Faith is being sure of what we hope for, certain of what we cannot see'.

A nun who worked for a local home health care agency was on her rounds when she ran out of petrol. As luck would have it, there was a petrol station just down the street. She walked to the station to borrow a can of petrol to start the car.

The attendant told her that the only can he owned had just been loaned out!

As the nun was on her way to see a patient, she walked back to her car. Rummaging through it, she spotted a bedpan she was taking to the patient. Always resourceful, she carried it to the station, filled it with petrol, and returned to her car.

As she was pouring the petrol into the tank, two men walked by. One of them said to the other, "Now that is what I call faith!"

What they thought was an act of faith, the nun knew was an act of reason. Christian faith is based on reason; it's based on evidence not emotion.

Historical evidence in both Jewish and Roman writings of the time, and in the

New Testament, state that Jesus lived and died and rose again. Once you've considered the evidence and chosen to believe it, like the nun in the story, things start moving for you.

That's not to say you need to have all the answers to all the things you face, rather you know enough to begin a relationship with the living Jesus.

As an archbishop of Canterbury put it, "I do not seek to understand in order that I may believe, but rather I believe in order that I may understand".

May you come to know the 'reason for the season' and discover joy in 2026.

Bishop of Buckingham visits St Michael's

On Sunday, October 12, the new Bishop of Buckingham, the Rt. Rev'd Dave Bull, visited St Michael's Church for the first time. He was accompanied by the Assistant Archdeacon, Rev'd Chris Bull.

The occasion was to celebrate the completion of the works to the south aisle of the church, including re-roofing, underpinning, stonework, re-pointing and the rebuilding of some high-level walls and a buttress.

As part of the celebrations, representatives from charities that made substantial donations, that together amounted to more than £300,000, were also present. One of those donors was the Francis Coales Memorial Trust who not only contributed financially but also made a presentation of their Founder's Chalice to the church to be held for a year. the trust's Chairman, Martin Stutchfield. Three other trustees were also present and a light lunch following the service was funded by the Trust.

Countess Elizabeth Howe was also present in her dual capacity as both the Lord Lieutenant of Buckingham and patron of the Bucks Historic Churches Trust, which also donated. The major contribution to the cost of the project was made by the Turpin Charity and the Chairman of its trustees, Richard Maskell, read a lesson.

In other news, fundraising continues. The church still doesn't have enough money to rerender the east wall where the Victorian plaster has fallen off, and the final stage of the Open House Project to extend the church by building on an accessible toilet and a catering kitchen has now commenced – led by Churchwarden, Steve Bowles, with fundraising headed up by Churchwarden, Liz Laurence-Blake. *James Adam*

As we approach the end of the year, we have the opportunity to look back at a very busy 2025 and reflect on our achievements.

The Grow to Give initiative, which has been operating with our park allotment growers for the fourth year, has now finished for 2025, and we sincerely thank everyone who has once again generously donated their excess fresh produce to the Aylesbury Vineyard foodbank. By the end of October, the Aston Clinton growers had donated over 175kg of fresh produce to the foodbank, an amazing amount for this vital cause, which is sadly more in demand than ever. The total for the whole county for the same period was 2,200kg, so Aston Clinton provided around 8% of the county total - well done to all of our super growers! While on the subject of allotments, any resident interested in taking on an allotment for next year can apply via the parish office. We offer half size allotments as well as full size.

Strengthening our initiative to work more closely with other local community groups, we held the second Harvest Festival Scarecrow Trail at the end of September, in conjunction with St. Michael & All Angels Church. This year, the weather was not as kind, but it didn't deter stalwart Trail followers who braved the rain to walk around the village viewing the 21 scarecrows and marking their top three best dressed. Donations for the Aylesbury Foodbank were requested, and we were overwhelmed by the generosity of participants who donated a whopping 224.93kg of non-

perishable food donations and £114.41 in cash. The scarecrows this year were even better than 2024, with the top spot being won by Barnowls Nursery with their scary Incey Wincey Spider! Runners-up were Your Cafe in the Park and the Aston Clinton Society. Our own dogwalker scarecrow attracted a lot of attention, including from a few dogs that barked at the scarecrow dogs wanting to play! Well done to all for a great effort ... the event will return in 2026.





