, parks, allotments, play areas and the planting of trees.
  - Protection of important buildings and historic assets, e.g. archaeological remains.
  - Promotion of renewable energy projects such as solar energy and wind turbines.

The entire process leading to an ACNHP being approved and in place is prescribed by the government and takes about 18 months, so if we are successful our Plan will not be effective until early 2017. You may well ask: "Isn't this all too late, given the plethora of planning applications being filed with AVDC Planning?" The answer is that an ACNHP cannot have an impact on planning applications already approved or about to be appproved. However, AVDC Planning Committee will become aware of the opinions and views of our community as the Steering Group publishes the results of ongoing consultations with all sections of the public, culminating in the final plan which would be put to a local referendum around the beginning of 2017.

Many hundreds of parishes throughout the UK already have or are in the process of creating their own Neighbourhood Plans. Late though we are, the Steering Group believe that Aston Clinton will still benefit from having one.

# What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

An answer to that question was outlined in an article in the April/May issue of Village Life. For the convenience of readers, extracts are reproduced below. Our Neighbourhood Plan will be based on what residents say about how Aston Clinton should develop over coming decades.

OUR VILLAGE has many enviable attractions, valued both by long-established residents and newcomers alike. Aston Clinton is a calm and peaceful place in a beautiful setting below the Chiltern Hills. Ask yourself why Sir Anthony de Rothschild chose to build his country house here.

The last 50 years or so have seen the change from a centuries-old, largely self-sustaining village to a mixed community of established families finding themselves sharing their village with increasing numbers of relative newcomers. You will have noticed that there has been consternation recently over the apparent tidal wave of planning approvals for large numbers of new homes to be built in and around Aston Clinton. This surge of applications has followed the failure of AVDC's new Local Plan, a framework against which new developments are judged. AVDC's local plan failed to gain ministerial approval because it did not provide for enough new homes. Concerned people believe that Aston Clinton needs its own Neighbourhood Plan (NHP), now permitted under the Localism Act 2011.

Under the new rules, local communities have the right to shape development in their areas through Neighbourhood Plans which, when accepted by the Local Planning Authority (in our case AVDC), will form part of the planning policy for the Vale. Winslow, a few miles to the north of us, was the first community in Buckinghamshire to adopt a Neighbourhood Plan. You can download a

copy of the Winslow Neighbourhood Plan by googling those three words. You will see that the process of producing an Aston Clinton Neighbourhood Plan will involve a lot of work, only possible with the active support of the parish council, local residents, and a small team of committed volunteers, assisted by consultants. Grants are available to help pay for professional consultancy fees.

The process starts with an application to the Local Planning Authority (in our case AVDC), defining the area to be covered by our Plan. This is followed by a period of public consultation followed by the preparation of a detailed plan setting out a vision of the future of Aston Clinton, reflecting an informed consensus of what the whole community wants to see. The plan would be based partly on the results of questionnaires sent out to all residents and partly on the conclusions reached from positive engagement with the entire community throughout the process. The final Plan would be subject to approval by a majority of those voting in a local referendum on the subject.

Those of us with a concern for the future of Aston Clinton need to think carefully about how we would like to see our village develop and change over coming years, given that 'no change' is not an option in a changing world.

## Progress to date with the ACNHP

TECHNICALLY, Aston Clinton Neighbourhood Plan is an initiative of the Parish Council. The Steering Group (SG) currently comprises six people, only two of whom are councillors. The intention is that a majority of SG members should be residents, not councillors.

The ACNHP will be based on what residents want the future of Aston Clinton to be like, given that change is inevitable. The process leading to a full-blown Neighbourhood Plan is very strictly controlled by law and involves extensive consultations with all sections of the community including households, businesses, school, clubs and other local organisations. The feedback from all those consultations will form the basis of a questionnaire which will be delivered to every home and business in Aston Clinton. From those results, a Neighbourhood Plan will be prepared which, after statutory examination by an independent expert, will then be put to a local referendum. If passed, AVDC will be bound to take it into account when deciding all future planning applications within the area of Aston Clinton civil parish.

