Dear Friends

Recently I was watching a father watching his child who was learning to walk. The little girl was just so resilient—the failure she was experiencing as she mastered her new skill didn't put her off, even though every couple of steps she sat down heavily or fell forward

Perhaps we're embarrassed about them. Perhaps we fear that those around us will think less of us if we're not always successful. Perhaps we don't like our vulnerable selves as much as we do our capable

starting to admit the truth about ourselves to ourselves. And we must never impersonate other clever, holy, successful people. Pretending we're somebody we're not isn't life-giving. > that just getting through life is heroic. Everyone shares our experience of the frailty of being human. We are each pursuing a uniquely interesting and valuable journey but we all have deep flaws as well as great strengths.

Like the father I watched, God is never absent. He celebrates our failures and delights in every hard-

won step we take. He recognises that salvation is not a magic act accomplished by moral behaviour but a gradual realisation of who we are and eternally will be: children of God, who through Christ are human and divine at the same time.



## A historical guide to St Michael's Church



#### PART TWO

IN the previous edition of Village Life I dealt with the Sanctuary which is that part of the Church at the east end containing the High Altar and divided from the rest of the Chancel by the Altar Rail.

The word 'Chancel' comes from the Late Latin word cancellus meaning lattice, which referred to the typical form of rood screen which divided the Chancel from the main body of the Church, known as the Nave.

The Chancel at St Michael's contains the choir stalls. The back rows of the stalls are the originals which have been adapted to fit in with the design of the pews throughout the church. The seats on the front rows and the frontals are oak and were installed in 1961. The oak that they (and all the pews throughout the Church) are made from came from trees cut down when building the then new Bedgrove Estate. They were made by Webster and

Cannon whose yard was in Cambridge Street, Aylesbury and which is now part of Sainsbury's car park. In the 1990s, additions were made to enable members of the choir to see their music better whilst standing to sing and brass candle sticks incorporating electric down lighters were added.

When the organ pipes were moved from between the windows on the south side of the Chancel to the west end of the church, some of the plaster fell off revealing a little bit of a medieval wall painting. Some time ago an 'expert' told us that it was a small part of a depiction of the beggar touching the robe of St Martin. How such a bold assertion could be made from such a small detail, I do not know. Conscripted as a soldier into the Roman army, St Martin found the duty incompatible with the Christian faith he had adopted and became an early conscientious objector. He is best known for the account of his using his military

sword to cut his cloak in two, to give half to a beggar clad only in rags in the depth of winter.

Over each of the four windows in the Chancel and over the east window and the blocked up window in the Sanctuary are stone mouldings at each end of which are carved stone heads. They would have been carved by a stonemason who specialised in portraiture. Usually the heads would be of people who lived in the village at the time the church was built, so here we probably have portraits in stone of some old Astonians. Considering they are nearly 800 years old, they are in remarkably good condition. Up close to the one with the



rather peculiar hair that looks like snails, one can still see traces of the paint with which it was originally covered.

There are a small number of memorial plaques in the Chancel. The most notable is that to the former

Rector, Charles Watkin Wynne Eaton who was Rector between 1848 and 1870. Although the memorial is to him, most of the information on it concerns his wife to such an extent that I wonder if *she* wrote it during her lifetime!

The Chancel contains the organ console and the Choir Organ. The organ was installed in 1894 at a cost of £280. The organ was fully

restored and improved in 2012 when the pipes which are now at the west end of the nave were painted and gilded. The cost of the restoration was nearly £100,000, thirty-five times its original cost! Behind the choir organ



and hidden from view, is a 'squint', - a small window which enabled lepers and others,

unable to come into church for health reasons, to watch the administration of the sacraments.

Finally, I have to correct a statement I made in Part 1 of this history in which I said that the figure on the



right in the East Window was St Peter. In fact, it is St Paul who is always depicted with a sword. My thanks to those who spotted this and pointed it out.

### Parish Council news

HE END of the financial year sees the parish council planning towards the next one. As we look back, we can feel a great sense of pride in all that it has been achieved in the first year of this new council.