Still on the subject of events, we ran the free Punch & Judy half term sessions again in the Red Kite Pavilion; both sessions were very well attended with children and adults alike enjoying fun entertainment with the addition of balloon modelling in the afternoon.

The annual Remembrance Sunday service took place on November 9 at the War Memorial. The mild sunny weather attracted a record-sized congregation, adding to the beautifully turned out groups of youngsters representing the Aston Clinton uniformed groups. Our sincere thanks go to Mr. John Disbrey, who does a wonderful job of keeping our memorial looking its very best every year, the volunteers who bravely steward the road closure points, keeping all attendees safe while sadly enduring some abuse from disgruntled motorists, and Sue Haycock who allows us to occupy her front drive each year for the event.

Our final event for the year is the visit of Santa's Float from the North Pole, which takes place over the weekend of December 13/14. On Saturday, Santa will start just before 4pm at Dayla's yard, finishing around 7pm at the Red Kite Pavilion and on Sunday, he will start from 4pm at Wenwell Close and finish at The Oak around 7pm. Full details of the route can be found on page 11, our website, noticeboards around the village and social media pages. We will attempt to keep a live feed going via Facebook on both days so that everyone will know where Santa is in the village. We are pleased to be collecting again for local charities - Aston Clinton Scouts, Chilterns Neuro Centre and the Rennie Grove Hospice - so please save your donations for our buckets and card readers.

In October we welcomed a new councillor, resident Gary Cleator, and we look forward to working together with Gary going forward.

In November, councillors were invited to join our new traffic warden around the village, checking for dangerous and yellow-line parking – particularly in key areas around the school at drop-off and pick-up times. Being highly visible, the traffic warden did speak with a number of drivers, and, perhaps unremarkably, there were only a few contraventions at the times of his visits. Residents are asked to park properly at all times, particularly around junctions, to avoid creating dangerous

conditions for pedestrians and drivers alike. Community Speedwatch has been absent in recent months due to a lack of volunteers – if you can spare an hour a month, then please do sign up and help us keep a presence against speeding in the village.

Buckinghamshire Council released its draft Local Plan recently. This legal document sets out how the county will meet its future housing, economic, and infrastructure needs up to 2045. It allocates land for new development, guides planning decisions, and protects the environment while managing growth. This plan is being developed to address the need for approximately 91,000 new homes by 2045 and was recently open for public consultation. Our planning committee recognises that Aston Clinton may have to take a certain amount of housing going forward, but by responding to the consultation, and in particular to the settlement hierarchy classification of Aston Clinton as a Tier 3 (small market town or other large settlement), which we feel is incorrect, we hope to influence what housing we are likely to be required to allocate, and where.

The new year is just around the corner, and 2026 will be a challenging year for all communities in Buckinghamshire, as central government funding cuts mean that Bucks Council will receive substantially less financial support next year. This will inevitably filter down to parishes and so managing our finances well will be key to keeping everything running smoothly here in Aston Clinton.

And finally ... to give our hardworking staff a well-earned break, the parish council office will be closed between Christmas and New Year, with an emergency contact number for councillors, should you need it. We wish all residents and businesses in Aston Clinton a very merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year.

Aston Clinton u3a

As an active member of Aston Clinton u3a, I would like to give readers a flavour of what being a member is like and what is available to the over 55s in our area.

Over the past 12 years, I have joined several groups. As I was scrolling through my iPad photos, I suddenly realised how busy and interesting the u3a has made my life, with many good friends and lots of good shared times. Here are a few examples.

Book Group: Over the last few months, we have read some amazing books, many I would otherwise have not bothered with. Our book group meets once a month rotating around members' homes - with tea and cakes to help the chat (which is not confined to the subject books).