The process started in the early spring with the official registration with AVDC of our intention to develop a Neighbourhood Plan for Aston Clinton. This was followed by the appointment of professional consultants (partly paid for by grants) to guide us through the intricacies of the process. So far the Steering Group has had around a dozen meetings leading up to the Public Consultation Launch at the Anthony Hall on the 4th and 5th September.

#### **Public Consultation**

These are the sort of questions that we need your responses to:

- How important do you think new housing development is?
- · What kind of housing should we prioritise?
- · Do we need more cycle paths and footpaths?

- Where should future housing development be located?
- How concerned are we on the impact of new housing development on school places?
- Have you or any member of your family (even if they now live elsewhere) had a problem finding suitable living accommodation within the parish?
- Where do we particularly want to preserve green space?
- What changes would we like to see in respect of traffic, parking and bus routes?
- Are our shops, cafés, pubs, restaurants and filling stations the right mix and in the right locations for the future?
- What do we feel about more light industry and where should it be sited?
- What do we feel about future plans for Aston Clinton Park and the proposed new community centre?
- Do we think that speed bumps should be installed on roads near the School?

#### ACNHP v. PACVE

There may be understandable confusion over the respective roles of the Aston Clinton Neighbourhood Plan (ACNHP) and Protect Aston Clinton Village Environment (PACVE).

ACNHP is a process, authorised by act of parliament, leading to an outcome. According to their website, PACVE is a community group of local people established to represent the views of the village and campaign for sustainable development in Aston Clinton.

There is some overlap between the two, in that both are concerned to safeguard the rural distinctiveness of the village and to avoid it becoming a suburb of Aylesbury. The key difference between them lies in the route taken to achieve a result most of us want to see, namely: a smooth transition over time to a larger village, not a suburb.

WHEN EXACTLY did kids' birthday parties get so complicated? With four primary-school-aged children, it sometimes feels like we ricochet from one party to another almost every weekend. If that sounds ungrateful, it's really not meant to. I'm pleased my children are popular enough to be invited but expectations are getting higher and higher and I sort of miss the days of pass-the-parcel and the bumps.

When it's your own child's party you care deeply that everything goes to plan-namely

Then there's the 'entertainer'. The good ones get booked up six months in advance, earning in one weekend what I earn in a year. And many of those I've encountered make me a little bit sick in my mouth.

It's just their way.

I always felt indignant that I would not be pressurised into the trend of the expensive party bag, but you need to have a very hard heart indeed to refuse twenty-five over-stimulated kids going-home gifts—not to mention the risk of social death on the playground. So you spend hours searching online for different fillers at the cheapest possible prices. You get sucked into analysing different types of actual bag. Cones? Paper bags? You want the contents

to be fun and quirky but definitely not tacky. You think a book would be a lovely idea, but the disappointment on the kids' faces tells you otherwise. What about a lucky dip? I did that once, and I'm ashamed of the ridiculous amount of time I spent actually wrapping a dustbin in which to offer said gifts.

As your kids get older you try to find something original for them

to do, something that no one else has done yet. What can possibly top bowling, archery, Go-Karting, trampolining and reptilestroking to name a few.

There are the parents who like hanging about. This is common with first-timers for whom a kids' party can be a fun social outing but once you're on child no. 2 or 3 and you've got projects to complete, hockey training and a music lesson to fit in, you need to drop and run. You sweep in late for pick up, fail to notice the cake and are thankful if they've eaten enough party rings not to require feeding later and with some sweets left in their party bag to share with you on the way home.

# How Aston Clinton gots its Surgery (Part 2)

This article follows on from 'Part 1: Early Beginnings' in the June/July issue (no. 25) of Village Life, which stimulated many readers' memories. We are particularly grateful to Ann Elkins for her photographs.