We have launched our Neighbourhood Plan (NHP) which continues to gather pace and is currently in the midst of a public consultation exercise. We have tendered out all our grounds maintenance work, saving us money and have had our first year in partnership with the excellent Buckland Landscapes. We have undertaken more grounds maintenance work but what a difference it has made, with all the clearance along the boundary of the Park, in the wooded areas and in the churchyard! We have been able to employ a new staff member who is not fully but largely dedicated to the planning committees and NHP, without whom the NHP would not have been possible.

We have applied for and received almost £128,000 in Section 106 money from new housing developments in the village. This has enabled us to install a state of the art Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA), new park signs and a new pathway allowing everyone to access our facilities. We have installed an overspill car park in anticipation of the busy summer months. We are hoping that the new skate ramps and integrated play park equipment will be in place by May half-term. We look forward to seeing disabled children being able to use the new equipment alongside their able-bodied counterparts.

We have implemented new policies that have brought us into line with current public sector practice, and a new accounting system to keep a tight eye on the finances. We have forged working links with the football club, the youth club and the skate park users. Last but not least, we have tenanted out the Pavilion to the fantastic 'Your Cafe in the Park'. For this

council, this is only the start of what is planned.

As Clerk, I would like to congratulate the council members on these achievements and for ensuring local taxes are being spent for the good of the village, with every penny working effectively during 2015-16. The parish council proportion of your council tax amounts to £8.79 per household per month for the average home in Aston Clinton. More than two-thirds of this was spent on projects for, and maintenance of, the village.

#### Future plans

Looking ahead to the next two years of this council, we are thinking big! Building a new community centre is not for the faint-hearted but we have already had earmarked over £1 million from BCC's New Homes Bonus and from Section 106 money, to be set aside from local housing developments. The sub-committee are now meeting regularly to find ways of raising the remaining £1.5 million. Designs have been prepared for the building which will contain high quality sports, hospitality, performance, meeting and office provision. We can't wait!

## Interested in being an allotment holder?

ASTON Clinton used to boast over 300 allotment plots on two main sites in the village. The first site was where the Wimpy estate is built, between Rosebery Road and New Road. These allotments were served by two wells and housed a variety of sheds in all shapes and sizes. Several families had piggeries for fresh meat and to recycle waste food from their homes. The second large allotment site was where the Long Plough estate is now. This area stretched from the back of Brook Street and Green End Street to the telephone exchange and to the school which was built on the site of the old recreation ground.

In the early 70s the land for Aston Clinton Park was purchased by the Parish Council to replace the old recreation ground which was needed for a new village school (see p.22). Provision for new allotments was made, because new homes were being built on the original sites. Initially they were situated on the site of the All Weather Pitch in the park, but later were moved to the existing location.

A happy band of allotmenteers can be found tending their plots and cultivating fresh fruit and vegetables most days throughout the growing season. Nowadays, water is supplied from a water tank which is filled by pump from the stream which flows through the park.

Over recent years remedial work has taken place bringing the uncultivated plots back into use and there are now eight vacant plots. Each plot measures 15x 5metres with an annual charge of £11. For more information, phone the Clerk to the Parish Council on 01296 631269.

### Aston Clinton, Buckland & Drayton Beauchamp Horticultural Society

We are now well into spring and I hope your garden is showing the fruits of autumn labours. The flowering trees are in bloom and we have leaves on the trees. Now is the time to stroll in the park and see how well the trees, planted by the Horticultural Society are growing. The Society's forthcoming talks include Graham Austin of Home Farm Plants on Wednesday

13th April who is talking about how to grow and look after delphiniums. Grown well, these plants can often become magnificent specimens and, as perennials, can last many years. My own experience is that you have to watch out for slugs and snails, pests that eat the young shoots as they come through the surface.

Once again your Society has taken a stall at the Aston Clinton Village Market to be held on the village school playgrounds

on Sunday 8th May, opening at 11am and ending at 4pm. We will offer our usual range of plants for sale including potted geraniums (some in flower) ready to plant into your tubs and window boxes. There will be bedding plants and perennials. We hope to have all the plants that you would wish to buy! We hope also to have runner bean and tomato plants and also fresh produce. This annual market, which also raises funds for our school, has a large range of stalls and food. It is worth a visit and if you have any surplus plants for us to sell—all the better!