Garden Visiting: During the spring and summer this group visits private gardens that are normally not open to general visitors. Once a month we have an afternoon visit and usually finish the tour with tea and cake with the owner/gardener to get more insight into the garden's development.

History Group: This group also meets monthly, either in the Baptist Church Hall or a visit to local historical sites. Recent trips have been to Amersham Museum and Little Missenden Church, which has spectacular medieval wall paintings.

Science & Technology: This is probably the largest of our groups and usually meets on the last Wednesday of the month to hear from visiting speakers on varied topics from 3D printing and HS2 to diagnostic radiology and Concorde.

In the summer, the group often goes on trips such as the Elizabeth Line, the De Soutter factory, and a modern milk farm where the cows have computer tags that allow them to be milked when the cows choose.

Apart from the specific groups, all members can attend the main meeting at the Baptist Church on the 3rd Tuesday of the month where we have visiting speakers and refreshments.

My own journey with Aston Clinton u3a was enhanced when I volunteered to join the Committee five years ago. I am now Vice Chair and Membership Secretary and will become Chairperson in February. It will be a hard act to follow Freda, our present Chair, but I hope, with everyone's support, we will have ever more enjoyable times and activities.

To Smartphone or not to Smartphone?

In the UK, children's happiness and self-esteem have been steadily declining since 2010 - around the same time that smartphones and social media became mainstream.

- 1 in 6 children aged 7-16 now suffers from a probable mental health condition (NHS) Digital, 2023).
- Girls aged 11-13 who use social media heavily are nearly three times more likely to struggle with body image and self-worth (Ofcom, 2023).
- By the time a child turns 13, more than 60% have already had a negative or harmful experience online (Ofcom, 2023).
- The average teenager receives 237 notifications a day (Common Sense Media, 2023).
- 1 in 3 parents of children with smartphones has cried over their child's phone obsession (HMD Global, 2024).

We are co-founders of One Childhood, based here in Aston Clinton. As parents of young children, we believe this is not a problem any of us should be making in isolation, nor should it fall solely to government, media, or overstretched schools to deal with the fallout. We are in an unenviable position; either we choose to delay giving our children

smartphones and risk social exclusion or we give one and risk exposure to harmful content. We want to build an open, supportive and judgement-free community to help parents navigate the growing pressure - both on us and on our children.

We're proud to champion the national Smartphone Free Childhood (SFC) movement, which encourages families to delay smartphones until the age of 14, and social media until 16.

But why?

Put simply: because they are children. Children should be playing, imagining, creating, developing language and building relationships through face-to-face interaction. They deserve a play-based childhood, not a phone-based one.

In the UK today:

- 89% of 12-year-olds own a smartphone.
- 25% of 5-7 year-olds already have one.
- the average age at which a child gets a smartphone is nine.

Smartphones weren't designed with children in mind, but childhood is being reshaped around them.

The science

Jonathan Haidt, author of The Anxious Generation, puts it clearly: "Play is the work of childhood. Through play, children learn the skills they need to become successful adults."

Excessive screen time, especially in the early years, can affect brain development, impair executive functioning (focus, self-control, emotional regulation), and is already being observed by educators across all age groups. By age five, a child's brain is already 90% developed.

The big issues

Some of the most serious concerns are: lost childhood opportunities, harmful online content, declining mental health, addiction, shortened attention spans, cyberbullying and grooming.

So, what can we do?

We can begin by looking at ourselves. Take a moment to notice how often we, as adults, are on our phones: at bus stops, in queues, at dinner tables, during conversations. Our children are watching. We are setting the tone.

Smartphones are designed to be addictive. Every notification, like, or message releases a hit of dopamine, the brain's reward chemical. But as Haidt explains, dopamine isn't satisfying. It creates craving, not contentment.

Even children's games – like Animal Crossing – are built to keep them hooked with daily streaks, tokens, and progression loops. The longer they stay, the more the tech giants profit. And that's the business model.

Let's talk about it

We believe the most powerful thing we can do is talk. Be curious. Ask other parents what they think. Together, we can reset expectations and take away the peer pressure.