#### PART 2 Building up the Practice

Opening day, July 11th 1983, had seen eleven patients register. In those days each patient had an NHS Card with an obscure NHS number. To register with the new doctor Part A had to be completed as an application to be placed on a different doctor's list. As the patient's chosen new doctor, I had to sign that I would accept the patient. Not only that, but the card also had to be signed by the previous doctor, 'I agree to this transfer'. Only then could the card go to the Family Practitioner Committee in Aylesbury to organise the transfer of medical records - a process which took about six weeks. I invite you to think for one moment what this old-fashioned process meant. It was as though doctors 'owned' patients, which in a sense they did: the patients registered on a doctor's list were that doctor's livelihood. Unlike most client bases, the doctor was (and still is) paid



capitation fees, getting paid a sum every three months by the NHS whether or not any service has been provided to that patient. Patients needed to be quite brave to ask their doctor to release them to another doctor's list, and some of my new patients reported that the process could be quite unpleasant.

Another feature of setting up a new practice is the diversity of new patients I met. All were welcome. Some patients, often with few medical


needs, came to support the new village surgery out of a wish to support the local community. In the leisurely days when I had plenty of empty slots in morning and evening surgeries, their 'new patient consultations' afforded a chance for a newcomer like myself to learn more about the village after we had checked their details and their blood pressure. Other patients were more challenging medically. I had anticipated that some of the very sick patients in the village would transfer early because of ease of access to care. Also among

the 'early adopters' of the new service were those who had done the rounds of many practitioners and dissatisfied with all, were here to try the new doctor. I had no miracles to offer, but in those days I had the time to listen and sometimes that helped build trust.

The list growth exceeded my expectations and over two-and-a-half years, whilst I was still single-handed, the number grew to two-and-a-half thousand patients.

#### Implications of rural practice

On the patients' NHS cards there were two other boxes to complete: one for if the patient was to be a rural dispensing patient; the other to claim 'rural practice miles'. Both were crucial for me.

Patients living more than a mile from a dispensing chemist could choose to get their medication dispensed by the surgery. We earned a strictly regulated profit margin on the medicines dispensed. Dispensing doctors were not allowed to sell anything, and we needed to be strictly ethical in not prescribing in order

to make money, but this extra income was a vital source of funding for ten years until the new pharmacy opened in 1993, and patients loved the convenience. As the doctor, in the absence of a qualified pharmacist, I was responsible for checking all medication dispensed. Mrs Jean Darby, who joined in the very early days, took to dispensing like a duck to water and soon had our stock control in hand, taking endless trouble to explain medications and to load the dosette packs for patients who struggled to remember what to take and when.

Rural miles payments came in handy too. I needed to build my list up fast (see below) and with time on my hands I could travel a few miles to see patients. For rural patients living more than three miles away, there were additions to the capitation payments, and I had patients as far away as Mentmore and Ivinghoe Aston. One or two patients generated even more income: I received 'difficult walking miles',

Surgery contd. from previous page payments for a patient whom I could only reach in his barge by crossing a lock gate and walking along the canal bank.

Incidentally, canals featured in my life in another way. Rural visits were made more complicated in 1984 by the activities of the notorious rapist Malcolm Fairley, known as 'The Fox'. Fairley, captured in September 1984, was given six life sentences in February 1985. Throughout the summer of 1984, when on night visits to patients, I became used to getting stopped by the police who took the sensible step of mounting road blocks on every canal bridge in the area.

Those early years saw bad winters with heavy snowfalls making it difficult for the district nurses to get to remote farms and cottages to give insulin injections (in those days few patients administered their own insulin.) This induced me to purchase a Landrover in our second year.



The surgery Landrover, stocked as it was with copious equipment became a hallmark of our practice. In the light of my experience of intensive care at RAF Hospital Halton, Bucks Ambulance service appointed me as their local entrapment officer, issuing me with a blue flashing light and emergency clothing. These being the days before paramedics or outreach trauma teams here, the idea was that if the ambulance crew at a road traffic accident estimated that a casualty would be trapped for an hour or more, I was called to assist with emergency care and pain relief. Patients were very understanding on the occasions when I needed to 'drop everything and run' from the surgery.