On Wednesday 11th May we have Mick Jones from Berks, Bucks & Oxon Wildlife Trust talking to us about 'Conservation of Dancers End Valley and the Rothschilds'.

#### The Learning Pit

This year our school is putting children in the pit... the Learning Pit, that is! As part of our involvement in the Great Learners' Project, we are embedding the vocabulary that surrounds successful and unsuccessful learning into our classrooms. We had already started this with the concept of Learning Wizards (mentioned in a previous magazine article), but we have extended the idea in maths lessons so we can challenge children's learning more.

The idea of the pit is simple. To learn something new you need to be in the bottom of the learning pit. Once you have learnt the new skill, you are out of the pit. The most useful discussion with the children is how you get out the pit. We use the image of a ladder and each rung is another strategy they can use to help them learn. The rungs might be getting out equipment, having a go before I ask for help, talking to my partner, asking an adult, using a different approach ... the list goes on.

We are asking children to say how their learning has gone after each lesson (by saying how high up the ladder they have gone to get out of the pit), what helped them learn and what they need to do next. When monitoring books we have seen children making comments such as 'I got halfway out the pit when I got the Numicon out to help me calculate the sum'; 'I have almost got multiplying decimals, but I need another go tomorrow please'; 'It really helped me today when I talked it through with my partner'.

To feel a sense of achievement a child should recognise their own efforts in learning new skills. It was pointed out to us at the project meetings that if we help children too much with their work we diminish their personal feelings of success. They believe they only did it right because an adult helped them.

At Aston Clinton, we want the children to be independent learners who know what to do when they face the challenge of developing a new skill. We know we are having some success already with this as, if you listen carefully around school each day, you can hear some children asking to be put further into the pit! They are relishing the challenge of 'hard' work.

We are very enthusiastic about the pit project as it fits comfortably with the school work on values. For example you have to be honest where you are in the pit-too near the topthen the work is too easy. If the work is too hard then perhaps you were deeper in the pit than you realised and you need to go back a step before moving on. You also need to have learning courage so you can cope with the frustrations you always get at the outset when learning something new. You must take responsibility for your own learning and not let others do it for you.

These are just a few examples of how this project fits in with our school ethos and values.



Then, during one half-term visit, Thea showed me a script adaptation of Me Before You by Jo Jo Moyes which, as a member of the Buckland Book Group, I had read a few months previously. I had adored the book and when she said she was going to direct the movie version, I immediately offered my help

with casting. While the kids played, she took a call from Kevin Spacey. It was a surreal moment in my kitchen, albeit perfectly normal for her as she was working with him on one-man show at the time. I made tea and short-listed my favourite actors for the role of extremely handsome, paralysed Will Traynor, hoping I'd at least get to plump the cushions on the casting couch if not sit on it.

When shooting began, I spent a day on set at Pinewood Studios. Cool, young 'runners' assigned me the Assistant Director's chair and

> kitted me out with headphones, as if I was in some way important. I kept an indoor scene. Imagine that? Others brought me drinks and snacks and only blue smarties if that's what I wanted. Well not quite, but you get

shtum that I was just an ordinary mum escaping real life for a few hours and nodded sagely that "Yes, the foliage needs to move more". It was someone's actual job to waft the branches outside a window during

the picture. Post-production was an eye-opener too. Did you know that for every one second of footage there are 24 frames to edit?

Anyway, I accept that I am totally biased but I urge you to go and see it. It's a wonderfully British tragi-rom-com featuring a hilarious cameo from Joanna Lumley. You won't see my name in the credits but I can assure you that I was a key member of the 'crew', in on some crucial decisions, like which song to play during THAT scene. And look out for the wafting foliage, I was sat right behind it.