Every family is different, and many children already have access to screens. That's OK. It's never too late to revisit boundaries, build healthier habits, or take small steps towards digital balance. We can support each other in giving our children more time to grow up – free from the pressures of constant connectivity.

Try the Parent Pact

The Parent Pact, led by SFC, is a simple but powerful tool. It's a growing national movement of families choosing to delay smartphones and social media, and doing it together, so no one feels alone.

You can learn more and watch a short video on the SFC website. If it feels right for your family, we'd love you to sign the pact. Here in Aston Clinton, we already have 41 signatures and counting.

Alternatives to smartphones

We know many parents want to keep in touch with children, especially as they begin walking to school. There are excellent alternatives available — basic phones that allow calls and texts, but no internet or social media.

What we've been doing locally

Aston Clinton Primary School is fully behind this initiative. Most recently, we have been working with Aylesbury SFC and hosted a meeting at Aylesbury High School on October 6, convened by Laura Kyrke-Smith MP. This was an informative and thought-provoking evening led by a panel of professionals from police, education and medical backgrounds. In addition, there was a moving and passionate speech from a local teenager who shared his lived experience of smartphones. We were incredibly pleased to have a turnout of around 250 people which included parents and teachers. Final thoughts

One of the most important moments for me in Parliament was introducing my Private Member's Bill on perinatal mental health something very close to my heart. The Bill, which I've called "Sophie's Law", would ensure that every pregnant woman receives a mental health assessment during pregnancy, with referrals for specialist support where needed.

It's named after my dear friend Sophie, who we lost to suicide after the birth of her third child. I believe such a measure could have helped her - and it could help thousands of mums in the future. I'm very grateful to local experts, including the Aylesbury PANDAS peer support group and the Buckinghamshire Community Perinatal Mental Health Team, for their input and inspiration.

Celebrating local heroes



One of my favourite parts of the job is recognising the people who make our area special. Recently, I was delighted to present a Community Champion Award to Stephen Lott from Ivinghoe. Stephen has shown extraordinary dedication to keeping his village safe through the Speed Watch team, and he's always ready to lend a hand in community life. If you know someone in Aston Clinton who deserves recognition for their voluntary work, please do nominate them via my website - I'd love to celebrate more local heroes in the months ahead.

Supporting families with SEND

I recently convened a roundtable with parents of children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) from across Aylesbury and the villages. It was an honest and emotional conversation, highlighting the challenges around transport, delays to Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs), and access to specialist support.

I'm so grateful to everyone who shared their stories. Their experiences will directly shape how I speak up for SEND families in Parliament and with local services.

The event brought together veterans, cadets, and community groups in a moving show of remembrance and gratitude. News from your local nature reserves

What an autumn we've had! Every season brings its own wildlife features at Dancersend and Aston Clinton Ragpits, but this October and November has been very special, possibly even outcompeting the spring and summer displays of wildflowers and insects. After the long summer drought, rain arrived just in time to trigger one of the best shows of fungi we have seen for some years and helped to swell the hedgerow and woodland fruits, already prolific after all the sun and warmth.

Phil Townsend reported several different colourful waxcap fungi in the chalk grassland at the Ragpits. A meeting of the Bucks Fungus Group at Northhill Wood, Dancersend in mid-October, recorded 112 different species, including nine species new for the reserve and one new for Buckinghamshire. We were also able to check on the condition of an extremely rare tiny cup fungus, Aurantiolachnea solsequia, discovered here two years ago - a first recording of this species for the UK and possibly northwest Europe. Less tricky to track down and identify were the fruits - cherry plums, sloes, blackberries and crab apples were abundant, taunting visitors with thoughts of jams and jellies, and layers of fallen acorns and beech mast made a stroll through the woods more like walking along a shingle beach.