Friends of Aston Clinton Surgery (FACS)

Not long after the practice started in July 1983, I was approached by Sam Powell to ask how the community could help the new venture. At that stage, finances were severely stretched and it was wonderful to have a local group raising funds for much-needed equipment, ranging from baby-weighing scales and an obstetric ultrasound to an early cardiac defibrillator, which was to prove life-saving. The group included stalwarts like Pat Collins (pictured left), Margaret Stevens, Tom Lyth, Jack Disbrey, George and Janet White, and Ellis Taylor (along with countless others). They not only raised funds but drove transportless patients to the surgery and accompanied others on scary hospital visits. More than anything else, their support carried us through those challenging Ed Peile early days.

Next instalment: Keeping afloat financially; The growing team at the new surgery; Life on call.

FACS had raised £3,400 towards the cost of a cardiac defibrillator for Aston Clinton Surgery. TV personalities Frank Bough and Bernard Falk came to Green Park to present a cheque for the final £800 needed.

70th anniversary of VE Day

FRIDAY 8 May 2015 was the anniversary of VE Day (Victory in Europe Day), marking 70 years since the end of WW2 in Europe.

Presentation by 1st Aston Clinton Scout Troop

The 1st Aston Clinton Scouts came to our June meeting and gave us a super presentation of their Summer 2014 expedition to Mons, following in the footsteps of the Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry 1914 retreat from Mons in Belgium to Le Cateau in France.

The scouts walked the first three days of the retreat to Le Cateau. Our troop was joined by other British and overseas scout units. They

also met up with some German scouts. Their presentation has been made into a DVD telling the story of the retreat that only stopped close to Paris. There are pictures of our troops marching to Mons and also of our scouts walking in three stages from Mons to Le Cateau. The scouts found that walking that distance was quite tiring, especially on the third day when it rained, a situation that was common to all our troops during WWI.

The DVD shows our scouts attending several memorial parades where they were made welcome by local Belgium dignitaries. To get the full story, purchase the DVD from 1st Aston Clinton Scout troop. Proceeds go to the Royal British Legion and UNICEF.

Members of our branch will be attending the annual Battle of Britain Memorial Service at Westmister Abbey in September. #### A hidden corner of Aston Clinton



THIS photograph dates from the time that 'The Bell at Aston Clinton' was synonymous with gastronomic excellence across the nation. Stars of stage and screen and famous faces from all walks of life came to Aston Clinton to enjoy the superb food produced by Michael Harris and his staff. Often, the diners stayed for days.

Such was the success of The Bell Inn that the old brewery opposite was converted to provide additional hotel accommodation. The original stables and malt-houses were turned into a group of cottages round the cobbled yard concealed behind what had been the wine shop. As you can see, the courtyard was seen at its best when geraniums and lobelia trailed from hanging baskets and fuchsias spilled out of the tubs and flower pots.

Much care went into making the rooms comfortable and attractive. The hotel brochure of the time claimed that "rather than resort to mass produced hotel-style furniture, old pieces are used-some of them having long been in the owning family's possession, and, though not necessarily valuable, regarded with affection".

The brochure also boasted that "each room has a refrigerator well stocked with drinks, and those little personal things which make so much difference: bath salts, soap flakes, bathroom scales, and even a hairdryer".

Altogether, there were 21 rooms and suites at The Bell Inn, each with bathroom, telephone, television and radio. Fifteen of those rooms were set around the courtyard and six were in the main building.

# Don't pass The Buck

WHEN the Rothschild Arms pub closed in 1993, the last pub in Buckland was gone. Rather than mope, the Buckland Society sprang into action to create a village pub, to be overseen by members Tony Fleetwood and Phil Hedges.