#### Lemon and Ginger Non-Cheesecake

#### Ingredients:

8oz (225g) ginger biscuits 3oz (100g) melted butter Tin condensed milk (approx 400g) 1/2 pint double cream zest and juice of three lemons and one lime

#### Method:

- · Crush biscuits and mix with melted butter.
- Press into a 9-inch tin (lined with foil).
- · Chill whilst making topping.
- · Whip the cream until it forms soft peaks.
- · Mix in the condensed milk.
- Mix in the juice and zest.
- · Pile into chilled base and level.
- · Freeze until required.



While still frozen, unwrap and place on serving plate. Leave to defrost (approx. 4 hours). Decorate with zest of lemon and lime if you wish.

## Scouting-making a difference since 1907

'Scouting exists to actively engage and support young people in their personal development, empowering them to make a positive contribution to society.'

Beavers is where the adventure starts in Scouting. Open to boys and girls between six and eight years of age, our aim is to have lots of fun, learn new things and try new and exciting experiences. We started the year off with Burns Night activities where an attempt was made to learn some Scottish dances. This was mostly foiled by our inability to distinguish our left from our right. Most of the time we try to hold meetings outside and this year we have been stargazing, firelighting, outdoor cooking, pioneering, canal dipping, orienteering, scavenger hunting, litter picking and campfire singing. We have had our own colony sleepover and some children attended the county sleepover at the Royal Artillery Museum. Food is very popular at meetings and we have



tasted fruit at Tring Tesco, cooked pancakes and sausages, made 'smores' over the campfire and continued the traditional chip shop walks.

Cubs (up to ten-and-a-half years old) is the next stage, where the outdoor activities get a little more adventurous and the first nights are spent under canvas. During the year Nigel stepped down as Akela after three years, Sophy and Sharon replacing him along with a new team of leaders.

The annual camp was two nights at Youlbury Scout Camp trying climbing, abseiling, rifle shooting and archery as well as helping with all the chores on camp. A great time was helped by Akela remembering to book the correct weather this year.

We've had hands-on demonstrations from Tring Martial Arts Academy, Aston Clinton bowls and tennis clubs, baked a cake in a mug, forced the Cubs to talk to the Brownies when we organised a joint activity in the park with them and finished the year making snow globes and tobogganing at Hemel snow centre.

Scouts (up to fourteen years old) is where you start to take responsibility for yourself. For many activities the leaders are only present to ensure everyone remains safe (if sometimes that means you're still lost). Activities started with a camp in January, chipping ice from tent zips is character building and everyone gave an enormous cheer when the snow started to fall. Other highlights are etching coasters in buckets of boiling chemicals and walking from dusk to dawn on midsummer's night. The biggest challenge for the Scouts entering their final year is 'The Expedition': two days of hiking and one night under canvas, organised and run entirely by the Scouts themselves who also carry all their own gear. Six Scouts looked utterly shattered as they staggered into Aston Clinton park at the end of the weekend but they still declared it the best activity ever.

Explorers (up to eighteen years old) provide six Young Leaders to the other sections in addition to having their own meetings. Last year was the final year of the leaders providing the programme, from January everything has

been organised by the Explorers themselves. During the year Alex attended the World Scout Jamboree in Japan, a once-in-a-lifetime trip for a very limited number of Scouts from across the globe and a further five Explorers took part in the county expedition to the Swiss Alps.

Support from the local community allows us to offer a wide range of activities. We're really grateful for the support given by too many people to mention. In addition to those

already noted we've had the use of local fields for camp fires, space to store our equipment and demonstrations of DIY and car maintenance. We've also had our trailer sponsored by At the end of 2015 Aston Clinton Scout group were presented with the Endeavour Trophy, an annual award to the 'best' group in the District, awarded for supporting events and performance in competitions.



This year is the Centenary of the founding of the Cub Scouts and we will be organizing a 'Thanks Event' this summer. This is an opportunity to thank past and present leaders and

> supporters and a chance to strengthen our links with the local community.

### How the Park and Pavilion came about

As you may know, plans are afoot to replace the Pavilion in the park with a modern building more appropriate to the needs of a growing community.

In the previous issue of Village Life, you would have read an account of how the youth club building came to be. Through a misunderstanding between your editor and James Adam, a former Parish Clerk, wires got crossed resulting in the building being wrongly described as The Pavilion in both the heading and the introductory paragraph.