With holly, wild roses and hawthorn bushes still weighed down by berries, hips and haws, I am now eagerly awaiting the arrival of our winter bird visitors. From now on, our volunteer work parties carrying out essential management are often enlivened by the sight and sound of flocks of Redwings and Fieldfares, but it takes a more solitary, quiet walk through the woods to spot my favourite winter visitors – Woodcocks enjoying the feast of worms and other invertebrates in leaf-filled ditches and depressions. Other birding interests can be found around the chalk scrapes towards the top of the Dancersend Extension fields, only a few feet below the highest point in the Chilterns. Here we have already seen migrant Wheatears dropping in for a rest and expect to see Stonechats and Whinchats for a few weeks. If you miss them, it's always a good viewpoint for raptors like Buzzards, Red Kites, Sparrowhawks and Kestrels as well as Ravens which breed nearby.

Do try to fit in a winter walk at our reserves or at College Lake, between Tring and Pitstone, where there are often exciting wildfowl and wading birds to be seen through the winter. There will still be sheep, ponies or cattle grazing on parts of Dancersend so please keep dogs on a short lead.

Events at our reserves and activities for both children and family groups coming up at our flagship College Lake Reserve are shown on our website at www.bbowt.org.uk/events. The wildlife-themed talks organised by the local BBOWT Chilterns Group continue through the winter on the third Tuesday evening each month at Great Missenden Memorial Centre. On December 16, local naturalist John Tyler will speak about woodland wildlife and on January 20, Catherine Moncrieff will cover chalk streams and conservation. The talks are usually accompanied by a second-hand book stall and sales of Dancersend Special Reserve Apple Juice, a perfect Christmas gift. All are welcome from 7pm for refreshments with the talk starting at 7.30pm.

Buckland Parish Council

In the last issue of Village Life we mentioned the problems with speeding cars in the parish, particularly along Buckland Road. Traffic on this road has increased by 40% since the introduction of traffic calming in Aston Clinton, and with the higher number of vehicles, the number of speeding cars has increased. Recent traffic data showed that an average of 36,000 cars use this road in a week, with many travelling at over 40mph in a 30mph limit. Buckland Road has no pavements but is used heavily by walkers, runners, schoolchildren and dog walkers. We have been in regular contact with Buckinghamshire Council to look at ways of slowing the traffic down, but budgets are extremely tight, and at present, Bucks Council is reluctant to install traffic calming measures. So we will start with measures to try to alleviate the problem and improve signage along the road. We are also in contact with Thames Valley Police to see if there is anything they can recommend.

Buckland Parish Council is receiving an increasing number of complaints about dog mess, particularly in the Burial Ground and Churchyard. We politely remind all dog owners to keep their dogs on leads within this area and take any dog waste home with them. It is very unpleasant for people visiting the graves of loved ones to find them covered in dog mess. There are a number of red dog waste bins in the village for dog owners to use. Failing to pick up after your dog is an offence and can result in fines.

Winter is now upon us and with that come the dreaded potholes. We urge any residents to report potholes on www.Fixmystreet.com. Bucks Council is notified of all reports and will follow up and repair them. If you are unable to report using the internet, please contact the Parish Office on 01296 630962 and we will make the report. Salt bins have now been filled for the winter. If you live in Buckland Village near a slippery area, please feel free to use some of the

salt and spread it on the road. Unfortunately, Bucks Council does not do this and it falls to members of the community to help.

As previously reported, there have been many changes to notifications of planning applications and the planning portal online. Buckland Parish Council is now displaying any planning application notices on orange sheets on the parish noticeboards and on the website and Facebook pages. Bucks Council has revamped its planning portal over the summer months. We encourage all residents to sign up for email alerts on planning applications for their neighbouring area. This can be done by simply visiting www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk. If you had previously signed up for email alerts you will need to re-register and sign up again.

Since the establishment of the ARLA/ Olleco site, Buckland Parish Council and many other parish councils have been invited to quarterly meetings with ARLA and Olleco. This has been a valuable tool for the local parish councils for liaison. Unfortunately, these meetings have suddenly been cancelled with no notice or explanation. Buckland Parish Council, along with others, is working hard to get them re-established. Coincidentally, over the summer months there has been an increased number of smells and odours reported from the ARLA/Olleco area. We would encourage all residents to report these to the Environment Agency (EA) - it does take note. After the recent spate of reports, the EA carried out a site visit and reported back to Buckland PC that the cause of the odours was cleaning of the facility.