The first obstacle was obtaining a licence which involved a court appearance which didn't come naturally to Phil. Confidence was not high as most applicants were merely applying for a licence to serve sherry at the next PTA meeting. The bench coughed and spluttered when Phil asked for a full 4-day licence. Having retired for what seemed an age, they returned to grant the licence. The process became less arduous in subsequent years.

In the first year of 1995, the Aston Martin Owners Club (AMOC) celebrated its Diamond Jubilee and built a monument on Aston Hill.

They had planned a luncheon at the Bell but following a double booking there, they snapped at the invitation to move to the Buck. The owners of Church Farm, Ronnie and Margaret Brown, kindly provided use of their paddock for parking and it was to become the first of many luncheons AMOC enjoyed over the years.

This year, the Buck celebrated 20 years and 22 openings (the extra events were the Golden Iubilee and The Millennium weekends).

Over £60,000 has been raised to date for local charities, mainly All Saints Church at Buckland and Rennie Grove Hospice Care (formerly Ian Rennie Hospice at Home).

The first years helped pay for the restoration and extension to Buckland Village Hall, followed by extra funds for restoring the storage sheds. A further two years paid for the material used to build the toilet block at All Saints, followed by money given towards the impressive village sewn map proudly displayed in the

church. In 2013, a donation was gratefully received by the Stoke Mandeville colonoscopy scanner appeal. Their department, along with their families, came to the Buck for lunch. This year nearly £4000 has been divided between All Saints and Rennie Grove.

Every year over 50 volunteers give their time, energy and commitment into organising and running this wonderful social and charitable event. They deserved the support from the hundreds who enjoy the splendid lunches and fine local ales. This year, an impressive 380 main courses were served, with the bonus of live music at three of the eight sessions provided by Norman Garner, David Bekaert and Nigel Kippax and their fellow musicians.

Once again, a brilliant effort by all concerned.

We learned that he originally occupied the Old School House with his owners but was then left behind when they emigrated some six years ago. From then on he adopted a nomadic existence wandering from house to house being fed, becoming more feral in nature but yearning to return to his original dwelling. Zumta was sometimes seen jumping through open car windows of Village Hall patrons and making himself at home and I'm sure that the unseen stowaway must have taken at least one unexpected ride! Having an air of independence and self-reliance meant he patrolled his patch

and enforced his territorial rights relentlessly.

By 2012 it was thought that he must have been between 15-17 years of age. In any event, and he was definitely looking a little shabby. As he was living outside we built him his own weather-proof, cushioned and heated cat-pad. We were relieved when he adopted this and soon made it his nightly residence.

# The Whitechapel Mission Clothes and Goods Appeal



PART of St Michael's regular giving is the support we offer to the Whitechapel Mission.

Each year we give our harvest gifts. The Mission is open every day of the year, including Christmas, to provide a substantial breakfast to the homeless living in the East End of London. It is independent of government and relies totally on donations. Besides money, our harvest gifts of breakfast foods help support the work.

This year we are looking for non-perishable, bulk, and staple items (dry and canned) food items such as: baked beans, tinned plum tomatoes, cereals, tomato sauce, tea, coffee, sandwich spread, pepper, canned fruit, canned meat, biscuits, baked beans, hot chocolate, sugar, squash and honey.

We also collect clothing which is made available to anyone. Any clothing, new or secondhand is accepted but they are in need of the following: winter jackets, winter coats, jumpers, men's gloves, black woollen hats, woollen scarves, baseball caps, T-shirts, padded shirts, face flannels, men's underwear, socks,

jeans (28-36"), rucksacks, men's trainers, men's shoes, jogging bottoms, trousers (28-34"), hand towels and bath towels.

In the basement of the Mission are washing and showering facilities. The following are much needed: ladies' make-up, body lotion, body wash, hand cream, face cream, shampoo, soap, toothbrushes, deodorant and shaving foam.

They are also desperate for old 35mm film canisters to put medical tablets in and carrier bags so that the homeless can carry their belongings.