This is James Adam's account of his involvement in bow Aston Clinton came to bave its present enviable recreation ground and Pavilion.

IN 1971 I was working at the Aylesbury solicitors Horwood & James and was asked to assist the then Clerk of Aston Clinton Parish Council, Raymond Tetlow. He needed some 'legs' to run around in the village and take the minutes at the meetings. I was appointed at the meeting on 12th March 1970 at

a salary of £50 per annum, payable quarterly!

It all started when the County Council wanted to replace the school which was operating from three buildings on two sides of the A41 trunk road. The Education Officer in charge of the project was Tim Brighouse, a young go-ahead Senior Assistant Chief Education Officer.

He wanted to site the new school on the Rothschild Allotments at the back of New Road but the Parish Council was, understandably, against this and wanted the School to remain in the centre of the village. I was deputed to attend a meeting at the then new

County Offices when I was told that the site at Twitchell Lane was too small to include a football pitch and was, therefore, ruled out. Living, as I was then, in Putnams Drive, I was well aware of the little field with a gate into Putnams Drive which was owned by Mr D J Elliott of Gingers Farm and almost adjoined the Twitchell Lane site and so I suggested that it was quite big enough for a junior school football pitch. This suggestion was jumped at by the county council and the field was quickly acquired together with a strip of land from the telephone exchange (at the end of Putnams Drive) to link the two sites and plans went ahead to build the new school on what had been, until then, the recreation ground.

However, from the parish council's point of view this raised the problem of finding a new recreation ground as it was statutorily bound to do. Raymond Tetlow had ascertained that there were 35½ acres of pasture land available on the south side of the A41 London Road, but it was thought that, with a purchase price of £17,500, there would not be enough money for the Parish Council to purchase it. He and

I both attended another meeting at the county offices, this time with the county valuer. His valuation of the school site, based on its development value, was £52,500 which left us both (literally) speechless! There was enough to purchase all 351/2 acres with lots left over.

In November 1971, Raymond Tetlow decided to retire from the post of Clerk to the parish council

and left it all to me! I had to arrange land swaps with Michael Harris at The Bell which allowed us to have the access that is now the approach road into the park and provided him with a site big enough for him to build his magnificent Bell Pavilion (sadly burnt down in

the 1990s). I also had to guide the Council through the hoops of fire which the Local Government Act provided before completion could take place.

Once completed, we then had the task of planning out the field. Planning and mapping out the whole area took months with meetings going on well into the night. Two football pitches were planned and trainees from Aylesbury Youth Custody Centre (the prison) were brought in to pick the stones off them. Space was allocated for the Bowls Club to have a new

Bowling Green and Club House as, up until then, they played on a sloping green at the corner of Brook Street and College Road. Further space was allocated for tennis courts. Plans for two squash courts and a house for a groundsman were abandoned on the grounds of cost.

With the money left, the Pavilion was then planned to provide a sports and social club building and, of course, the changing facilities for Aston Clinton Football Club whose hut on the old recreation ground had gone. David Bosanquet, an architect, was brought in as well as Gordon Tomalin, a quantity surveyor, and more lengthy meetings eventually saw the completion of the Pavilion in October 1973. It had a flat roof and the large meeting room was only half the size it is now. The bar had two sides as it does now but what is now the Café in the Park was the football clubs' room, adjoining their changing facilities and showers. The whole building was

designed to a strict budget and at a final cost of £35,604.75 it was a bit utilitarian. Later parish councils have been able to double the size of the hall and football clubs' showers and to make other improvements including a pitched roof.

However, it served its purpose at the time and, bearing in mind that it is a modular concrete building and was built 'on the cheap', it has lasted well for over 40 years. Aston Clinton can rejoice at having such a wonderful park and recreation ground which is the envy of neighbouring villages. Bowls, tennis, children's playground, woods, walking areas, allotments, five-a-side pitch ... the list goes on.

I do applaud the courage of the present Parish Council in planning a replacement to the Pavilion. The present building has always



had its drawbacks and I wish them every success in their endeavours.