Village Business

This is a series about the businesses that operate locally and advertise in Village Life: what they do, what services they provide and the people behind the business names.

Jared Ward is Beer Sommelier at Tring Brewery.



Q. What's your role at Tring Brewery and who works there with you?

A. My role is Beer Sommelier, Events and PR. I work with Alan and Alex in sales within the office, all under the watchful eye of director Andrew. In the brewhouse, Head Brewer Barry creates the magic, flanked by Lead Brewer Sam and brewhouse operatives Scott, Charlie and Jude. The Piggeries Taproom and Courtyard is headed up by manager Claudia.

Q. How and when did you get involved in the world of brewing?

A. I've been at Tring Brewery since 2016. I previously worked at a pub where a wide variety of beers were stocked, and part of this role was to

ensure the cask ales were fresh each day. Naturally the best way to experience and convey freshness is tasting, so I developed a palate for 'proper' beer and scouted for a job in the industry. I joined the brewery as a shop assistant, before moving on to tours and PR. I later added events and Sommelier duties to my responsibilities.

Q. What makes Tring Brewery so successful?

A. The team believes its strength lies in quality, storytelling and community, with our beers taking their names and imagery from Home Counties' folklore and history, so there's always intriguing literature and artwork. Quality is secondto-none when it comes to

brewhouse objectives, brewing each style with premium ingredients, including our signature house yeast strain. To cap it off, community is a pillar of our values as a business.

Q. How important is it to be part of the local community?

A. We regularly help at local events with preferable rates on draught beer for fundraising events and help with event logistics and beer festivals where we can. We deliver more or less exclusively within the Home Counties and all live in, or close to, Tring. We're local faces, and big supporters of local pubs and other watering

We partner with a local charity or non-profit organisation each year when brewing our monthly specials, raising

thousands of pounds through multiple fundraising events. We're also proud supporters of our local 'toad patrol' conservation group, and we're working with a local non-profit organisation that conserves community assets on our doorstep – more details coming soon.

Q. What changes have you seen at Tring Brewery?

A. When I joined, we'd just commissioned our test batch brewing kit. This has been the proving ground for styles we'd never explored before, so in the last nine years we've made forays into hazy IPA and lager - quite different from our core range of traditional cask styles - and today we cater for all tastes. Our house lager, Alchemist, is the first Tring beer to be packaged in a can. The introduction of our refillable 'growler' containers is popular in the brewery shop, replacing single-use plastic for reusable, branded flasks, growing in numbers year-on-year.

We've also just opened The Piggeries Taproom and Courtyard, our very own on-site bar, and can't wait to welcome local people to our space.

Q. How many beers do you brew?

A. We currently brew nine core range cask beers, four core range keg beers, one monthly special each calendar month, and five seasonal specials throughout the year – so 30 each year as a minimum.

Q. What are the Brewery's plans for Christmas? A special beer?

A. For Christmas, we'll be releasing our seasonal special Santa's Little Helper, a 4.8% ruby ale, alongside Ho Ho Hoe, a 4.0% traditional bitter brewed in collaboration with The Repair Shed (our annual charity) and also the December monthly special.

Q. What do you enjoy doing away from work?

A. I have wider interests in food and drink. I'm a big fan of whisky, charcuterie, cheese, hot sauce, cider – all the good stuff. I'm also big into music and film. I mostly listen to Rock music. That term can cover all manner of sins, so, yes, Heavy Metal right through to Country.

Q. The inevitable obvious question, what's your favourite beer?

A. It is, and always will be, Side Pocket for a Toad. Tring's flagship beer. Even if the boss wasn't reading, I would still affirm that Side Pocket is one of those unique beers that flits seamlessly from a solid background quaffer (only 3.6%) enjoyed with friends in a great location – to a beer you can dissect with a discerning palate, drawing on the nuance and complexity of the ale in the most indulgently geeky way. If you're looking for less of a brand-loyal answer, I do love Belgian beers, and my favourite of these is Orval.