We will start to collect clothing and foodstuffs in church from the beginning of September for our Harvest Festival on Sunday 13th. The Whitechapel Mission will collect our harvest gifts in October, so if you cannot make the Harvest Festival there will still be time to donate.



#### Michael Anns (1940-2015)

MICHAEL ANNS was a true son of Drayton Beauchamp. He was born at 2 Peartree Cottages on 11th June 1940, only one week before his father Jim went off to war for five long years. Michael's mother, Margery, was a Ball – one of the ten or so families whose names were everpresent in Drayton Beauchamp for generation after generation in the days when the

The surname Ball has appeared in the registers of the village church for 200 years at least. The Balls and other local stalwarts toiled on the land, looked after the church and graveyard, volunteered whenever tasks needed to be done or money raised for the church, and took care of each other in good and bad

parish was still a farming community.

In his father's absence, Michael was surrounded by the loving care of his extended family – mother, maternal grandmother, cousins, aunts and uncles – many of whom lived locally. He delighted in his rural surroundings and as a lad could often be found helping with the work on a local farm rather than sitting in the school

classroom. He pumped the organ in the village church and helped his neighbours carry out repairs to the old schoolroom which was at that time used as the village hall.

Michael was fortunate in being young at a time when village children could roam freely around the countryside, learning, exploring, and having the kind of adventures which most children in the more anxious, cautious world of

2015 will never experience. At the same time, in this small hamlet where

everyone knew everyone else, the
activities of Michael and the other
children were quietly observed by
the village men and women going
about their daily tasks. This meant
that each child's safety and wellbeing were always being monitored,
but—perhaps less welcome to the
child—it also meant that reports to

parents of a child's misdemeanours tended to reach the child's home before he did.

Michael was involved in many boyhood adventures, at least some of which must have earned him his mother's displeasure. There were occasions when the Lower Farm pony and trap were 'borrowed' so that Michael and

his friends could go for jaunts, particularly to the rookery at Buckland; there were eggs to be 'rescued' from a henhouse and cooked in a hole dug in the field, and there were cricket pitches to be laboriously created in a level area of meadow with the help of a push-mower.

At a Christmas concert in the schoolroom one year, organised by Edie and Florrie Ballad of Lower Farm, Michael hid their niece's recorder before she-Frances-was due to play it. Fortunately Michael's cousin Richard had seen him hide it and retrieved it just in time to save the day.

Michael's first paid work was at Upper Farm for Harry Nicholls. He then trained as a builder, carpenter and bricklayer, studying at Aylesbury Technical College. He was involved in the construction of the new town of Hemel Hempstead and for a time made chicken cages for Grossmith of Aston Clinton. He also worked at Frovines, the Jewish slaughterhouse in Tring, and became foreman there.

Michael married and had two daughters. In 1996 after some years away from the village, he returned to 2 Peartree Cottages with his second wife Norma to look after his by-now widowed mother, Margery, who was in poor health.

Margery died in 2000; Michael and Norma stayed on, creating a wonderful vegetable and flower garden at their cottage, content and happy in the surroundings they both loved.

Although the village had changed greatly during the course of his lifetime, Michael never had a moment of doubt that his heart and his roots were here in the village of his birth. As his health failed, he was lovingly looked after by Norma who was in turn supported by their children and grandchildren. Both Michael and Norma felt greatly helped in his last few weeks by the recently-established Weston Project which provides support at home to the older patients (and their carers) of the Wendover, Aston Clinton and Bedgrove Surgeries. Norma remains very grateful to the Weston Project and asked after Michael's death that anyone wishing to give a donation in his memory should name the Weston Project as beneficiary. With the Project's help Michael was able to remain in the home he loved, and with Norma-his love for 42 years -at his side. His life ended, as it had begun, at 2 Peartree Cottages and Michael was buried, as was his wish, in the churchyard of St Mary the Virgin, Drayton Beauchamp beside his parents and other members of his family. 
This year, thanks to the foresight of the committee there were more 'facilities' in the field, helpfully located near the beer tent, easing the queuing seen in previous years.