And finally, let's not forget the foresight of those members of the Parish Council of the early 1970s. With the notable exception of Valerie Owen, every one of them has died but I hope that what they did for this village will not be forgotten. They were: Joan Baker, Dorothy Brown, Jack Cato, John Crofts, Andrew Dames, Susan de Fraine, Jack Disbrey, Ian Elliot, Ken King (chairman), Rev'd Terry Lewis, Margaret Lowe (chairman), Valerie Owen and Dick Stratford. Not all of them served throughout the development of the site and I don't remember Mr Burnham and Mrs Parfitt who are mentioned in the minutes early on. Thanks also to my Assistant Clerks (first Tim Lewis and then Elaine Dykes) without whose help I could not have managed. James Adam

## Planting in the rain

HE Buckland, Drayton Beauchamp and Aston Clinton WI planted an oak tree in the Aston Clinton Park on Saturday 6th February 2016 to celebrate the centenary of the Women's Institute. Although it was a damp and very windy morning WI members and guests were in good spirits as President Catherine Letton and Mary Tyrrell (a member since 1968) planted the tree.

The WI movement began in Canada in 1897. Erland Lee was chairman of his local Farmers' Institute and decided to have a Ladies' Night, to which Adelaide Hoodless came. Adelaide had lost a son at eighteen months as a result of drinking unpasteurised milk. Following this evening, Erland, his wife Janet (who had been a teacher) and Adelaide formed a group—The Women's Institute—to educate and inform rural women about the health of their children and encourage them to be a part of their local community.

In 1915, after much work by Madge Watt, another Canadian, on the 16th September at Llanfair PG on the Isle of Anglesey, the first WI was formed. By the autumn of 1916 there were 24 WIs. In 1924 Jerusalem was sung for the first time at the AGM. This had been the Suffragettes' song, many of whom had joined the WI. In 1947 Denman College, near Abingdon, was opened and today still offers courses on many subjects to today's members.

Each local WI is supported by the National Federation and, for us, also by the Bucking-hamshire Federation. We are a campaigning organisation and over the years have passed many resolutions on a wide range of topics that matter to women and their communities. The WI Life magazine, sent to every member, keeps everyone up-to-date.

Our WI was started at
Buckland in November 1930
with Drayton Beauchamp,
followed by Aston Clinton
so this December we
celebrated our 85th birthday.

We meet on the first Wednesday of the month at the Anthony Hall in Aston Clinton at 7.45pm and have a varied programme of talks but we also have other activities such as theatre and cinema visits, lunch get-togethers, walks and gentle strolls.

## Obituary: Dr Peter James

T WAS with great sadness that we in Drayton Beauchamp learned of the recent death of ▲ Peter James. After leaving this area, Peter and his wife Heather had been living for several years in Swansea. They were proud to be Welsh and enjoyed living once again in Wales, but their move to Swansea was unfortunately prompted not by a wish to return to their homeland, but rather by the heartbreaking discovery that Peter was suffering from a severe hearing problem for which no treatment could be offered and which would inevitably become gradually worse. Given that music was his career and his great passion this was a particularly cruel blow, although happily he was still able to carry on composing music and marking the examinations of music students.

Until his premature retirement Peter was for many years the Vice-Principal of the Royal Academy of Music in London. He and Heather lived in Wilstone, but loved St Mary the Virgin Church in Drayton Beauchamp and threw themselves enthusiastically into church life. Heather became organist at St Mary's and Peter became a churchwarden. Using his professional access to a ready supply of young students from the Royal Academy of Music, Peter set up the Summer Music concerts in Drayton Beauchamp.

These concerts gave young musicians valuable experience in playing before an audience; they gave the audience an opportunity to listen to excellent music and to socialise over supper and a glass of wine; and they raised funds for the ever-recurring costs of repairs to our ancient church. Peter even secured the ('anonymous') sponsorship of Professor Bill Mead of Aston Clinton, who also died recently. These concerts are now in their 29th year and attract young musicians—some of whom are already graduates of the Royal Academy of Music and seasoned professionals—and an audience from far beyond the village.

We extend our deepest sympathy to Heather and to all the family.