Horticultural Society





The end of the year is fast approaching, and it is time to think ahead to the new year; 2026 will be an exciting year for the Society as we celebrate our 70th anniversary. The Society, known then as the Aston Clinton and Buckland Allotment and Garden Society, was founded in October 1956 by a dozen residents. Membership soon expanded and a programme of talks and social events developed. The first show was held in September 1957, in the grounds of Rookery House, and quickly became an annual event in the social and horticultural calendar. A spring show was added in 1997. We will be holding some special events to mark this anniversary year and a full list will be available on our website

We would love to hear any memories or see memorabilia you have of the earlier years of the Society. Coming up in the next few months at our regular venue of the Anthony Hall, with a start time of 7.30pm, we have:

December 10 - Christmas Social. Time to mark the festive season!

January 14 – AGM. Join us to hear more details of our exciting plans for 2026.

February 11 – Monthly talk, "*Lindengate* – Let's all Grow Together" by Andy Grant and Jacqui Greenham. They will discuss the idea of social and therapeutic horticulture which is at the centre of the Lindengate charity's aims.

March 11 – Monthly talk, "Daisies, Dahlias and Dendranthemas", by the very popular and knowledgeable Sandy Primrose to give us all ideas for what to grow in our gardens.

March 14 – 7pm – our first special 70th Anniversary event: dinner and entertainment with the highly talented and amusing Neil Gurney. Details of how to book will be available in January.

It may be winter, but we still have some seasonal tips for you:

- if you are feeling energetic, dig over empty borders and prepare the soil for next year's planting.
- prune climbing roses between now and February.
- hard prune overgrown shrubs and hedges while they're dormant.
- December is a good month to winter prune apple and pear trees to control shape and increase productivity. You can also prune currants and gooseberries.
- cold, wet, windy weather can damage trees, shrubs and garden structures such as trellis.
 Check structures and staking, mulch or wrap plants and wrap pots.
- insulate outside taps and try to prevent ponds from freezing e.g. float a ball on a pond but ensure it doesn't risk attracting children on to the ice. If a pond with fish does freeze, melt a space by putting a hot pan on the ice.
- bare-root rhubarb crowns, and gooseberry bushes and raspberry canes can be planted between November and March, but avoid times when the ground is frozen or waterlogged.
- spike lawns with a garden fork to improve drainage and aeration and get your lawnmower and shears serviced and sharpened while not in use.
- avoid turning compost bins as they may be sheltering wildlife such as hedgehogs and other small mammals, as well as reptiles, amphibians and bumblebees. Wait until April.
- If we do have heavy snow, brush off the tops of greenhouses and cold frames and tree branches to prevent damage.

Of course Christmas is coming, so...

- make a note of tools and equipment that you would like and put on your Christmas list!
- stems of berried winter shrubs, seasonal flowers and evergreen leaves make lovely natural festive decorations.
- for a real Christmas tree, keep its base in a stand with water and check it daily. Position the tree away from heat sources like radiators or fires.
- turkey may be the food most people associate with Christmas, but plants feature heavily in traditional Christmas goodies such as spiced mulled wine, brussels sprouts, cranberry sauce, mince pies and the traditional Christmas pudding is full of plants, although you are unlikely to have grown any except the sprig of holly on top!
- did you know that Boxing Day is the traditional day to sow onion seeds? Choose seeds, rather than sets, and start them off in pots indoors or undercover, to aid germination and plant out in spring.
- poinsettias, Christmas cactus and cyclamen make popular gifts but coal is also a Christmas plant! Buried plants were transformed over millions of years into the coal we see today. Traditionally first footers (the first person to cross the threshold after midnight on New Year's Day) brought gifts as a token of luck for the coming year, including coal, representing warmth and fuel.