## Aylesbury Waterside reviews

My name is Christine Jensen and I will be writing a review for the shows I see at the Waterside Theatre. I realise that these productions may well have been and gone from our area by the time you read these words. But if the tour is still going on, you may be able to catch up at another local theatre.

#### The Glenn Miller Story

I did not see this production, but the reviews from my fellow critics are varied. I have looked for some guidance and the general feedback is extremely positive. However, one criticism is worth mentioning; Tommy Steele, excellent showman that he, is felt to be too old to play the 40-year old band leader. Fortunately the show has two big pluses: a rich sounding 16-piece on-stage orchestra (four of whom double up as actors), and some nifty period choreography, gracefully executed by a six-strong chorus.

#### Rehearsal for Murder

As a murder mystery fan I was really looking forward to this production, and I wasn't disappointed. With an effective, simple single set throughout the play and carefully created flashbacks to a murder (believed to be a suicide) a year ago to the day when the characters reunite, the Classic Thriller Theatre Company keeps you on the edge of your seat. A playwright is still struggling to deal with being told his fiancée committed suicide the night before their wedding, and, after a party to celebrate the opening night of their play, he still believes she was murdered. The play has plenty of twists and turns, and you really won't see the end coming! Highly recommended.

#### **Aston Arrows Racing**

For those of you fortunate enough to be present in Aston Clinton Park for the start of the Aston Hill 100 Celebration procession on May 17, you may have wondered about the group of children who were flagging the cars off. They were in fact Year Six pupils from Aston Clinton School, who belong to a very special club - Aston Arrows Racing.







Aston Arrows Racing has been running for three years and is a wonderful partnership between the school and volunteers from our local community. The project is part of the Greenpower Education Trust, a UK-based charity that enthuses young people about science and engineering by challenging them to design, build and race an electric car.

Each year, a new group of children embark on the challenge of putting together a car framework from a kit before designing and adding the bodywork. They learn how to safely use tools and to understand the mechanics of this simple car. Much consideration is given to the theme of the car each year and the materials that will be used to complete it.

This season, we have used our local history and based our car on the 1922 Aston Martin TT1 'Green Pea' which had its racing debut at

the French Grand Prix in 1922 and at Aston Hill in the same year. At the Aston Hill 100 celebrations, the team were delighted to meet the owners of this wonderful car and be allowed to sit in it! The children researched 'Green Pea', designing the bodywork and including elements of it in their car. They were fortunate to form a partnership with the Automotive Engineering department at the University of Hertfordshire and, through this, learned about computer design and 3D printing which they used to recreate the iconic grill of this Aston Martin. Through visiting the university, the children were given the chance to learn more about how cars work and see what higher education looks like. They also had the opportunity to present our project to the heads of the engineering departments!

The children are taught to drive the car and practise throughout the school year, honing their skills ready for our race meets.

Greenpower runs many meetings across the country and Aston Arrows Racing takes part in two race days each year, ending at Goodwood on the last Sunday in June. This is a fun day out for the team and their families. The children race against up to 100 cars from other schools across the country. They enter drag, slalom and sprint races as well as driving a lap of the course and undertaking a pit stop challenge.

Each year, we have improved on our performance, learning from previous seasons. This year, we came away from both our meetings with many wins and trophies. We could not be prouder of our children and all they have achieved!

Aston Arrows Racing is so much more than building and driving a car. It teaches the children teamwork and independence, it builds confidence, it teaches them about fundraising and blogging, and it is an opportunity for children to apply STEM understanding in a practical way. We also encourage past students to come back and volunteer with us, often for



their Duke of Edinburgh awards. This year, it has been wonderful to be part of the Aston Hill events, learning about and celebrating our local racing history as well as the history of Aston Martin.

As we come to the end of our third season, it only remains for us to dismantle the car and say farewell to our current team members as they head off to their new secondary schools. We are very aware that we would not be able to offer such an exciting experience without our local volunteers who come in week after week to support the children. Special thanks need to go to Mike Stark, Andy Graham and Paul Flower, without whom, Aston Arrows would not be so successful.
